Let's not be confused. There will soon be two petitions circulated in Parmer County in the near future. One will call for an election to determine if this district, composed of Oldham, Deaf Smith, Castro, and Parmer counties, wants a Junior College. This is the petition that the Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, along with other County organizations, urge you NOT to sign. Another petition says that the undersigned of it are OPPOSED to the establishment of a Junior College district. This we recommend for your consideration and endorsement. Elsewhere in this issue of the Tribune is an advertisement outlining the reasons for opposition to a Junior College district. We editorially concur with these reasons and believe that this is another BIG GOVERNMENT scheme to spend our money and eventually control our lives.

We noted in a column in a Panhandle weekly that the writer used the tired old descriptions of "Bold" and "Get Off Center" and "Get Moving." To us, the record of the past seven years translates as: \$50 billion deeper in debt; more taxation and more civil strife in our streets. If this is being "Bold" and "Getting Moving", I guess we are slow thinking cowards.

We received a news release from our recent whipping boy, John Santa Fe. We think this is a good time to use it: "John Santa Fe turns 100 this year but you'd truly have to say he neither looks nor acts his age.

"From that modest beginning at Topeka, Kan., in 1868, Santa Fe has grown into a \$2 billion empire whose 13,000 miles of track extend, as Cyrus K. Holliday, its founder and first president predicted, from the Great Lakes to the Pacific Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico.

"Santa Fe operates more miles of track in Texas - 3,615 to be exact - than in any other state. There are 7,578 Texans on the payroll who last year earned \$58,151,026. The company's '67 tax bill amounted to \$2,264,466. "Through the years the railroad has scored some impressive transportation 'firsts,' including the first to become fully Dieselized in 1954; developing the Autoveyer car for shipment of automobiles in 1960, and the inauguration of 'Super C,' the world's fastest freight train in 1968, which operates on a 40-hour schedule between Chicago and Los Angeles although it consistently makes the run in little more than 35 hours. These are but a few; the list is almost endless.

"While Santa Fe is pardonably proud of its distinguished past, its centennial theme is geared to the future - 'Second Century of Progress - On to 2068.' "The State Line Tribune wishes it God speed."

Yes, and the Tribune also wishes that in its second hundred years and with its \$2,000,000,000,000 pot, it could keep the little old run from Houston to Clovis operating.

County Convention OK's Tower As Favorite Son

The Republican County Convention of Parmer County passed resolutions supporting Senator John G. Tower as a first ballot favorite son presidential nominee and favoring Ronald W. Reagan for president of the United States. Other resolutions were for upholding law and order, controlling civil disobedience, recognizing communism as an enemy and treating it as such, and exercising control over the Supreme Court through constitutional checks and balances of the legislative and executive branches of government. Glenn Lust, Lazbuddie, was elected delegate and Frank Hinkson, Lazbuddie, alternate delegate to the Republican State Convention.

The convention also supported Mrs. Kathryn McDaniel, Borger; Jim Campbell, Pampa; and Wes Izzard, Amarillo; as delegates and alternate to the Republican National Convention, from the 18th Congressional District. The invocation was led by R. L. (Bob) Jones, Republican candidate for commissioner, Precinct 3. Lust, was elected permanent chairman and Mrs. Vernon Estes, Bovina, was elected permanent secretary of the county convention.

Democrats Name 4 Delegates

Parmer County Democrats passed a resolution favoring Governor John Connally as favorite son presidential candidate at their bi-annual meeting Saturday in Farwell. The meeting was held in the district courtroom in the courthouse. Presiding was Nelson Welch of Friona, county chair-

man of the Democratic party. Four delegates were named to represent the county at the state convention next month. They are Sam Bradley, Lazbuddie; Doyle Elliott, Friona; Mal Manchee, Friona; and Welch. By a vote count of 23-11, the county convention delegates voted to bind the state convention delegates to the unit rule. Named as alternate delegates to the state convention were Joe Bullock, Lazbuddie; Herman Jesko, Friona; Ted Weaver, Friona; and Hugh Moseley, Farwell.

