Hospital District election nears

The election on whether to create a Parmer County Hospital District is scheduled Saturday.

The ballot is simple: you either favor or oppose creating a hospital district which can set a tax rate up to 25 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The election is open to all county residents who don't live in the Farwell or Muleshoe hospital districts.

Polling places are at: Friona - Friona fire station. Bovina - Bovina EMS station (old American Legion Hall).

Rhea - Rhea Community

Center.

Lakeview - Dee Willard home.

Lazbuddie - Lazbuddie School.

The Parmer County Community Hospital Board of Directors have announced that they would recommend setting a tax rate of 18 cents if the district is created.

This would mean that property having an assessed value of \$50,000 would have a tax rate of \$90.

The Hospital Board of Directors, who would also serve as the first year hospital dis-

trict directors, have reviewed the priority needs of the hospital which were presented during the public meetings. After this review it is their opinion that a tax rate of 18 cents would be sufficient to meet the first year plan for equipment upgrade and improvement.

A spokesman for the PCH Board of Directors stressed that this rate is only a recommendation for the rate to be considered. If the district proposal is passed, a tax rate not to exceed 25 cents is available.

Farwell Schools' traffic pattern changes approved

The Farwell City Council Tuesday approved changes in the traffic pattern near Farwell Schools.

Farwell Junior High Principal Jerry Dee Owen and School Board member Ronald Byrd presented the request.

It will make 7th Street, between Avenues F and G (on the east side of the Farwell Elementary School block), one way during school hours. Traffic will go south.

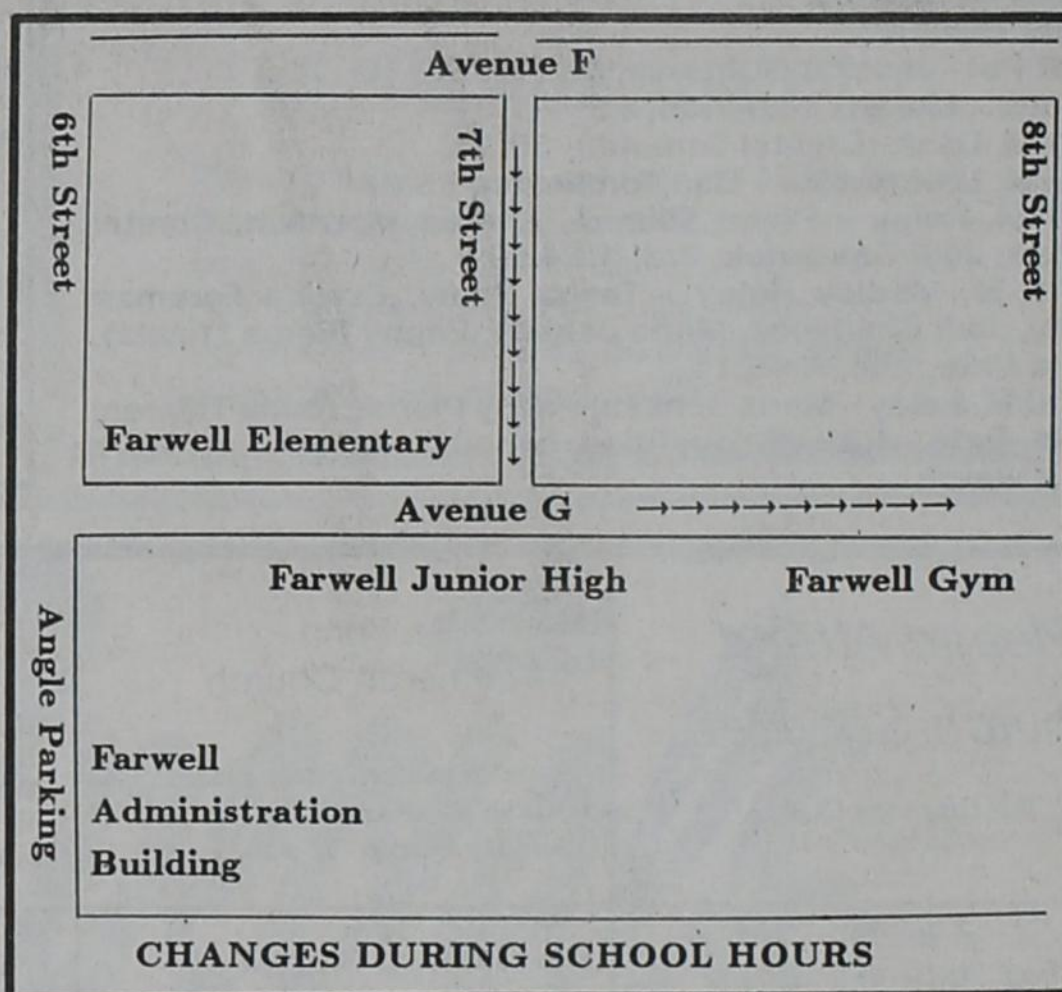
It will also make Avenue G between 7th and 8th streets (the north side of the junior high) one way during school hours. Traffic will go east.

