The Twin Cities got more snow early Monday. Estimates of 1 to 2 inches were made here, but it was dry powder which does not translate into a lot of moisture when it melts.

Texico moves on well problem

The Texico City Council Tuesday signed a six-month contract with Roy Weston Co. of Albuquerque to handle the city's water well problem.

Currently, Texico has only one water well operational. The well at KKR Park was closed by state officials after it was found to be contaminated.

The council hopes that the contaminant can be found and that the KKR Park well can be re-claimed because the expense is heavy in drilling a new well.

Brown Edwards, of the state Environmental Improvement Division, appeared at Tuesday's meeting to say he has taken samples at the KKR Park pond and will have results next week.

If the pond is found to have the contaminant, the council likely will have it drained and closed.

The council also discussed putting the pump back into the KKR Park well for use only in case of a major fire. But this is on hold pending more sampling for the contaminant - carbon tetrachloride.

Also, the council is checking into the possibility of a new tax for handling solid waste. It's based on a percentage of the sales tax collected. However, it might turn out to only generate about \$100 a month and if the total is very small, the council probably won't approve the new tax.

In other business, the council approved rules for community groups using the community building. The \$15 rental fee will stay the same but the deposit was upped from \$10 to \$25.

Also, city maintenance chief Ron Rowe was designated to check the center before a group's use and also after its usage before the deposit is returned.

Rowe was asked to have the lock on the community center door fixed and weather stripping placed around the door.

A more vigorous check of how the facility is being used

was asked last year by the Chamber of Commerce after vandalism was done to the bathroom - after the center was renovated.

The council also: - After a 5-year discussion, decided to seek bids for a new sewer in the 500 block between State Street and State Line Road. There's a sewer already there but the council is unable to determine whether it's on public or private property. The new sewer will be placed on public property.

- Had a hearing on the Solid Waste Act. A task force needs to be formed, according to federal guidelines. Contact persons are Mayor Doyal LaRue and councilman Ronnie Warmuth. Any resident may join it; call City Hall to sign up.

- Asked Rowe to fix the merry go-round and picnic tables at the Tower Park. Also, a state beautification grant of \$500 (matching funds) will be sought to buy more playground equipment for the Tower Park.

- Authorized city attorney Duane Hamar to act as city prosecutor in municipal court dealings.

- Discussed some illegal oil burning in the city by a resident.

- Heard Autrey complain of more junked vehicles being brought into the city. The council will hold off on removing them until the source of the contaminant at KKR Park well is found. If the contaminant is identified from a residential property, then the EID would seek reimbursement from the property owner after it's cleaned up by the state.

- Voted to have the cemetery board meet with the council in executive session after its next meeting to discuss the cemetery.

The council had negotiated for several months to buy some property for cemetery expansion. But Hamar reported the negotiations have fallen through. So the council may seek other land, or use its condemnation rights.

He notes that he has reports of people failing to come to a complete stop at stop signs. He will be looking for this in the upcoming weeks, especially around the school.

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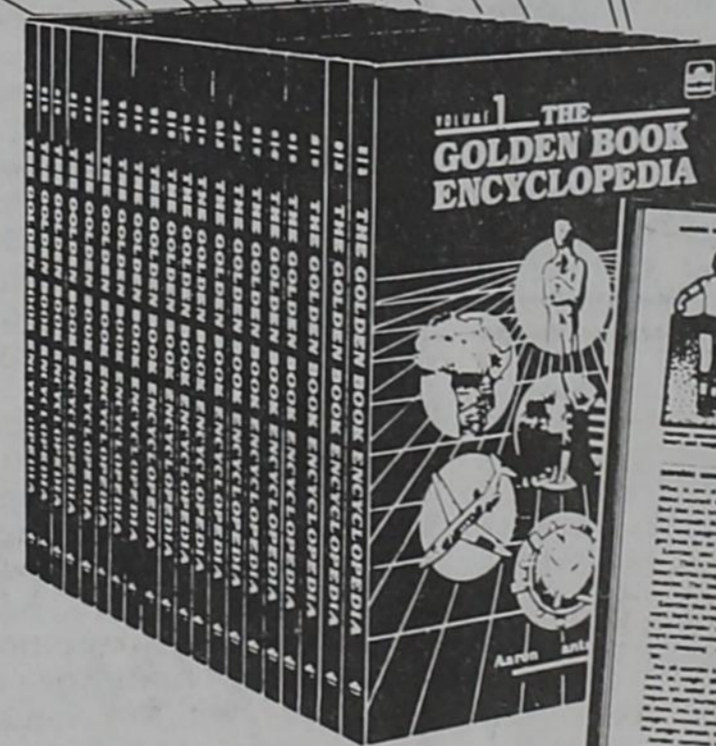

Systems Increase

The use of center pivot sprinkler systems continues to increase in Parmer County, according to the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 in Lubbock.

