Patience is needed

I bet I was one of the very few columnists who wrote, just after the Iragi crisis broke, that I didn't expect imminent military action but that the crisis would really start when Iraq would begin running out of funds and supplies.

It's always tough to write a column like that. If war had broken out immediately, I would have had some egg on my face.

But I really didn't see the Iragis striking into Saudi Arabia. And I believe events have proven that I was correct. Of course, if you had watched TV in the days immediately sion, there would have been against the Saudis was next in line - that's what the TV newscasters kept shouting.

Now that the news media hysteria is somewhat subsiding, we can take a clearer look at the situation. As I wrote, wars usually emanate from economics and this crisis falls into that mold. Bush has done so far. I believe we don't need to send any more troops into the Gulf area, but should continue to intercept cargo going to and from Iraqi ports. Unless Irag establishes a lifeline somewhere (and I don't think Iran will help here, not after 10 years of bloodshed), then it is only a matter of time before Iraq is brought to its knees. Many countries can exist through a boycott. But when you have 300,000 troops under arms - well, they expect to be paid. And if they don't get their money, you have a problem. In the coming days and weeks, you can expect to hear all sorts of silly pronouncements from Baghdad, such as calls for a Jihad (holy war) against the Americans. I can't believe how this foolishness got big play in the U.S. media. If I had a dollar for every Jihad called by some Arabic leader or government over the years against the U.S., I would be a wealthy man today. That's the worst part of situation involving some a comic world leader. Our news media strives to give "fair play" and thus over-emphasizes whatever stupidity is shouted out. As far as I'm concerned, a call for a Jihad is not news and doesn't need to be stressed, except on the back pages next to the comic section. And the same thing goes for Hussein's pronouncements that Iraq will never part with Kuwait. At the same time he is making these statements (with big coverage), his state department is trying to make a deal to end the crisis by giving up Kuwait, now a raped state.

Cleanup attack continues

The Texico City Council Tuesday continued its program of renovating the community. Highlights were:

* Voted to buy 30 pecan trees for placing at KKR Park. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey is in charge of this project. Also, councilman Butch Tharp will get cost estimates for a drip irrigation system to be installed at both city parks. This will help insure that the trees thrive.

* Authorized Autrey to dredge the KKR Park pool. He will be assisted by Tharp. The work will be done at cost. Texico had advertised in the Clovis paper for bids to dredge the pond but none were received.

* Noted that Waste Management had placed a large container in back of City Hall. No metal or household trash are to be placed there. It is to be used for large items that don't fit into the Polykarts.

Decided to wait until after the Sept. 20-22 cleanup before continuing its attack on "wrecked, dismantled or non-working" vehicles. The council stressed that residents should take advantage of the Sept. 20-22 cleanup to remove these vehicles from their property.

* Heard City Clerk-Treasurer Marie Christian report she had almost a full sheet of names of residents who had large items they wanted hauled away during the cleanup. This list likely will be given the Curry County Highway Department to handle. The county will have equipment in Texico Sept. 21following the Kuwaiti inva-, 22. City Water Supt. Billy Hammit will coordinate this.

* The Texico landfill will be open Saturday from 1 to 4 p.m. no question that an attack It was not open last Saturday and Autrey said he received about 10 calls from residents wanting to use it. Here's what can be placed there:

- Household trash must be placed in the transfer station.
- Metal must be placed in a stack in the designated area.
- Burnable wood items must be placed in the "burn pile."

Texico doubles utility deposits

The Texico City Council voted Tuesday to raise its utility deposit from \$30 to \$60.

This is due to folks running up large utility bills, then leaving the community.

The hike likely will go into effect in early October, after the legal ad changing the city ordinance is published.

Also, the council will begin filing liens on delinquent accounts, usually about 60 days in arrears. Property owners will be notified. This will put more pressure on property owners to get higher deposits from their renters.

In other business, the council:

 Hired Brent Byrum, deputy Curry County sheriff and former Texico marshal, to be the city's animal control officer.

Byrum will use his own equipment. He will work up to a maximum of 40 hours a month at \$8 an hour. He also is empowered to issue citations.

 Scheduled a special meeting for 6:30 p.m. mdt Sept. 18 to discuss school traffic flow on Griffin. The Texico School Board will be asked to attend. Parents and other interested citizens also are invited.



The Farwell School Board Tuesday heard school bookkeeper Leandra Byrd report that the school's annual audit is currently being conducted by De'Aun Willoughby, CPA. The preliminary figures show that the school system has turned its budget problems around in the past year.

Last year the school system had projected that it would spend all of its reserves if it continued spending at the rate that it was. Mrs. Byrd reported that the spending trends had changed, and that there was a carryover of \$55,732.07 for the 1989-90 school year.

The school system had implemented several spending cuts and had reduced the staff to save money.

"Finances have turned around since November," said School Supt. Richard Boothby.



Isela Mendoza of Farwell attended Girls State in Seguin this summer. The experience gave her a good grasp of the way that government works.

Part of each day the girls listened to experienced people discuss the ways that government works. Part of the day they put those theories into action.

When girls arrived at Girls State, they ran for election to an office. Some of the 600 delegates were elected to state positions such as governor, or senator or legislator, others were elected to county or local positions.

Isela was elected to the Senate of Girls State. There she participated in writing bills and debating issues.

This year the issues included: 1. Should there be a state lottery?, 2. Should abortion be legal? 3. Should smoking be allowed in public restrooms ?, 4. Should students under 18 years if age be allowed to get a driver's license without taking a driver's education course?

