Basketball has been lots of fun

Congratulations to the Farwell and Lazbuddie varsity boys' basketball teams on earning berths in the state playoffs.

Lazbuddie came in second to state-ranked Nazareth, while Farwell earned a co-championship with Sudan.

And I'm optimistic that the Texico varsity teams will do well in district playoffs. Although their records aren't spectacular, they have had good seasons.

A lot of folks here are probably pleasantly surprised by how much the Steers improved this year. At one point, their record was 8-11. Then they ran off 9 straight wins in district before falling to Sudan Friday. Thus, they ended the regular season with an excellent 17-12 mark - and a district title.

The Steers are an example of a team that had to literally find itself. They started the season with a good big man in Kade Kent, at center. Then it became a matter of the team meshing with him.

This was achieved when Eric Delgado and Ryan Williams began driving the lane, making good penetration and either taking a short shot or dumping the ball off to Kent or to forward Derrick Haseloff.

They say, in basketball, that for a team to be a winner you must have a strong point guard. And Farwell has a good pair, in Delgado and Williams.

The improvement they have shown has helped others. The end result: a winning attitude and a winning season.

Another key reason for the Steers' success can be found in the defensive pressure they put on other teams. Brent Harrison is a human dynamo on defense.

If you had seen that great comeback against Vega, when Farwell erased a 17-point deficit in the final 4 1/2 minutes, you would have watched a team that wouldn't quit.

For the majority of those last few minutes, Vega couldn't get the ball past half court because of the pressuring tactics by Farwell. That sure was fun to see.

And what this really shows is important to all athletes. Just because you start a season off on a losing note doesn't mean things won't change. If you work at your game, and can come up with a plan that works well for your type of team, success can occur.

The keys are simple:  
- Don't quit; keep hustling.  
- Remember, there is no "I" in "team."  
- Have a coach that adapts a game plan to the type of

Soil moisture data revealed

Parmer County producers need 4 to 10 inches of water for precipitation and / or irrigation to bring the 5-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before 1993 spring planting, according to soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Soil Conservation Service.

"The soil moisture sites in the northern portion of the District, including Parmer County, were read in mid-November. The soil moisture deficits may not be as much due to snow, rain, and ice that have fallen since the survey was completed," says W. E. Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

Crenwelge adds that there are several factors accounting for the moisture deficits in the 3 or 4 foot layers of the soil profile.

"Excellent pre-plant soil moisture conditions reduced the need for irrigation during the 1992 growing season. The crop roots extracted moisture from the 3- and 4-foot soil layers as they normally would. The fall season was drier than normal, and as a result, the soil moisture in these layers was not replenished," he says.

Soil moisture conditions were surveyed from Nov. 18 to Jan. 15 at 282 sites throughout the Water District. Readings were taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently installed aluminum access tube at each site. These sites are chosen based upon the soil type, crop(s) produced, and the saturated thicknesses of the Ogallala Formation, which influences water well yields. Each soil moisture monitoring site represents typical field conditions in the area.

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the 5-foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at planting.

Any precipitation received now and the start of the planting will improve soil moisture conditions and influence prospective crop yields.

Copies of the regional or Parmer County soil moisture survey maps are available by contacting High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, 2930 Ave. Q, Lubbock, Texas 79405-1499 or by calling (806) 762-0181.

A pre-plant irrigation or additional precipitation will be needed to bring the 5-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before planting within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, according to data collected during the annual joint Water District / US Department of Agriculture - Soil conservation Service (USDA-SCS) pre-plant soil moisture survey.

