Vote slated for 3 posts

Texico School District voters go to the polls Tuesday to vote for three School Board positions. The polling place will be in the Texico Community Center; it will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

In advance of the election, the Tribune sent questionnaires to each candidate. They were asked to provide biographical information and to answer these questions:

- 1. What are your personal goals for education?
2. What specific changes might you have in mind for Texico Schools?
3. What do you feel are the strengths and/or weaknesses of Texico Schools? If you mention weaknesses, then how might they be improved?

- Bruce K. Mayfield vs. Hilda R. Montano.
- Paul Dee Barnes, incumbent, vs. Deborah Autrey (write-in).
- Greg Martin, incumbent, vs. Byron E. Mayfield.

Bruce Mayfield

I have lived in the area all my life. My wife's name is Roxanne. We have three children: Kyle, 4th grade, Shane, 1st grade, and Cherry, kindergarten. We live 25 miles north of Texico, and also farm north of Texico.

What are your personal goals for education?

Try to insure that our children receive the best education possible. Also insure that we maintain, if not improve upon the morale structure of the school.

What specific changes might you have in mind for Texico Schools?

No specific changes, just try to help maintain the quality that has already been established.

What do you feel are the strengths and/or weaknesses of Texico Schools? If you mention weaknesses, then how might they be improved?

The strength of Texico is the teachers and administration. Another strength is the small school system where children can receive individual attention.

Hilda Rojas - Montano

My parents are Merced and Lola Rojas. I have three children: Lilo, who is a senior at THS, DiAna, a third grader at Texico Elementary and Felisia, who is 3 1/2 years old and attends Humphrey Montessori School. I am the widow of the late Jerry J. Montano.

I have lived in Texico since about 1956. I began school in Texico and graduated in 1969. I attended Eastern New Mexico University from 1969-71, graduating with an Associate of Arts. I have currently attending ENMU working towards a Bachelors. Eventually, I hope to be admitted to law school.

I am employed with Southern New Mexico Legal Services as a Legal Assistant and have been employed with Legal Services since 1978.

My personal goals for education: It would be exciting to see more of our local children employed in positions of high standing. The young men and women in our school should have more exposure to the types of employment there are. This could possibly be accomplished by role-model speakers representing such fields as medicine and law, politics, education, etc.

It is so important for our children to be given an opportunity to develop their own self-confidence so that they can prevail in their endeavors in life. Parents as well as teachers play an important role in boosting a child's confidence. It is therefore important for parents to become more involved in their child's education. It is also important that teachers assist in the independence and self-confidence of the child and not criticize or downgrade their efforts.

Morality of war

I read an interesting note in the weekly bulletin put out by Rev. Larry Heacock of the Hamlin United Methodist Church in Farwell. It dealt with the morality of war and bears repeating.

Here's what Rev. Heacock wrote:

"Centuries ago, Christians wrestled with the problem of the morality of war. Augustine (354 - 439) and Thomas Aquinas (1224 - 1274) refined the issue, and came up with six basic principles to determine whether a war may be just or not.

According to that theory, to be just, a war must meet six conditions:

- 1. It must be conducted by a legitimate authority which explicitly serves notice that it intends to use military power to attain its objectives.
2. It must be intended for the advancement of good or for the avoidance of evil.
3. It must be undertaken only as a last resort.
4. The good anticipated from the war must outweigh the evil done in pursuit of war.
5. There must be a reasonable expectation of success in the effort.

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Area population declines

Parmer County's population, along with most other West Texas counties, took a beating in the 1980s.

The U.S. Census Bureau reports that the 1990 figures show Parmer County with 9,863, down from 11,038 in 1980. This represents a decrease of 10.6 percent.

Since Farwell and Friona preliminary estimates show

that both cities maintained their populations in the decade, it seems that the rural areas were responsible for the decline.

Meanwhile, Bailey County showed a decrease of 13.5 percent - from 8,168 to 7,064.

Deaf Smith County lost 9.5 percent - from 21,165 to 19,153.

Above-average precipitation aids

Even though the amount of participation received on the Southern High Plains of Texas during the latter portion of the 1980s was below average, the total for the 1980s was approximately 17 percent above the average received in the area up to 1980.

