Combest fields questions



Cong. Combest answers queries.

U.S. Cong. Larry Combest fielded a myriad of questions April 4 for his Town Hall meeting at the Farwell Community Center. Below are some of Combest's comments on various topics.

**Economy:** Until the Mexican economy becomes better, we need to try to establish an equitable trade plan.

**FDIC Reform:** There are a lot of packages I don't like. A lot of them limit 'too big to fail banks' Congress would be expected to cover these huge banks, not FDIC. I'm disappointed that they came from a Republican Administration.

We need to re-regulate banks, either get non-bank banks out of the picture or put them under some regulators. We have allowed unfair competition.

The average person just doesn't know the inside workings of a bank.

Too big to fail banks have financial assets overseas, and don't contribute to our economy. Foreign deposits need to be totally split off or we have to charge equitable fees.

**Clean Air Act:** It's the epitome of Congressional stupidity. It is going to cost us so many billions of dollars in Texas to clean up the air. Congress spent \$500 million dollars on a report. It came back and said we don't have an acid rain problem, and then only 25 voted against it.

**Environment:** The largest expenditure at your house will be what you do with your trash.

**OSHA:** The basic concept seemed so good. But when we tried to live with the regulations, it seemed ridiculous.

**Current farm Legislation:** It is hard to know how the it is going. There are some inequities in it. We are fine-tuning it. We want some flexibility. The more you try to compensate for specific problems, the more complex it becomes. But, the direction of the legislation is primarily the same.

**Environmental policy:** It will affect agriculture more than anything else.

**Wetlands designation:** It causes massive restrictions. You don't need very much water on land to cause problems. The theory is good, but the practice stinks.

**Budget:** The agriculture and defense budgets get cut back every year.

**Free trade:** Not everybody in agriculture is a member of GATT. If you get everybody in GATT to agree to subsidize, those who aren't in it don't have to have subsidize.

A lot of countries pay a lot more than we do in subsidies. I believe we can compete. The 1985 farm bill saw free trade market work with 70 cent cotton. We sold more cotton than we thought we could sell.

**Agricultural production:** We do it so well. I saw one report that said that only one country in the world is more efficient than we are, and that was Argentina.

**Re-districting the 19th District:** Will Parmer County wind up in New Mexico? I don't look to give anything up. We will be gaining three seats in Texas, but I've seen a jillion different maps about how this could be done. Probably some court suits will be filed. ... I don't want them bothering Texas.

**Great Plains Program:** Martin Chandler noted that the new regulations rule that if land is in the Great Plains program, all land owned by that farmer would become ineligible for ASC or CPR.

I hadn't heard that. That's one of the good things about a town hall meetings. I learn from them.

Will Parmer County need re-districting?

Will the four county commissioner districts in Parmer County be re-districted? That's the question following the 1990 census.

So the commissioners Monday hired Northern & Daugherty lawn firm of Amarillo to view the updated county population statistics to see if re-districting is necessary.

Any re-districting plans must be cleared with the U.S. Justice Department.

If re-districting isn't necessary, the current districts will stay the same.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Approved adding a voting box at Lazbuddie Schools for the special Hospital District election May 18.

- Agreed to file for a second year's grant to continue the DARE (drug education program) in the Parmer County schools.

- Noted that the state prison in Huntsville will take some of the furniture from the county courthouse for refinishing. Then the furniture will be brought back for use in the new 3rd floor offices. The charge is very reasonable, said commission president Ernest Anthony.

- Heard County Judge Bonnie Clayton report that the problem of some Parmer County residents having a 911 emergency number that is first routed through Clovis will be eliminated. Plans have been approved so that when the call goes to Clovis it will automatically be re-routed to Friona. This is not on line yet.

Area teaching program 'on hold'

Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby reported to the School Board Tuesday that the proposed fiber optic teaching program has been put on hold.

Boothby said local telephone companies had run into some problems with FCC regulations in their efforts to implement a fiber optic television teaching system which would serve six area schools.

A TV teaching system would enable area schools to broaden their curricula.

Boothby had met April 3 with school Supts. Phil Warren of Lazbuddie, Mike Jensen of Bovina, Hal Ratcliffe of Friona, Bill Moore of Muleshoe, and telephone company representatives, Jimmy Bennett of ENMR Telephone Cooperative and Hubert Kidd of Five Area Telephone Cooperative.

