Pleasant Hill fire fighters to be honored

Six members of the Pleasant Hill Volunteer Fire Department will be honored at 7:30 p.m. on Aug. 9 at the Pleasant Hill Fire Department.

They will receive certificates from Curry County Sheriff Mike Jackson for their participation in the arrest of a man in Pleasant Hill last weekend.

According to Sheriff Jackson, Jeffery Scheidier, 21, of Clovis, was arrested on charges of false imprisonment and aggravated assault. He was tracked down and detained by Pleasant Hill Volunteer firemen.

The incident began when Pleasant Hill Baptist Church pastor Gary Warren was working on paperwork at his kitchen table about 1:45 a.m. on Aug. 3. His doorbell rang. Warren stepped out on the porch where a man asked to use the telephone because he said he had a flat tire.

Warren turned to get a remote phone to bring to the door but the man entered the home and pulled out a long barreled revolver from under his shirt. He told Warren to "get the keys to the chapel."

Warren told the man that there was nothing there, but the man insisted that Warren open the door.

Warren asked to get his shoes and shirt before they went into the chapel. When he went to the closet to get them, he loaded a shotgun

he kept in the closet. At the same time, he whispered to his wife, Cheryl, to dial "911" for help.

Turning toward the living room where the intruder waited, Warren fired a shot as the man ducked.

Meanwhile, Cheryl dialed 911 and asked the Clovis dispatcher for assistance. She also suggested that the Pleasant Hill Fire Department, Texico marshal and Curry County sheriff be notified to help search for the intruder.

Richard Kelley was one of the fire fighters who heard the call. He sped to the scene with the red light flashing on his truck.

"As I rounded the curve by the fire station I was going pretty fast. I saw somebody standing by the field. I went a ways down the road past him and called the others before I turned around," said Kelley.

"I saw him, and I had my gun with me, so I told him to get down on the ground and set the gun down. It wasn't until afterwards that I thought about how he could have shot at me. I was sure glad to see Deputy Sheriff Waldo Casarez and Deputy Texico Marshal Fry Urioste," said Kelley.

Sheriff Jackson noted that he was "sure glad to have them (the volunteer fire department) out there," too.

Farwell

Aug. 13 is the day to register new students to the Farwell School District. Registration will take place in the elementary school office from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m.

Students who were enrolled in Farwell Elementary School last year need not register at this time; they are automatically pre-registered.

Farwell High School students may register for their classes at the following times: Seniors, Aug. 15; Juniors, Aug. 16; Sophomores, Aug. 17; Freshmen, Aug. 20.

The high school will be open from 9 a.m. - noon and from 1-4 p.m. each of these days.

Texico

Ninth and 12th grade students register between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. mdt on Aug. 14.

Tenth and 11th grade students register between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. mdt on Aug. 15.

Junior High School students entering 6th, 7th, or 8th grades register on Aug. 16.

Texico Elementary School will register students on Aug. 16 from 8 a.m. - 6 p.m.

Lazbuddie Elementary School students who are new to the district may stop by the school office during the next two weeks to register. Mrs. Farris will be in the office to help students register.

Lumbrera indicted in three deaths

A Parmer County Grand Jury indicted Diana Lumbrera on Aug. 7 on three counts of capital murder in connection with the deaths of three of her children who died in Parmer County between 1976 and 1982.

The children named in the indictments here were:

- Joanna Lumbrera Garza, 3 months, who died Nov. 30, 1976 at Parmer County Hospital at Friona.
- Melissa Garza Lumbrera, 3, who died Oct. 2, 1978, at Parmer County Hospital.
- Melinda Ann Garza Lum-

brera, 2, who died Aug. 17, 1982 at Ms. Lumbrera's Bovina home.

Ms. Lumbrera is currently awaiting trial in Garden City, Kan., in connection with the May 1 death of her 4 year old son, Jose, in Garden City. Trial is set for Sept. 19.

Also dead are Joselionel Garza, Ericka Aleman, and Christopher Daniel Lumbrera. Their deaths occurred in other jurisdictions. All the children except one are Ms. Lumbrera's own children.

District Court Judge Jack D. Young set bail at \$100,000

per count. An arraignment date has been set here in Parmer County for next Thursday, but it may be changed if extradition is necessary. The Kansas authorities have priority in this case because she was charged there first. They have been asked to arrest Ms. Lumbrera.

