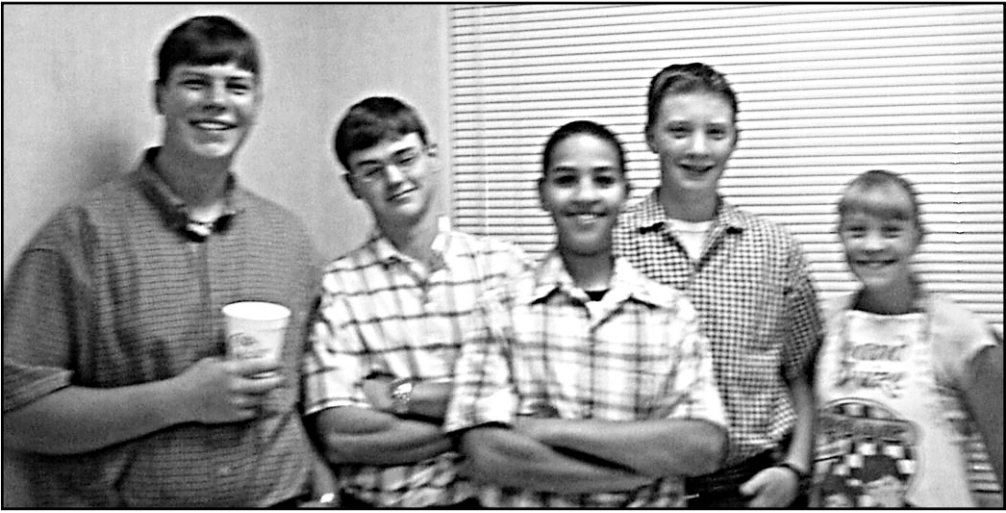

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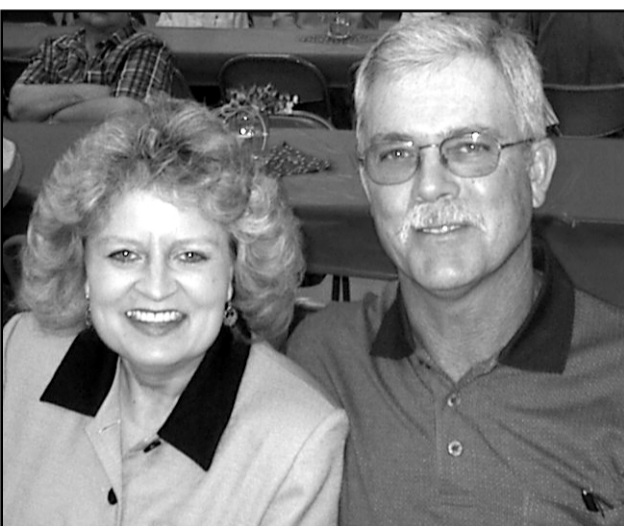

History can repeat itself

When I wrote my column the day of the 9/11 tragedy in New York City, I said that World War III had just begun.

I know that few folks believed me at that early stage in the war with the terrorists. But I think you see now that I was correct in my early thinking.

Just looking at the headlines in the major papers each day brings that truism to mind quickly.

-- Police arrest 13 in anti-terrorism raids in London and several towns.

-- Possible terrorist suspect arrested in the U.S.

-- 9 Colombian policemen killed in car bombing.

-- Thai forces storm a mosque, killing 32 Muslim militants.

-- Death toll rises to 4 in U.S. embassy attack in Uzbekistan.

-- Fighting continues in Iraq and Afghanistan.

And all those headlines were from the same day's paper!

The list goes on and on. And just a few years ago most of us never heard of places like Uzbekistan.

This is why when political candidates claim a quick end to the war with the terrorists, I go bonkers. How very, very silly.

As I've written over and over, the war with terrorists will continue into our children's lives, far beyond our own life spans. The roots are so deep, in culture, religion, economics and politics, that a quick end is simply out of the question.

And this is why I've supported President Bush on how his handling of this war so far. He has looked beyond "a quick victory" and has attempted to tell the public the far-reaching nature of the war.

And that is also why the toppling of Saddam Hussein was a very good thing. This accomplished:

-- Removal of a dictator who was a definite threat to us and Israel.

