Farwell approves building plans

The Farwell School Board Monday approved plans for the building program.

Additions will be built to all three school buildings, plus a new gym. Bids for the work will be opened Feb. 23.

The new gym will seat 720. The current gym seats 530.

The new gym will have the "home crowd" on the south side. There will be 8 rows of 44 individual seats with bleachers at both ends, which can seat about 32 people at each end.

The north side will be for "visitors," and will have 6 rows of 13 individual seats. Bleachers will fill the rest of this space.

Due to new federal handicapped laws, there will be a ramp between the seats and the floor.

School Supt. Richard Boothby was to be in Amarillo later this week to see if any state matching funds are available to build the new tennis courts. If not, the school system will still build the courts, across the street from the high school and near the baseball field.

The old courts were demolished to make way for the new gym. The old courts also were in very bad physical shape.

Also, Boothby reported that there will be no problems with sewer pipes under the current and planned buildings. All state and federal guidelines will be met.

In other business, the board:

- Approved the senior class trip to California.
- Called for a board election on May 1. Seats held by Charles Christian and David Norton will be on the ballot. Billie Blain will be election judge.

- Approved having the annual Open House for March 4.
- Hired its top administrators: Larry Gregory, high school principal; Jerry Owen, elementary - junior high principal; Gwen Corn, administrative assistant, and Rex Cump-ton, athletic director.

Commissioners okay supplies for county's reserve deputies

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday approved having the county handle the finances for a proposed fire department program.

County Judge Bonnie Clayton said the county's fire volunteer fire departments backed the program.

It involves the U.S. Forest Service offering matching funds (50-50 basis) to local fire departments to convert electric irrigation wells into use as fire hydrants.

This way, if a fire department is fighting a fire in the countryside, and runs out of water, it can go to one of the wells that was converted instead of running back into

Texico plans cleanup day

The Texico City Council Tuesday scheduled its annual cleanup day for April 17.

In other business, the council:

- Agreed to buy a chlorine leak repair kit for \$1,260.

- Heard Marshal Fry Urioste report that he talked with officials of the Santa Fe Railroad about the problem of trains blocking the crossings and everything should be okay now.

- Agreed to consider taking over the lease for the ball park from the Farwell Youth Commission.

- Discussed the need to start fixing up Lions Park.

- Gave councilman Butch Tharp several ideas for projects that might be funded by the state highway department. Tharp will take one of the suggestions to the state for possible funding.

Suggestions were:

1. Replacing pipe under Wheeler Avenue.

2. Improving the intersection of Highway 60-74-84.

3. Flood control and repairs to South Garwood to Avenue D.

4. A new water line west of the Port of Entry.

5. Reworking Highway 248's dip.

6. Curbs and gutters.

7. Improving the dirt road on Avenue F.

8. Buying land adjacent to the Tourist Center and fixing it up.

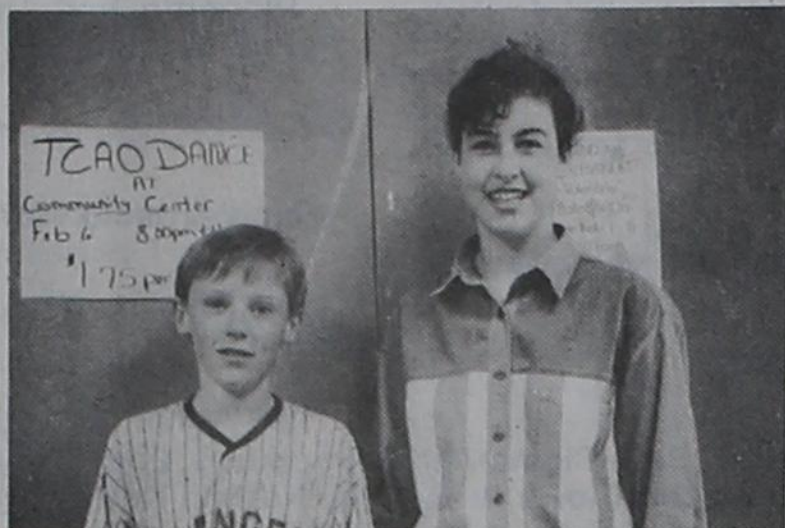

Texico reviews building project

The Texico School Board Tuesday worked extensively on various facets of their building project.

They reviewed the progress of work that has already been done on the addition to the Junior High where they saw that sheet rock had been installed to the science lab.

They also voted to re-surface parking lots with money received from a new state grant. They voted to put a metal roof on the Peyton Williams property. They also voted to install washable ceiling tiles in the Ag shop and cafeteria.

Board members heard that the school system had received \$10,000 in new federal funding for special education. They voted to purchase a new computer for each special education classroom with this money.

In other business, the board:
- Reduced the Younger scholarships from two per year to one per year because interest rates are much lower now, and the principle does not generate as much interest as it did in the past.

- Voted to request two new buses from the To and Fro bus contractor.

- Approved an increase in insurance.

- Noted student achievements, especially science fair winners.

- Discussed the possible school realignment which will come up in March. Texico may change from a 1A school to a 2A school for sports classification purposes.

- Discussed the Inservice day which is planned for Feb. 15. Representatives of the State Department of Education's Special Education department will be present to work on curriculum upgrades.

- Discussed the athletic bids and the open meetings resolutions which will be voted upon at the next meeting.

- Reviewed the school board election results. New member Ted Richardson was introduced to the board. He will be officially sworn in when he attends the State School Board Member's Institute in Santa Fe on March 5 and 6. Supt. R. L. Richards, and school board members Bruce Mayfield and Byron Mayfield are also expected to attend.

