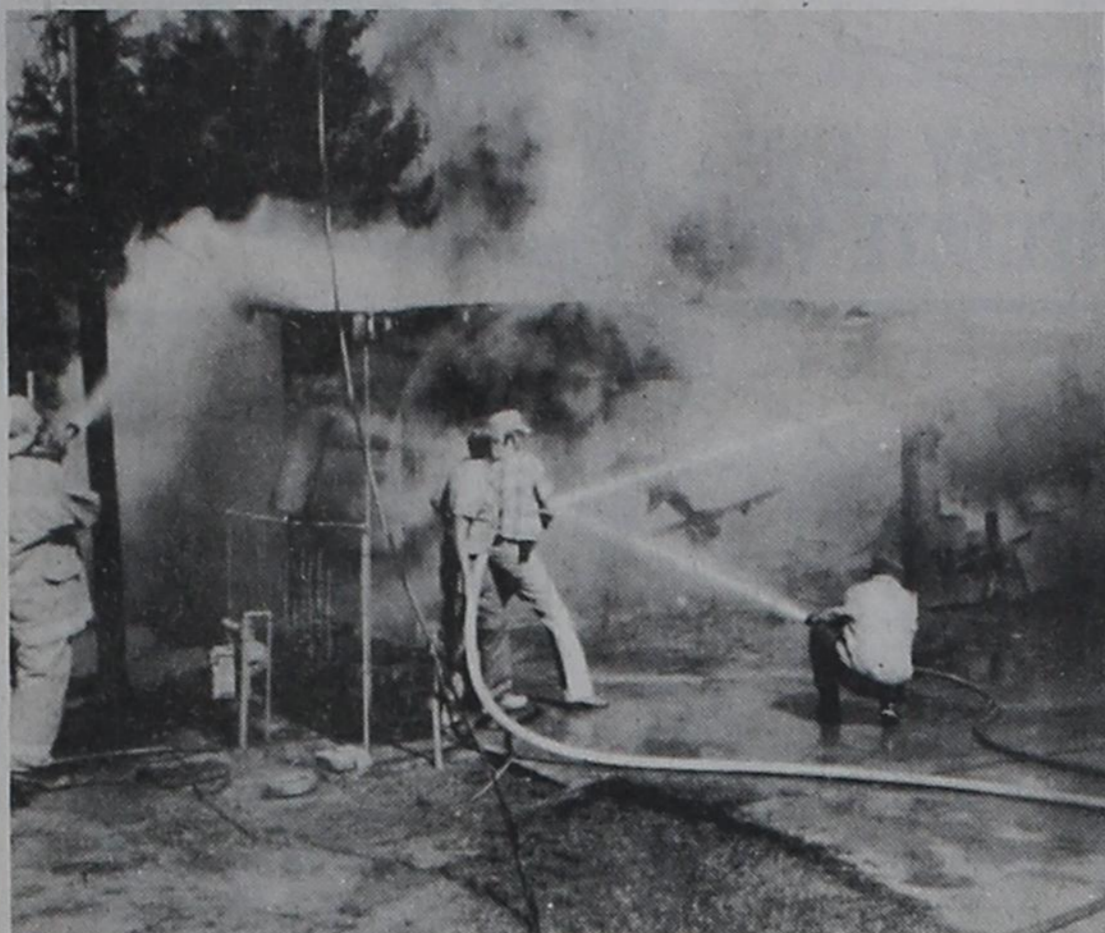

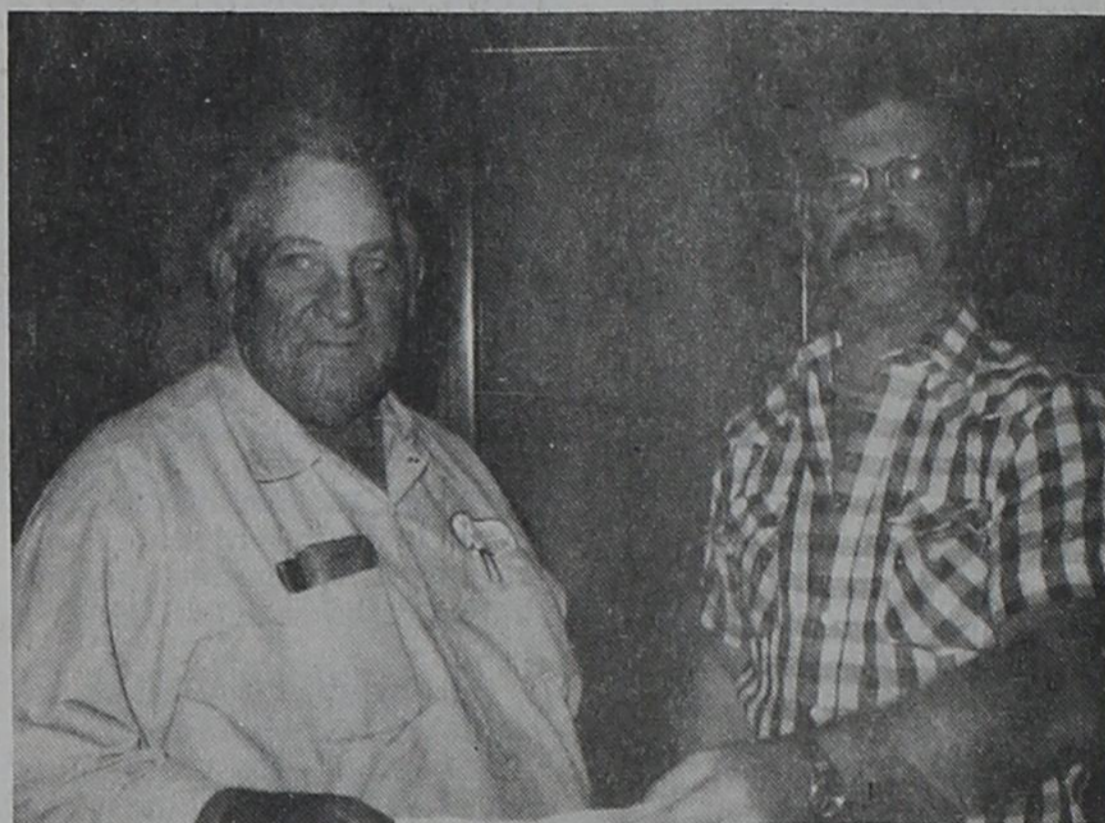

Future annexation is topic

Possible future annexation was the main topic at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting.

About 8 residents, mainly from Ave. F and North Craig Street - both just outside the city limits - attended to express their opposition to any plans that might move them into the city.

Mayor Doyal LaRue emphasized that possible annexations are just in the talking stage and that any decisions will be publicized in the paper.

What has brought up this topic is the realization that Clovis has expanded its boundaries to around Cook's Truck Stop. By taking into its corporate limits more businesses, Clovis gets to keep their gross receipt taxes.

"A big concern is how far Clovis will come," said LaRue.

Texico City Attorney Duane Hamar explained how "grandfather clauses" work so that if a property owner with animals is taken into the city, he can keep the animals. Also, the council could zone the property so that future owners of the same property also could keep animals.

However, if an area was taken in as a farm, for example, and the owner wanted to sell it down the road to a dairy operation, then that would require special zoning approval later.

Hamar was asked if an area could be annexed if a majority of its property owners opposed it. He will research this question and have an answer at the Oct. 23 meeting.

In other business, the council:

- Heard councilman Ronnie Warmuth say that several junked vehicles still need to be moved from the city "and we need to enforce our ordinance."

LaRue said that he, councilman Oran Jay Autrey and City Marshal Walt Causey will tour the city to check on the vehicle problem.

- Went into executive session for pending litigation and land acquisition topics.

- Noted that an aesthetic review permit has been signed for a mobile home moving into 209 Lamar St. The owner has 90 days to meet the accord. The area is already zoned for it.

- Increased its water meter deposit to \$60 (see legal ad elsewhere in today's paper).

