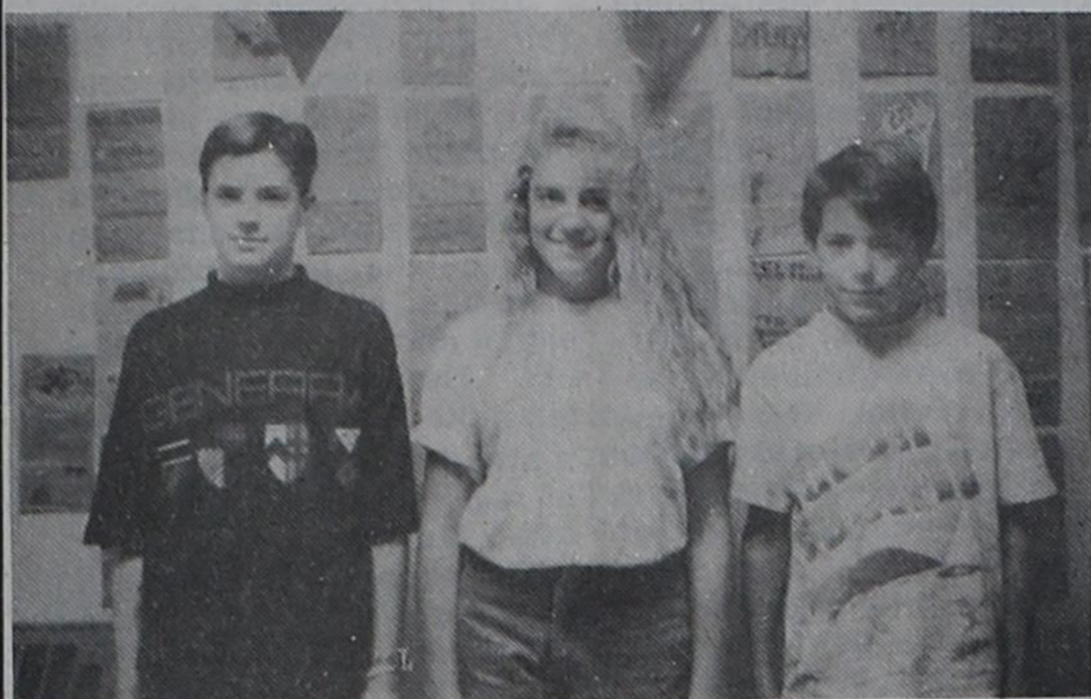

Here's your typical congressman (I'm being facetious). He was convicted in Ohio of having sex with an underage girl. Then he is accused of fondling a House elevator operator.

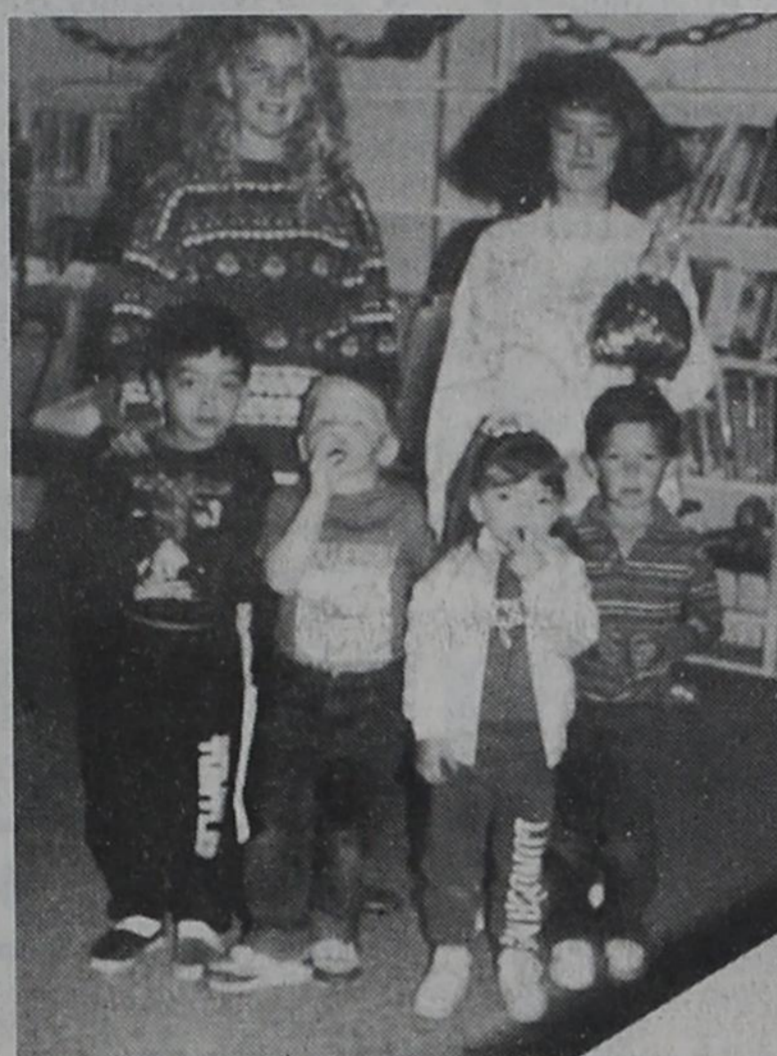
The result: he now qualifies for a pension of more than \$2,000 a month starting in 1993. Under the federal pension system, his congress-

