

Other highlights include the CAKE Train, petting zoo, water polo, puppet shows, and a host of musical entertainment.

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Texico gets optimistic financial outlook on KKR Park well

The Texico City Council got an optimistic funding forecast Tuesday from its engineering consultant on the contaminated

Don Diego Gonzales, of Weston Corp., Albuquerque, said Texico quite likely will get a big state grant to help pay the costs of solving the problem.

The city is facing a huge financial undertaking: to eliminate the contaminant found in the now-closed KKR Well park, to connect the KKR and Tower Park wells (which would dilute

the contaminant), and to build a new well. Gonzales said the city is eligible for two state grants:

One with a \$250,000 limit for emergencies. Gonzales said the needed air stripper in the KKR Well, costing about \$60,000, may qualify.

- One with a \$600,000 limit. On Gonzales' recommendation, the city council will suggest its total cleanup package. "There's a good chance to pick up most of this money if not all of it," said Gonzales.

The city has to present its package to the state by Aug. 23 for that second grant. Awards are announced Nov. 7.

Discussing that second grant, the city is preparing to take a survey of residents in order to try and show that over 50 percent fall into low to moderate income categories. If that proves true, then any funds gotten from that grant fund would not have to be repaid.

However, if less than 50 percent of Texico residents are considered with low to moderate incomes, then the city has to repay 5 percent of the loan. Thus, if Texico was given the \$600,000, it would have to later repay \$30,000.

The 1980 census showed that Texico had 47 percent of its residents fall into the low to moderate income categories.

Texico has scheduled public hearings on the well problem and its seeking of state financial aid for July 30 and Aug. 6 at 6:30 p.m. mdt at Texico City Hall.

At the July 30 meeting, it will further discuss the survey to be taken. Residents, especially those who are Spanish-

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speaking, are asked to attend so plans can be finalized.

The survey basically has two questions: how many people are in your household, and what is your yearly income. No names and addresses are needed. The more folks polled, the better the survey will look when it is presented as part of the grant request.

In his presentation, Gonzales made three major points: 1) The city needs to buy an air stripper for the KKR Park

The KKR Park well should be tied into the Tower Well, and the dilution of the contaminant should meet acceptable

3) The "historic landfill" - the area covering the northern part of KKR Park and the adjacent Moore property - will need to be excavated, as well as the lagoon on the southern part

He said the lagoon can be eliminated by designing a plan to divert surface water elsewhere. Last year, the city had preliminary plans made to divert this water to the west.

Gonzales said the debris and material buried in the "historic landfill" must be removed. He figured the debris was about 6 to 8 feet deep and it would take 2 to 3 weeks to remove it. "The new well would draw the contaminated plume toward it unless it's removed," he said.

Also, a site must be found for a new well. Currently, only the Tower Well is working.

When Texico goes before the state board, Gonzales said the city has to: explain the project, show a need, show

appropriateness, explain its fiscal capacity, feasibility of the project, cost benefits to the city and state, and show how the improvements will be maintained. This package must be put together before Aug. 23.

Weston Corp. already has received the \$16,000 the city voted to pay as a limit, so the council Tuesday voted unanimously to add \$23,000 to the contract.

Lewis Cooper, who was on the City Council when the KKR Well was built around 1980, was in the audience. Gonzales asked him if it were true that the well was built through debris. Cooper said he was not aware of that until just

It still has not been determined what caused the toxic contaminant problem at KKR Park Well. Gonzales said the No. 1 suspect is the "historic landfill."

The costs involved in meeting the well problem already has taken a toll. City Attorney Duane Hamar said the decision to add a second police officer has been put on hold because of finances. It was noted that the city has had 18 burglaries



Corns get to visit Germany, Czechoslovakia

Farwell High junior Clay Corn and his grandmother, Ann Corn of Bovina, returned recently from a trip to Germany and Czechoslovakia. They were accompanied by Clay's cousins, David Sorley of Dallas and Doris Grissom of Dallas.

"The first thing I saw was a three tower nuclear power plant near the Frankfurt Airport. You could see it while you were landing. Germany was very modern, probably more modern than the United States," he said.