- Heard councilman Butch Tharp report that he has checked on the new school traffic flow and it seems to be much better. There still is a problem with vehicles backing up, especially those who pull in off of Katherine. He said the council might want to consider making some of the nearby streets one-way.

- Heard a report on re-

Rezoning may be considered

The Farwell City Council Tuesday discussed possibly rezoning certain areas in the city so that individual variances for mobile homes wouldn't be needed.

In particular, they talked about the half block behind the Farwell Grain Exchange. Last month, the council approved a variance for a mobile home there.

Mayor Chris Gikas said the area has 8 lots and instead of seeking individual variances each time, it might be a better idea to rezone the half block.

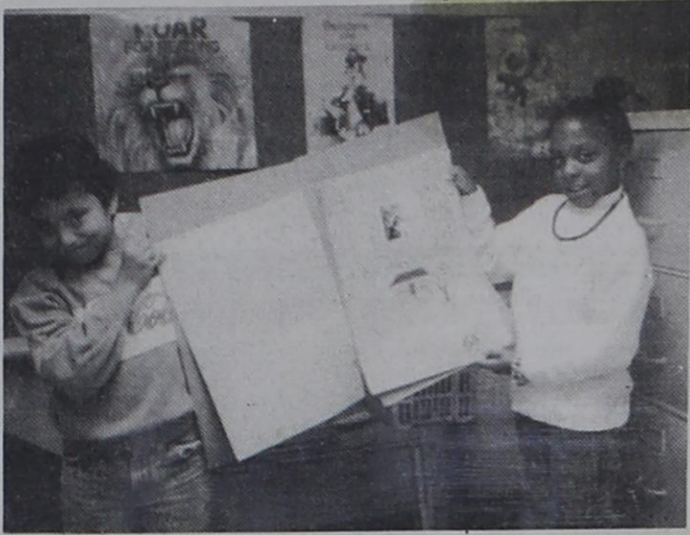
The council needs to officially poll the area's neighbors. Also, other sites throughout Farwell will be looked at.

Also, the council may rezone small areas that currently are within the fire zone. Gikas said he has talked with City Attorney Charles Aycock

and it can be done so that the fire zone is consistent throughout the city.

This topic arose last year when Shandra McIntosh asked to build a wooden garage on her property, but since it was within the fire zone the council turned it down (because higher insurance premiums for everyone might have resulted). If that property can be moved out of the fire zone, a wooden facility might be acceptable to the council.

In other business, the council heard a presentation on computerizing its utility billing system from a Lubbock company. The cost is \$7,943. Since two of the councilmen were absent, no decision was made, but it appears the council and mayor favored the presentation.

Wolverines overwhelm Springer; go 5-1

The Texico Wolverines, ranked No. 3 in the state of New Mexico, overwhelmed Springer's Red Devils last Friday, 61-6.

The victory boosted Texico's overall record to 5-1 and 1-0 in district. The Wolverines face No. 1 Hagerman in an away game tonight (Friday).

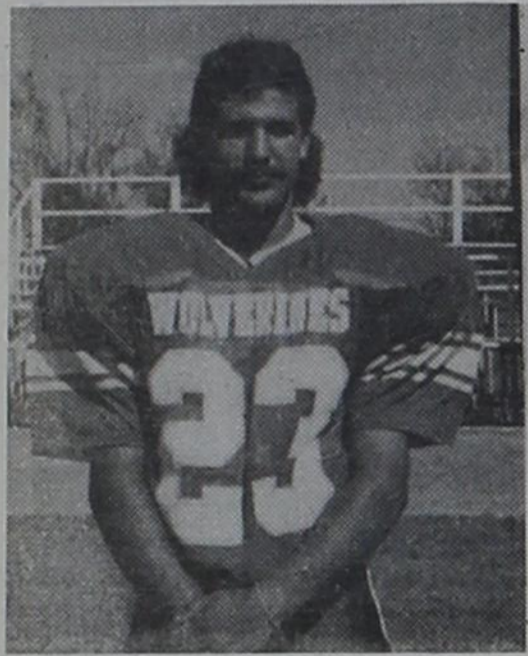
Springer kicked off and Texico began driving immediately. With 10 left in the first quarter, Josh Autrey scored from the 3. Hector Orozco kicked the point after and it was 7-0.

