A strange occurrence

A very odd situation has developed in Parmer County which really surprises me. Having lived here for more than 9 years now, I've learned certain things about folks who lives in rural areas.

One is that folks normally don't confront someone else directly even if they are angry about a certain situation. They may pose their feelings in the form of a question; they may talk with a third party; they may low key their approach; they may hold it in. But rarely do they come "head on."

But for the first time during my years here, I've seen that "head on" approach used - by the City of Friona vs. the Parmer County Commissioners.

As the article on Page 1 points out, the City of Friona had issued an ultimatum to the county commissioners. And the county commissioners unanimously rejected it, setting up a serious problem - a lack of speedy fire and ambulance protection to the rural areas outside Friona as of Oct. 1.

It should be pointed out that one of the four county commissioners (Johnny Mars) lives in Friona, while smaller parts of Friona are part of two other commissioners' districts (Tom Ware and Raymond McGehee). So, obviously, the county commissioners' vote wasn't "anti-Friona."

Personally speaking, I feel that Friona's complaint that it wasn't sufficiently reimbursed by the county due to the larger number of rural calls its fire department is valid.

And I think the commissioners feel the same way, based on their budget discussions involving new methods of funding the fire departments more fairly.

It would appear that a more equitable method of funding will be approved, giving Friona a fairer share of the pie. This is how it should be.

So why - in the midst of this discussion - does the City of Friona issue an ultimatum with a rapidly-approaching deadline?

I am completely surprised. Things like that don't normally happen in a rural area, where folks realize that the only way to get through life is by working together.

Throughout U.S. history, you will always find situations where government entities don't feel they are being reimbursed fairly by other government entities.

Each year, there are statistics showing the amount of dollars each state gives to the federal government, and how much of that money flows back to each state. Some states don't get as much back as they give - but I don't recall any ultimatums

Lazbuddie gets new post office building

Lazbuddie residents have been getting their mail in a clean, bright, new modular building since July 12.

The new building is small, but it has air conditioning, heating, running water, and a telephone - things that were missing in the old frame post office across the street from the new building. It also has postal boxes that lock with keys instead of combination locks.

For years Lazbuddie postmasters used the restroom, water and telephone of Mrs. Mae Elizabeth Mahan Davis, who shared the building with the post office. Her first husband, I.C. Mahan, had been the Lazbuddie postmaster in 1948. They owned the building that the old postmaster shared.

I. C. Mahan moved to Lazbuddie in 1948 to run the Lazbuddie grocery store. Anyone who ran the grocery store picked up the mail in Muleshoe when they went to town. They would put all of the mail into a big box, and anyone who came into the store could look through the box for their mail.

I. C. Mahan died in 1950, and his widow, Mae Elizabeth Mahan (later Davis) and the children ran the store, post office and filling station. She retired in 1974, and lives in two rooms that she and her husband had added to the old store in 1949.

"I still live in the building and lease part of it to the post office. They still have some equipment in here," said Mrs. Davis.

Farwell's postmaster Lynne Mahaney was Lazbuddie's postal officer in charge for five months back in 1988. She remembers Mrs. Davis fondly, "She let me use her bathroom and fixed mop water for me so I could clean. She was always cooking and baking things." She also remembers that the building had no running water, open faced heaters, windows that were painted shut and a drafty roof.

"They were telling us for years that we were going to get a new building, but then one day it arrived," said Lazbuddie's current postmaster Connie Barnes. "I'm really enjoying it. After five years, it's just wonderful!"

The new building has a plaque dated February 1992 with President George Bush's likeness on it, but the building did not arrive until March 1993. It waited on cement blocks until this summer when it was installed. According to Mrs. Barnes, "Maintenance men came from the Lubbock Post office and set it up and installed the new safe."

"I boxed the mail that day, and they moved it on my lunch hour," she added. Postal relief clerk Liz Jesko and Mr. Barnes' husband Royce helped with the move.

Mrs. Barnes told the local residents to "follow the flag." When the new building was ready, the U.S. flag was raised to let everyone know which building to use.

"It's still natural for people to pull back over there," she said as she pointed to the old post office. The building still has the US postal service emblem in the window.

"We had to board up the mail drop because people were still leaving mail over there," she said.

One of the nicest features of the new building is that it is equipped for handicapped. "I had some customers who couldn't use it - now they can just buzz in." There is a parking space and a ramp especially built to make the building accessible to handicapped.

Since Lazbuddie's new modular building arrived, three postmasters have called Mrs. Barnes to ask her opinion of the building because their post offices were going to get modular buildings. "I have to tell them that compared to what we had before, this is wonderful."