In the part of Parmer County within the Water District service area, about 371 additional center pivot systems were installed between 1986 and 1990. This brings the total number of center pivot systems used in Parmer County to 1,061.

This compares to 599 in Bailey County, up from 571 in 1986. The Deaf Smith total has risen from 220 to 324. The Parmer County increase is by far the largest in the Water District service area.

The 371 additional center pivot systems represent a \$11,130,000 investment by Parmer County farmers during the past four year - an average of \$30,000 per system.

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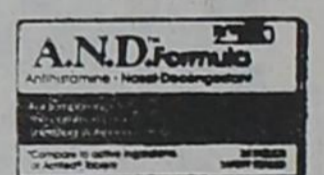
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Wolverines seeded No. 1 in EPAC tourney

Requirement for ARP down

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter announced that the acreage reduction program (ARP) requirement for the 1991 Upland cotton crop will be five percent, a decrease from the 12.5 percent ARP of 1990.

Also announced were other provisions of the new farm law including target price, projected deficiency payment and the loan level that will apply to a new and expanded "base quality" description.

"These," according to Donald A Johnson, Executive Vice President of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., "cover the basic information producers will need in planning for the 1991 crop. But they are just the first of a series of announcements required for full implementation of the 1990 farm act."

A substantial portion of the USDA announcement consisted of new planting flexibility regulations, under which producers for the first time will have the option to "flex" up to 25 percent of any program crop base to another crop.

There is concern, Johnson note, that the lower ARP coupled with planting flexibility may lead to excess production and depressed 1991 prices. However, he says, there are those who maintain that a lower ARP could discourage enough producers from planting "wildcat" cotton outside the program to offset an increase in program acreage. "So it boils down to an uncertain situation, with one guess as likely to be right as another."

Yeutter's announcement included the target price for Upland cotton, 72.9 cents per pound, and the projected deficiency payment rate, set at 10 cents per pound. Of this total, 40 percent or four cents per pound will be paid at sign-up, scheduled for early March. Payment will be made in cash.

The previously announced 50.77 cent loan level for 1991 will apply to a new base cotton quality description. The change is the first to be made since 1963 when micronaire became a factor in the loan schedule. The old base, Strict Low Middling 101/16th inches, 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire, now reads "Strict Low Middling 1 1-1/16th inches, 3.5 through 3.6 and 4.3 through 4.9 strength 25 through 25 grams per tex (gpt)."

The change is in line with recommendations made last year by the USDA's Industry Cotton Marketing Advisory Committee. Although the loan schedule will not be published until later, according to the PCG Board Chairman and Advisory Committee member Steve Verett of Ralls, if the schedule reflects the Advisory Committee's intent, micronaire readings 3.7 through 4.2 will carry a premium, as will strengths above 25 grams per tex.

As in 1990, a 50-92 program is in effect, permitting producers to devote up to 50 percent of maximum payment acreage (MPA) to conservation uses and collect 92 percent of deficiency payments. MPA equals the crop acreage base minus 15 percent minus the ARP requirement.

An improvement on last year's rules is a provision allowing producers who are prevented from planting to participate in a "0-92" program. Also unlike 1990, both 50-92 and 0-92 participants will be guaranteed payments at least equal to the payment rate projected at the beginning of the year.

Another provision announced for 1991 is that program payments yields will be the same as those established for 1990 crops. And without new legislation yields will remain fixed throughout the five-year program.