Springer was stopped when Warren Martin made a super tackle, forcing a punt. On Texico's possession, Orozco, Autrey and Benji McDaniel marched the ball downfield behind excellent blocking. Autrey broke loose behind top notch blocks and raced in from the 25 for his second TD with 4:26 left in the first quarter. The kick failed.

Billy Rodgers ran downfield quickly and stopped the kick returner. Then Rusty Foreman and Tom Derouin held Springer with excellent tackles. The Wolverine defense was really stopping the Red Devils and giving up little yardage.

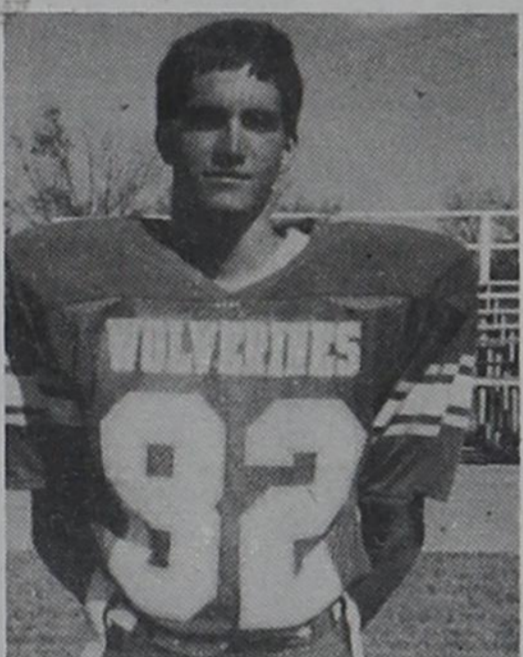
Springer connected on a long pass but McDaniel was there to tackle the receiver. Springer was having to go to its passing game because its runners were being stopped effectively. Then Autrey made a nice play, coming up with an interception. Autrey, Orozco and Kelvin Gooden all moved the ball well as the first quarter ended.

With 11:51 left in the second quarter, on a 3rd and 8, McDaniel ran around end, behind great blocking, for a 35-yard TD. Orozco kicked the point after.

The Springer kick returner fumbled the ball when Matthew Williams and other Texico defenders stopped him cold. Anthony Garcia and Orozco made good tackles and McDaniel broke up a pass. Then Josefre Gonzales broke through the line and sacked the quarterback for a big loss, bringing up 4th and 28, which forced a Springer punt.

Springer had to punt four times to Texico's one. On Texico's second play, Autrey broke loose again. Behind super blocks, he raced 55 yards for his third TD. Orozco kicked the point after.

Steven Horner, Dwayne Hamilton and McDaniel stopped an end run by Springer. Then Gooden broke up a pass, forcing another punt.

Kenny Shaw took the punt and ran up the side line for a nice carry. Three Wolverine blockers allowed him to make good yardage. Texico was held and punted.

Hamilton, Horner and Derouin all made big tackles. Autrey made a good tackle to stop a receiver after a completed catch. Lilo Montano broke through the line and got Texico's 2nd QB sack.

McDaniel made a fantastic tackle to stop a possible TD. But on 3rd and 3, Patrick Martinez scored for Springer with 1:31 left in the half. The running try for extra points failed.

On their second play, McDaniel handed off to Autrey, who broke loose for 59 yards and his 4th TD. The Orozco kick was good.

Springer went to long passes. They succeeded on one but Shaw made a strong tackle. Autrey tackled the next receiver. Then Orozco broke up a long pass, tapped it into the air and Shaw caught it for the interception as time ran out in the half. It was 34-6 in Texico's favor.

Texico's defense stopped Springer cold on its first possession in the second half. Then the Wolverines behind Orozco and Autrey marched the ball downfield again. McDaniel scored from the 22 and Orozco's kick made it 41-6.