Young has also set a November trial date, but the case will probably come to trial much later than that because she will be tried in Kansas first.

Accident ruled as cause of Farwell Clinic fire

A state fire marshal ruled Tuesday that the cause of a fire at the Farwell Clinic Aug. 5 was accidental.

The fire apparently was started by a small appliance that had been left on.

The Farwell Fire Department was summoned Sunday morning about 10 a.m. by Joe Jones, who saw smoke coming from the roof of the building as he drove to church.

He went to the dispatcher's office at the Parmer County Sheriff's Department to report the fire because it was so close.

About a dozen Farwell fire-fighters responded to the call. When firemen arrived, the clinic doors were locked so they had to break the glass on the doors to gain entry. Air from the broken windows may have fanned the smoldering embers in the office area into flames. The fire was quickly extinguished, but great smoke damage occurred.

There was also damage done to office equipment and records by the flames.

Sheriff Rex Williams arrived at the scene after the flames had been extinguished.

"It appeared to me that the fire burned a long time - maybe 4 to 5 hours," guessed Williams.

The building is fairly airtight. Much of the available oxygen was probably used up by the smoldering fire. When the windows broke, the flames spread quickly.

Williams sealed the building with police barrier tape and called the state fire marshal in to investigate.

"One room is going to have a lot of rebuilding done, the main office," said Williams.

Damage has been estimated at \$40,000 to \$50,000.

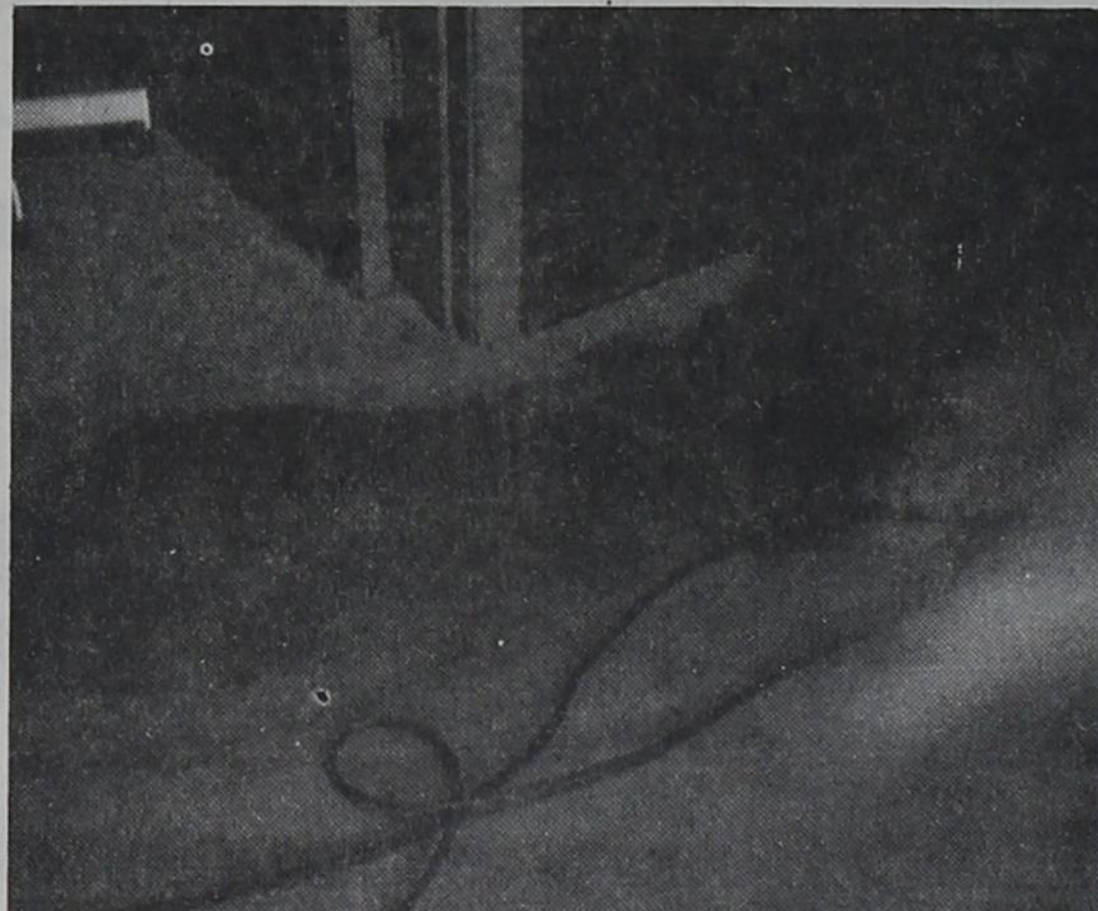
Once the state fire marshal is finished with his investigation, an inventory will be taken, and the hospital board will decide what to do next.