The phone company officials said new phone lines would have to be laid, and it would cost about \$43,000 per school per year to implement the changes.

Bennett, ENMR marketing engineer, told the Tribune Wednesday, "The regulatory environment that we currently live in would require total separation from our regulated business. Because of that it would require a separate fiber optic cable to implement the fiber optic teaching system."

Bennett indicted that the telephone companies are still interested, but they feel that the educators need to go through their state legislature for assistance with this.

A fiber optic system had been implemented in Balco, Okla., when Boothby had been superintendent there. The phone company there was able to implement a teaching program which used fiber optic telephone lines, television sets, and Fax machines to link students with teachers over a long distance. But, there had not been existing fiber optic cables in those areas when the system was instituted. The system started at a time when the phone companies planned to lay fiber optic cables anyway.

ENMR already serves some New Mexico school districts which use fiber optic teaching. The systems went in at the same time that fiber optic lines were laid.

In Farwell where fiber optic telephone lines already exist, they are regulated by FCC regulations. "This is a 1956 ruling on a 1991 problem," said Boothby.

The board also:

- Tabled next year's athletic budget presented by athletic director Rex Cumpton because the State Supreme Court froze all school funds on April 1. For Farwell, this means that the school system will not receive the \$150,962 it expected for April.

Cumpton had proposed an athletic budget about \$284 higher than this year. It includes buying \$3,200 worth of new basketball uniforms since it has been 5 years since new ones had been purchased.

Cumpton indicated that he

has tried to replace uniforms for one sport's team each year on a rotating basis. Old high school uniforms are passed down to the junior high teams.

- Voted to rescind the requirement that all freshmen take a vocational education class.

- Heard a report from Judy Howard and the Campus Improvement Council on School Climate. Mrs. Howard reported that the committee had identified three important projects: The need to improve traffic patterns around the school; the need for a fenced playground, and the need for signs to identify the school buildings. Her committee includes 5 teachers and two parents.

- Heard Edris Klucher and Lou Ann Smith report on the Measuring and Monitoring Committee. They proposed the purchase of computer programs to identify the learning styles of each student in the school.

- Accepted the 1991-92 school calendar as presented by Gwen Corn on behalf of the calendar committee.

- Voted to amend the 1991-92 school calendar to make April 24 the parent conference day instead of April 25 due to a conflict with UIL

scheduling.

- Voted to change the May board meeting to May 13.

- Heard the report that a mock accreditation team from the Region XVI Service Center will visit the schools on April 11 to prepare the school for the real accreditation team which is coming next year.

- Boothby requested that the school board members hold a policy manual update session on a Saturday to go over new policies from the Texas Association of School Boards. He suggested that it be done with another school system so that members from both can get school board continuing education credit hours for the session. No date was set.

- Approved a request to reimburse Richard Montgomery for some expenses incurred while transporting students and their project animals to Houston for the Houston Livestock Show.

- Adopted the list of textbooks as presented by the textbook committee.

- Met in executive session to discuss a law suit that had been filed against the school system. The suit has been dropped. It involved a residents' problem with Internal Revenue Service rules.

Protest proves successful

A protest by Farwell over a jump in the city's key rate charged city property owners has proven successful, water Supt. Dee Hammit reported at Tuesday's City Council session.

The key rate concerns fire insurance and is included in home owners' and business insurances.

In January, Farwell was told that after a recent inspection, the rate had jumped from 39 cents to 46 cents. Five cents of the hike was due to a 3-block line near the loop in which plastic pipe was used.

Farwell sent a map to the state which showed that the pipe in question can be removed from the city line.

Now, the State Board of Insurance has notified Farwell that "due to the previous service record of the main and the ability to isolate it from the system, we will honor your request to remove this charge during the next quarterly update, effective Aug. 1, 1991."

Water was a key topic at the meeting:

- Once again, the city postponed a decision on buying a new fire truck. Mayor Chris Gikas had said he didn't want a vote on it unless the entire council was present.

Councilman Prentice Mills was absent, due to vacation. He will be back shortly and a special meeting will be called later this month for the vote.