Also, angle parking will be put in on 6th Street between Avenues G and H (on the west side of the school administration building).

The requests were made by the school officials to ease the problem of unloading children at school.

Mayor Wendol Christian checked on the legality of the changes Wednesday morning and found it okay. They are expected to go into effect in September.

Twister destroys Lazbuddie home, sprinkler systems

A tornado cut a swath about one half mile wide in the Lazbuddie area Friday destroying the home of Roger and Debbie Johnson and damaging property in the area.

At least 7-8 sprinkler systems were also wrecked by high winds, windows broke, and trees were uprooted.

The pressure caused by swirling winds caused the walls of the Johnson home to implode. Luckily they were safely in the basement by the time the worst of the storm hit at about 7:30 or 8 p.m..

Reportedly, there was one main tornado and three or four smaller funnel clouds beside it.

The Johnsons were trapped under the debris until neighbors came to clear it away from the basement entry way

about an hour later.

The Lazbuddie Fire Department was the first to arrive on the scene. Many other Lazbuddie people turned out to lend a hand.

The Parmer County sheriff's department had been tracking the tornado's wake. They had four cars out to watch the clouds. When they found out that the fire department had responded, they decided to wait and cover the remainder of the county.

"Our fire departments in Parmer County are some of the best in the world. As a volunteer organization they do a fantastic job," said Williams.

The cleanup effort started almost immediately, but Saturday was one of the big days for the cleanup.

"I can't tell you how good

it was that people came over to help," said Lazbuddie area county commissioner Raymond McGehee.

"There were so many in there Saturday that we could hardly get up in there," said Williams.

The Johnson family was left with most of the burden of picking up the pieces. "Justin seemed kind of down today; they lost everything," commented a school staff member Monday. School officials rallied by allowing the high school boys to work on the cleanup this week.

The family lost clothing, food, furniture, as well as their home. Anyone who wants to make donations to them may do so personally or through the Rev. Keith Comier of the Lazbuddie Church of Christ, 965-2932.

Recipe of Week

Gingered Vegetables

This recipe comes from the Campbell's 75th Anniversary Cookbook

1 Tbs. vegetable oil

1 c. garlic minced
1/2 tsp. ground ginger

Zincks, Owens, Devault resign

The Farwell School Board May 9 accepted four resignations. Leaving at the end of the current school term are teachers Mary Lou and Craig Zinck, coach Kendall Devault, and nurse Sarah Owen. Farwell had been sharing Mrs. Owen with Bovina Schools. She will be working fulltime at Bovina Schools come September.

The board heard a lengthy discourse from Supt. Richard Boothby to the effect that the tax rate is higher than it should be due to some assessed valuation of Farwell homes being too low.

Here's what happened: Farwell Schools' tax rate is \$1.277, including 5 cents for bonded indebtedness. The bonds were paid off in February but the nickel was included in last year's taxes.

