



The bathroom is one of the most expensive areas in the house. Careful planning is important to get the comfort and convenience the modern homemaker has come to demand.

The modern bathroom must be a thing of beauty as well as convenience for, next to the kitchen, it's usually the bathroom that sells a

If you are building a house, an extra \$200 spent on the bathroom may pay dividends.

The minimum-sized bath is 5 x 7 feet. It will barely accommodate the three necessary fixtures. It's adequate for a minimum house or as a second bathroom.

Generally, a single, threefixture bathroom is adequate only for a one-floor house of less than 1,000 square feet.

It's possible to make one bath serve as two by increasing its efficiency. For example, you can enclose the water closet for privacy and add another wash-basin for around \$150 as against the cost of a full extra bath. The lavatory is by far the most frequently used fixture in a bathroom.

Today you can change your entire bath environment with the new seamless onepiece three-sided bathtubshower alcove. It wipes clean easily and is available in several colors.