The Farwell Dental Clinic, which shares the building with the medical clinic, suffered smoke and water damage, and the electric and telephone wires must be replaced before Dr. Ivins can go back to work.

Ivins was at a church conference at Glorieta, N.M. when the fire occurred.

"I'm so thankful that they reported it when they did," said Ivins. "We'll lose 3 to 4 days of work, but it could have been much worse."

He and his staff were busy Monday cleaning the carpets and airing out the dental clinic.

The fire department brought four pieces of equipment to the fire. With it, they quickly extinguished the hot flames, but they needed to stay for several hours to make sure that there were no smoldering embers which might re-ignite the blaze.

Dr. William Green was at his father's home delivering peaches when the sheriff's department called his home. He rushed to the scene.

Saved from the fire were some allergy syrums. Patients needing them are asked to call Dr. Green's home in Clovis after 5 p.m.

Pleasant Hill fire fighters are building 2 water towers to store water so that they can fill pumpers in case of a fire.

Pleasant Hill leads the way

Pleasant Hill residents will be the first residents of Curry County getting new addresses.

Instead of an address like "Route 1 Box 1," residents will have four digit addresses which will denote the exact location of each house.

The new address will assist emergency personnel when the 911 number is used.

"We apologize for any inconvenience this might cause you, but we feel if one life in Curry County is saved due to our work, we are all well paid," said Martha Wall who is doing much of the work on this project.

"A heart attack victim only has 4- 6 minutes," said Pleasant Hill firefighter Richard Kelly. Response time is critical.

"Under a stressful situation, victims don't always know where they are at," added Curry County sheriff Michael Jackson. With the new 911 system, the location of the call would automatically appear on the screen.

For this reason, the Pleasant Hill Fire Department has shown its support of the new system by donating the sign posts for their district.

Starting on Aug. 2 at the Pleasant Hill Fire Station volunteers began assigning the numbers. Much of the field work will be done by Martha Wall, County Assessor. Tim Lyman, rural addressor, and Mrs. Geraldine Wilson of Pleasant Hill are also helping with the area.

The Pleasant Hill Fire Department is donating the post for the house numbers to show how important this project is to them.

The rural addressing will complete the enhanced 911 program for Curry County. The addressing will be done by fire districts. After a fire district is completed, the information will be put in the E911 system so that the dispatcher can give clear directions to emergency personnel.

When the Pleasant Hill Community is all completed, a resident will be able to dial 911, and the street location from which the call is made will automatically appear on the dispatcher's screen, and the emergency unit will know where to respond.

The emergency personnel will have a 13" x 17" plat book with each location in the county clearly marked with an address.

Adjoining counties from the northern New Mexico State line south to Guadalupe County will all use the same system based on base lines and prime meridians to number the locations in their counties. That way, emergency personnel from neighboring counties will be able to quickly respond to calls.

A reflective number will be placed in front of each rural address to assist the emergency personnel.

The address will also be given to the postmaster, and he will start his own process to convert to the street addresses. At the time he is ready, residents will receive a notice from their post office to use the new address for mail. Once a residence has a location number, the number will not be changed. The number is a physical location belonging to this one residence.

The street address system is a very simple one. The north and south roads are numbered using the alphabet. For example, A, B, or C. The letters start at the state line and extend through the west side where Curry meets Roosevelt and Quay counties. Should a house be on a north - south road, the address might be CR H, (Curry County Road H) for example.

The east - west roads are numbered 3 through 48. The 3 is the south county line of Curry County. The reason for the 3 being the first road in Curry County is that the neighboring county of will be using the same system Curry County is using, and the base line for townships is 3 miles inside Roosevelt County. Therefore, by using 3N in Curry County and 3S in Roosevelt County, there will be no confusion. Curry

County will be using CR in front of its road names, so it will not be necessary to use the N on each road number.

