It's funny how opinions change over the years.

If you had asked me, say 20 years ago, what I thought about a national medical program, I would have laughed. It was a real failure in some European nations at the time; health care had declined because of it, I would have suggested.


Times change.

Currently, many school districts provide no health insurance plans for their employees. What we're seeing in this country is the ability for government employees to have access to effective health insurance programs. Such is not the case for many nongovernment employees. And if you don't have health insurance, you sure can end up the creek without a paddle fast. Especially if you have young'uns. I believe that within this decade a national health program will be a fact. Folks simply cannot afford the spiralling medical and hospital costs without one.

Sanchez returns from the Gulf

Second grade students at Farwell Elementary School May 29 heard the father of one of their classmates talk about his experiences in Saudi Arabia.

Sgt. Rudy Sanchez answered questions from his daughter Andrea's classmates about a multitude of topics.

Sgt. Sanchez is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Sanchez Sr. of Farwell. His son Benjamin is in 3rd grade here, and his daughter Andrea is in 2nd.

The Sanchez family also has two other children. Alexandria, 2, and Gregory, 5 months - who was born while his father was out of the country. He saw his son for the first time on May 25.

Sanchez is assigned with the HHC 4th of the 70th Army. 1st Armored Division. He was stationed in Germany when the conflict in the Middle East began to heat up. He was sent to Saudi Arabia on Dec. 31 and left there on May 2.

He will be reporting back to Germany after a 30 day leave with his family.



was for. If I had my way, I'd block them all."

ENMR is able to give its members a choice. If a member marks the line that says: "I do not want access to 900-976 (blocked)," then telephone numbers that start with 900 and 976 will not be able to be made from that telephone.

ENMR is capable of blocking these calls if the customer requests it. This service is free. But if the customer wants the option of calling these numbers at a later date, there will be a service charge to re-connect 900 and 976 service.



Deficit worsens

Dear Editor:

By now I am sure you are aware that despite Congress' promises to use the new tax revenue to reduce the federal deficit they did the exact opposite.

That's right, Congress enacted the second largest tax increase ever and rather than reduce the deficit they increased spending \$111 billion (and that doesn't included the Gulf War costs) and pushed the FY1991 deficit to an all time record \$320 billion.

Congressional leaders promise that the new budget would mean a \$500 billion spending reduction in the years ahead. How can they say that?"

Let me explain. Only in Congress can you promise a \$500 billion savings at the same time you increase actual spending by \$111 billion. Here's how it works:

When Congress talks about spending cuts, they are not they are not talking about cutting actual spending, but reducing projected increases. If Congress just reduces the amount of increased spending, they call that a spending cut- even though actual spending is still increasing.

a simplified example. Let's cut, actual spending will still suppose Congress today is spending \$1 on a program and they have budgeted to spend \$2 on the same program next year. However, if they spend \$1.75 next year they will call that a spending cut of .25- even though they actually increased spending by .75.

to save \$500 billion in the years ahead, this was not an actual cut of \$500 billion, it was a reduction in their