The Autobahn really impressed Corn. "We were driving along the road doing a casual 160 km. (100 miles per hour) when this motorcycle passed us like we were standing still. The rider leaned into a wide turn and just disappeared," he

In spite of the fact that there are no speed limits outside of towns, Germany has few traffic accidents. They have very comprehensive drivers' education classes, and are very strict about enforcing drunk driving laws. The driving age is 18 in Germany, so Clay was not able to try out the Autobahn.

They did run into a couple of traffic jams that were miles and miles long. As more Europeans begin to own cars, the more the German Autobahn system is becoming clogged.

"They've also got a new train system with bullet trains from large city to large city," he noted. There are also passenger trains that regularly service the outlying areas. He called the system quite efficient, although he noted that the German transit system was working on "a few glitches,"

In Frankfurt, Clay stayed in the beautiful 5 star Kimpinski Hotel. "It was 5 star times 2," he said. This was the first time that Clay had ever stayed in such a luxurious place. He was quite impressed.

While they were eating in the luxurious hotel dining room, Clay's grandmother picked up the plate she was eating from and noticed it was made in Shoenwald, West Germany, the town where she spent part of her childhood. The porcelain made in her hometown is used by many hotels throughout Europe. Shoenwald was one of the stops on their trip. While they were in Shoenwald, they visited Mrs. Corn's cousins,

From Shoenwald - near the Czech border - they could see the high school in Asch, Czechoslovakia, where Ann Corn went to school.

"They are about 5 minutes' drive from one another, and the people lived in a different world from each other. There are almost no Germans in Asch, and almost no Czechs in Shoenwald," said Corn.

Asch had been a very rich textile manufacturing community before World War II. Corn heard people say that the communist government wanted Asch destroyed, and "it all came out of the wealthiest people's pockets. Now it is all dirty and run down."

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Clay's grandmother and her parents were forced leave Asch when the Communist government took power in Czechoslovakia. She moved to Shoenwald with one suitcase. During the trip she saw old friends and relatives that she had not seen for many years. It was a very happy homecoming.

She and the members of her family were also able to visit the grave of her step-father, Christian Swoboda, who died two years ago.

Little details underlined the differences between the lifestyle of the people on either side of the border.

"People on one side of the border drove Mercedes Benzes and on the other they drove these little two cylinder, two cycle cars with engines like motorcycle engines," said Clay. The two countries were close together and the people who lived there were aware of what was going on across the border, even when it was impossible to cross it.

In Czechoslovakia, "the wall" was actually some white stakes with a 30' minefield between, but the wall between East and West Germany included a concrete fence with spiraled electric barbed wire atop. There were tall guard towers, and the wall there was topped by cannons loaded with items like glass and nails.

When they visited the wall, one of Clay's cousins told him the story of a person had attempted to pole vault over the minefield a few years earlier, and had been hit by shot from one of the cannons. He was injured by the shot, but he had

They visited the Kornberg- a 75' tower in the wall. Near it was a 400' radar tower that sent messages to Moscow.

They also saw a place were there is a monument. It is supposed to have been the spy hole where spies traveled from the East to the West.

During the trip they visited a place near Hoff, Germany where the East Germans had a kennel for the dogs that patrolled the border. "They left in such a hurry, that there was still a wheel barrel full of meat and bones for the dogs,"

On the West German side of the border, bridges have manholes filled with bombs which could destroy the bridges if Communists from invaded.

Corn noted that the young people he had met on the trip were much more politically minded than American young people. "You could get into an argument and 4 hours later still lose," he noted.

The Texans visited many of the tourist attractions while they were in Germany.

In Munich they saw the famous clock with figures that dance around. And they climbed the tower in the Cathedral.

They saw Marienbad, a mineral bath resort which was used by kings and queens for their cures. Marienbad had become quite run down during the Communist era, but now it is a tourist attraction. "The buildings are very old. The fascades have been rebuilt and repainted; it's just amazing," he said.

The contrast in economic policies between East and West is underlined by the price of food. In the former East Germany, the Corns enjoyed a wonderful meal for four people in a very elegant restaurant for only \$15. In Munich, a dinner for 6 people in a less fancy restaurant cost \$60. In Germany a glass of Coca- Cola cost about \$1. In Czechoslovakia a bottled Coke cost about 18 cents.