Boothby discovered that there is a disparity between the local and state appraisals of Farwell School District properties. The local assessed valuation is \$62.3 million; the state has it at \$66.9 million - \$4.6 million higher.

In checking, Boothby found

this is because the samples taken by the state for their valuation proved to be higher on homes sampled in Farwell than those listed by the local appraisers.

The \$1.277 (per \$100 assessed valuation) is based on the local appraisals. If the state figures were used, it would be \$1.19 (including the nickel for bonded indebtedness).

Thus, taxes would still be the same for most folks but the tax rate would be nearly 9 cents lower.

Boothby will pursue this to try to get a lower tax rate by having the assessed valuations moved up.

In other business, the board: Re-appointed its officers: Doyle Johnson, president; Steve Kaltwasser, vice president, and Katherine White, secretary.

Approved the athletic budget. New uniforms will be ordered for the basketball teams. AD Rex Cumpton said the students who graduate this month were very successful the past four years: they had more football wins over that period than any

other team; they got to state in basketball for the first time ever, and they did well in track.

Heard maintenance Supt. Joe Stanton report that one of the lawn tractors has broken down.

Approved the transfer of some students from Bovina Schools.

Set up a salary committee

of Tom Nichols, Kaltwasser and Mrs. White.

Gave the go-ahead for school officials to check into implementing a Head Start program here for pre-kindergarten students. Farwell already has a pre-K program, but by using Head Start, more state and federal funds would be provided.

Shade to be built

At the Farwell Convalescent Center Auxiliary meeting May 13, members voted to have built a gazebo type shade for the patio, a 15' x 15' structure.

Projects completed for March and April included: candies and fruit were given residents for Easter, new flowers and baskets were placed on the dining room tables, and a quilt was completed for Debra Loooper to take for disaster relief.

The Auxiliary provided homemade ice cream for the Mother's Day party May 10.

The Auxiliary is buying 10 new dining chairs for the dining hall.

Upcoming events include Father's Day cookout, with members bringing strawberries and bananas, Border Town Days bake sale, August ice cream party and September watermelon party.

Bandleader Charlie Phillips will have a fund-raising dance for the Convalescent Center in July at the Clovis Holiday Inn the night before Border Town Days.

FmHA starts new program

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has implemented a new program to assist rural residents to become successful home owners.

In addition to its direct housing loan program, the federal agency is now authorized to guarantee commercial loans to purchase single - family housing.

FmHA guarantees a loan made by a qualified lender against a percentage of possible loss. Loans may be made by any lender, including state housing agencies, which is approved as a mortgagee for federal housing mortgage insurance. Additionally, lenders approved by FmHA, the Federal National Mortgage Association (Fannie Mae), or the Farm Credit System may qualify for the program.

FmHA is authorized to guarantee up to \$100 million in loans for single-family homes during the current fiscal year. This assistance is available for new or existing rural housing, located on individual tracts or in subdivisions, according to the State Director.

Many rural residents eligible for direct FmHA loan assistance may also qualify for the guaranteed loan program. Applicants with low to moderate incomes may be eligible for loan guarantees, and low-income applicants may qualify for the agency's interest assistance program, which brings down the cost of the monthly payment.

Applicants must be without safe, decent and sanitary housing and unable to obtain a loan without the FmHA guarantees at rates and terms they can reasonably be expected to repay.