-- The beginning of a push for democracy in the Arab world.

-- The change in Libya, from being a terrorist state to a moderate nation.

The democracy issue is very important. Sure, it won't happen tomorrow. But from small seeds grow... The U.S. is sending a powerful message to the "Arab Street," that we

Don't get me wrong. We have made mistakes in our war, too. One of the greatest blunders in U.S. military/political history was the disbanding of the Iraqi army after we kayoed Saddam. Horrifying.

If that army, under better leadership, had remained constant, you would never have seen the insurgency arise in Iraq this year.

I find it fascinating that this blunder of major proportions is never talked about in the media or by politicians. Just fascinating... This is where John Kerry could have made big political hay. But he's clueless, too.

Anyway, the war will go on for years and years. We will have terror attacks in the U.S., regardless of who's running the nation, Democrats or Republicans. We will continue to send our troops to foreign soil.

But I just wish there was a way that our nation's leaders could band together on this war, alert the public to its complexities

and it's long-range work, and to make the changes needed to achieve victory in the long run.

That, unfortunately, is a major problem in a democratic society. And I always think back to the Athenian-Spartan wars and how democratic Athens handled them -- and was vanquished.

Does history repeat itself? Sure does, when a nation's leaders don't see how the past was handled. And the similarities between Athens and the U.S. are frightening.

I wish our nation's leaders would sit down with a book on the ancient Greek wars and try to understand where Athens went wrong -- and make sure the U.S. doesn't follow the same course.

# State continues to tell local schools what to do

A year ago, the State Line Tribune carried a Page 1 article entitled "State tells local schools what to do."

The article pointed out new Texas guidelines that affected local schools -- basically taking away more of their controls.

Many of the changes involved the food area, whereby local schools were told not to allow "junk food" or carbonated beverages to be sold in schools.

While this doesn't affect local schools very much, it cost some larger schools a lot of funds since they had contracts with national companies like Pepsi Cola and Coca Cola to sell their products in their schools.

The state policy says that "foods of minimal nutritional values" are not allowed at any time during the school day in elementary school; not allowed in middle schools until after the last lunch period; and not allowed during high school meal periods where meals are served and eaten.

Sometimes, "policies" can get to you. That is the case with Lazbuddie School Board member Dieter Isaacson, who called the Tribune last week to note how local schools are affected in another way.

If a birthday party is held for a youngster in the elementary school, for example, cupcakes are allowed. But no sprinkles!

Why? Because "certain candies" fall under the "foods of minimal nutritional value" clause.

As for candy, it's not allowed at any time in the elementary schools; not allowed until after the last lunch period in the middle schools; but is allowed in the high

**LIVE CATTLE:** Once cash prices traded this week, the market began to sell off. Most short term trends turned down again after making their way back to the top of this summer's trading range. The USDA Cattle on Feed has little to report as there were no surprises on Friday. Looks like the market will trade back to the lower end of the range before trying to turn back up.

**FEEDER CATTLE:** Prices were pulled lower along with Live Cattle prices this week, but the August contract has to settle to the Cash Feeder Index going into the end of the month and prices were quick to recover from mid-week losses. Feeders seem to be comfortable trading around the \$1.15 level for now. The spread will eventually change between fed cattle and feeder prices.

**CORN:** Short and long term trends were able to turn back higher this week. Many analysts believe that the 11 billion-bushel estimate for this season's crop may be a little too big? Crop looks good, but the wet, cool weather has many believing that it will have an impact on yields. Demand remains very strong and an uptrend may have end users looking to price corn at these levels.

**SOYBEANS:** The market made its way back higher this week along with the rest of the grains, but long term trends are still down and trying to recover. Again, the cool, wet weather all across the Mid West has many analysts concerned about this year's production. No doubt that this crop will probably turn out to be a good one, but may not be as large as estimates predict?

**WHEAT:** Short term trends turned higher this week but it will take higher prices in order to turn the market around long term. Export sales have been okay but still too much competition coming from overseas. Most analysts still believe this will change with time, but for now, the seasonal tendency is for higher wheat prices from now into the December/January time frame.