- The council agreed to install a main down Second

Street, south from Avenue G (1,240 feet). This will provide added fire protection.

Harry Sheets will install the 8" main for \$3,450, with the city furnishing the supplies. It will cost an estimated \$7,000 more to put the paving back since the street will be torn up.

Sheets had recommended the city buy the supplies because it would be less expensive to the city that way.

- The council voted to install a 6" main down 1 415-ft. stretch of alley behind Avenue I to the State Line Road. Sheets will be paid \$1,850 for installation. The city will provide the supplies.

**Lazbuddie happy with results of TAAS tests**

 - Hammit was instructed to seek bids for the May meeting to install a 3" water line along a 500-ft. stretch of First Street, near Avenue F. Residents have asked for a larger line there.

In other business, the council:

- Heard a protest from the owner of Chevy Chase Apartments that he was paying too much for garbage pickup. The rate currently is \$12 a month for each occupied unit. He wants the apartments to be considered a "business" and just one \$12 fee charged monthly.

Councilmen Fred Chandler and Martin Kube will check on how other communities handled such apartment complexes. Chevy Chase has 8 units. No other complex in Farwell has more than 3 units.

- Agreed to have city employees mow the Twin City baseball field. Texico and Farwell teams have signed up for the Clovis youth baseball league and Clovis has a space problem due to the large number of entries. So Clovis wants to use the Twin City field in its league structure. The field is in Texico but Farwell traditionally has mowed it.

- Approved bids from High Plains Pest Control to spray the cemetery, fire station area and city park.

- Approved a request by Jose Garcia to move a house from Clovis to 109 Sixth St.

- Said no to a request by Felix Vega to park a vacant mobile home behind his residence at 505 Second St.

Final results are in statewide on the TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) standardized tests. Lazbuddie Schools report they have exceeded expectations on all levels.

For the past four years, students across Texas took the TEAMS (Texas Assessment of Minimum Skills) test, which tested only basic skills. TAAS measures higher-level thinking and problems solving skills. TEA officials had warned school districts that the test scores would be lower.

However, Lazbuddie administrators and teachers were pleasantly surprised by the high scores of all grades on most sections of the test. Lazbuddie has stood out with high TEAMS scores in comparison with other area schools and in state averages.

Lazbuddie juniors have, for the past two years, achieved 100 percent mastery on all sections of the exit-level TEAMS, an accomplishment reached by very few schools in the state. Again, this year, Lazbuddie juniors exceeded the state average on the TAAS, receiving 92% mastery on the writing, 100% on the reading, and 86% on the math, as compared to state averages of 81%, 88%, and 74%, respectively.

Grade 3 achieved 93% mastery on the writing, 100% on reading, and 100% on the math sections of the test, as compared to state averages of 70%, 84% and 86%, respectively.

Grade 5 received 90% mastery of the writing, 79% of reading, and 75% on the math sections, as compared to state averages of 80%, 68%, and 60%, respectively.

Grade 7 had 85% mastery on the writing, 70% on the reading, and 79% on the math, compared to state averages of 72%, 59%, and 61%, respectively.

Ninth graders achieved 89% mastery on the reading and 89% on the math. State averages were 76%, and 57%, respectively.

In the third grade, 57% received academic recognition in reading and 21% earned academic recognition in math. Fifth grade had 42% to achieve academic recognition in reading, and 30% had academic recognition in math. Lazbuddie 7th graders won academic recognition for 35% of their class in reading, and 21% in math. Ninth grade had 50% to receive academic recognition in reading, and the eleventh grade had 57% in reading.

To have such large percentages of each class to achieve this outstanding academic recognition means that those students made 100% on their individual test sections. Lazbuddie had academic recognition in somewhat smaller percentages on the writing and math sections, as well.

Like other Texas schools, Lazbuddie will now look to the tests to determine weaknesses and will adjust campus goals to meet individual student needs. Lazbuddie school administrators expressed pride in their students' performance on the much harder test and look forward to climbing scores in the future.

"Lazbuddie's academic strength lies in effective programs, a total - school effort, outstanding teachers, parental support, and more individualized attention. The school's emphasis on academic excellence has been clearly demonstrated by scores on both the TEAMS and the TAAS," state Lazbuddie school officials.