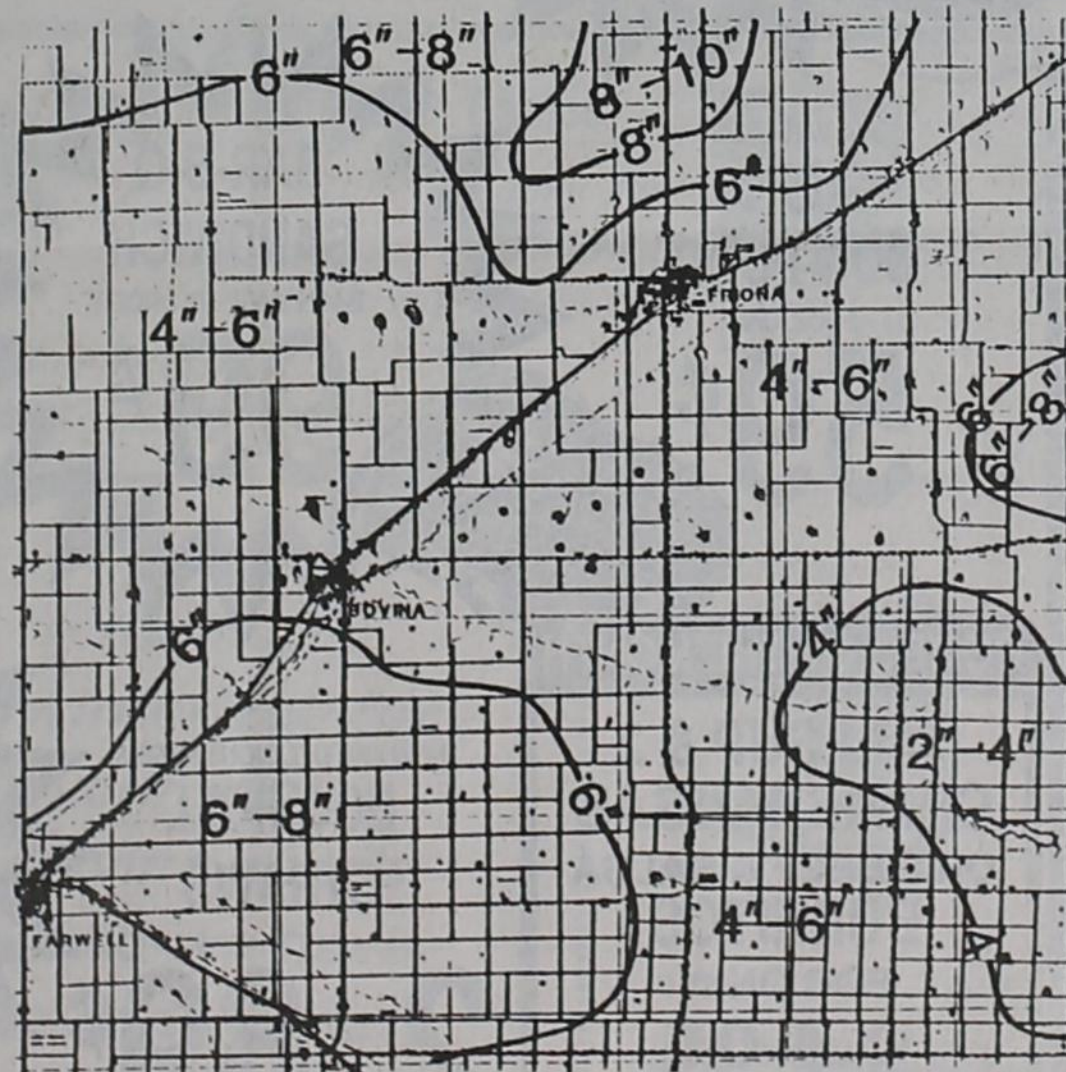
"Our data indicates average soil moisture conditions throughout the Water District's 15-county service area. The 5-foot root zone soil profile is not as wet as it was in 1992 nor as dry as it has been in some prior years," said Crenwelge.

According to maps that accompanied this report, the area around Farwell needs about 6-8" of moisture to wet the top 5 feet of soil to bring it to field capacity.

The map shows the area around Lazbuddie as needing about 4 inches of moisture to bring the top five feet to field capacity. The Bovina area needs 4-6" of moisture. West Camp and Muleshoe need about 4-6" of moisture.

Another map shows that soil in the Farwell area needs 2-4" of moisture to bring the top five feet of soil to the proper

Farwell police post still open

The city of Farwell doesn't have a police officer yet - but it does have a police car.

