Here's how you can help

Changes in attendance keeping by the State of Texas will affect the amount of money Farwell School receive from the state. With the help and cooperation of parents, this may mean a real difference to taxpayers.

Students must be present each day at a specific time in order for the school to qualify for funds that are awarded on the basis of daily attendance. "It is imperative that students be here at the start of second period," said Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby.

In the past, the amount of money that a school system received from the State of Texas depended upon the number of students who attended during two 3-week-long "attendance periods" each year. This has been changed.

Starting this year, school officials must keep accurate records of the number of students present at a specific time each day. For Farwell Elementary School, the time begins at 9:30 a.m. For Farwell Junior High, the time is from 9:02 a.m. - 9:47 a.m. For Farwell High School, the time is from 9:18- 10:13 a.m.

Parents can make a real contribution to their school system scheduling doctor's appointments or other engagements at another time of the day. School administrators may not count a student unless they are present at the official attendance taking time, even if they are present the rest of the day.

There is a new piece of furniture in the office of Farwell High School- a play pen.

Starting next year students who are parents will be guaranteed an opportunity to attend school by the state of Texas. Lack of child care will no longer block a student from completing a diploma.

On the first day of school, parents of local school children will receive a form from the U.S. government about free and reduced price lunches. This is a very important form.

The amount of money that a school system receives from the state and from several federal programs is determined by the number of low income students who qualify to receive free lunches. This is one of the major ways that the government decides which schools need money.

If a family qualifies for free lunches for its children - even if the children choose never to purchase a lunch or breakfast from the school - it is important that they sign and return that form to the school.

Any parent who fails to receive the form should check with the school. If they have any questions about the guidelines, the school secretary will be happy to answer them.

Texico seeking a dog catcher

The Texico City Council wants to hire a dog catcher.

The council Tuesday discussed the problem of animals being allowed to run loose at night.

The city has an ordinance covering dogs running loose. "We need to enforce it," said councilwoman Carolyn Burrows.

Councilman Butch Tharp said animal owners should pay a fee when their animal is picked up. Also, the problem of animal owners not registering their pets was noted. Texico has no animal pound, but has used the Clovis and Farwell pounds.

The dog catcher, according to law, must be a licensed police officer. The council met in executive session with Brent Byrum, former Texico marshal who is now deputy Curry County sheriff. Byrum has expressed an interest in taking on the dog catching job as part-time work. He still lives in Texico. No decision was made.

In other business, the council discussed whether to have an ordinance restricting pit bulls, such as Bernalillo County has. No decision was made.

Mary Hicks, of Texico, who owns a pit bull, attended the meeting and expressed the importance of such dogs to increasing a person's safety. She questioned if she would have to get rid of her animal if an ordinance is adopted.

City Attorney Duane Hamar said her animal would be "grandfathered" in, in such case, and she could keep it.

In other business, the council: - Noted that although the city landfill was open last Saturday, in response to cit-

izen requests, no one used it. It will be open again this Saturday from 1 to 4 p.m. Oran Jay Autrey will man it.

- Heard City Clerk Marie Christian report that four residents have called in so far who need help moving large debris during the Sept. 20-22 cleanup.

- Heard Mrs. Christian say she is still checking with state agencies to see if Texico can get a master plan drawn up for the city's parks. - Heard councilman Autrey say that he can get pecan trees at \$25 per tree for planting in the city's parks. This had been suggested at the last council meeting. No decision was made.

- Heard a report on two trailers that had been moved into the city but hadn't complied with their aesthetic review permits. Mrs. Christian said skirting had been placed around one, and the other was waiting for a gas line.

- Noted that a meeting is set for 10 a.m. Sept. 20 at City Hall to discuss an enhanced 911 number. Currently, Texico has the emer-

Commissioners OK pay hikes

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday approved a proposed budget that calls for the same tax rate as this year.

The budget hearing is set for 5 p.m. Sept. 10 at the county courtroom at the Parmer County Courthouse.

The proposed budget is for \$2,565,033.65. This is up about \$62,000 from last year.

The proposed tax rate is .3050, said County Judge Porter Roberts.

Proposed are 3 percent pay hikes for county employees and 5 percent pay raises for elected county officials. This is identical to the raises approved last year.

Also, the commissioners put aside \$35,000 for possibly setting up a longevity pay fund for employees and elected officials. Roberts will check with other governmental entities to see how this works.