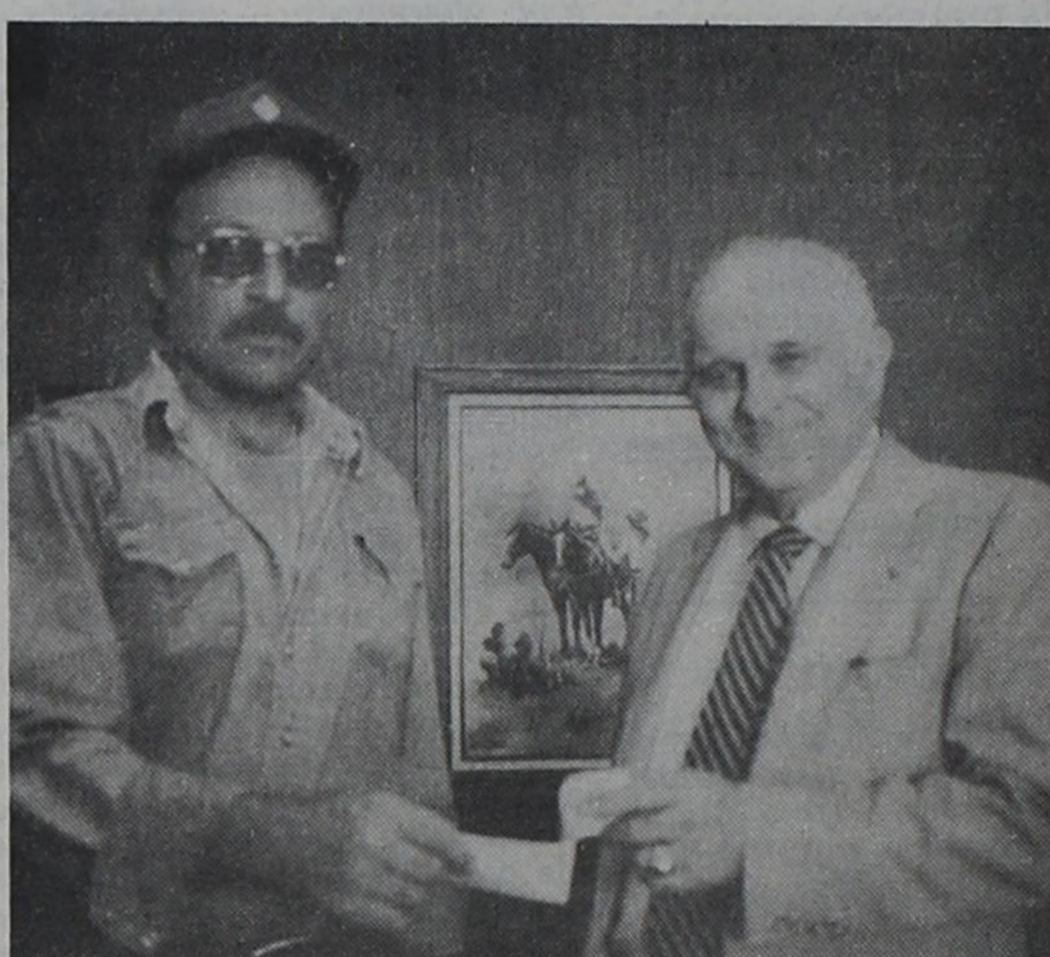

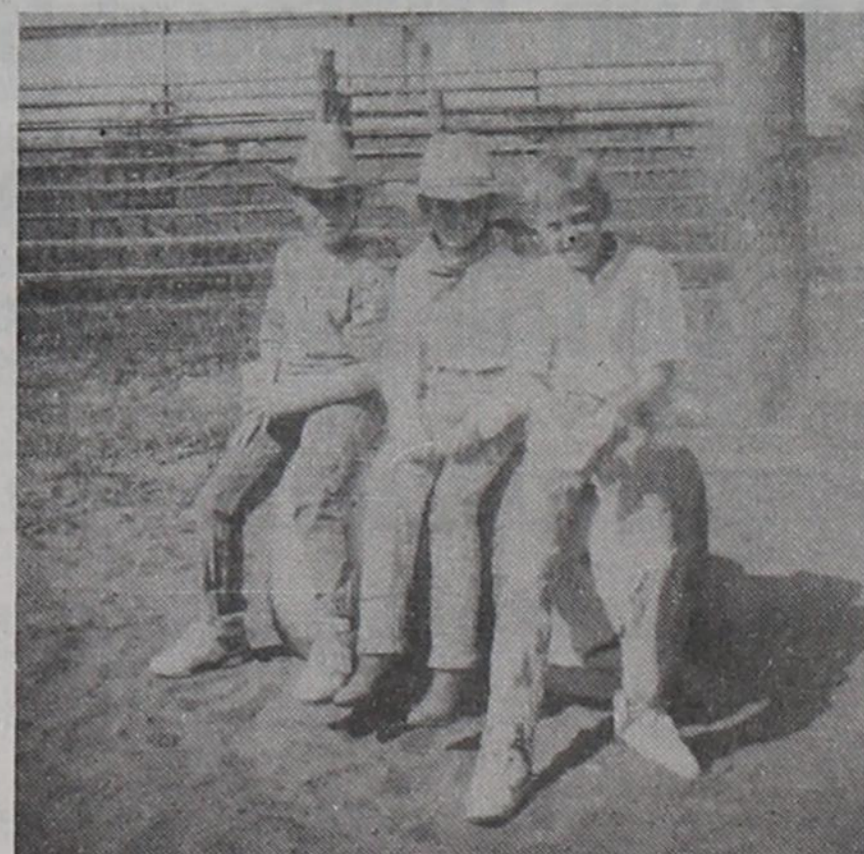
small kids.

sional service is combined with his 6 1/2 years in the Air Force and 2 years on a congressional staff to determine his pension.

As I've written, I fully realize that the 3,000 to 4,000 folks who read our tiny paper are just a drop in the bucket of the 250 million Americans. So our thoughts hold little water. But I am adverse to hypocrisy and strive to be honest with myself.

So when I say the future looks bleak for the middle class, that the only chance for material success is to work for the government, that our children's future is in financial jeopardy, and that there's absolutely nothing you or I can do about it - I wish I were wrong.

In Washington, it will be business as usual.

When we first moved to Farwell, we had the idea that we were moving to pleasant rural community where our children could run and play, just like the characters in Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn.

We should have gone back and read the books before we thought such a thing.

Remember the characters in those books?

There was Huck Finn - a teenager who smoked, swore, drank, skipped school, lied, and rebelled against his father. Of course, Huck's father deserved to be abandoned. He was a lazy, drunken lout who both neglected and abused his son.

Then there was quite an assortment of other unsavory characters - conmen, scoundrels, gamblers, and of course, the murderous Injun Joe.

Luckily, when we moved to Farwell we found that the town was mostly populated by warm, friendly, loving people. But, in recent months we have found that our safe haven isn't as safe as we thought it was.

In the past several months several scary things have happened. There have been people arrested in both Farwell and Texico on drug charges. There have been cases of theft and vandalism at the school. And, a woman who lived 12 miles from here has been indicted on a charge of murdering her children.

Is our community as safe as we thought? Do we need to do some things differently?

In the past few years the