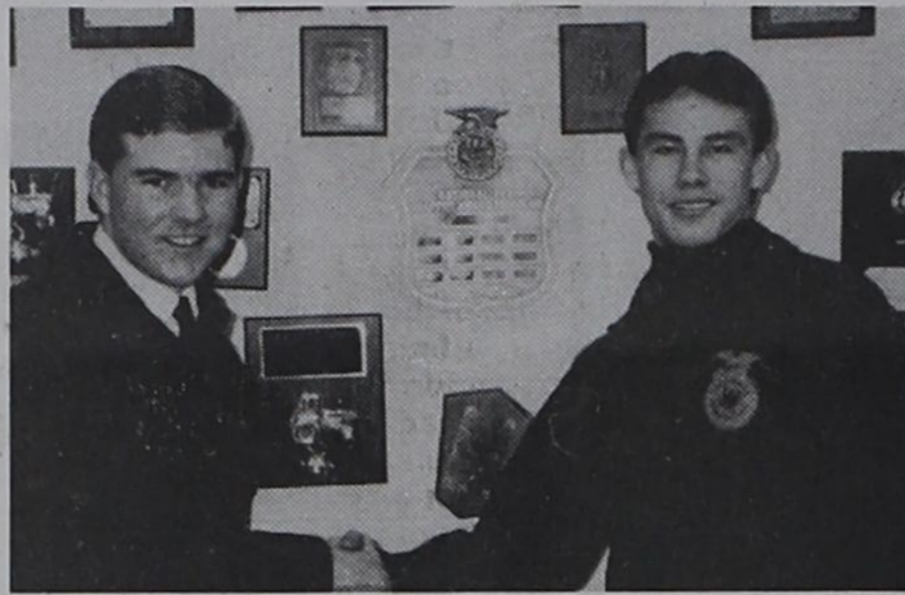
The benefits of the above-average precipitation and an increased conservation effort were reflected in the reduced rate of water depletion in the Ogallala Aquifer that occurred during the 1980s. The Ogallala Aquifer in the 36,000 square

mile area of the Texas High Plains contained about 415 million acre-feet of water in 1990. This volume is about 30 million acre-feet more than expected.

The net depletion of the aquifer in the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's 5.2 million acre service area averaged 1.6 million acre-feet per year from 1965 to 1970; 1.4 million acre-feet per year from 1970 to 1975; 1.2 million acre-feet per year from 1975 to 1980; .85 million acre-feet per year from 1980 to 1985, and .03 million acre-feet per year from 1985 to 1990.

Two of the major factors in the reduction of the net depletion of the aquifer have to be the increased conservation effort by area farmers and the above-average precipitation in the early 1980s.

If precipitation averages return to normal during the 1990s, even with added conservation efforts, projections show that the groundwater reserves for the aquifer within the Texas High Plains area will be reduced from the 415 million acre-feet calculated to be in storage in 1990 to about 380 million acre-feet by the year 2000.

Now it is realized in a computerized wuperintendent/business office, several computer labs, intensive IBM office lab, all students getting hands-on classroom experience, and our teachers being more qualified in this area. I think this past goal will keep on expanding in the future. I commend and appreciate all the efforts of our entire system for their achievement.

My goals for the future would include expand the vocational areas, looking into the concurrent enrollment that the legislature has approved for schools, and keeping Texico School strong in the 1990's.


The past four years have brought changes of new superintendent, new staff, and some building projects. The expanding enrollment of elementary students is producing some needs for more classrooms. The only other changes I see will be in funding for schools and we as board members probably will be actively, more involved with the legislature and innovative ways of getting the most of each dollar we spend.

I presently have the honor of serving the 450 board members of this state in two capacities; the school board member of the Public School Insurance Authority Board, and as one of the four delegates from the School Board Association to serve on the Federal Relations Network of the National School boards Association. The week of this election I will be in Washington D.C. working on this years FRN project and lobbying our national legislators with school issues. My position on the Insurance Authority puts me in Santa Fe 2-4 days per month developing policy, overseeing operations of our self-insured Insurance Pool for Public Schools in New Mexico, and reporting back to NMSBA executive board.

My wife Sydney and I have an eighth grader, two seniors, and two children who graduated from Texico Schools. We are very appreciative of the educational opportunities they received.