Mrs. Barnes noted that long ago folks in the Lazbuddie community used to get their mail at Buddy Sherley's general store which was located where the old post office is today. All the mail went into a big box, and anyone who came to town could pick through the box looking for letters.

Sherley's handwriting was so bad that the U.S. Post Office records listed the place as Lazbuddie rather than Lazbuddie. The official postal records now list the town's name as Lazbuddie.

For years, whoever owned the store owned the post office. In 1926 John H. Hennington became the first Postmaster. Some of the other postmasters have been: Wanda Templar, Othele R. Mahan, Otto Trieder and Elsie Clark.

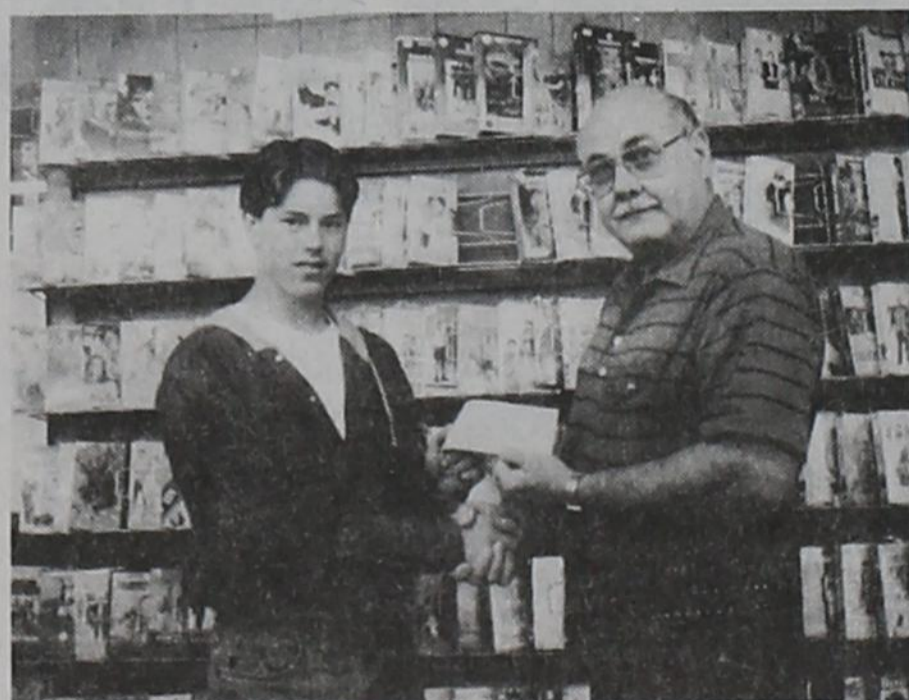
Rules for the 1993 contest are the same as in the past. A person must be at least 12 years of age to enter. Games are divided among high school, college and pro games.

Commissioners to meet with firemen

Officials of the five volunteer fire departments in Parmer County have been invited to attend Monday afternoon's meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners to discuss the fire protection problem in the Friona area.

On Aug. 23, the Commissioners unanimously rejected a proposed contract from the City of Friona in order for Friona to continue to provide rural fire protection after Oct. 1.

Basically, Friona wanted Parmer County to reimburse the city figuring Friona's actual expenses, less 20 percent. The ration of city fires to county fires would be totalled, less accidents and false alarms. The city was asking for quarterly payments, beginning Jan. 1, 1994.

If that proposal wasn't accepted, then Friona informed the commissioners it would stop answering fire calls outside the city limits (actually, outside a one-half mile radius of the city) on Oct. 1.

Last year, the county's fire departments got over \$85,000 from the county commissioners, which had been giving each department a flat total. Since Friona voiced its complaint that it was not being reimbursed fairly since a larger number of its calls are outside its city limits, the commissioners have been discussing changing its formula.

In its budget discussions, the county commissioners are viewing three proposals:

1) The county has set \$50,000 aside for the county's fire departments. Of this, \$5,000 would send up to two firemen from each department to hazardous waste material school. Also, each department would get a flat \$5,000 subsidy. And the remaining \$20,000 would be pro-rated among the three city departments (Friona, Farwell and Bovina) according to the percentage of rural calls they make.

2) Of the \$50,000 set aside, each department would get a flat amount: Friona, \$20,000; Farwell and Bovina, \$9,000 each; Lazbuddie and Rhea-Hollene, \$6,000 each.

3) Each department would be paid a given amount per rural call they mak.