Citizens Face Jr. College Tax District Formation

Citizens of Parmer County are facing being forced into an election for the establishment of a junior college tax district composed of Deaf Smith, Parmer, Oldham and Castro counties. Under the new Texas law governing formation of Junior College tax districts, any petition which bears the names of ten per cent of the registered voters of Parmer County would result in forcing Parmer County into a Junior College tax district election. Therefore, Parmer county voters are being

urged to sign a petition which is being circulated opposing the formation of a Junior college district election. Should such an election be called, 100 per cent voter opposition to the issue would not be sufficient to exempt Parmer County from being brought into the proposed Junior College district, and taxed accordingly should the other three counties carry by an overall majority. Taxes levied for such a Junior College would represent a form of double taxation, say opponents to the election, since

each taxpayer is now paying his proportionate share of monies for higher education. This includes his share of revenues from the public domain (oil, gas, minerals, royalties from oil, gas, minerals, etc. At the present time, no less than seven colleges and universities, including Junior colleges, are now serving the Parmer County area, all within one and one-half hour driving distance, along with developing technical vocational training centers, plus several religious-

ly oriented schools within a reasonable distance. None of the institutions of higher education in the area are operating at capacity, and students are not being refused admission due to lack of facilities, report school officials. The Farwell and Bovina chambers of commerce have gone on record in opposition to formation of such a Junior College district election since the formation of such a district would cause undue taxation of Parmer County residents for an unneeded institution and would also cause undue burden on local school systems. Opponents to the formation of the district say that some independent schools in Parmer County have already found it difficult to pass certain school bond issues, and while the formation of a Junior College district is an indication of proper progress, it must be noted that bonded indebtedness of most Parmer County school districts is at an all time high, with some needs to still be met. This is the second time in as many years that a neighboring county has tried to force Parmer County into group Junior College voting. If forced into a Junior College district, the opposition points out, comparative county land values would cause Parmer residents to bear a disproportionate burden of the taxes levied for its support.

Junior Rodeo Contestants Bring Home All-Around Honors

Four junior cowboys and one junior cowgirl amassed a total of 49 points, eight belt buckles, numerous banners, and brought home a championship cowgirl trophy for "all around cowgirl" in the twelve and under age group, and a championship "all around cowboy" in the 13-15 age group from the Earth Junior Rodeo held last week-

end. Champion all around cowboy went to Laura Doshier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Junior Doshier, and champion cowboy honors went to Derek Garner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Delbert Garner. Each contestant received a belt buckle for first place and a banner for all other places. Miss Doshier had a total of eight points for first place in the pole bending and flag race. She also received a belt buckle as all-around cowgirl. Derek Garner had a total of 14 points in the 13-15 age group winning first in ribbon roping, first in flags, second in pole bending, third in rescue race, and fourth in barrels. James Chadwick won second in calf roping, second in barrels and fourth in ribbon rop-

ing and had a total of seven points. Milton Lee Walling with 11 points missed the championship cowboy honors in his age group by a margin of one point. Milton was first in bull riding, fourth in calf roping, second in pole bending and second in flags. Bobby Chadwick won first in calf roping, second in ribbon roping, and third in barrels for a total of nine points. James and Bobby Chadwick and Milton Lee Walling were entered in the 16 through 18 age group. Each contestant (boys) were required to enter three events including a riding event to be eligible for all-around honors. Girls also had to enter three events to compete for all-around honors.

