I support the hospital district

With the election coming up May 18 on the creation of a new hospital district in Parmer County, I thought this would be a good time to let hospital officials use this space to present their case.

I support the creation of such a district as a way of maintaining the hospital in Friona. Without hospital districts, the future of any hospital becomes questionable.

And there is no question that having a hospital in Friona is a definite plus for Parmer County.

If anyone has a rebuttal, please send it in, and we'll be able to print it before the election. Most of the following information was sent to us from hospital administrator Phil Langston:

Article IX, Section 9, of the Texas Constitution allows for the creation of a hospital district. In the petition to set up the Parmer County Hospital District, the Board of Directors has set up a maximum tax rate of 25 cents per \$100 valuation, although they say they will recommend setting a tax rate of 18 cents for 1991.

Although the legislation to set up a hospital district allows for up to 75 cents per \$100 valuation, the petition to set up the Parmer County Hospital District is limited to a tax rate of 25 cents. A higher rate could not be set without calling for a new election. A 25 cent rate means a home with a \$100,000 assessed valuation would have a rate of \$250. The Parmer County Appraisal Board settles any question on the appraisal rate.

Currently in Texas there are over 90 hospital districts and the rates vary from a low in Dumas of 3.5 cents to the highest in McCamey of 53 cents per \$100 valuation. The weighted average in Texas is 16.5 cents. In the Panhandle, hospital districts include the Muleshoe area Hospital District at 25 cents, Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt at 35 cents, Deaf Smith Hospital District in Hereford at 12.5 cents, and the Amarillo Hospital District at 23.5

The creation of the district will insure the long term survival of quality health care services for Parmer County.

Several questions have been raised concerning our local Friona Medical Clinic and its relationship to the Parmer County Community Hospital. The physical building housing the Friona Medical Clinic is owned by the Parmer County Community Hospital, Inc.

The current practicing physicians, Drs. Robert Alexander, Tracey Toten and Natasha Shah lease their offices and pay rent for the use of these facilities. The hospital is incorporated as a non-profit private corporation. The clinic practice is incorporated as a proprietary business that pays taxes like other small businesses.

Due to the close proximity of the hospital services, the doctors' clinic uses the hospital laboratory, x-ray, physical therapy, EKG and pharmacy services of the Parmer County Community Hospital. This arrangement saves the doctors' clinic from having to duplicate expensive equipment, personnel and services. The hospital meanwhile is able to better use its equipment, personnel and services and generate additional in-

In Texas, it's illegal for a hospital to own a clinic practice. However, a hospital can contract with doctors to provide specialized services

Lazbuddie School **Board candidates** give their views

(Editor's note: Since six candidates signed up for the three Lazbuddie School Board posts in the May 4 election, the Tribune sent questionnaires to all the candidates, asking them to send back information about themselves, their families, their goals and photos. Following is what we received.)

John E. Jones is a 1971 graduate of Lazbuddie High School. He graduated from West Texas State University with a bachelor of science degree in 1975.

A financial plan must be kept in force that continues a delicate balance of funds to maintain the school, recruit excellent teachers, and at the same time not become a burden to the district's taxpayers."

Gail Morris was born and raised in the Lazbuddie Community. He attended school in Lazbuddie for 12 years and received a bachelor of science degree in animal production from Texas Tech University.

He is married to Marca Ann Morris. She teaches 5th grade at Lazbuddie. They have two children, Cade and Kia, both in

Morris is general manager of Bovina Feeders, Inc., a commercial cattle feeding company. He is also engaged in a farming and stocker operation south of Lazbuddie.

Morris says: "With the strong base of administrators and teachers that the present school board has assembled, the future trustees are in an excellent position to take advantage of the challenges the coming years will offer. The school districts which excel in people and money management will be the schools which continue to offer quality education and training to our children."

Dave E. Engelking, is a lifelong resident of Lazbuddie and a 1976 graduate of Lazbuddie High School.

He and his wife, Sheryl, have two daughters, Heather, 18; and Holly, 10. Engelking has been self-employed as a farmer since 1977 and is a member of the Lazbuddie Methodist Church.

His goals are to help promote quality education for the young people and make the Lazbuddie School system stronger by working with the people of the community.

Tommy St. Clair was born in Muleshoe. He graduated from Muleshoe High School and attended Texas Tech University where he made the Dean's Honor Roll in agricultural

St. Clair and his wife, Jana, have three sons: Justin, 12; Adam, 9; and Cole, 8.