County Judge Bonnie Clayton had said that the commissioners felt that the Friona proposed contract was open-ended when they rejected it. After lunch Monday, the commissioners will meet at 1:30 p.m. with a representative of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to discuss the forthcoming changes in county addresses in order to provide speedier fire department assistance.

Current rural addresses will be changed to using numbers and letters, like in New Mexico.

The Cowboys lost because their defensive line and linebackers had a lousy game. Period.

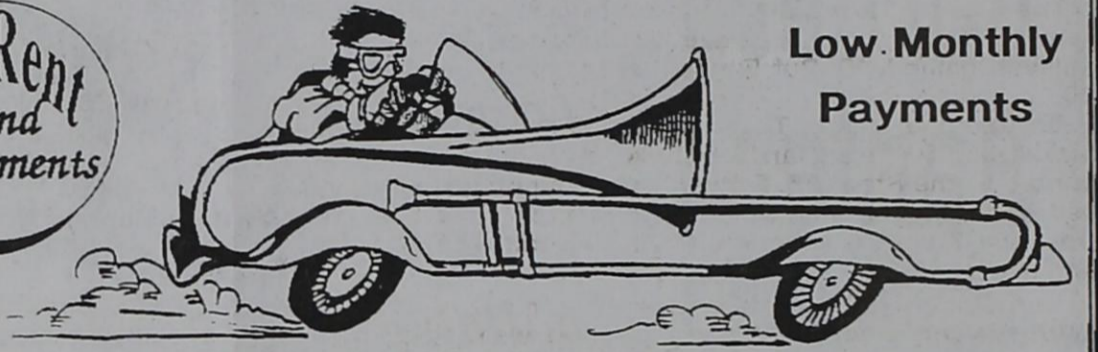
Fans at Friday night's Steers game were entertained by the Farwell Steers Marching Band.

Plains turns back Steers in season opener

The Farwell Steers opened their 1993 play at home last Friday with a 62-12 loss to a very talented and strong Plains Cowboys' squad.

The youthful Steers also were without middle linebacker Derrick Haseloff, who was injured.

Plains started the game on their 34. Despite good tackles by Jeremy Ortiz and Jon Sullivan, they went for it on 4 and 1 near mid-field, making it. Then they scored on a 53-yard end run at 8:57. The kick made it 7-0.

Brent Harrison returned the kickoff 25 yards to the Steer 30. Farwell was stopped and the punt attempt failed, with Plains taking over on the Steer 20. Plains scored on a 15-yard end run at 6:25. The kick made it 14-0.

Blaze Hardage returned the punt 15 yards to the Frawell 20. Plains intercepted at the Steer 35, returning it for a TD at 4:05. The kick made it 21-0.

Harrison returned the next punt to the Steer 27. Harrison gained 8 yards for the Steers' 1st first down of the season. But Plains intercepted at its 38, returning it to the Farwell 3. The Cowboys scored on a 2-yard pass at the end of the first quarter. The kick made it 28-0.

Farwell ended the quarter with Harrison returning the kickoff 85 yards for a TD. The pass for-extra points failed and it was 28-6.

On defense, Nic Ketcherside and Michael Phillips had good tackles. Justin Mahaney had a QB sack for an 8-yard loss. But Plains had a 60-yard TD run at 10:03. The kick made it 35-6.

Harrison returned the kickoff to the Steer 37. Harrison ran around end for 10 yards, then gained 15 more. Jon Sullivan rambled up the gut for 12 more. But Plains intercepted at its 25 and returned it for a TD at 8:24. The kick made it 42-6.

The Steers started at their 18. Harrison completed a 50-yard halfback pass to Blaze Hardage, at the Plains 30. Sullivan gained 10. But Farwell lost a fumble at the Plains 20.

On defense, Jason Taylor, Brock Anderson and Hardage had strong tackles. Harrison broke up 2 passes and Plains punted to the Steer 25. Farwell was stopped and punted the ball back. Plains hit a 30-yard pass, then scored on a run from the 7 with 8 seconds left in the half. The kick failed and it was 48-6.

Hardage opened the third quarter with a 21-yard kickoff return to the Steer 31. A halfback pass was intercepted at midfield and returned to the Steer 42. Hardage intercepted the Plains pass at the Steer 20. Farwell was held and punted to midfield, where Anderson made a good tackle of the punt returner.

On defense, Hardage had a fine open-field tackle. Plains got some luck when the ball was tipped by one of its receivers into the arms of another receiver in the end zone for a TD at 1:46. The kick made it 55-6.