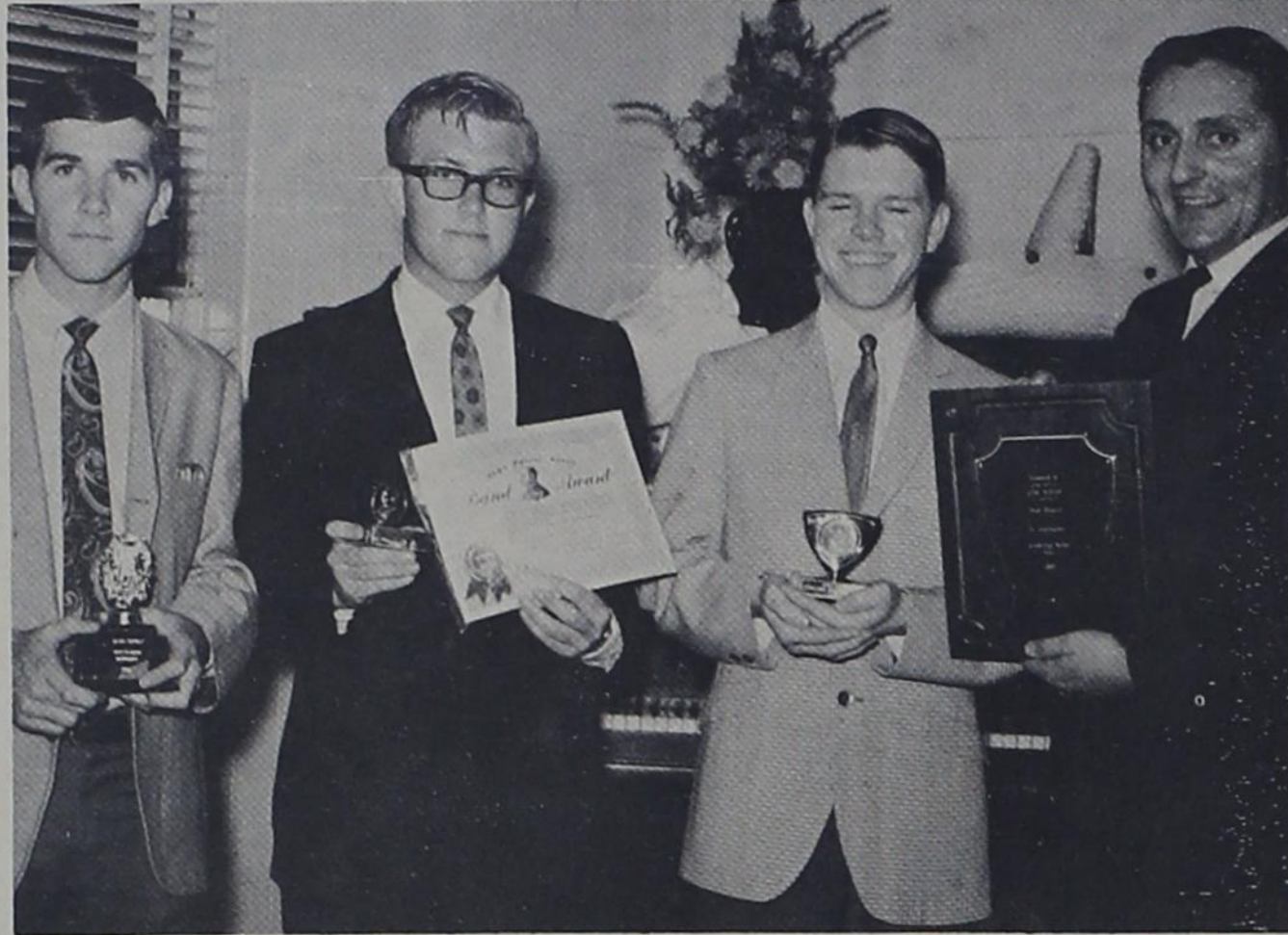

Mrs. Craig was accompanied to Amarillo by Muleshoe curriculum coordinator, Mrs. John Watson.