**COTTON:** For the first time since turning down in January, long term trends were able to turn higher this week. As impossible as it seems to think that prices will continue to move higher was probably the place many were when the market moved below the 60-cent level. Cool weather is affecting potential yields and is creating some concern. Targets are now around the 56-cent level.

## Texico looking at higher water rates

At Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting, councilman Oran Jay Autrey asked that the topic of water rate hikes be placed on the next agenda.

The last rate hike came in November 2003. Autrey, noting the higher costs needed to ensure the future of the city's water supply, said he expects the rates to climb significantly in the next decade.

The water bills that go out this week are also higher, due to the city's higher tax rate.

In other business, the council:

-- Received one bid, from All-State Mechanical of Clovis, for \$120,213 to build a fire department classroom and offices metal building.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper was hoping to get a bid closer to \$100,000. He will discuss the bid with the department before making a recommendation to the council on whether to accept it.

-- Heard city clerk Daisy Swerczek report that state officials have told her it's too late in the year to have a street sealcoating program go ahead (another state okay was still needed first).

But the state will give Texico an extension until next spring to use the funds it has granted the city for the work (the streets to be worked on were reported in the Tribune earlier).

-- Earmarked \$20,000 in the proposed budget for playground equipment at KKR Park.

The TCAO has been raising funds for the equipment, to be bought from an Albuquerque firm for \$16,414 (if the city installs it and provides a safety cushion).

TCAO's Ann Cooper said the group will have over \$10,000 after the cookbook fund-raiser ends. Autrey said the full cost for the equipment will be about \$30,000 with all its extras.

Mrs. Cooper reported that the Border Town Days raffle netted \$2,000 for the TCAO.

-- Heard police officer Gilbert Salguero report that notices to property owners to clean up their property has gone well. Only a few problems continue.

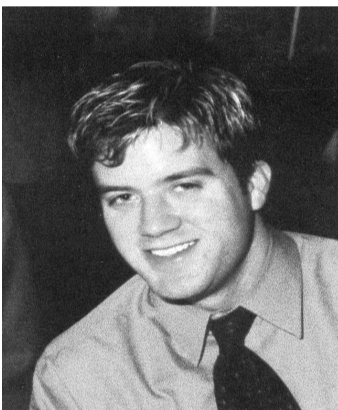

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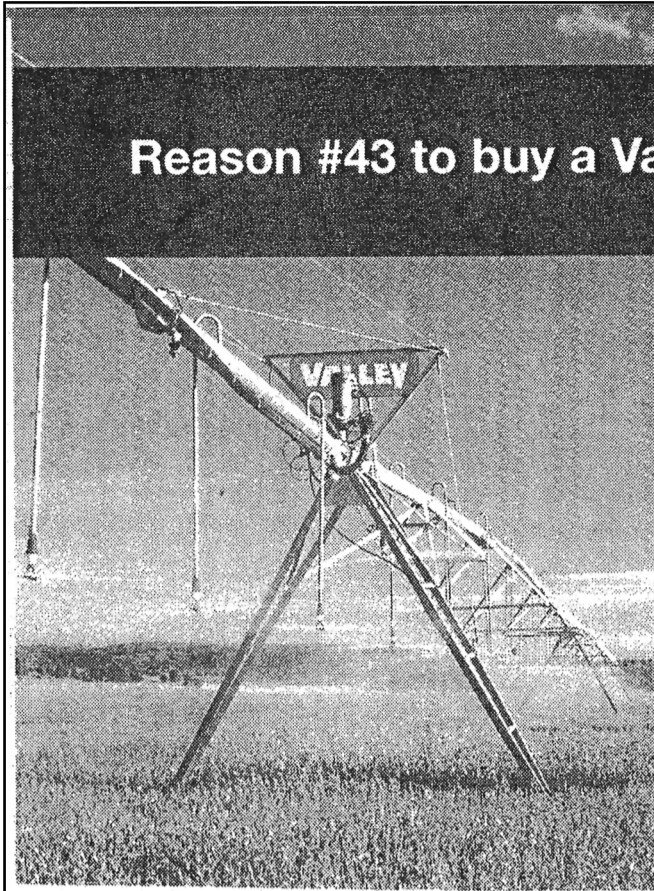

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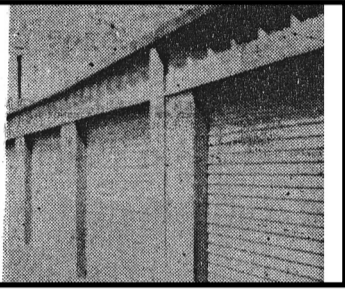

"The hail wasn't widespread, but where it hit, it hit extremely hard," said Doyle Johnson, of the Farwell Gin. Reports of total crop wipeouts have been received from the areas of Texico-Pleasant Hill, south of Farwell and the Bovina area.