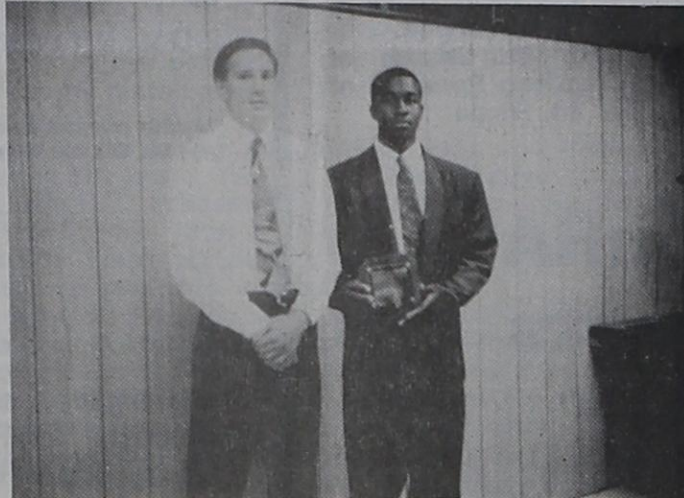

I respect the person who is trying to take steps to reduce their cost of taxes and unnecessary expenses. They will be good stewards of what they have.

However, I must lift up my experience that we will pay for the hospital district expenses one way or the other!

I have lived in a community which voted down a hospital district. Their hospital is vacant. They now are paying for a hospital in a neighboring town, and there is no doctor to replace their elderly doctor. No one is interested in being a doctor there. What little industry they had left is vanishing.

I have lived in another community where we worked to keep the hospital open. We had celebrations and bar-b-ques, truck-stops, and etc. We raised \$300,000 to keep the hospital operating, until we could vote on the hospital district. It passed, and the hospital now is going good, and is still open. A new prison is coming in, because of the hospital. Other industry is planned because of the hospital.

Both of these are in small towns. Both had paid the cost for the hospital district.

I have also gone with ambulances to take people to the hospital in Amarillo and Lubbock. Some died and some lived. More lived where our hospital stabilized them before travel, and the helicopter crew said that several over those years would not have made it without the hospital.

I experienced medical care at Friona when I was almost killed in a wreck. If I hadn't been stabilized, a blood clot would have more than likely jarred loose. At the very, least I would not be as well as I am now.

I cannot tell you what is right for your vote. But I can tell you it is going to cost you dearly either way. And one day, we will be in a larger town's hospital district, to make sure we have care for you and your family.

Thank you for having the hospital here when I needed it.

Dear Editor:

Since my internship, residency, and time in the Service, I have been associated with Parmer County Community Hospital. The people who worked and spent a lot of their time elected to get a Community Charter for our hospital. At the time of Charter there were only seven such hospitals in Texas. They felt that local control was very important and no government help was solicited or accepted. The hospital was maintained by the income from its services and through donations. We were able to function fairly well under this system.

This system worked without debt but in order to continue we had to cut back on services and were unable to buy any new equipment. This occurred after the government became involved through Medicare and Medicaid. Rural hospitals received about one half of the pay for services as larger hospitals. The government's idea was that it cost only half as much to operate in a rural area. This proved to be entirely false and small hospitals began to fail. We avoided failure by cutting back on services and making our antiquated equipment last a little longer. The hospital can no longer continue to exist under these circumstances.

The government is changing its mind and over a period of five years will gradually increase pay to smaller hospitals, however, it will be impossible to continue services or expand services without a tax base. The only certain way of doing this is to form a Hospital District. This will allow us to have

"We'll be happy to sit down with you and fill out your sales tax return, explain which state taxes apply to your particular business and send you home with useful information," Sharp said.