"We also saw Braunfels, that's were the prince of Braunfels lived before he came to Texas and founded New Braunfels, Texas. They called him "Texas Pete." The former prince's relatives live in the castle in Braunfels and are still addressed as "your highness."

They visited Fruedenstadt, "the Friendly City," of the Black Forest. It has the largest market place in Germany -4 kilometers in circumference. Clay referred to the Black Forest as very beautiful. The steep hills and majestic trees made it a wonderfully scenic place to visit.

A highlight for Corn was a visit to Bamburg. They arrived at the Cathedral in Bamberg (which was built in 1015) just in time for the noon organ concert.

Clay, who loves to play the piano and keyboard, was really impressed by the ancient pipe organ. "We sat next to the bass pipes. They were 4' wide and 30' tall. They were huge. It was monumental." It takes two people to operate the mechanical pipe organ. One to run the bellows and to turn the music, and one to play the organ."

Bamberg is the home of a huge government building which sits in the middle of a tributary of the Main River. The Protestant people of Bamberg wanted to build a city hall, but the Catholic run government refused to give up the land for the building. So the building was built on a little island in the river and the water runs under the building.

The trip made Corn very proud of the U.S. "You don't realize that you have it so good until you see other parts of the world. Traveling put a different perspective on my appreciation of the U.S." "We have diversities in our people, and we have different accents in English, but over there they spell words entirely differently and they say things entirely differently from one state to another. It is very difficult for people from the state of Hess to understand somebody from Bavaria."

In Freudenstadt in the Black Forest area, Clay's grandmother couldn't understand the German spoken by some people even though she is fluent in German.

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

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
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Launching the sorties!

The following information was provided by Debbie Phillips of Farwell about her brother-in-law who has just returned from the Gulf. It was supplied by the Navy Public Affairs Center.

Navy Capt. Arboth Andrew Rylant, brother-in-law of Dewayne and Debbie Phillips of Farwell, who recently returned from duty in support of Desert Storm aboard the carrier USS Ranger, has a prediction he'd like to make.

"Hollywood will probably try to capture Desert Storm on film but they won't come close to the real events as they occurred. They won't be able to touch those intangibles heart, discipline, bravery and love of country that I observed aboard Ranger during the 43 days of combat."

Rylant has had a distinguished career as a naval aviator, flying the A-6 Intruder but this time his expertise was needed not in the cockpit but on the carrier. He heads the Ranger's Air Department - a unit of 530 men who man the control tower, handle the aircraft, fuel airplanes and work the carrier's catapults and flight lines.

The Ranger, a flattop based in San Diego, arrived on station in the Persian Gulf the day before hostilities began. Its planes flew the first strikes into Iraq two hours past midnight on Jan.

"The more sorties the carrier launched, the more hours we spent in the tower and the more grueling the schedule is for the flight deck guys," Rylant explained. "On a normal cruise we work 12 hours on 12 hours off. During Desert Storm the first few days we worked round the clock and finally cut back to 16 to 18 hours a day."

The professional voice the fighter, attack, helicopter and reconnaissance pilots heard inside their helmets is always the voice of Rylant or his assistant, the mini - air boss. In the critical set-up to an approach the veteran aviators are there, like a second set of reflexes for the pilots.

Since the majority of the pilots who flew in Desert Storm had never flown in combat, the professionalism of the 44year-old former test pilot was doubly appreciated.

"Once they're 10 nautical miles or less from the carrier. I control them. Outside of the 10 miles the control is done by instruments," he explained.

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
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
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
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


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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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


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Heltons 'tie me kangeroo down'

Hal Helton doesn't remember what happened to July 10. All he knows is that he boarded an airplane in Albuquerque on July 9 along with his wife, Gloria; children, Kyle, 12, and Kymberly, 3; and his parents, Joe and Dardanella Helton, and 23 pieces of luggage.