Many acres of cotton, green beans and corn silage are reported to be the hardest hit in these areas.

The moisture and hail have also hurt pumpkins. Too much moisture is causing spotting and rot damage to the growing pumpkins lying on the ground.

The excess moisture has also seriously and fatally hit the potato crop. Several potato growers have completely plowed up fields that once held promise to be the best potato crop in many years.

motor assisted scooters around Bovina have occurred, and they have been operated unsafely. It is the fear of the Council that a youngster will be hurt riding these neighborhood electric vehicles and motor assisted scooters, especially on 3rd Street or on Highway 86.

Those incidents witnessed and/or reported, the youth on the neighborhood electric vehicle and motor assisted scooter was not supervised by an adult. In addition, the vehicles were being operated late at night (no lights or reflectors) and without adhering to any traffic controls; in other words, they ran the STOP signs and were darting in and out of traffic.

It was pointed out that some parents were supervising their kids, while the kids operated the neighborhood electric vehicles and motor assisted scooters. It was decided that to enact the new ordinance would be unfair at this time. However, if it is observed that the kids are being supervised and/or the kids are not operating the neighborhood electric vehicles and motor assisted scooters in a safe and responsible manner, this ordinance could be revised in the future.

Also, a word about "pocket rockets"...these are street legal and regulated. They are motorcycles and must be registered, insured, safety inspected, and operated by someone old enough to have a motorcycle drivers license. This matter is regulated by the State laws. Allowing kids to operate pocket rocket suffers the same laws as allowing them to operate a car without a license. Enough said...

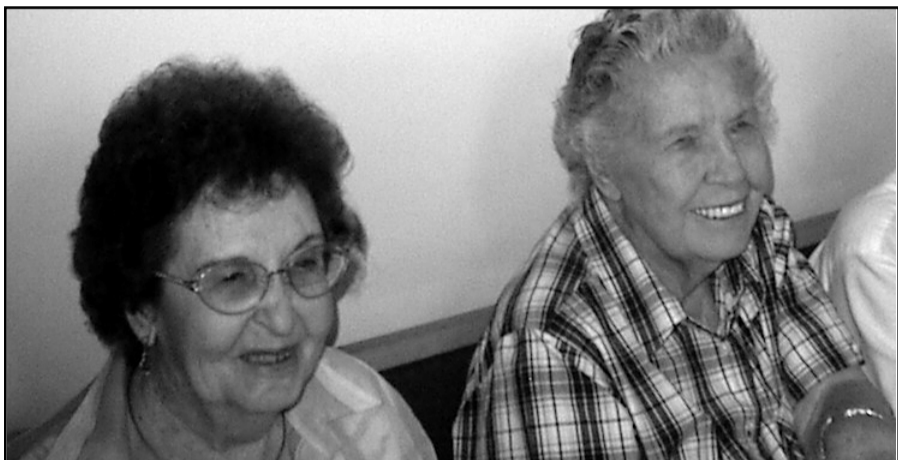

From Bovina City Manager Ernest Terry:

The Bovina City Council, in an open meeting held on Aug. 12, considered an amendment to the City Code prohibiting the operation of neighborhood electric vehicles and motor assisted scooter. In accordance with Texas State law, section 55.302 states and "a county or municipality may prohibit the operation of a neighborhood electric vehicle and motor assisted scooter on any street or highway if the governing body of the county of municipality determines that the prohibition is necessary in the interest of safety."

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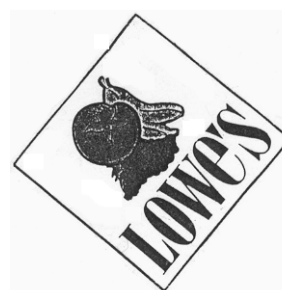
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
