## 'Sage of Southwest Texas' coming here

W.C. Newberry, the "Sage of Southwest Texas," will be the guest speaker at the Farwell Chamber of Commerce annual banquet March 27 at the Farwell Community Center.

Newberry has 20 years of speaking experience. He offers a relaxed style, a sense of humor and a dynamic message. He has spoken in 42 states while giving more than 1,500 speeches.

He has a doctorate in educational administration from the University of Texas. He was a football and baseball coach for 10 years and a public school administrator for three years. In other business, the Chamber:

So far, more than \$10,000 has been raised toward the monument cost, which is expected to be between \$12,000 and \$13,000. The memorial will be dedicated May 30, Memorial Day.

- Heard President Ralph Franse appoint a nominating committee of Ronald Byrd, Cloria Hutchins and Frances Kube to pick three new board members to serve 3-year terms. Fred Chandler, Anne Norton and Larry Cochran have their terms up this year.

- Scheduled the next meeting for March 23.

## Construction bids come in too high

The Farwell School Board opened bids Tuesday for its planned building program. But the bids came in higher than expected.

The board had sold a \$1.5 million bond issue, and figured it could go as high as \$1.8 million on the project - additions to the elementary, junior and senior high schools plus a new gym.

Four bids were opened. The lowest, from Monterey Construction, Wolfforth, Texas, was for \$2.3 million.

Nine companies had asked for the plans, but only four general contractors gave bids.

School Supt. Richard Boothby said the project engineers will meet with Monterey in an attempt to whittle down the total to something the school system can afford.

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# Texico to discuss law enforcement

Texico councilwoman Carolyn Burrows announced at Tuesday's City Council meeting that a Town Hall Meeting will be held at 6:30 p.m. mst March 2 at Texico City Hall to discuss law enforcement in the community.

Mrs. Burrows stressed that the meeting if receive positive information and not be a gripe session.

Currently, Texico has one city policeman, marshal Fry Urioste. Deputy marshal Kirk Roberts resigned two weeks ago. In the past 8 years since Micky Fenn served as marshal (in that post for 10-years), Texico had hired 10 police officers.

Mrs. Burrows has been talking with former Texico police officers and others involved in the court processes. Some of the points she raised were:

- Should Texico go back down to having only one police officer? That's difficult because one officer can only patrol 3 days and 2 nights, and that uses up his 40 hours. Also, since when an officer lives in a small community "he's never off duty."

- Should Texico hire a certified or a non-certified officer? If he's already certified, that means he is experienced. If he's non-certified, Texico must send him to a 10-week school; expenses are paid by the state but Texico must pay his salary and transportation. Also, there is no guarantee he will pass the school.

But Texico might find a person already living in the community who would be non-certified but more likely to stay living here. It's often a problem to get someone to move to Texico due to a lack of available housing.

- Specific goals are needed. Boredom is often a problem for police officers in a small community. Should the Texico police be involved in more drug education in the schools; or traffic control; or DWI control, to cite some examples.

Also speaking at the City Council meeting Tuesday was Ted Blair, who served as Bovina police chief for two years before resigning last year. He is interested in the Texico post.

Blair, of Clovis, suggested that the city test applicants to screen out those who are not knowledgeable in police work. He also pointed out that if the city hires a young, inexperienced person and get him certified, he's likely to leave soon for a better job elsewhere.

Also speaking to the council was Larry Garrison, of Clovis. He is a volunteer deputy there also interested in the Texico post. He said he is willing to sign a 5-year contract to work here, and he would move here. City Attorney Duane Hamar said such a contract was legal.

In other business, the council:

- Called an executive session to discuss a possible problem with the landfill road. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey reported there's a chance that the property owner, through which the landfill access road runs, might close it. But city clerk Marie Christian said state laws mandate access.

- Heard Autrey report he has taken 14 loads of scrap metal from the landfill to Lunsford's.

- Heard Mrs. Burrows report that Senate Bill 128 would allow cities to subsidize low income residents with their utility bills.

- Heard Mayor Doyal LaRue direct city employees to find out how much money Texico owes Farwell for using its dog pound in the past and to pay any past bills promptly.

The stray animal problem in the community was brought up again.

Urioste reported he had checked with Clovis about using their dog pound and they wanted \$50 per animal, plus the animal would be donated to the shelter.

## County may charge cities for lodging inmates in jail

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams discussed with the Parmer County Commissioners Monday his proposal to have the cities in the county pay fees when they lodge their inmates in the county jail.

