Teaching, like most other professions, is feeling the impact of today's technology. Some changes are very minor, but some are really major.

For instance, years ago when I was taught, school bells were programmed to ring automatically at certain hours. But, if there were a change in the schedule due to an early dismissal or a pep rally schedule, the principal or secretary had to ring the bells manually. It was easy to forget.

The other day I was over at Texico Schools when a computer specialist was programming the bell schedule into the school's computer. With the touch of a button the principal could select one of several different schedules. She could also pick one of three different sounding bell tones. It was really something to see how quickly and easily a task could be accomplished with today's technology.

Years ago I would pound on a typewriter to cut a ditto stencil for the mimeograph machine each time I wanted to give a test or make a worksheet. I always got purple ink all over everywhere, and sometimes the copies came out blurry or creased.

Today, teachers use copy machines to duplicate their tests. They are made quickly and easily. The amount of paper being used in schools has certainly increased over the past few years.

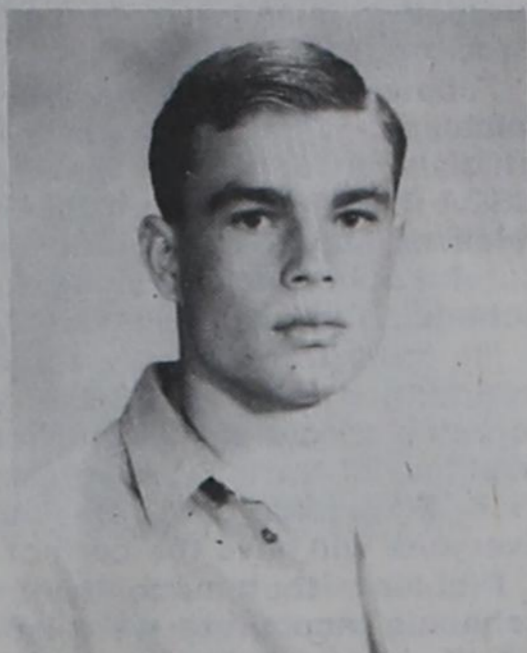
Some teachers today even give tests which appear directly on a computer screen. Students may type in their answers and produce nice neat hard copies of their answers. Having legible answers makes grading much easier.

Computer augmented instruction was just starting to become a reality in 1984 when I left teaching. Today, children can have totally individualized programs of instruction. Records management and program management will be quite a challenge for teachers coming up. Luckily, computers can also help with this.

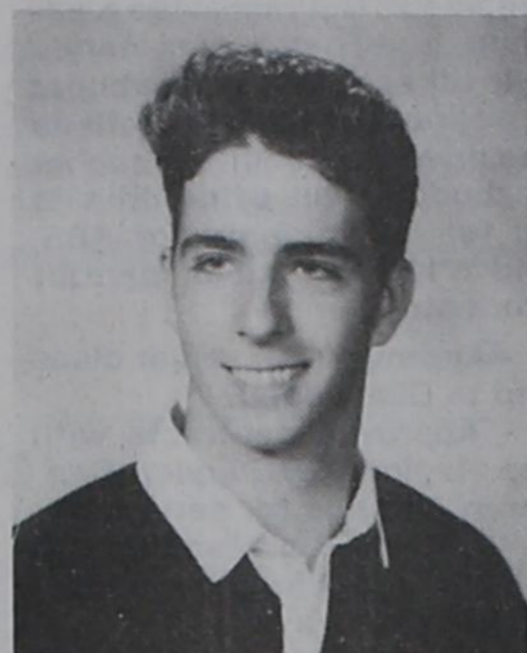
Today those who aren't working on computers can answer questions that are scored with Scantron machines that not only tell the teacher which questions the students missed, but also how many students chose each wrong answer. This helps the teacher word the questions more precisely. Again, this is a real help for teachers.