Farwell then put on its best drive of the day, starting at its 33. Harrison ran up the middle for gains of 17 and 14 yards

as the third quarter ended. Nash Armstrong then gained 5, and Harrison had runs of 7, 15 and 8. Then Harrison scored on an 8-yard TD spring at 8:41. The pass for extra points failed and it was 55-12.

Plains moved quickly, scoring on a 57-yard TD run at 5:55 to put the score at 62-12.

Farwell didn't quit. They got the ball back at midfield. Then Harrison had a great cutback run for 45 yards to the Plains 4. But Plains recovered a fumble in the end zone, stopping Farwell's attempt for a third TD.

On defense, good tackles were recorded by Mahaney, Jesse Chilton and Ortiz. Farwell got the ball back and Armstrong completed a 20-yard pass to Harrison as the game ended.

ENMR Telephone Cooperative customers in Parmer County had a pleasant surprise when they received their September phone bills last week. They got a large credit.

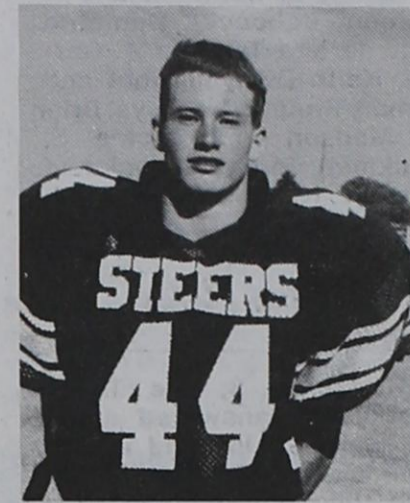
ENMR was alerted by a Farwell customer a couple of months ago that a mistake may have been made in his bill involving calls made within Texas. He was right about about being overcharged.

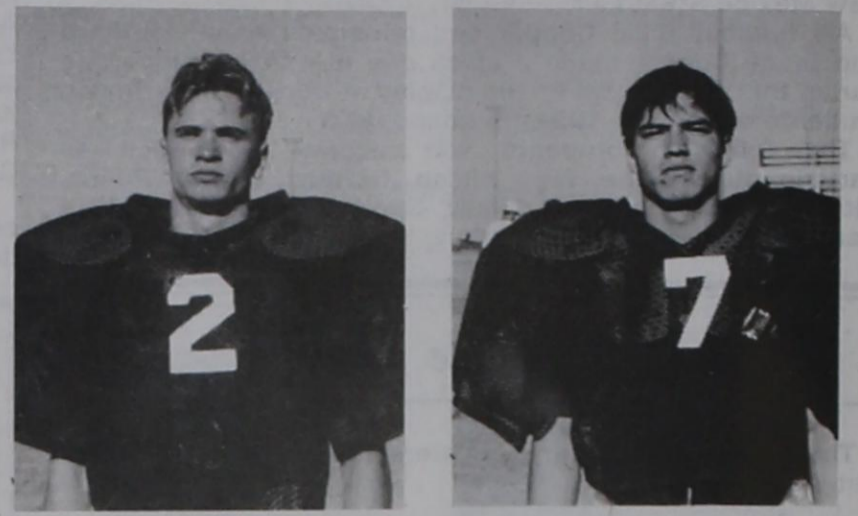
The one-year certificate course is designed to help students gain knowledge and technical skills in ranch and feedlot management.

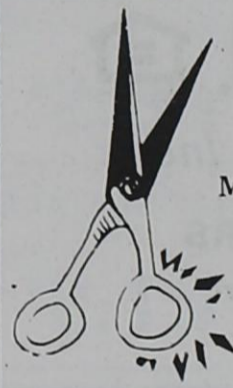

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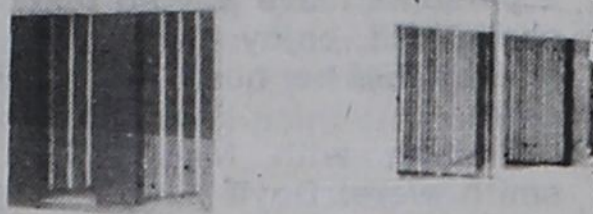

Lonnie McFarland of Lariat reported that they had not gotten any moisture out there.

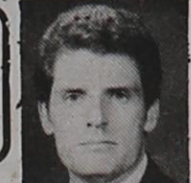
Lazbuddie reported a good bit more moisture. Shirley Steinbock said, "I guess we got about 3/10. We got a shower but it didn't amount