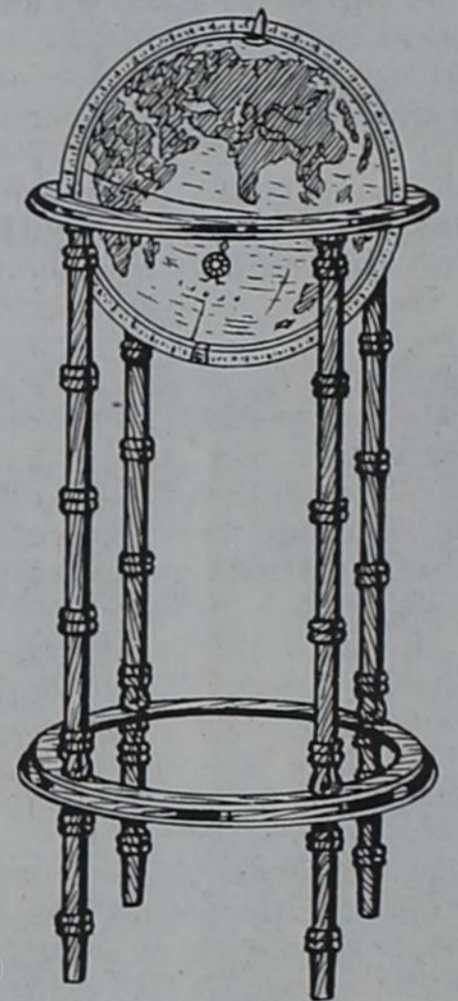

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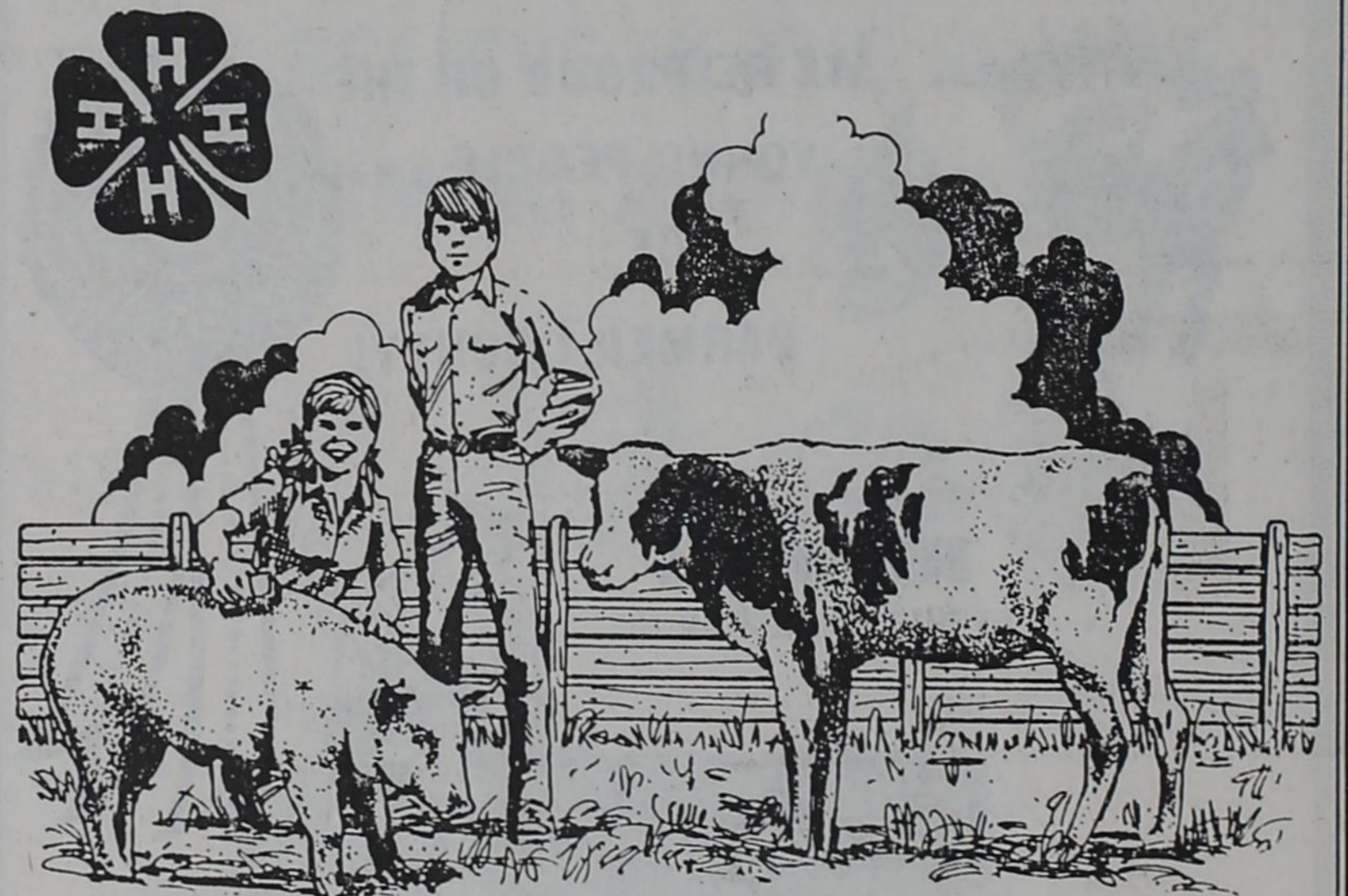