When I taught, lessons could be augmented with oc-

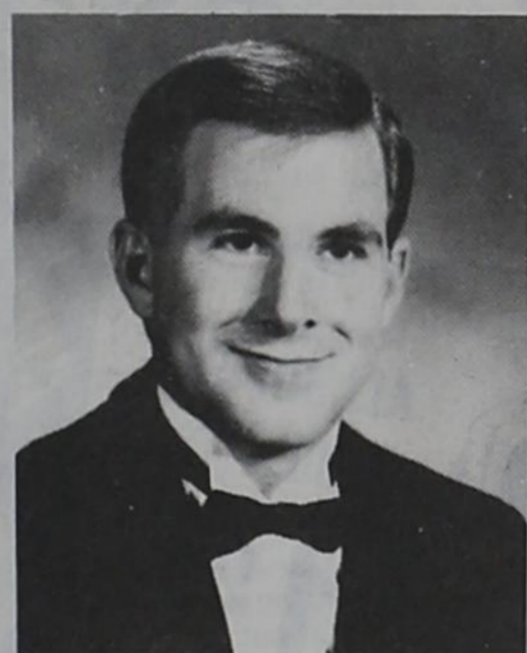

The dedication of the Parmer County Veterans Memorial will be held at 3 p.m. Sunday, May 30, in Farwell City Park.

The memorial contains the names of 34 Parmer County servicemen who died in the service to their nation.

The program has been organized by Mike Ratke, Dutch Quickel, Tom Nichols and Ralph Franse.

Master of ceremonies will be Paul Fortenberry, former Parmer County judge, of Friona. His son, James Richard Forten-

berry, is one of the 34 servicemen who are listed on the memorial.

An honor guard from the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post in Friona will present the colors.

The national anthem will be played by Alan and Kerry Finney, a trumpet duet.

Rev. Edward Greenhaner, pastor of St. John Lutheran Church in Lariat, will give the invocation.

The list of those to be honored will be read by veterans

of those wars. Then, a 21-gun salute will be offered by airmen from Cannon Air Force Base. Taps will be played.

A reception will follow, with refreshments provided by Beta Sigma Phi sorority.

Free copies of a State Line Tribune 4-page special section featuring background and photos on the servicemen will be available. Three hundred extra copies of the paper are being printed.

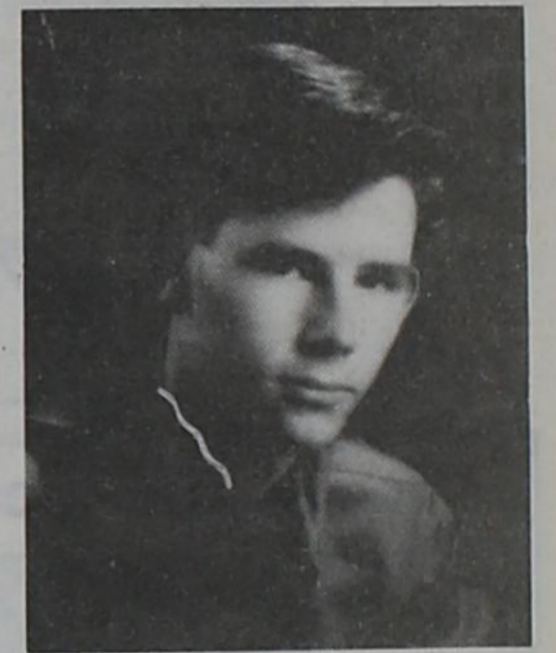

Construction management approach out

The Farwell School Board held a special meeting May 12 to discuss its building project.

The board met with John Cole, who it had hired at its April 20 meeting to be its construction manager if he was able to present lower bids than the general contractors.

Cole wasn't able to come in with a bid to be in the school board's ballpark and is no longer the construction manager for the project.

Instead, the board will discuss the project with Monterey Construction, of Wolf-forth, Texas, which was the low general construction bidder.

Here's the situation: The board wants to add classrooms at all three campuses plus build a new gym. It had around \$1.8 million available. Monterey's original bid came in at about \$2.3 million. The board is not looking right now at another bond issue to raise the extra funds. Rather, it wants to cut back on items that can be without cutting quality.

Those discussions will now be started with Monterey.

Will teachers be happy as records managers or librarians of computer programs

and videotapes instead of being instructors?

Will there be enough time for teachers to analyze the vast amount of material students generate at their computer terminals?

We'll see.

'Slightly premature'

Announcement of the 1993 - crop Upland Cotton Premium and Discount schedule by USDA May 5 was slightly premature according to Lubbock - based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).

Following the initial release of the loan schedule several mistakes were recognized by PCG and other industry officials. After calling these problems to the attention of USDA it was discovered that the wrong schedule had been released May 5. USDA officials say that growers need to be careful and check to make sure they are using the correct schedule that was released May 11.