Basically, if approved, employees and elected officials would get pay boosts every so often, such as in 5-year increments.

Also, the commissioners put funds in the proposed budget for renovating the third floor of the courthouse into offices. The extension service likely would move to the third floor if this is done.

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
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

Did you see the strange lights?

When local residents noticed some strange lights in the evening sky on Aug. 23, several called the 911 number to find out what was happening.

Emergency vehicles from Texico were dispatched to find out what caused the odd lights. Unfortunately, several gawkers followed the emergency vehicles. According to City Clerk Marie Christian, the gawkers were a hazard to emergency personnel.

"People should have enough sense to get out of the way of a fire truck or an ambulance," she said. "Somebody could get hurt."

According to Walter Andrus, International Director of the Mutual UFO Network in Seguin, Texas, the lights sighted last Thursday were probably a natural phenomenon. He said it was probably a meteorite breaking up in earth's atmosphere. It traveled in a shallow trajectory through the sky in a path from the southwest.

Andrus said that he had many calls about the sightings. They came from all of the Midwestern states, with the bulk of the reports coming from Kansas. Roswell television reported sightings

in New Mexico, and Andrus reported that he had received reports of sightings as far north as North Dakota.

Observers noted that there were points of light followed by smoky trail filled with small specks of light. It moved silently across the whole sky from horizon to horizon in a slow manner.

"It wasn't like a shooting star; it was much slower," said Leandra Byrd who was

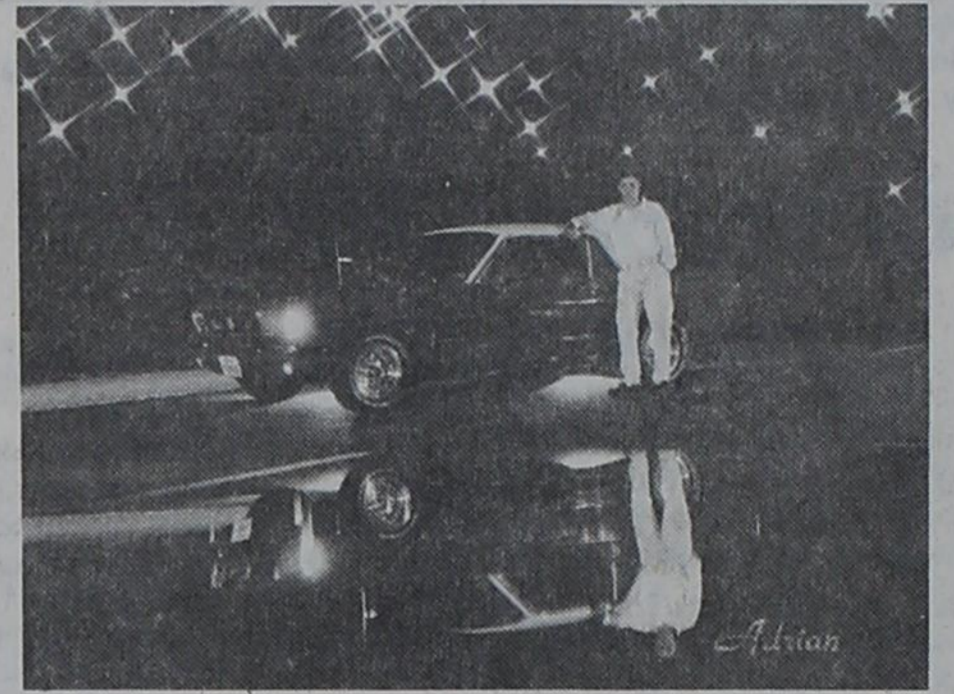
out with a walk that evening. When she saw it, she thought that it might be jets traveling across the sky followed by some kind of lights.

"It was really something," she added.

Another observer described it as, "One big light and several small twinkling ones in a smoky trail."