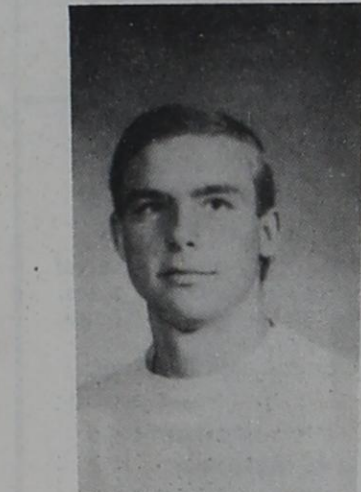

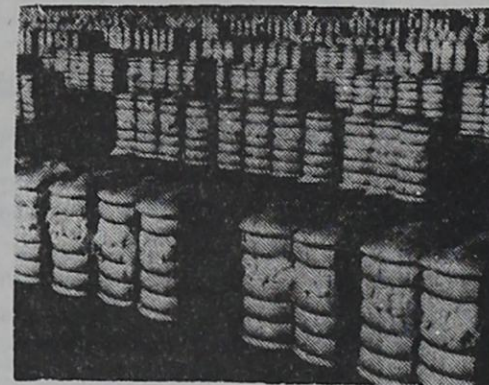

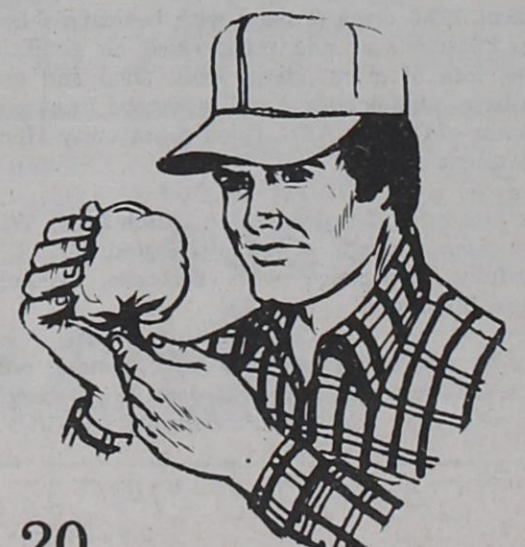

Texico to seek a second police officer

The Texico City Council Tuesday voted to seek a deputy marshal.

Fry Urioste was promoted to city marshal by Mayor Doyal LaRue.

Fix-ups, repairs and clean-ups were big topics, too.

Mayor Doyal LaRue again recommended that funds be set aside for future work on curbs and gutters for the entire city.

He noted that gas taxes provide about \$11,000 a year to the city; these funds can only be used for street work. In addition, he proposed that another \$9,000 be added to it - for a total of \$20,000 - and placed in a fund for future street work.

Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows noted that at the last meeting they had talked about hiring an engineer to get cost estimates for such work.

She also said she would like to see a list of priorities first.

Councilman Butch Tharp said he wanted to think about it first. He asked about the annual street repair programs. LaRue responded that the special fund "won't hamstring us."

City Clerk-Treasurer Marie

Christian noted that if an emergency came up, the city can seek a release of the money in the special fund from the state Department of Finance.

In conjunction with this, bids were received for the city engineer's post that is being created. They were discussed in executive session. Afterward, Bob Lydick, Clovis, was picked.

Also along the fix-up line: Councilman Oran Jay Autrey and Steve Meeks reported on their work at fixing some of the swimming pool problems, mainly the plumbing. They're being helped by licensed contractors. The cost is around \$6,500.

Talked with Johnny Eastwood of Eastwood Construction on re-sweeping city streets and getting more rock for street work.

Agreed to seek someone to fill the maintenance post.

Agreed to buy sprinkler materials to be placed at Lions Park. Tharp will be the council's liaison to the Texico - Farwell Lions Club, which is planning a long-range refurbishing of the park.

Agreed to move the police

practice range to a safer location.

Heard Phil Black, who owns 3 lots on North Turner Street, say that an adjacent property owner has placed his trailer too close to the boundary (a 5-foot setback is needed, according to city laws); also a dirt build-up will harm the water drainage.

LaRue, Autrey and Tharp will check on the drainage. As for the setback, they will talk with the Clovis building inspector and/or an attorney. Will meet May 22 with a Weston Co. engineer to get information on a filtering system solution for the KKR Well contamination problem.

In other business, the coun-

cil:

- Paid the annual \$382 dues to Eastern Plains Council of Governments.

- Received audit proposals from CPAs De'Aun Willoughby, Sandra Johnson and John Schoenberger. Willoughby's was accepted, at \$2,200.

- Agreed to advertise for a city attorney; this must be

done periodically, by law.

- Was asked about providing water and electricity for the baseball field, which will be used for T-ball and softball this summer as part of the Clovis league. The question is: who owns the park, since the group running it years ago apparently is no longer in operation.