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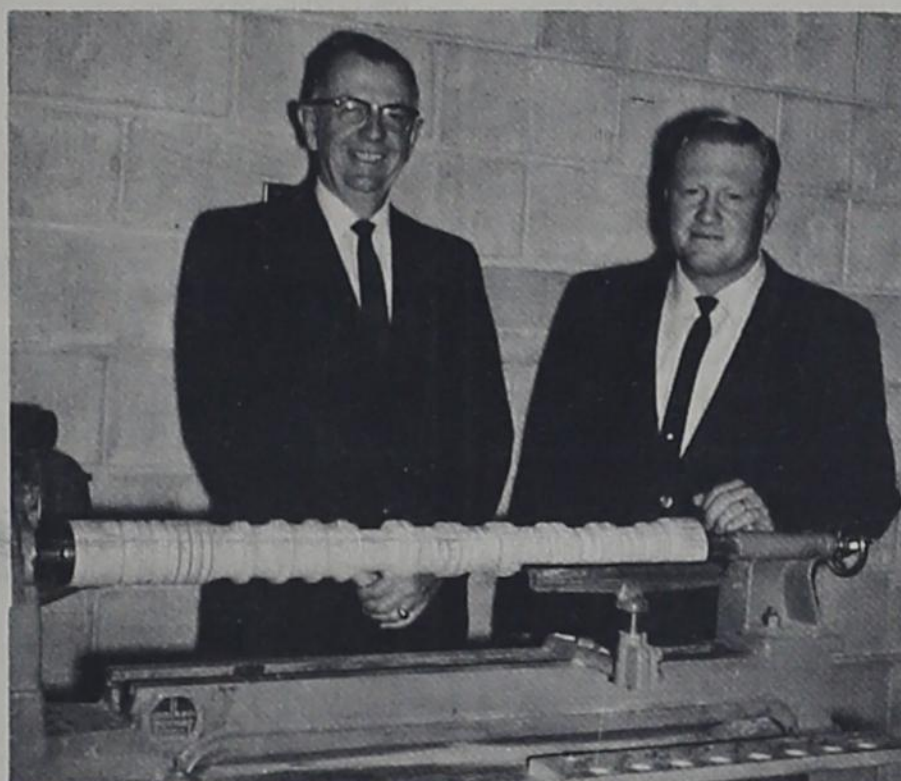

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Parmer Citizens Urged To Oppose Petitions Calling Junior College Vote

Parmer County faces the immediate danger of being forced into an election to form a Junior College tax district composed of Deaf Smith, Oldham, Castro and Parmer Counties.

FACT: Under the new Texas Junior College law, any petition to call an election that is signed by as many as ten per cent of the registered voters of Parmer County would result in forcing Parmer County into a Junior College tax district election.

FACT: 100% Parmer voter opposition then could not exempt Parmer County from being brought into the proposed Junior College District, and taxed accordingly should other voting counties carry by an overall majority.

FACT: Taxes levied for such a Junior College would represent a form of double taxation, since each taxpayer is now paying his proportionate share of monies for higher education. This includes his share of revenues from the public domain. (ie) Texas lands, royalties from tideland and other oil, minerals etc.

FACT: Not less than seven excellent Universities, Colleges, and Junior Colleges now serve our Parmer County area, all within an hour and a half's driving distance, along with developing technical vocational training centers, plus several fine religiously-oriented schools within reasonable distances.

FACT: The above educational institutions are not operating at capacities, and students are not being refused admission due to any lack of basic facilities.

FACT: Bond issues in a Junior College District could be imposed over the negative vote of Parmer County voters as a whole.

FACT: If forced into a Junior College District, comparative county land values would cause Parmer residents to bear a disproportionate burden of taxes levied for its support.

FACT: Bovina and Farwell Chambers of Commerce have gone on record as being opposed to a petition for calling a Junior College election.

IN SUMMARY:
Parmer County citizens are much in favor of, and are not opposed to higher education, and those contributing to the making available for the consideration of all the above information feel that the levying of Junior College taxation could only result in unfair taxing for an unneeded institution and cause undue burden on local school systems. We note that some independent school districts of Parmer County have already found difficulty in passing certain school bond issues. We note further that, while it is assuredly an indication of proper educational progress, nevertheless, bonded indebtedness of most Parmer County school districts is at an all-time high, with some needs still to be met.

Based upon the above facts and information, we therefore respectfully urge that Parmer County voters not permit their name to be affixed to any petition calling for a vote that would lead to the placing of Parmer County in a Junior College district. We might add that many voters may not have had it called to their attention that this is not the first, but is the second attempt in as many years by a neighboring county to cause Parmer to get petitioned into group county Junior College voting.