Farwell City Council has repeatedly discussed the need for a law enforcement agent for the city. But they have come to no decision.

Recently the Farwell School Board tabled the question of paying its share of the funding for the Parmer County Sheriff's deputy in charge of the D.A.R.E. program. The D.A.R.E. program teaches children to say no to drugs. It also gives the juvenile officer a chance to meet the children of the community and form a positive relationship with them.

In Hereford, where a D.A.R.E. program has been in effect for some time, three cases of molestation were reported because the children involved trusted the officer enough to tell this secret.

On the other hand, some of the ideas of the D.A.R.E. program are already being taught by teachers at Farwell schools.

In both the case of the city police and the D.A.R.E. program, the community is being asked to decide whether it needs to spend money for law enforcement or not.

Obviously, people have different opinions about this question. A retired person on a fixed income might worry about any increased taxes. Or, they might be frightened because there is no city police officer patrolling the streets on a regular basis. Each citizen needs to study the issue and make an informed decision.

So, we DARE you to make your feelings known to your elected officials. The question is up to you.

What do we really need?

From wife Judy:
Students are encouraged to be in school every day. State funding is tied to attendance using a formula that designates a certain amount of money for each student in average daily attendance (ADA).

With the passage of Senate Bill 1, however, attendance

counts now will be based on monthly averages of daily attendance for the entire year instead of one four-week period. (This year is a grace period.)

Because many school districts feel the change in the attendance counting procedure will cause them to lose state money, SB1 limits the aid reduction any district may suffer this year to 2% of the four-week count in October. Losses in subsequent years, however, will not be limited.