Shaw stopped a potential Red Devil TD on the 9 yard line. McDaniel intercepted on the next play. Then McDaniel made an excellent toss to Autrey for a first down. Orozco scrapped for good yardage, and Autrey ran around end for a 36-yard TD, his fifth of the night. The Orozco kick was good.

LEGAL PUBLICATIONS

Ordinance No. 248

An ordinance increasing the amount of meter deposits for domestic meters connected with the water system of the City of Texico, New Mexico, and amending any ordinance conflicting therewith.

Be it ordained by the governing body of the municipality of the City of Texico, New Mexico:

Section 1. Recitals. It is hereby determined by the governing body of the municipality of Texico, New Mexico, that the meter deposit rates for the City of Texico should be increased to insure adequate protection of the public water utility through a secure financial foundation, all of which is in the best interest of the citizens of the City of Texico, New Mexico.

Section 2. Meter deposit. A domestic meter deposit for a customer of the City of Texico public utility shall be a sum in the amount of \$60.00.

Section 3. New Customer. The new deposit rate shall apply to any meter hookup which shall be requested after the effective date of this ordinance, whether or not such customer was a prior customer or existing customer of the public utility.

Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance is effective five (5) days after publishing notice of same.

Passed and adopted by the Council of the City of Texico, New Mexico, unanimously, this 9th day of October 1990.

Ordinance #112

An ordinance providing for increased municipal contributions to

the current service annuity reserve at retirement of the employees of the City of Farwell, Texas.

Be it ordained by the City Council of Farwell, Texas:

That effective January 1, 1990, for each month of current service thereafter rendered by each of its employees who are members of the Texas Municipal Retirement System, the City will contribute to the current service annuity reserve of each such member at the time of his or her retirement, a sum that is 150% of such member's accumulated deposits for such month of employment; and said sum shall be contributed from the City's account in the municipality accumulation fund.

Passed and approved this the 9th day of October, 1990.

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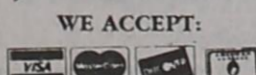

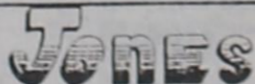

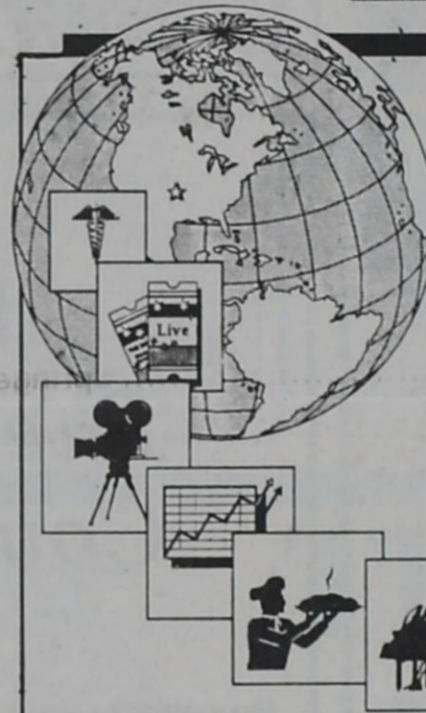

The board named Reynolds, Owen, and Mrs. Corn as the board's designated teacher appraisers. The appraisals done by them will count 60% in the determination of career ladder ranking.

The board also voted to hire an outside consulting firm to conduct the second round of teacher appraisals. The outside firm's appraisal will count the remaining 40%.

If there is a discrepancy of 15 points or more between the two appraisals, Boothby will conduct a third appraisal.

Reynolds, Owen, Mrs. Corn, and Boothby have taken special courses in teacher appraisal methods. The cost of the consulting firm is less than the cost of sending Farwell staff for teacher appraisal training.

"The career ladder is the biggest threat to this school system of anything. It is not fair and politics always gets into the picture. I would like to pay better teachers more, period," said Boothby.


"T.A.S.B. (Texas Association of School Boards) supports dissolving the career ladder. This may change in the future," said board member Ronald Byrd.

The board voted to refinish the gym floor. This year the floor will be sanded, repainted, and re-finished. This is slightly more work than was done in the past.

The board heard a report from Gary Erwin on an energy conservation system,