"In order to make sure the correct premium and discount information is used, PCG is in the final stages of putting together a schedule of minimum loan rates for the various qualities of cotton," says Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "We are putting this together so that everyone will have the correct information to go by."

Problems that made the initial premiums and discount schedule inaccurate were isolated in color grades 52 and 62. It seems a few of the grade 52's in Leaf grades 1-2 and all the Leaf grade 3's were valued more than their grade 51 counterparts. Color grade 62's were also valued higher than grade 61's in all leaf grades except 5 and 6 which were correct.

"If the loan values you are using have the grade 62's worth more than the grade 61's then you are using the wrong loan schedule," says Johnson. "If this is the case please throw away the schedule you are using and get a copy of the corrected premium and discount schedule."

Texico Baptist Church adds minister

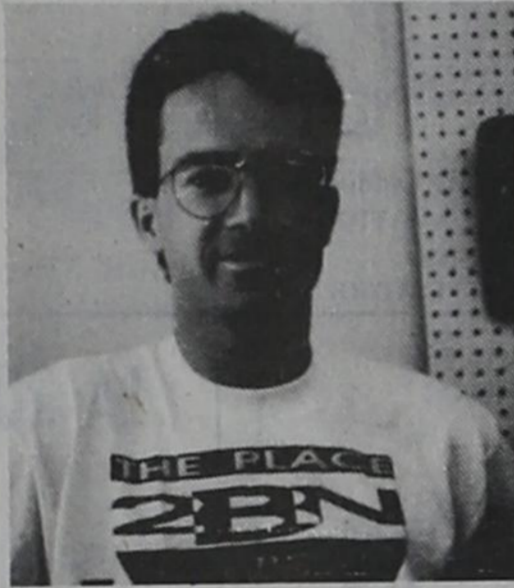
The First Baptist Church of Texico has a new Minister of Youth and Education, David Wallace.

Sunscreen SPF's: What do they really mean?

One of the most commonly asked questions about sun care products is "What do the SPF numbers really mean?" While the concept of sun protection factors (SPFs) may appear somewhat complex, there is a simply way to explain them.

Scientifically speaking, the sun protection factor is a ratio between the ultraviolet does required to produce the minimal erythema reaction (redness) in protected skin (skin with sunscreen) compared to unprotected skin (skin without sunscreen).

SPFs represent a relative length of protection, which is subject to a number of other variables, such as skin type and weather conditions. The SPF number is a multiplier that indicates how many times longer a person can stay in the sun before burning while searing sun protection than if he/she were not wearing any sunscreen at all. The higher the SPF, the longer a person can stay in the sun without burning.

Here's an example: If a fair-skinned person burns within 10 minutes without sun protection, this person can remain in the sun for 2 1/2 hours with an SPF 15 (10x15=150 minutes (2 1/2 hours); 5 hours with an SPF 30, 7 1/2 hours with an SPF 45, and so on. Thus, the difference between SPF 30 and 45 is the length of protection each provides for the same person, with 45 providing 2 1/2 more hours of protection than 30.

The same SPF numbers will provide a different length of protection for a person with a different skin type. For example, a darker-skinned person who burns after 15 minutes of unprotected exposure to the sun can remain in the sun for 3 3/4 hours with an SPF 15 (15x15=225 minutes (3 3/4 hours), etc.

Different skin types tolerate different amounts of sun before burning. Because the redness from a sunburn doesn't appear immediately, many people think it takes longer for them to burn than it actually does, and therefore don't always choose the proper SPF.

Also, a number of other factors influence the effects of the sun on the skin, including the ozone, geography and time of year.