Because of declining enrollments and the new attendance counting method, the Farwell School District expects to lose 1%, or 10 students, in average daily attendance this year. This translates into a loss of \$19,100 in state revenue, which is a significant amount of money. Each student in average daily attendance this year means \$1,910 for the district, so it is very important that students attend school every day.

Attending school is important not only for financial reasons, but also because a child who misses a day of school also misses a day of learning that might never be repeated.

A 2% gain in attendance this year would reduce the anticipated loss by \$17,190. That money could then be used to help the district meet student learning needs.

Parents can help by making school a top priority and helping to build the habit of daily attendance.

About a year ago Holly Sugar Corporation began in-

vestigating where to place its first ion exclusion plant. It has 8 factory locations located across the U.S. Their question was:

Which location would the best place to build the ion exclusion plant?

After much research, Hereford was chosen.

Why?

The first reason cited was the good relationship between growers and the company. The growers and the company have had a 26 year history of dealing together in a professional manner. In the past, problems have been settled in a professional and gentlemanly manner. This relationship has guaranteed the company with a steady, dependable source of raw materials- something every business needs.

The second reason cited is purely economic. The Texas Panhandle area is the strongest market for Holly products. Not only do we use sugar in baking and cooking, the Texas Panhandle is also a major market for the cattle feed which is a by-product of sugar production.

The third reason cited is the good community support which has been shown in the Hereford area. Their Chamber of Commerce asks businesses "What can we do to help," and that attitude is more than a rhetorical question. They do all in their power to actively promote a good business climate.

Fourth, the managers at the Hereford plant were receptive to new ideas. The new ion

exclusion plant uses some of the newest technology in the world. Instead of burying their heads in the sand and saying "Let's wait and see how it works elsewhere," the plant managers at Hereford were willing to study what is being done.

For those reasons, the Hereford plant will be building a 4 1/2 million gallon molasses tank and a 60' high processing building by next August. This will make the current plant 10 percent more effective as far as the removal of sugar from the sugar beet. It will also enable it use its workforce more effectively.

One of the speakers at the groundbreaking, Jim Witherpoon, talked about places which were not as successful as Hereford. In the 26 years since Holly Sugar opened its Hereford plant, sugar plants have closed in eight states. Plus, some nations stopped producing sugar for export.

The kind of cooperation that was shown by the Hereford leadership is the type every community should show.

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3 Way halts Lazbuddie

The Lazbuddie Longhorns ran into a Three Way buzz saw last Friday at home when the Eagles won 100-52. It was the first district loss for Lazbuddie, now 2-1, and 5-3 overall. The Longhorns play at Amherst tonight (Friday) at 7:30.

Three Way's Mario Guillen threw for 5 TDs and ran for 8 more. His brother, Efrain, caught 4 TD passes and intercepted 2 passes. Due to the 45-point rule, the game ended with 2:40 left in the final period.

Here's how Lazbuddie scored: In the first quarter, Luis Gonzales had a 7-yard TD run. He kicked the point after. Then Kirk Jesko scored from the 15. The Gonzales kick put Lazbuddie into the lead 16-14. Then Three Way scored 3 TDs in a row to stay out in front. The Longhorns fought back when Casey Russell caught a 10-yard TD pass from Paul Williams. The extra point pass failed. Next, Gonzales caught a 6-yard TD pass from Williams. The Gonzales kick was good. And just before the half, Williams scored from the 16. Gonzales kicked the point after but Lazbuddie was still down 54-38. In the third quarter, Lazbuddie matched the first 2 Three Way TDs. Jesko scored on an 80-yard kickoff return (the pass for extra point failed) and Williams scored from the 37. Williams kicked the point after. Then Mario Guillen scored 5 straight Eagle TDs to clinch the victory on runs of 7, 38, 4

and 26 yards, and a 70-yard kickoff return. According to area statistics kept by the Lubbock newspaper, Lazbuddie ranks 5th in team offense with 376.6 yards a game, and 10th in team defense, allowing 323.3 yards a game. Individual leaders: Jesko is 4th among area rushers, with 131 yards a game. Williams is 4th among area passers, with 70 completions in 151 tries for 1,088 yards. Barnes is 7th among receivers with 22 catches for 396 yards; Cozby is tied for 10th with 20 grabs for 426 yards.

"We just didn't play very well. We dropped passes all over the place," said Longhorn coach C.W. Williams. Williams praised his opponents, "I don't want to take anything away from them. Three Way played well." Amherst is a team Williams feels his team can beat if they play well. However, he was quick to add, "If we play like we did last week, we may not win."

No. 1 Wolverines explode past Melrose

It was another Texico Explosion last Friday. The Wolverines whipped Melrose at home, 54-6. And it helped Texico claim at least a district co-championship.