St. Clair farmed for 11 years. He also worked for a land developer in Dallas for 1 year. He was also a partner in a

landscaping business in Rockwall, Texas, for 1 year. He attends the Lazbuddie Church of Christ. He is active in Parmer County 4-H, and is a member of the Lazbuddie Athletic Boosters. He has coached in the Little Dribblers

St. Clair says, "My goal for Lazbuddie Schools is to see that the students have every opportunity to receive a good education. To provide the facilities and instruction necessary and to create an atmosphere where kids will enjoy school."

Bobby Redwine graduated from Lazbuddie High School and received a bachelor's degree in feedlot management from Texas Tech University. He and his wife Debra have four children who currently attend Lazbuddie Schools: Jarah, 15; Brice, 11; Shan, 7, and Tobin, 6.

After graduating from college, Redwine served as assistant manager of the Carter/ Kirchoff Feedyards in Edmondson, Texas, for 1 year before returning to Lazbuddie were he has farmed and raised feeder calves for the past 17 years.

'Lions Park' is park's new name

The Texico City Council April 25 approved a suggestion from the Texico-Farwell Lions Club to renovate Tower Park - now renamed "Lions Park."

Earlier last week, the Lions Club decided to take on the long term renovation project if the city council agreed to the following conditions: buy a sprinkler system; mow the park and trim the shrubs at proper times, and change the name of the park to "Lions Park."

Now that the council agreed to those conditions, the club is expected to take a final vote on the project at its May 13 meeting.

The Lions Club will install the sprinkler system and sod, then begin repairing the playground equipment, which has fallen into disrepair. Also, shrubs will be planted. And one Lions Club member said he would buy an automatic timer for the sprinkler sys-

The renovation project is expected to take several years. The park is in back of First Baptist Church.

City Clerk Marie Christian told the council that state beautification funds are available for buying a sprinkler system and sod. She also said it was legal for the Lions Club to install the system (without a state permit) since it is voluntary work.

Councilman Butch Tharp indicated he would help with the equipment needed to break the ground for the sprinkler system.

The Lions Club is expected to report back to the council at the May 14 council meeting so that a sprinkler system can be purchased.

Beautification and cleanup were the major topics discussed at the meeting.

A report was made by the Texico Cleanup Committee of its meeting the previous week. Flowers were bought for planter boxes placed along the highway. Also discussed was continuing the removal of junked vehicles, abandoned houses, a new swimming pool and curbs and gut-

Mayor Doyal LaRue recommended that a fund be started for street work. He proposed putting \$20,000 into the fund immediately. Mrs. Christian also noted there was \$33,000 in gas tax money available, too. No decision was made and the topic will be brought up again at the next meeting.

The council held a lengthy discussion on the feasibility of curbing and guttering the city. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said that cost isn't much, but that the dirt work needed in conjunction with it might top \$1 million.

It was noted that Farwell was able to get curbs and gutters through a bank loan from Security State Bank. Bank loans are not legal in New Mexico for city projects.

Discussed was whether to put away some funds each year, or use a bond issue, or do neither.

Councilman Ronnie Warmuth urged that the council move on the junked car problem. The council voter

The Texico School Board on creases in salary and insur-April 26 approved the budget ances. proposal for the 1991-92 school year which will go to the New Mexico State Department of Education on May 3.

It includes a 1/2 percent increase in the salary schedule which will translate into an average 1.4 percent increase in pay for staff members.

After the state review, a public budget hearing will be held here at 4 p.m. mdt on May 22.

The new budget is based on figures presented to the board concerning projected changes for the new school

Supt. Dr. R.L. Richards sees an enrollment of 495.5 fulltime students for next year. He estimated an increase of about 4 students because of the expansion of Cannon Air Force Base, and the fact that Texico had under-estimated its enrollment last year.

The projected enrollment creates a projected budget of \$1,983,884 for next year- an increase of \$16,542.

3/4 c. (1 1/2 sticks) butter or margarine 1 1/2 c. sugar

2 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

2 3/4 c. sifted Martha White All - Purpose Flour 2 tsp. cream of tartar

1 tsp. baking soda

1/2 tsp. salt

2 tsp. cinnamon

2 Tbs. sugar

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Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Grease a large baking sheet. Cream butter and 1 1/2 c. sugar together in mixing bowl until light and fluffy. Add eggs and vanilla; beat well. Sift

flour, cream of tartar, soda and salt together; blend into creamed mixture. (For easier handling, chill dough 1 hour before shaping into balls). Combine cinnamon and 2 Tbs. sugar in a small bowl. Shape dough into 1-inch balls; roll in cinnamon- sugar mixture. Place balls of dough 2 inches apart on prepared baking sheet. Bake 8-10 minutes or until light golden brown. Cool on wire racks. Make about 48 cookies.