He remembers that they flew from Albuquerque to Denver, and from to Los Angeles. From there they boarded a 14 hour flight to Sydney, Australia where they arrived at 6:30 a.m. on July 13. Somewhere along the line the group crossed the international date line and misplaced July 10

As the newly elected Lions Club District Governor of District 40X, Hal Helton was on his way to the International Lions Club Convention in Sydney, Australia to attend the installation ceremony.

During the course of the Australian visit, which lasted from June 9 -July 5, the Texico native drove about 3,600 miles - almost all of them on what most Americans would consider the wrong side of the road. Members of the Helton party toured many famous sights from Brisbane in the north to the southern coast.

Hal Helton admits that at one point in his trek he looked up from the steering wheel to see a truck (or lorrie, as the British would say) aiming straight at him. He realized that it was he, and not the truck, on the wrong side of the road. Luckily, the mistake was corrected before it caused any major problems.

The convention was held this year at Broad Beach which Helton describes as a "junior Las Vegas" with hotels, convention center, and gambling casinos. Nearly 40,000 Lions Club members from all over the world attended the event which featured lots of meetings, dinners, and a 3 hour

According to Helton, the Australian convention was hampered slightly because of some customs regulations. Delegates were limited in the amount and type of baggage that they could bring with them, and those restrictions limited the number of floats, costumes, flags, and souvenir trading pins that normally abound at a Lions Club International conventions. For instance, one group usually brings along Native American headdresses and costumes to wear in the parade. This year, they were not able to bring all of their gear because of the restrictions. But, the

restrictions were not too bad.

Helton noted that this convention had a somewhat more formal atmosphere than some previous conventions. It began with a very formal tribute and toast to Queen Elizabeth II.

and beaches. One beach they saw was equipped with shark The scenery around some of the beaches was especially breathtaking. Nude beaches offered some sights that they


wouldn't have seen at home. "They were standing out there

The trip also allowed them all to taste some very interesting cuisine along the way. At one banquet Chinese food was served in little bowls. Diners were expected to clean their plates because each new course was added to

the same bowl.

Some of the items they were served on the trip included: barbecued "bugs"- seafood larger than a crayfish but smaller than a lobster; prawns- giant 6" shrimp served in the shell with the head still attached.

Tea is normally served hot, and "they look at you like you're some kind of foreigner if you ask for iced tea," said Dardanella Helton. "You can get ice and you can get tea, but they don't serve iced tea." The first time she asked for tea in a glass and a glass of ice, the tea came with tea leaves in the bottom.

Waitresses routinely ask customers if they want coffee or tea, "black or white," meaning with or without milk.

Beef is grass fed in Australia, so it has a slightly different taste from corn fed beef in the USA. Hal Helton ordered a steak sandwich in one restaurant, and was surprised to hear pounding from the kitchen where the chef was tenderizing the meat before making it into a sandwich.

Australian fruits abound everywhere. The tiny "sugar bananas", kiwi, strawberries, and other fruits were reported to be extremely cheap.

Eating out in restaurants is normally pretty expensive in Australia. "Food was high, I'm sure glad there was a McDonald's." said Helton.

"Australia is in kind of an economic slump. Workers earn about \$4 per hour and the price of things was very high. I paid anywhere from \$4.75 - \$13 a roll for Kodak film," he

Joe Helton added that in his estimation Australia has two classes. "You have the wealthy, and then you have the rank and file. It's more of two levels than three like we have," he said. "Their government has its finger on everything. For example, people have to pay a buyer's fee

to the government for every piece of land they buy." Joe Helton noted that things have begun to change in Australia (Continued on Page 11)

"We were preparing for war from the time we left San Diego last December," he said. "Actually each time we go to sea the Navy performs as if it were at war. Our training has been as tough and maybe tougher than what we did in combat. Everyone had to have discipline that extra 110 percent, to make things work for the air wing. The Ranger had the oldest equipment of the six carriers in the war and everything worked beyond our expectations."

Still even with excellent training and motivation the hazards to the carrier were increased by its wartime footing. Aside from the mines and the missile threat the carrier had its own explosive problems to contend with.

"The sheer amount of ordnance aboard increased the hazards of the flight deck," said Rylant. "Even a minor accident could have been disastrous and the large number of planes we were launching also increased the obstacle hazard. The biggest enemies on the flight deck are space and time."