The Wolverines are 4-0 in district and 8-1 overall. They finish the regular season with a game at Ft. Sumner tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m.

The Wolverines are now ranked No. 1 in New Mexico.

The exact time and place of the Texico playoff opener will be set Nov. 3. There is a possibility that Texico will play Carrizozo at 2 p.m. mdt Nov. 10 at Texico, but this is not definite.

Texico didn't waste any time scoring on Melrose. With 10:38 on the clock, Freddy Chavez took a 29-yard pass from Benjy McDaniel into the end zone. Hector Orozco kicked the point after and the Wolverines were on the move.

On defense, Steven Horner made a super tackle. Then Greg Akers caused a 3rd and 9 situation. And Rusty Foreman broke through for a great tackle for a loss, forcing a Melrose punt.

Texico took over at midfield. Josh Autrey considered his assault on school rushing statistics with a gain of 16 yards. Kelvin Gooden carried the ball to the Melrose 25 and McDaniel rolled for another first down. But Texico fumbled, stopping the drive.

Warren Martin, Matthew Williams and Horner stopped Melrose cold. Melrose completed a pass, and McDaniel made the tackle. Melrose punted and Autrey returned the ball for good yardage.

On offense, Autrey gained 4. Then McDaniel ran the keeper to the 15. Autrey then scored the final 15 for a TD with 14 seconds left in the first quarter. Orozco kicked the point after and it was 14-0 Texico.

Melrose started on its 24. Kenny Shaw, Williams and McDaniel had good tackles. Tom Derouin broke through for a quarterback sack, forcing a punt.

'No Findley payments'

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that no Findley payments will be made for 1989- crop corn and sorghum under the price support and production program since the 12 month national weighted average market prices for these commodities exceeded the basic support level.

Payments are made when the basic support level for a crop of a commodity is reduced to maintain domestic and export markets for that commodity. Findley payments are made when the 12-month national weighted average market price is less than the price support level before it was reduced.

The national average market prices per bushel received by producers from September 1989 through August were \$2.36 for corn and \$2.10 for sorghum (\$3.75 per hundredweight). The basic price support level for

each of these commodities was \$206 and \$1.96, respectively.

Smith galloped for 24 yards. After more running plays, Stewart raced into the final 11 for the TD at 1:19. The Haseloff kick made it 54-7.

On defense, Ruben Lucio made an excellent tackle of the kick returner.

In the third quarter, Farwell scored once again, at 4:59. Keeping the ball on the ground, the Steers moved downfield on runs by Smith, Stewart and Actkinson. Stewart scored from the 4. The Haseloff kick made it 61-7.

The P-ACT+ will help a student determine his strengths, weaknesses and aptitudes in various areas.

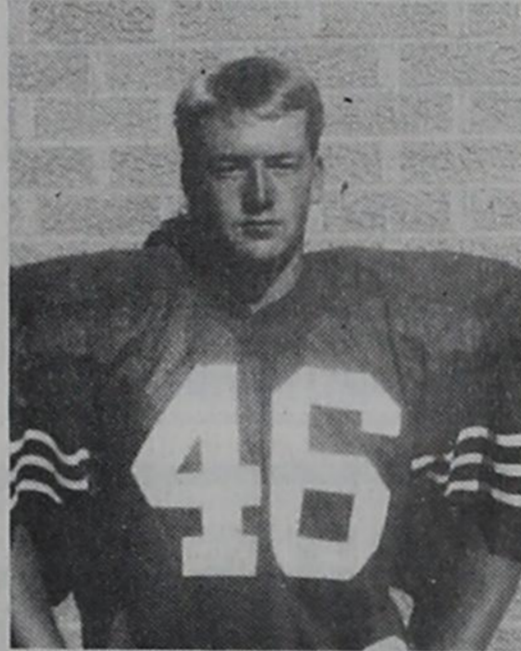

Students attend medical ethics session

Farwell High School students in the Region XVI Gifted and Talented program attended a day-long session in Amarillo on medical ethics cosponsored by the Harrington Regional Medical Center, Inc. and Region XVI Education Service Center Oct. 31.

The day began with a lecture on general ethics by Dr. Edward Sherwood, who defined medical ethics and posed several ethical questions to the students.

During the following two portions of the seminar, students selected two of the nine elective sessions to attend.

The topic for one of the elective sessions was an overview of biotechnology and the ethics of adapting this new technology. It was conducted by the Texas A&M Research & Extension Center.

Another session was held at the St. Anthony's Hospice and Life Enrichment Center. It focused on dying with dignity and the hospice concept of caring for the terminally ill.

Northwest Texas Hospital hosted a tour of the neonatal intensive care unit, diagnostic imaging department and trauma center, and it allowed students to ponder the ethical decisions which must be made in these areas each day.