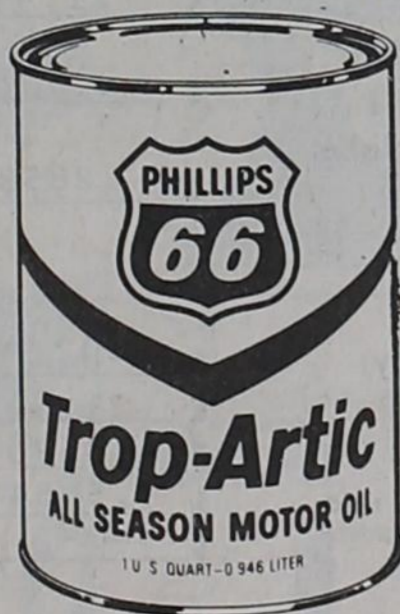

Recipe of Week

Quick Broccoli and Turkey Rolls

- 1 10 oz. pkg of broccoli spears
- 8 oz. thinly sliced fully cooked turkey breast
- 2 English muffins
- 4 - 5 oz. of your favorite cheese spread
- 1/4 c. milk
- Paprika

Thaw broccoli under hot tap water. Drain well. Prepare a steamer with boiling water. Use a rack placed in a skillet if you do not have a steamer. Pour in enough hot water to almost reach the rack. Bring to a boil.

Divide meat into four portions. Place thawed broccoli on one edge of each meat slice. Roll meat around the vegetables in a jelly-roll fashion. Secure with a toothpick. Place roll on wire rack in steamer seam side down. Steam about 10 minutes or until heated through.

While vegetable rolls are steaming, split and toast the English muffins.

Place cheese sauce and milk in the microwave until cheese is melted, stirring after one minute.

Assemble each portion by placing a meat and vegetable roll on each English muffin half and pouring sauce over each. If desired, sprinkle with paprika. Makes 4.

Note: Ham may be used instead of turkey, and asparagus may be used instead of broccoli.

TCPB approves 6 corn projects

Texas corn farmers are creating a self-help scientific support system to solve their production problems and aid them in their drive to increase the profitability of their crop.

Six corn projects were approved for funding by Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) at its August meeting. The projects, dealing with aflatoxin control and remediation, insect control, crop protection chemicals, and marketability of food corn, were submitted by extension and research specialists of the Texas A&M University System. Project funding will be made possible from the half-cent per bushel corn check-off administered by TCPB.

The statewide corn check-off was established earlier this year when Texas corn producers approved it by a vote of more than 2 to 1. At the same time, voters elected directors to the fifteen-member Texas Corn Producers Board to administer the program. Within three months, the research committee of the new board had

reviewed projects and ranked them by priority based on their value to corn producers. Other projects will be considered as they are submitted. All funding is subject to the checkoff collection.

"The TCPB investment in corn research will leverage a substantial amount of public funding," according to Dr. Dudley Smith, associate director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. "Texas A&M already spends more than \$2 million on corn research. The TCPB grants will involve corn producers more directly in the research process and help determine priority topics for expanded research in this new partnership."

Williams is on the board of the Texas Corn Producers Board, and is active in the American Corn Growers Association.

Two grain producers from the Panhandle were honored at this national meeting: wheat producer Bill Nelson of Amarillo and Elbert Harp, a grain sorghum and corn producer from Abernathy.

In addition to attending national meetings, the Texas Corn Producers Board have been doing many things to improve and market their product. Below are some of the things their news releases have mentioned.

- Setting standards for "Texas Supreme" the name to identify Texas' highest quality food corn.

- Working to market "Texas Supreme" on a worldwide basis. Because of its proximity to Mexico, Central, and South America, Texas has a geographic advantage in this market.

- Using funds from the farmers' checkoff to help leverage a substantial amount of public funding for corn research projects here in Texas.

The projects funded at the August meeting of the Texas Corn Producers Board were:

- Dr. Timothy Phillips' work at Texas A&M University on food safety and cost-effective Myotoxin removal.

- Control programs for Mexican and Western corn rootworm and the interaction of these controls with herbicides.

- Projects of Drs. Anton J. Bockholt, corn breeder; Lloyd Rooney, cereal chemist; J.D. Smith, soil and crop scientist; and R. A. Frederiksen, plant pathologist to make Texas the food corn state of the nation.

All of these projects are subject to funding of the farmers' checkoff, which was approved by a margin of 2-1.