Recipe of Week

Turtle Cookies

- 2 c. all purpose flour
- 1 c. packed light brown sugar
- 1/2 c. butter, softened
- 1 c. pecan halves
- 2/3 c. butter
- 1/2 c. packed light brown sugar
- 1 c. milk chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Combine flour, 1 c. brown sugar, butter, and pecans in a 3 quart bowl. Mix at medium speed for 2 - 3 minutes or until well mixed. Pat into an ungreased 9 x 13 inch baking pan. Sprinkle with pecans. Combine remaining 2/3 c. butter and remaining 1/2 c. brown sugar in saucepan. Bring to a boil. Boil for 30 seconds to 1 minutes, stirring constantly. Pour evenly over pecans. Bake 18-22 minutes or until crust is light brown. Remove from oven. Sprinkle chocolate chips evenly over top. Let stand for 2-3 minutes, swirl chips slightly. Cool in pan. Cut into bars.

Suffered losses?

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) expects to resume approval of emergency loans for farmers who have suffered losses from last year's weather disasters in the near future, acting FmHA State Director John E. Kirchoff said.

"We know many producers are reaching the point where they have to make decisions on next year's crops, and we are confident we will be able to provide assistance," he said.

"In the meantime, any farmer in a disaster-designated county who feels qualified for an emergency loan is invited to visit the local FmHA county office and file an application."

FmHA was forced to temporarily suspend final approval of emergency loans because of a provision in the 1990 farm bill which, in the end, will benefit farmers and ranchers.

Under FmHA's regular statutory authority, farmers must have crop insurance, if available to be eligible for FmHA emergency loans, in most cases. The 1990 farm legislation, signed into law on November 28, waived that provision for loans based on losses on 1990 crops.

"Whenever there is a change in our statutory authority, our regulations have to be changed to match up," Kirchoff said. "I am informed that the regulation change waiving the insurance requirement is now in final clearance in Washington."

He said applications are being accepted and can be processed up to the point of final approval. To assist in the timely processing of applications, any farmer, in a disaster-designated county who feels qualified for an emergency loan is encouraged to file a completed application with the County Supervisor as soon as possible.

"I have been assured that we will be notified immediately when the regulation change has been published in the Federal Register, and loans can be given final approval without further delay," he said. "We can and will help our Texas producers with their credit needs."

Emergency loans available

Emergency loans for farmers, ranchers or aquaculture operators are available through county offices of Farmers Home Administration, Bobby Murphy, FmHA Parmer County Supervisor said today.

He asked that those who need farm credit as a result of drought and excessive heat in the 1990 crop year make their needs known at the Farwell office.

Applications for assistance in the disaster stricken counties will be accepted by Farmers Home until Aug. 26 for physical and production losses.

FmHA loans covering actual physical and production losses may be used to replace installations, equipment or buildings (including homes) lost through this disaster. Funds may be used to buy feed, seed, fertilizer, livestock or to meet interest and depreciation payments on current real estate and chattel debts.

"Funds can be used for essential operating and living costs," Bobby said.

Applicants that certify that other credit is not available may receive loans covering actual losses at an interest rate of 4.5 percent and are scheduled for repayment as rapidly as feasible consistent with the applicant's ability to pay.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered losses from the disaster.

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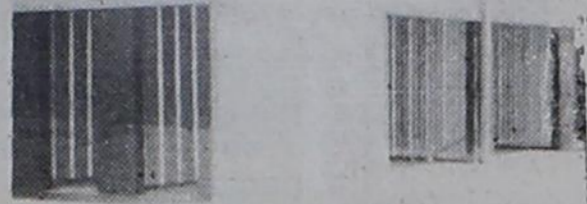

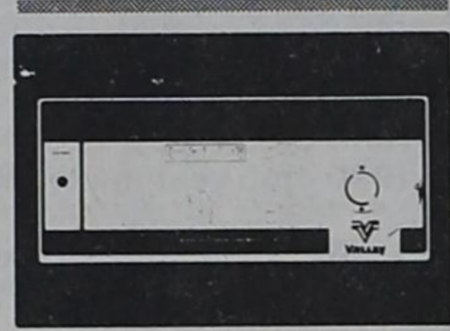