Another session featured the benefits of prenatal care and barriers to accessing it. Topics included high - risk pregnancies and a look at the high - tech babies who are two to three years of age.

A session on ethical issues in medical research explored the issues involved in basic research and preclinical research through videotape and discussion.

The Bivins Center for Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation hosted a tour of the 48-bed facility to show students how patients suffering from head injuries, spinal cord injuries, strokes, major trauma and neuromuscular disease are rehabilitated.

Harrington Cancer Center hosted a tour of its research and

treatment/therapy areas, including the electron microscopy lab and the new research institute.

A tour was also offered at the Coffee Memorial Blood Center which was responsible for providing all the blood and blood components used in all hospitals throughout the Texas High Plains. Discussions included the moral and ethical implications of donor questioning regarding high risk activities, donor confidentiality and notification of test results.

The seminar included a panel discussion involving several participants from the Harrington Regional Medical Center and it was moderated by Dr. Sherwood. Panelists included Dr. Nancy Plummer, R.N., Ph.D., a nursing professor at West Texas State University; Dr. James Luce, M.D. of the Harrington Cancer Center; Mike McQueen, director of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission Area Agency on Aging; Dr. Elizabeth Carter, R.N., Ed.D., chairman of Harrington Regional Medical Center, Inc.; Dr. Karen Holman, M.D., Industrial Health Clinic; and Joe Kraft, MSIV, senior medical student at Texas Tech.

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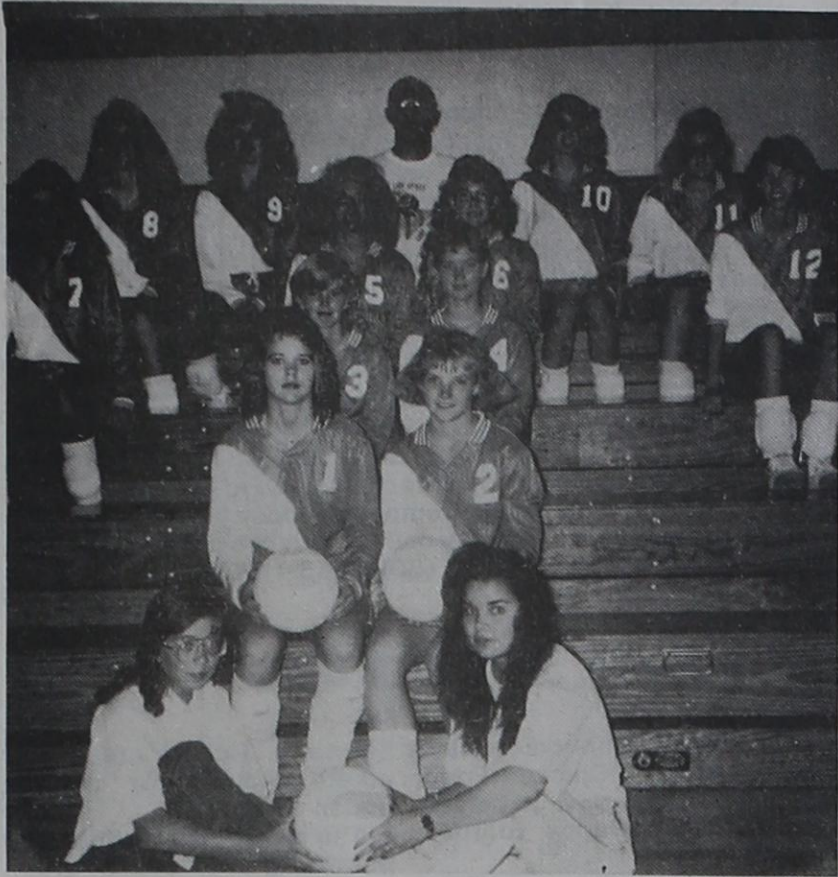

The theme of the event was "Experience Eastern New Mexico".

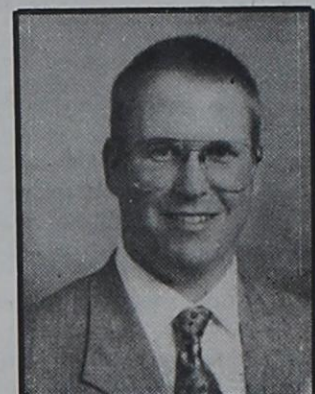

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Pilot project ready to go to work

A pilot project to improve loan service to cotton producers, the Regional Cotton Loan Center in Lubbock, is staffed and anxious to "prove its mettle" as the area harvest accelerates, says Center Director Susan Hughes.

The Center is equipped to handle much of the data processing required in recording warehouse receipts and class card information needed for cotton price support loans. It also will provide a centralized data base to make cotton loan collateral information readily accessible to buyers.