Each house number will be assigned according to the number of miles from the beginning of the road. For example, 33 miles from the base line will give a house number of 33. Location within a section will be the next numbers. On the half section line would be 50 therefore a house located 1/2 mile inside the section, 33 miles north would be 3350 CR H.

The odd numbers will be on the east and south side of the roads. Intersection names have been ordered and will be there within a month. The signs will be installed at the SE corner of each intersection wherever possible.

The county is accepting donations of posts, labor or cash to purchase road names. This is a public service venture, and they are in need of all the help and support they can get.

New maps are being prepared to show the new addressing system and road names. They are available from the county assessor's office for \$30 each to help fund the project.

U.S. West has pledged \$5 per customer in Curry County to help with this project, and it has donated all the address plaques.

Grazing, haying rules outlined

Parmer County has been approved for grazing or haying of CRP acreage. Following is information that will be helpful to you deciding whether to graze or hay.

1. The FY 1991 annual payment under CRP-1 shall be reduced by the number of acres actually hayed or grazed by 50 percent of the CRP per acre rental rate.
2. The required reduction may be prepaid by the participants.
3. CRP acres may be hayed or grazed only to maintain the CRP participant's own livestock which must have been owned or leased before June 1, 1990. Sale or donation of any hay from CRP acreage, or grazing of CRP acreage by any livestock other than those owned or leased by the participant, shall not be permitted.
4. Haying will be allowed on CRP acreage that was planted or replanted to CP1, CP2, CP4, or CP10 before Dec. 1, 1988.
5. Grazing will be allowed on CRP acreage planted to CP1, CP2, and CP10 that was planted or replanted before July

16, 1988. Any acreage planted to these practices between July 15, 1988 and Dec. 1, 1988 shall be visually inspected by SCS on a field by field basis to determine whether an adequate stand is available before being approved for grazing.

6. No federal assistance will be provided for livestock facilities such as fences or water equipment on CRP acres.

7. Program participants shall designate the CRP acreage to be either hayed or grazed, but not both on the same acreages.

8. Haying and grazing of CRP acreage shall be confined to the acreage within the boundary of eligible counties.

9. Request, in writing, permission to make hay or graze CRP acreage.

10. Harvest only 1 cutting of hay.

11. Agree to leave at least 3 inches of stubble.

12. Not harvest hay for seed or grain.

13. Report the amount of hay harvested to the county office.

14. Harvesting of hay will not be allowed after August 1, 1990 and all bales shall be removed from CRP fields by midnight Aug. 1, 1990.

15. The term "haying" includes cutting for hay, silage, or green chop.

16. At least 25 percent of each CRP field hayed or grazed must remain unharvested or grazed for wildlife cover. Grazed CRP shall have temporary fences erected, if necessary, to ensure the required area is left ungrazed for wildlife cover.

17. Grazing of CRP acreages shall NOT be permitted after October 1, 1990, or an earlier date established by COC, in consultation with SCS.

18. Grazing shall not be permitted on CRP acreage established to practice CP4.

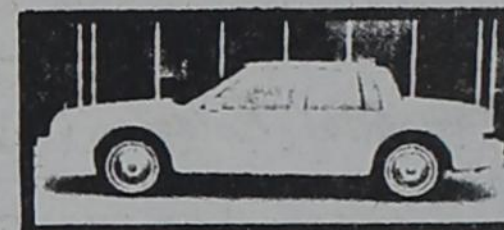

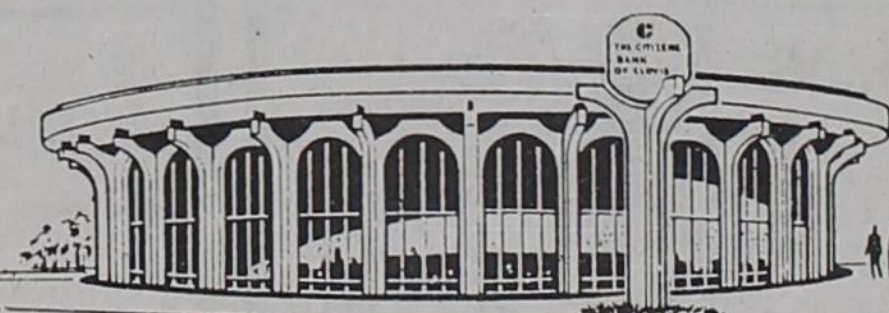