Williams and County Attorney Charles Aycock are drawing up contracts, which would then be presented to the commissioners for approval.

Williams said Tuesday the commissioners looked favorably on the plan.

The sheriff explained that sometimes the cities in the county lodge persons their police departments charge in the county jail. This means that the county has to feed them, and also is liable for them in case of accident or illness.

Currently, the state pays the county about \$40 a day to lodge inmates here. But the cities in Parmer County haven't been charged

anything. Williams said it was only fair that the cities pay something toward this lodging.

Williams noted that new jail standards are being put into effect and smaller jails, like the one in Friona, may be forced to close next year.

The commissioners earlier this month gave Williams the go-ahead to have the county remove the concrete where the croquet court used to be north of the courthouse. It was in disrepair.

The area will be used for a vegetable garden to be taken care of by inmates. This will give them something to keep busy with, said the sheriff.

Currently the county jail is housing 8 inmates. Under state laws passed last year, county jails are being used more to house inmates who formerly were sent to state prison.

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It was an extremely informative, extremely important meeting for those who have children heading toward college.

The most important change in the college financial aid picture is that colleges now hold that parents are responsible for the cost of their children's education until the children are 23 years old. Students may take out loans and apply for credit cards which make the parent responsible for repayment when they are 18, but they are not considered responsible for their actions until they are 23 years old.

Parents who have been frugal, and who have saved for their child's education are penalized in the current financial market. The speaker advised the parents to spend any money saved in the child's name before filling out the financial aid packet.

Parents of college-bound students should hope that they have done a good job of raising responsible children. Because under current regulations these kids can endanger the parents' credit ratings.

## Conservation District supports using furrow dikes

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 encourages the use of furrow dikes to capture spring rainfall.

Installing furrow dikes to capture spring rainfall this year will be important to producers, since the 1993 pre-plant moisture survey showed only average soil moisture conditions.

"With the middle portion of the five - foot root zone profile as dry as it is, producers really need to maximize the use of rainfall this year," says Ken Carver, Water District assistant manager. "Furrow dikes are a cost-effective means of doing just that."

Furrow dikes are small earthen dams mechanically constructed in the furrow. During a precipitation event, the small basins between the earthen dams collect rainfall and hold it in place until it can soak into the soil.

Annual precipitation totals range from 18 to 20 inches across the Texas High Plains. Most of this precipitation occurs just prior to and during the summer growing season.

Jacque Sides presided over the meeting as president. Luisa Coronado, Tobe Diaz and Jade Mahaney led the opening ceremonies.

Stock show reports were given by Klay Camp, Amy Hartzog, Aaron Christian, Leesa Patterson, Clint Patterson, Tyler Chadwick, Brett Curtis, Melody Montgomery, Watson Langford and Sarah Montgomery.

Congratulations were given to Watson Langford showing the Grand Champion heifer at the El Paso Livestock Show.

During a 3-year study, researchers at the Texas A & M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock noted an average annual precipitation runoff of 2.73 inches per acre.

Furrow dikes hold this free moisture in place, allowing it to soak into the soil. For each additional inch of water provided beyond the basic requirements needed for plant development, cotton lint yields can increase as much as 30 pounds per acre, while grain sorghum yields can increase up to 350 pounds per acre.

"Furrow dikes are very cost-effective. While initial equipment investment range from \$140 to \$300 per row, this cost can usually be recovered during the first year as a result of increased crop yields and reduced irrigation pumping costs," said Carver.

## Rucker takes 2nd in Texas

Bin busting yields despite a weather - delayed harvest across much of the country helped Rusty Rucker of Rucker Farms, Inc. capture second place in the Ridge - Till Irrigated division of the

Rucker applied atrazine pre-plant incorporated at 3.00 pounds per acre to control weeds.

1992 National Corn Growers Association National Corn Yield Contest in Texas.

Rucker posted a yield of 216.97 bushels per acre with Pioneer hybrid 3162. The contest included 2,470 harvested entries from 44 states, up from 2,262 last year. It represents the largest number of entries ever in the 28-year-old contest.

Rucker's entry was planted in a field that had raised wheat in 1991. It was planted April 14 in 40-inch rows using a Buffalo 4500 planter at a rate of 31,000 seeds per acre. The crop was watered with furrow irrigation, and harvested Sept. 24 at 25.10% moisture.

Rucker applied about 250 pounds of nitrogen, 60 pounds of phosphate and 15 pounds of potash per acre. He also applied 15 pounds of sulphur per acre.