The service, instituted for the first time this year by USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is designed to benefit producers by shortening the time between loan application and receipt of proceeds. In addition, it's intended that a centralized loan collateral data base available to buyers will facilitate producer marketing operations.

The elapsed time from loan application at the county ASCS office to a check in the producer's hand, ASCS officials say, will be cut to 48 hours. And producers who make loan applications at the Lubbock Center can expect a check within 24 hours. Otherwise the wait is a minimum three days.

Testing the new method of handling cotton loans will involve cotton from 42 county ASCS offices in roughly a 100 mile radius of Lubbock. The regional facility will provide a service center for entering and processing loan data electronically, plus physical storage of receipts and class cards. Participating counties will continue to be fully responsible for administering the loan program and county offices will be the only dispersal point for loan payments.

It's emphasized that producers are not required to use the regional center. They still can apply for and redeem loans at their individual county offices, but with the new system

producers from all 42 counties will have the additional option of conducting loan transactions at the Lubbock site.

Producers and buyers using the center will find six terminals set up for their use. They'll be able to access the most current collection of information on loan cotton, but will have access to no data other than that which is currently and legally available in cotton offices. The advantage lies in the speed of operation and in the availability in a single location of data from all 42 counties.

Some familiarity with the computer system and its reporting methods obviously will help users get the most out of the information collection. And Ms. Hughes and her staff are offering to arrange demonstrations and informal training sessions on request. The center is located at 4601 West Loop 289, Lubbock. Cotton estimate questioned

If the old futures market saw that says a lot of people have gone broke betting against U.S. Department of Agriculture crop estimates is true, then betting with the estimates must be a money-maker, right?

Anyone who thinks so, say officials of Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., can get plenty of action in High Plains cotton circles where hardly anybody agrees with the Department's latest 2.6 million bale projection for the 25-county area.

Some disagreement following a USDA estimate is more or less normal, says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson. "But in this instance there's an uncommonly large majority of experienced crop observers who disagree. And virtually all those speaking out on the issue are on the same side," he adds. "They all believe the estimate is too high. In fact, the top end of the estimates we've heard has been barely above 2.4 million bales.

The USDA estimate, released Sept. 12, was based on data gathered between Aug. 22 and Aug. 30 to reflect crop conditions as of Sept. 1. And if in fact final production is 200,000 bales or more below the estimate, the timing may provide a logical explanation.

As area Extension Agronomist Dr. James Supak points out, the last half of August was abnormally hot and dry. But it wasn't until late in the month that producers and others become aware that much of the irrigated crop as well as dryland cotton had sapped available moisture and was shedding bolls that otherwise would have gone to the gin. "So it's very possible," Supak says, "That USDA surveyed many of its fields before this unexpected fruit loss occurred." If so, he adds, unless there are offsetting developments in the meantime, that fact should show up in lower boll counts when estimating data is gathered for next month's report due October 11.

One recurring question in gin offices and coffee shops after almost every USDA crop report is, "Where does USDA get these numbers?"

The national figures, PCG explains, come from the National Agricultural Statistics Services which has a

Inventories to be taken

The Texas Agricultural Statistics Services will begin contacting farmers and ranchers across the state in late November for 1990 acreage, yield and production totals and end-of-the-year livestock and poultry inventories.

"Extreme weather conditions have certainly had an impact on Texas agriculture this year. From the heavy rains and flooding in East Texas last spring to this summer's prolonged hot, dry conditions, weather has been a major factor in Texas production this year. These surveys should help us summarize where the industry stands at the end of 1990," state statistician Dennis Findley explained.

"Information from these confidential surveys conducted by mail, telephone or in person will also help producers make their plans for the coming year.

"Sound production and marketing decisions require good, reliable information and some advanced planning, and our reports provide producers with solid facts and figures they can incorporate into their plans," Findley added.

As always, the Texas service will be trying to keep survey costs at a minimum, so Findley is urging producers to return their mailed questionnaires as soon as possible to avoid follow-up contracts.

"Remember, these are sample surveys, so if you are contacted it is important to provide the requested information since one producer represents several other operations of the same type and size. Our estimates can be no better than the numbers of producers provide," Findley noted.

Results of the surveys will be published in early 1991. Anyone wanting a copy of the results can write Information Section, Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, P.O. Box 70, Austin, Texas 78767.