During combat, squadrons from the Ranger jettisoned more than two million pounds of ordnance over targets in Iraq and Kuwait. This did not include the weapons carried by fighter aircraft used for air-to-air combat.

"During the war we never even had to rig the barricade to trap a damaged aircraft," said Rylant still marvelling at the carrier's good fortune. "If a pilot had come back with a damaged plane we would probably have diverted his, if possible to Bahrain, we couldn't take the risk of having a fire on the ship or damaging the deck.'

Rylant remembers that when the Ranger's commanding officer announced last January that barring message traffic to the contrary the Ranger would launch the first air strikes of the war at dawn there was no noticeable difference

between the floating airfield.
"Everyone went about their business," he recalled. "there was no big attitude change. Everyone was already on top of things that they were responsible for."

Although attitudes didn't change aboard the carrier, viewing habits did. Normally at sea, sailor are voracious offduty movie watchers. This time they watched the news in real - time. Shortly before leaving homeport, the Ranger had a satellite dish installed which allowed them to capture CNN.

"All eyes were on the television," Rylant said. "In the tower we had a monitor to watch the flight deck but we were watching the news."

Rylant first served with the Navy during the Vietnam War; this time the feel was much different. "Watching the news was exceptional," he said. "We all gained a sense of pride for the whole allied operation and for the U.S. forces."

Now back in California, Rylant has the time to reflect on his experiences at war. "I take special pride in the fact that the carriers and the planes made the ground war a short one and less costly in American soldiers and Marine lives," he said. I told my people to think the thoughts of warriors. I think we all expected a worse war than we encountered. We had to be there and we were there for the right reasons.


"In hindsight," Rylant concluded. "I didn't see us do anything different from what we usually do when we're at sea, just more of it. We did our jobs the way we were trained to do them and then we were ready to come home.'

An alumnus of Springlake High School in Earth, Texas and of West Texas State University where he majored in education, Rylant tried to reach out to his family while deployed, to calm their fears.

"I'd send my son maps so he'd know where we were," he said. "I know they were all glued to the television set. I think it was comforting to them to know that things were going



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Patrolling the Gulf!

Scott Childers recently returned to Farwell from the Persian Gulf for a short visit with his family. He shared his experiences in Operation Desert Storm with us in the following interview.

By JUDY POMPER

Navy Fire Controlman Third Class Scott Childers joined the Navy to learn electronics. He was told that he would be going to school to become a fire controlman; his immediate reaction was,"I don't want to be a fireman!"

The 1989 Farwell graduate soon learned that the fire controlman operates the computers which aim and fire the artillery on a ship. That was just the schooling that Childers wanted.

Childers had his basic training and one session of schooling at Great Lakes Training Center to learn the basic overall electronics necessary to operate the artillery.

When his class at Great Lakes ended last February, Childers reported to San Diego. From there he was flown from Norfolk, and then on to Italy, Saudi Arabia, and Bahrain. In Bahrain he caught a ship which caught up with the USS Harry W. Hill in the Persian Gulf. He joined his ship on Feb.

His ship was patrolling the Gulf and checking vessels in the Gulf for contraband when he arrived. Later the U.S. Coast Guard ships arrived to take over this duty.

Childers reports that he did not personally see much action while he was in the Gulf.

"My first thought was, 'I'm in a war! Anything can happen."

After a while, though, it's kind of boring.' "There was one time we did have to go to General Quarters. That's the most ready condition. It was kind of scary, but that

was about it," he says. "We didn't do much," he adds. Hearing about other ships hitting mines did cause some concern, but his ship did not experience that kind of action

in the Gulf. "Mainly what everybody was doing is sitting there waiting for something to happen. I'm not going to have terrifying

thoughts afterwards about what I did." During the action the crew operated on shifts of 6 hours of work and 6 off work. The lack of a full night's sleep caused some problems, but nothing major. When it was over, "I was

glad to go back to a full night's sleep," he notes. One of the things that surprised Childers about being aboard a ship was the age of the crew. "It's very scary when