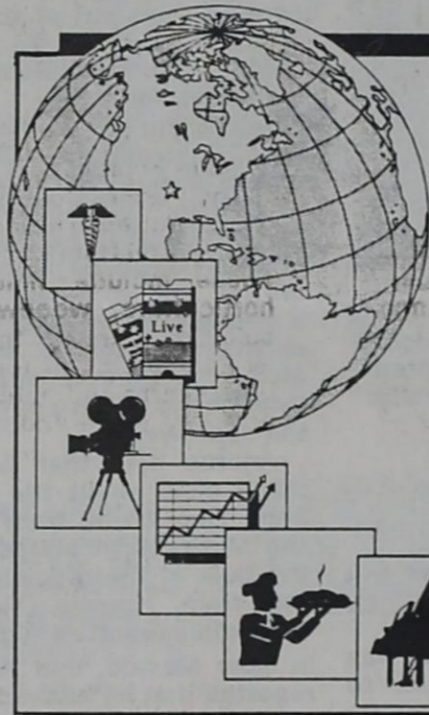

Also on Aug. 23, Texico was called during what was probably a meteor shower to investigate a possible plane crash at 8:42 p.m.

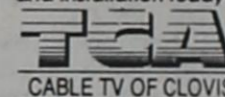

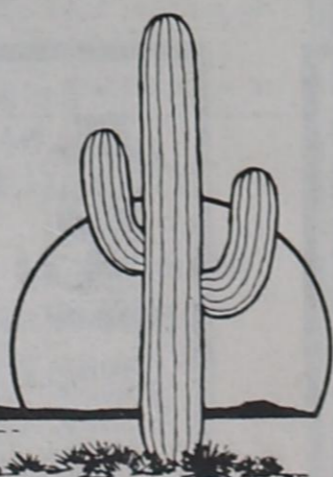

Navy Seaman Recruit Rodney S. Smith, a 1987 graduate of Texico High School has completed recruit training at Recruit Training Command, San Diego.

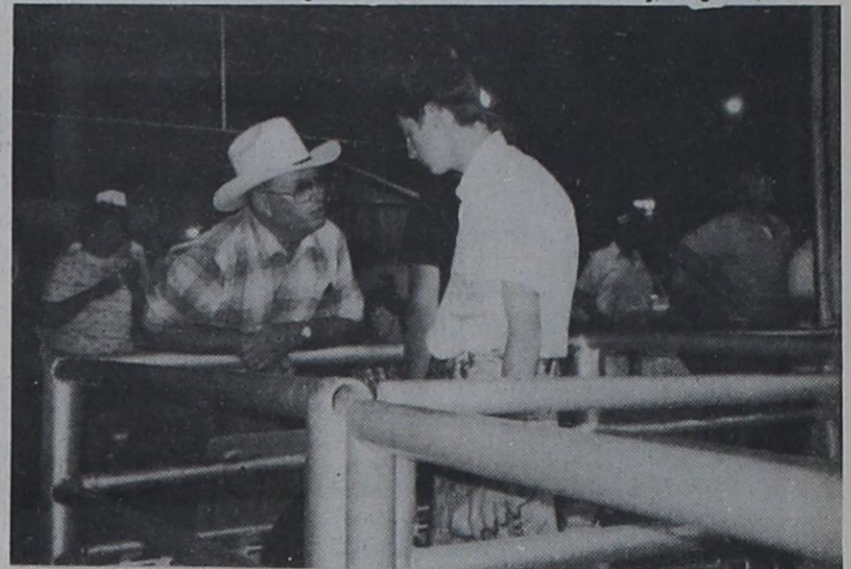

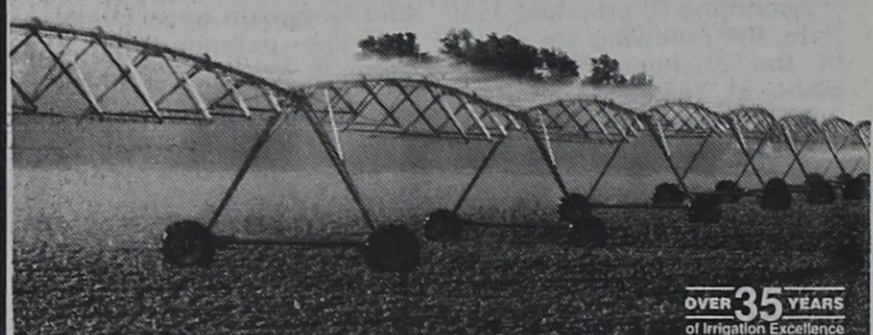

Food Corn Field Day to be sponsored

A multi-county Food Corn Field Day will be held on Sept. 5, at 10 a.m. at the Gene Smith Farm. The Smith farm is located 2 miles north of Lazbuddie and 1 mile west and 1/2 mile north.

