





Just because a product has a name that I recognize does not mean that it was actually manufactured in a factory this side of the border. Nor does it necessarily have exactly the same standards of quality that it had a year or two ago.

Wetland regulations in bill changed

Wetland regulations of the 1990 Farm Bill have changed, said Thomas Reed of the Soil and Water Conservation District office in Friona.

One of the most important changes involves the time frame when a person is in violation of Swampbuster. As of Nov. 28, 1990, when a person converts a wetland for the purpose or to have the effect of making the production of an agricultural commodity possible he or she will be subject to a fine plus loss of eligible for USDA benefits until the wetland has been restored, stated Reed.

Persons who plan to convert a wetland for other than agricultural production, this includes things such as roads or building construction, may be able to get prior approval so they will be exempt from eligibility and benefit losses. Reed stated that this prior approval involves a person completing a AD-1026 Form at the ASCS Office. He will need to state his intentions on the AD 1026. At this time the SCS will approve or disapprove the proposal depending on whether or not the proposal fits into a non- agricultural use and all needed permits have been obtained.

Reed stated if a person is planning any new construction in a wetland he should contact the local ASCS or SCS office prior to starting construction.



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


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Farwell students do well at district UIL events

Texico 'Odyssey' team qualifies for nationals

Four Texico School teams entered the New Mexico competition in the "Odyssey of the Mind" program - with one winning the chance to go to the nationals.

The Texico teams competed in different divisions and problems. Teams competed in problem solving, which involved a certain problem that was to be solved using guidelines for construction, budgeting their construction, using artifacts in their scripts, precision in mechanics, portraying historical episodes, and other competitive guidelines.

Each problem was different and was portrayed by personalities in unique ways. Each team was coached but was independent of suggestions and was to construct and decide scripts on their own. Scores varied with each team as some were ahead winning the long term problem while others were hoping for better scores in the "brainstorming" part of the competition.