The issues debated are real issues of our society, but they are also issues of interest to young people. Sometimes the debates became pretty emotional.



Recipe of Week

**Apricot Snack mix** 

- 3 c. rolled oats 2 c. oat bran 2 tsp. cinnamon 1/2 tsp. nutmeg 1 c. walnut halves, broken
- 1 c. almonds, coarsely chopped
- 1/2 c. raw sunflower seeds
- 5 Tbs. vegetable oil
- 3/4 c. honey, melted

1 1/3 c. California dried apricots, quartered (6 oz.) 3/4 c. raisins

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Mix first 6 ingredients together. Drizzle oil over mixture and toss until coated. Drizzle melted honey and continue tossing until coated. Mixture should be clumpy.

Divide mixture onto two cookie sheets, spreading evenly. In top third of oven, bake 20 minutes. Remove from oven; stir with a wooden spoon, mixing thoroughly. Continue to bake 30 minutes more, stirring every 10 minutes. Return snack mix to bowl; add dried fruits. Toss gently and cool.

Can be stored for 2 weeks in an airtight container or frozen up to 2 months. Makes 20 servings, approximately 265 calories per 1/2 cup serving; 7 g. protein, 34 g. carbohydrate, 13 g. fat, 9 mg. cholesterol, 5 mg. sodium and 4 g. dietary fiber.






"We played poorly," said coach Larry Gregory. "We had poor execution of offense; they lined up and whooped us."



## Wolverine Band is first at fair

If you think that winning a first place in the New Mexico State Fair Parade was easy for the Texico Wolverine Band, think again.

Imagine the logistical headaches facing band director Robert Simmons.

First there are the normal logistical problems involved with getting all 83 students and their band instruments, pieces of music, and the uniforms on a bus and to the right location in Albuquerque.

Add to those normal problems a few extra little problems. The football players and cheerleaders were not able to travel with the rest of the band. They were in Cloudcroft for a football game. They had to send their equipment and uniforms on ahead, and join the band later.

High School principal Ken Shaw drove the band members who played football from Cloudcroft to Albuquerque after they had showered and changed and eaten following the game. They arrived in Albuquerque at about 4 a.m. - giving them a whole hour and one half to rest before getting up to get ready for the parade.

Another little logistical headache concerned the FFA members who where showing animals at the State Fair. They had to make arrangements to get their uniforms and equipment to the parade, and they needed to know where to meet the rest of the group.

Once everyone was at the lineup site with their instruments, they noticed that there was a lot of competition for that first place trophy. There were 180 units in the parade. and there were at least 15 in the same size category as the Wolverines.

That meant that the Wolverines had to be sharp to outdo the competition.

The groups had to play well as they marched the 4 1/2 mile parade route.

Texico was one of the last units in the parade, and as drum major Chad Barnes puts it, "You have to watch where you step when you're toward the end of the parade."

They also had to watch out for the square dancers ahead of them who stopped to do their fancy stepping from time to time.

When the parade ended, the Wolverine Band waited for the

When I left Farwell on Monday morning at 4, I finally realized that I wouldn't see my friends and family and all the familiar surroundings for an entire semester. I have finally realized what a great place home really is. I really miss everyone a lot.


I departed from Lubbock Airport on Monday morning, and I flew to Dallas. I had a two hour lay-over, and then I finally departed for New York. I arrived in New York at 3:30 in the afternoon, and I was delayed for over 11 hours. I got into the J.F.K Airport with several hundred other people, including many other exchange students until nearly 2 in the morning. I finally arrived in Madrid at 4 the next afternoon.

We drove straight to Segovia, where our orientation was held. I learned a lot about Spanish culture and Spanish ways of life, and I met a lot of great people.

On Friday, we toured the town of Segovia, and among many other things, I toured the Alcazar of Segovia and the Roman Aquaduct. The Alcazar, a fortress or castle, was the home of King Ferdinand and Queen Isabela of Spain, the rulers who sent Columbus to discover the Americas. The Roman Aquaduct was built when the Roman Empire ruled Spain. It carried water to the other side of Segovia, and it can still be used. It is an enormous structure consisting of many arches, and built entirely without mortar of any kind.

I finally traveled to Aviles, the town where I live with my host family. It is in Asturias, which is on the Bay of Biscay.

The province has one of the most beautiful coastlines in all of Spain, and is lined with beaches. My town, which is very

large, is not far from the capital of Oviedo. It is very beautiful, and green, and it rains quite a lot. ( A feature that I am not very used to!) Most of the people live in tall buildings, and there is usually only one car per family.

Everything here is open at very different hours from home. Most businesses open at 9:30 in the mornings, and close about 1:30 or 2. Lunch is usually at 2 or 3, and the rest of the afternoon is devoted to sleeping. Then, at about 5, the businesses re- open until 7 or 8 p.m. and dinner is usually at 9 or 10. Then everything really comes alive at night!

My town is very nice, and the people are very friendly. I really love what I have seen of Spain, and I hope to see a lot more of it. My only drawback is that I don't know the language well enough yet. However, everyone assures me that within a month I will speak it very well. The Spanish speak very fast, and it is hard to understand them.

I really wish that everyone could see and experience everything that I have seen here. I have learned so much. and I am excited about the rest of my stay in Spain. My only advice to other Americans is to learn as many languages as possible, and learn about other cultures. If we can understand the other countries better, then we might be able to achieve a little more peace for our world.

I really miss everyone, and I wish everyone the best. Good luck to everyone at school, and I hope to see you when I come home.