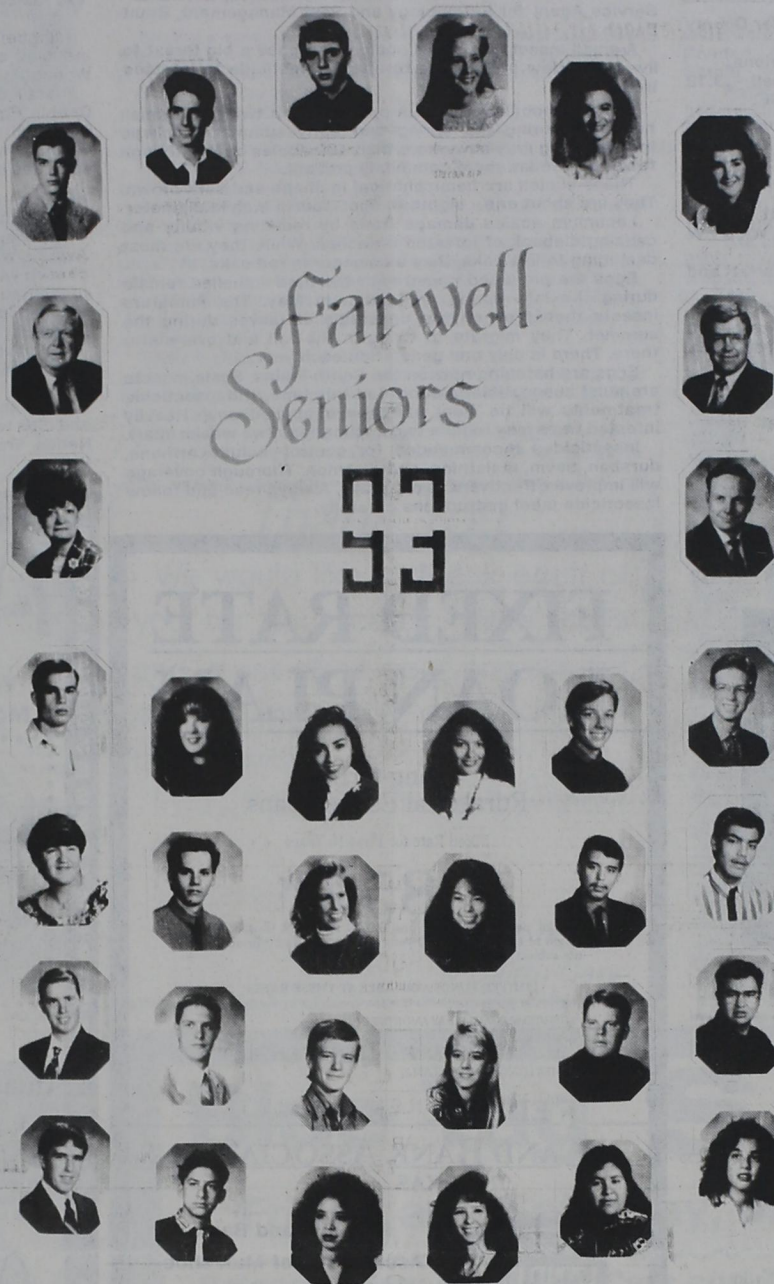

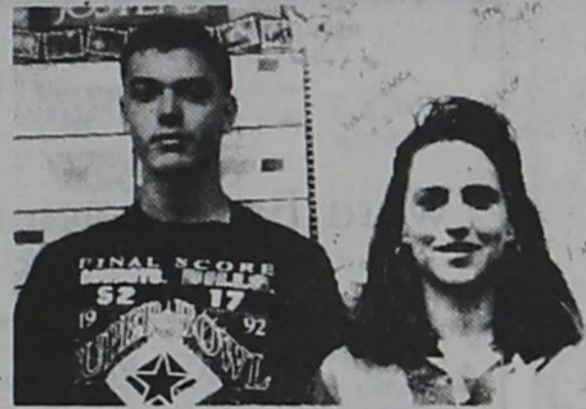

Beware of this small insect

This comes from Parmer County Agricultural Extension Service Agent for Entomology and Pest Management, Brant Baugh:

A small insect, Lecanium scales, can pose a big threat to live oaks. Now is the time to apply a pesticide to infested trees.

Lecanium scales are most prominent on twigs and small branches during the spring and early summer. A single infested twig may have more than 100 scales on it, although fewer scales are more commonly present.

These scales are hemispherical in shape and dark brown. They are about one-eighth to one-fourth inch in diameter. Lecanium scales damage trees by reducing vitality and causing dieback of infested branches. While they are most damaging to live oaks, they also occur in red oaks.

Eggs are produced underneath the hard-shelled female during the late spring and hatch in May. The immature insects then feed on the underside of leaves during the summer. They migrate to twigs in the fall and overwinter there. There is only one generation each year.

Eggs are hatching now on the South Plains. Scale insects are most susceptible to control at this time, and insecticide treatments will be most effective if applied now. Heavily infested trees may require two applications two weeks apart.

Insecticides recommended for control include orthene, dursban, sevin, malathion, and diazinon. Thorough coverage will improve effectiveness of sprays. Always read and follow insecticide label instructions carefully.