Area producers from Bailey, Parmer, Castro, and Lamb Counties are encouraged to attend this event and view approximately 125 varieties of corn hybrids which are being tested this year.

More than 20 different seed companies have hybrids planted in this year's test which includes 52 white food corn entries, 29 yellow food corn entries with pink, white or red cobs, and 49 feed corn entries. Some of these entries are experimental varieties which will be the new and improved releases of seed companies in future years. Seed company representatives will discuss the different characteristics of these hybrids being grown in the test plot. Information to be discussed on each variety will be stability, days to maturity, grain quality characteristics and other important agronomic information.

This field day serves as an excellent opportunity for area producers to see and observe some of the new corn hybrids which are being bred and grown for this area of the High Plains and to visit with area seed company representatives. The field day is free and open to everyone. This annual event is hosted by Smith, Valley Grain Products, and the Extension Ag. Committees from the four-county area.

Test plot results will be collected and distributed to area producers by county Extension agents and area seed companies in early 1991.

Farwell, Texico schools' enrollments increase

The first-day enrollment figures have been reported for area schools. Farwell shows a gain of two

students over last year - 496, up from 494. Farwell High's enrollment was down from 137 to 127.

The junior high had one less student - down from 107 to 106. But the elementary school had a large gain - up from 250 to 263 students. Texico School Supt. R. L. Richards reports that Texico's first day enrollment has increased again this year. The 1990 first day enrollment was reported as 493 compared to 466 for the first

day enrollment for 1989. Texico Elementary School showed the greatest increase in enrollment. There were 232 enrolled this year; in 1989 there were 201. Texico Junior High increased its enrollment this year by 6 students to 120. Texico High School showed a loss of 10 students this year, going from 151 to 141.

"I think the actual enrollment will be higher than this," said Dr. Richards. "We had some students on our rolls who did not show up," he said. Lazbuddie School's first day attendance was down from last year's estimate - 264 to 247. This included 113 in the elementary school and 134 in the high schools.

Last year Texico forfeited to Estancia because coach Curt Cook had resigned on short notice, and coach Richard Luscombe wanted to develop the team before he took them out on the playing field. This year, coach Luscombe will be coaching basketball again, but Bruce Scroggins will be the football coach. He has been an assistant

football coach for Clovis High School for several years. The Wolverines have had time to get better situated than this time last year. And, they are favored over Estancia. The forfeited game was the only football game Estancia had in the win column last year. In spite of the favored status, Coach Scroggins wasn't going to get over-confident about the chances of winning Saturday night. He will face Estancia's new coach, Scott Sparks, who was at Las Cruces High School last year. "We're trying a new offense, and it is taking a while to click on all cylinders," said Scroggins. "The team is putting out a good effort, and I think it will all come together very well." The Wolverines are fortunate because they have experience on their side. "We've probably got about as many seniors as they've had out in a long time," said Scroggins. The Wolverines will probably only play about three underclassmen on offense, and about four on defense Saturday night. According to Scroggins, Estancia is expected to run the ball more than throw it Saturday night, but they are tricky. They like to throw in a lot of motion to distract their opponents. Fans will see the Wolverines use a very flexible offense. There will be both running and throwing from Texico. Both teams use the same defense - a 50. It is expected that Texico's ability to block will be tested Saturday night. The Texico Wolverines had their first taste of action when they scrimmaged Bovina last Saturday. "Our first bunch won 1-1," said Texico coach Bruce Scroggins. "They moved the ball pretty well, and things got better as we went along." "Some of the kids surprised us a little bit, and we finished a little bit better than I expected," he said.

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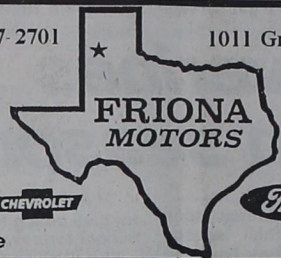
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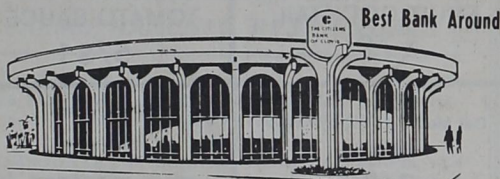
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