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
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
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


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
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

Farwell graduate singled out for bravery in war

Editor's note: This article was written by Gary Mitchell, a staff writer with the Clovis News-Journal. It is being reprinted with the permission of the News-Journal. Beal, the subject of the article, graduated from Farwell High School in 1982 and is a nephew of Delbert Lingnau, of Farwell.

A Clovis area seaman has been singled out for his bravery and cool level- headedness in operations apart from the Persian Gulf War.

Linny Beal, son of Tom Beal, of Clovis, and Evelyn Martin, of New York, was promoted to petty officer second class in December. Previously, he was part of a detachment assigned to provide armed air cover for the first maritime interception mission in which the first U.S. warning shots were fired at an Iraqi vessel during Operation Desert Shield.

Beal was awarded the Air Medal for the rescue of 13 shipwrecked survivors in the northwest Pacific in October 1989. In addition, he received the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, the Coast Guard Special Operations Ribbon and Sea Service Ribbon.

A 1982 graduate of Farwell High School, Beal attended Eastern New Mexico for 1 1/2 years and worked as an electrician in Clovis for four years before entering the U.S. Navy in 1988.

"I've enjoyed the Navy quite a bit," Beal said. "It's been good to me. I've done some exciting things." One of those exciting things included the air-sea rescue in the Pacific Ocean between Alaska and the Soviet Union.

"It was during a previous cruise in the fall of 1989," Beal said. "We were in the North Pacific, off the Aleutian Islands. In fact, we were close to Attu Island, the last island in the chain."

A Korean freighter had broken up and was taking on water when his ship, the U.S.S. Mahlon S. Tisdale, arrived at the scene, Beal said.

"We were basically tasked to rescue the crew from the freighter" he said. "It was all a helicopter operation. They lowered me down to the deck of the freighter, and I prepped the survivors of the ship to be hoisted on our ship.'

It took a total of three flights, taking five survivors at a time on the first two trips and three on the last. Beal stayed on the deck of the sinking freighter 40 to 45 minutes until the rescue was completed.

Another close call came when he was stationed in the Persian Gulf from May to October 1990. As an air crew member of the Helicopter Anti-Submarine Warfare Squadron (Light) 33, Beal's helicopter crew experienced an in-flight

"We had a temporary hydraulic failure in the helicopter,"

Beal said. "We provided some emergency corrective measures and we landed safely."

Beal made it sound simple, but it actually wasn't, said Ensign Jeff Harter, the public affairs officer for the squadron.

"To attempt a recovery landing of a helicopter aboard a small-decked ship without hydraulics is very difficult," said Harter. "It takes a lot of coordination among the crew members to carry it out efficiently. Without assistance from the air crew, recovery would have been impossible."

For his efforts, Beal was nominated for the Commander Anti-Submarine Warfare- Wing (Pacific Fleet) "Pro of the

Before the hostilities broke out in the Persian Gulf area, Beal was part of an historic maritime interception operation.

"While in the Persian Gulf, we were attached to the U.S.S. Reid," said Beal. "I was a sensor operator. We did everything from ship's surveillance (giving the ship a look at what's over the horizon beyond the sensor) to serving as a door gunner. Our mission was to intercept any suspected vessels in violation of the blockade."

They did intercept a vessel in the middle of September, said Beal.

"We fired the first U.S. warning shots directed at ships carrying contraband," he said. "It was an Iragi-flagged tanker. We trailed the ship a number of hours. We fired the warning shots to board it. We never boarded it, but we trailed them to the Gulf of Oman. Then we handed them off to another ship."

While in the Persian Gulf, Beal made a port call into Kuwait City in May.

"We spent some time in the embassy," he said. "I'd like to go back sometime and compare it now to what it was before the war happened. A number of families hosted dinners for members of the ship and gave us a tour of the city. It was very enjoyable."

Beal said he was elated about the news of the war's end and the homecoming of troops. "I was glad to see it happen. It will be good to see the guys coming back home."

Beal is married to the former Jil Jameson, of Clovis. They have two children - Mark, 3, and Jilian, 17 months.
