Parmer faces redistricting

Virginia Daugherty, legal counsel from Northern and Daugherty, spoke to the Parmer County Citizens Advisory Committee on Redistricting Tuesday.

Due to the 1990 census and several landmark court cases, Parmer County precincts have to be re-drawn.

She said this year is unlike other years when the guiding principle was, "one man, one vote." New court rulings dictate that lines must be re-drawn so that minority populations are not diluted and one precinct must be "packed" so that a minority will have a "say" in at least one district within the

The committee, consisting of Pat Fleming, Matilda Baca, Carol Ellis, Edwin Lide, Hugh Moseley, Maria Lopez, Richard Haseloff, Pearl Cervantez, Kaye Williams, Jerry Cass, Billie Powell, Scott Brown, and Ben Rejino, Jr. will meet several times to discuss the impact of new information and new court decisions on the election process.

The advisory committee was organized by County Judge Bonnie Clayton.

Once the committee has made its recommendations, the county commissioners will redraw the precinct lines. The maps will be sent to Washington, D.C. where the Justice Department decides whether the process has been followed, and whether the rights of the minority residents of the county have been adequately taken into consideration.

Daugherty indicated that not only will county commissioner precincts be re-drawn, but also justice of the peace precincts and constable precincts.







In Parmer County, 53,600 acres were planted; 50,100 acres were harvested. The yield per acre was 796 - second only to Casto County in the 25 county area. The 796 yield compares with a 510.4 weighted average for the 25 county area. 83,100 480# Nt. Wt. Bales were produced in Parmer County in 1990.

In Bailey County, 93,200 acres were planted. 73,200 acres were harvested. The yield per acre harvested was 445. There were 67,800 Nt. Wt. 480# bales harvested in Bailey County in 1990.

The 25- county weighted average yield amounted to 510.4 pounds per acre on 2,775,100 acres harvested in 1990. The yield total ranks third behind the High Plains' record of 535.3 pounds per acre produced in 1965, according to PCG records that date back to 1928. The second - best yield total was 1968's 516.8 pounds per acre. The 1990 crop topped 1989's average yield by 146.3 pounds bringing the five- and ten- year average yield figures to 447.5 and 386.5 pounds respectively.

PCG figures indicate that of the 3,183,700 acres planted to cotton, 2,775,100 acres were harvested and 408,600 acres were abandoned. The 408,600 abandoned acre total represents about 13 percent of total planted acres.

TASS is encouraging producers to participate in mid-year crop and livestock survey that is currently being conducted. Through their voluntary participation producers will help TASS develop an accurate picture of how Texas agriculture is responding to the new farm program Many of the TASS reports and figures are used by the National Agricultural Statistics Service in compiling crop estimates that are used by producers nationwide.

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **AUGUST 10, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

Please pick up report cards

Beware of bagworms

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other treas and shurbs in Texas.

Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks.

Insecticide control is most effective in early June when the bagworms are small, says Parmer County Entomologist Agent Brant Baugh.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on leaves they soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs, and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1/12 inches long, Brant Baugh adds. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter as eggs in these bags in trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," says Baugh. "But if bagworms were present on the plant last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thuriengensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, through coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides.





The Lazbuddie School Board Tuesday accepted the resignation of elementary principal/ counselor Anne Farris. who is returning to DeKalb, and cafeteria manager Cheryl

The board also voted to give the staff and aides a 5 percent pay raises.

Some adjustments were made were made for the base pay of band director, bus maintenance persons, and the superintendent's office staff.

The board accepted the Improvement Team's recommendations. The committee had met in Dimmitt to discuss the needs of the school system. Items suggested include: 1. Improving school climate by showing respect, 2. Ways to increase leadership, 3. Organization of an academic banquet. 4. Involvement of parents and community members, 5. Ways to improve relations between racial groups, 6. Improving fine arts in the curriculum, 7. Improving the facilities.

Some of the specific repair projects discussed by the board after hearing the Improvement Team's recommendations include: refurbishing elementary bathrooms, and dressing rooms, painting classrooms, weather stripping on windows, lighting the tennis courts, improving drainage near the band hall, adding a shower and eye wash to the science lab, and repairing the school roof. Maintenance will also be made at the school housing.

In other business the board:

- Heard the attendance committee report to allow students who have missed more than 15 days of school to make up their work.

- Heard a report on the Migrant Summer School program which offers both remediation and enrichment.

- Appointed Robert Gallman to the District County Education District, if it comes into being. Senate Bill 351 which establishes this may be signed by the governor very

- Approved the purchase of student insurance from the Baker Company for next year.

- Adopted a gym use policy.

Feedlots set record

For a second year in a row, feedlots within the area served by Southwestern Public Service Company during 1990 fed a record number of cattle, according to SPS's annual Fed Cattle Survey.

Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,570,203 head of cattle, a 1.9% increase over the 1989 total of 5,468,350.

The survey also showed that the one-time total capacity of area feedlots in 19909 was 2,887,275, up from the onetime total capacity in 1988 of 2,758,662 head.

"The growth indicated in the survey is good news for this region," said Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agricultural and wholesale marketing. "It shows that cattle feeding is still solid and a vital part of this area."

SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey covering feedlots in its service area, which covers 52,000 square miles.

The region includes the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico and southwestern Kansas.

While most numbers in the survey were up, the number of cattle slaughtered last year in the area decreased slightly. The 13 beef - packing plants in the SPS service area slaughtered 4,661,163 cattle, down from 4,694,852 in 1989. At the same time, however, capacity at the plants increased in 1990 to 5,095,520.

"There are several packing plants located just outside our service area," Krupnick said. "That accounts for the difference between the number of cattle slaughtered and the number fed."

The Fed Cattle Survey is also showing growth in the total number of feedlots in the area, from 117 to 1989 to 120 in


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