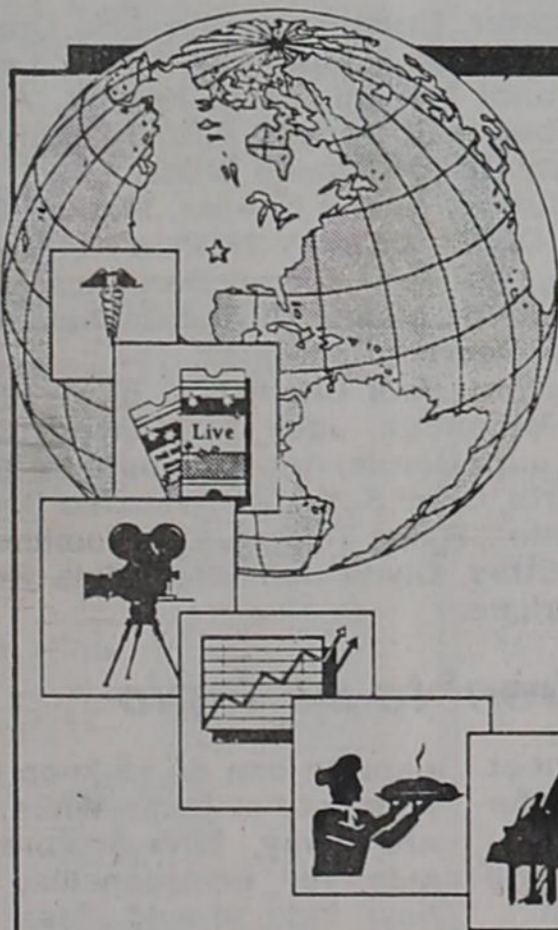

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cooperating agency in each state that supplies the necessary data. State offices get their information from "enumerators" in the various crop reporting districts.

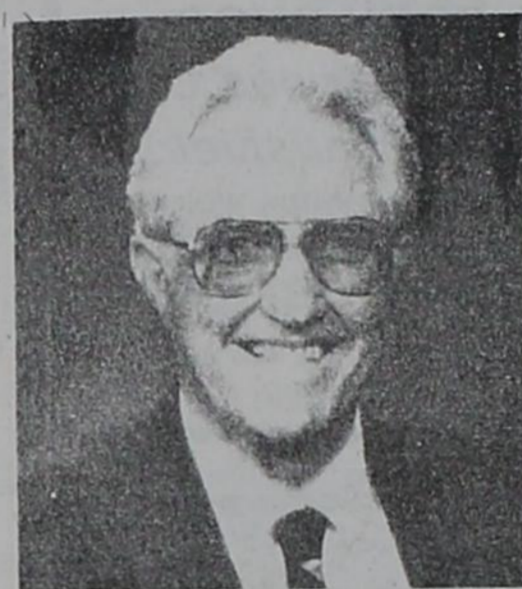
According to Texas Agricultural Statistics Service (TASS) statistician Doug Spillman of Austin, about 20 enumerators are active on the High Plains this year, gathering data from 300 "samples." Each sample consists of two 10 foot row sections at no less than two locations in fields randomly pre-selected by computer. Stalks, squares, blooms and bolls are counted in each location.

Locations are mapped and stalks tagged to permit monthly evaluations of the crop's biological progress through the season. Later surveys include boll sizes, percentage of open bolls and ultimately lint weight. In the process of getting entry permission from farmers, enumerators also compile information on seeding rates, acres in fields surveyed and total acres planted. If requested, survey information on a given field can be given to the farm operator, Spillman says. But he emphasizes that although the random nature of sample selection works well for projecting yield of individual fields.

The site choice for samples within a field, Spillman explains, begins at the corner where the enumerator first arrives. From there he or she follows a fixed, predetermined route to the first site or another to the second site, with no alternative to that procedure. Therefore either or both samplings may produce data representing the very best or the very worst of the field's overall potential.

For the record, PCG notes, USDA's September estimates for the 10 years 1980 through 1989 on average have come out within about 1.5 percent of the final production figure. And November projections for those years have been even more on target, averaging to within less than one percent. The worst "misses" of the decade came in 1987 when the September and November estimates, respectively, were 15 percent and 6 percent below the 14.76 million - bale final out turn.

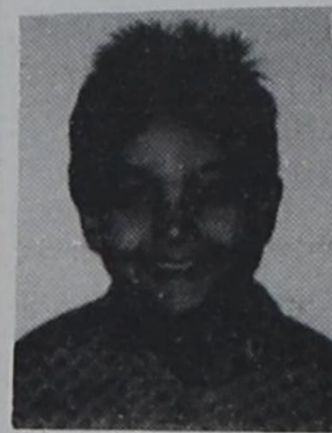

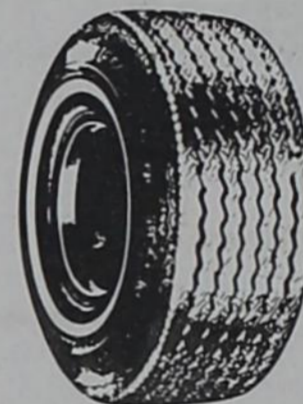