Stuffed Pumpkin

5 lb. pumpkin
1/4 c. (1/2 stick) margarine or butter
2 medium baking potatoes, peeled and chopped (about 2 c.)
2 medium stalks celery, chopped (about 1 c.)
2 medium carrots, chopped (about 1 c.)
1 medium onion, chopped (about 1/2 c.)
1 lb. veal stew meat
1/2 c. prosciutto or fully cooked Virginia ham, chopped (about 3 oz)
1 c. chicken broth
1 1/2 c. spaghetti sauce
1 tsp. ground cloves
1 c. shredded mozzarella cheese (4 oz.)

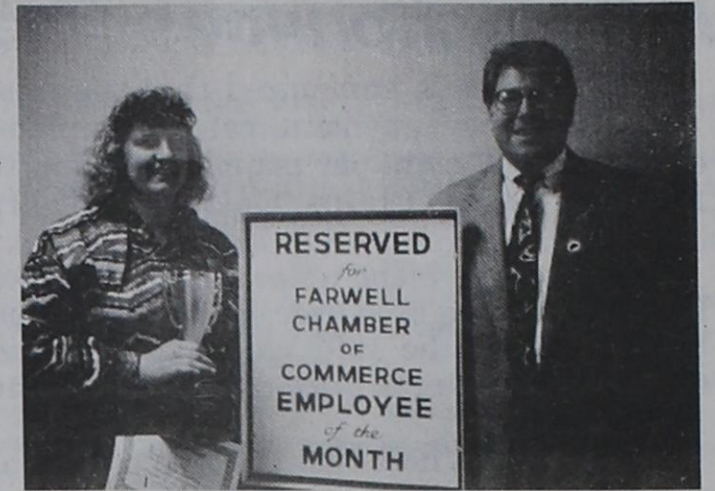
Heat oven to 350 degrees. Remove pumpkin stem if necessary. Cut pumpkin crosswise in half; remove strings and seeds. Place cut sides down on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake about 1 hour or until tender.

USDA announces final deficiency payment rate

USDA officials announced that the final 1992 deficiency payment rate for upland cotton is 20.3 cents per pound according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

The final payment reflects the difference between the weighted average price received by farmers for the 1992 calendar year and the 72.9 cent target price mandated by the 1990 farm bill.

PCG officials note that the 20.3 cent final payment rate will translate into a 12.8 cent final payment to producers who received the advance payment of 7.5 cents.

"The announcement of the 1992 deficiency payment rate at 20.3 cents is good news for High Plains cotton growers," says Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "This should really help get most producers on firm ground financially to begin the 1993 crop."

USDA's estimate for the 1993 deficiency payment rate was announced February 3

Producers are reminded that flexibility provisions written into the 1990 Food, Agriculture, Conservation, and Trade Act are still applicable. The following is a breakdown of the flexibility provisions:

- **Normal Flex Acres (NFA)** equal 15 percent of the crop acreage base on the farm and is not eligible for deficiency payments.
- **Optional Flex Acres (OFA)** equal 10 percent of the crop acreage base on the farm and is eligible for deficiency payments only if planted to the original program crop. Program crops planted on NFA and OFA acres are eligible for loan whether or not the producer is participating in the commodity program for that particular crop.
- **Maximum Flex Acres (MFA)** equal the sum of NFA and OFA.

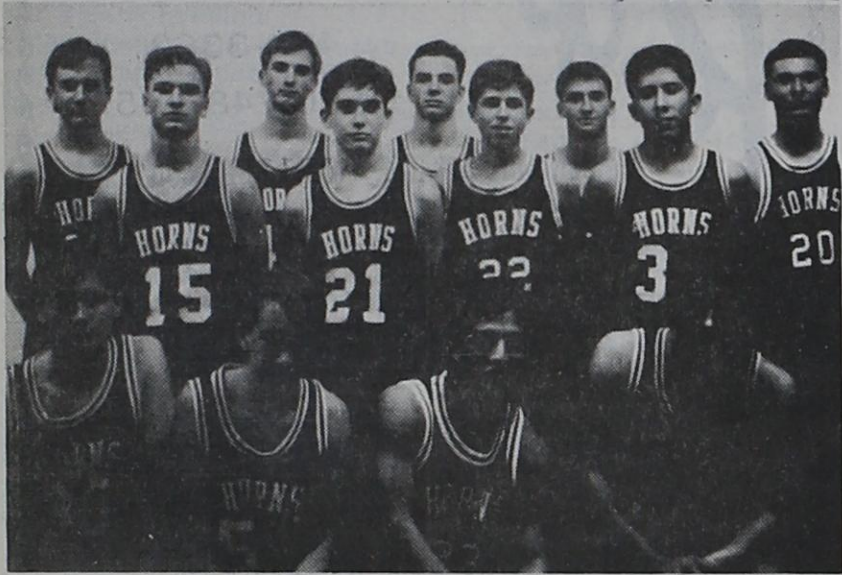
Other information regarding the 1993 crop are the Target Price and Payment Yields which remain frozen at 1990 levels.

"This information will allow cotton producers on the High Plains to start planning their 1993 crops," notes Johnson. "Producers who are still putting the final and set at 20.55 cents per pound, with an advance payment of 10.275 cents available at sign-up. Sign-up for the 1993 cotton program will begin March 1 and run through April 30.

Program provisions announced so far for 1993 seem to parallel last year's provisions with the exception of the Acreage Reduction Program (ARP) percentage which fell to 7.5 percent.

In addition to the disaster program sign-up deadline, Johnson adds that the final day to request a loan or a Loan Deficiency Payment on 1992 cotton is May 31, 1993.