Last Friday, the City Council had a special meeting to interview candidates for the city police post, which is being established. Three applicants had been asked to come.

Only one showed. One man already taken another job and one man had changed his mind. So the council interviewed the one man who attended.

But Mayor Chris Gikas said at Tuesday's city council meeting that he had talked with that man "and he asked that his application be withdrawn."

Gikas noted that two police schools recently graduated students and Farwell might want to contact them. Also, the council's police search committee will go over the applications again.

And City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen said a man from Lamb County is coming to Farwell to fill out an application.

Meanwhile, the council received only one bid for a police car, from Friona Motors for \$13,876. The bid was accepted and the vehicle, a Ford Taurus, will be delivered in 8 to 12 weeks.

In other business, the council:

- Approved an emergency override system with TCA Cable which would allow for special messages to be given in case of disaster.

- Approved three building permits: a storage building at 105 Sandia for Tom Beekman; a storage building for Kerry Ford at 9th and Ave. E; and a ready-built home at 109 8th St. for Robert Vidaurri.

- Heard Richard and Pam Carpenter say they want to move a house to 909 6th St. and live in it for a couple of years while they have a house built there. The neighbors will be polled.

- Agreed to take sealed bids, with a \$1,700 minimum, to sell some vacant lots near 7th St. and Ave. B. The council was told Jack Landrum was interested in buying the 3 lots. Taxes, court costs, etc., are owed on them.

- Ordered the city election for May 1.

- Heard a report that concrete will be poured in the closed alley behind Heritage Square Garden Homes.

- Discussed salary raises for city employees. This was put off until September because the council is concerned about a lack of funds. Utility rates may be raised at that time.

- Was told that the piano at the Farwell Community Center was tuned for \$60, and needs at least two more re-tunings, at \$45 each, within a year.

The council voted 3-2 to charge groups that use the piano \$22.50. In favor were Pat Howard, Royce Bethel and James Chadwick. Opposed were Martin Kube and John Carlson; they wanted a smaller fee.

- Noted that Farwell didn't want to accept strays from Texico in its dog pound because in the past Texico employees put strays in the Farwell pound without notice and thus didn't pay the fees agreed upon.

- Discussed getting concrete and dirt to fill up the former city landfill, which must be filled. Chadwick suggested concrete at a Clovis business was available if the city could truck it, and dirt was available at another Clovis business. Also, dirt will be taken from where the new Farwell gym is being built.

The more the landfill can be filled with free material, the cheaper it will be to completely close the ex-landfill to government specifications.

- Was told that the sheriff's office wanted the croquet court near the courthouse removed and the site used for a garden to be tended by inmates.

Election filing period opens

The filing period for local elections opened on Feb. 15, and will extend until March 17.

In our area, Farwell City Council, Farwell School Board, Lazbuddie School Board, and Farwell Hospital District positions will be on the ballot May 1.

Those interested in filing for the City Council may file at Farwell City Hall. Those candidates interested in school positions should file at the school administration buildings, and those interested in the Farwell Hospital District may file at the District Clerk's office in the Parmer County Courthouse.

There will be three Farwell City Council positions on the ballot; they are currently held by mayor Chris Gikas and city councilmen John Carlson and Royce Bethel.

Gikas said he had not decided if he should run or not. Carlson said he supposed he would seek re-election.

There are three positions up for election on the Lazbuddie School Board - currently held by Robert Gallman, Lloyd Bradshaw, and Tommy Sinclair.

Sinclair indicated that he would run.

Bradshaw hadn't decided yet.

Five positions will be on the ballot for the Farwell Hospital District. Martha Curtis' seat is vacant since she moved to Ruidoso, N.M.

Three of the four incumbents said they intended to run again - Rick Sullivan, Jack Allen Kirkland, and Jerry Monk. Jimmie Mace said he wasn't sure yet.

Insurance bids explained

Editor's note: There were questions raised as to the exact amounts included in the insurance bids received in January by the city of Farwell. So the Tribune is presenting the totals.

At its regular meeting in January, the Farwell City Council was to open bids for liability insurance.

But a representative of TML Insurance attended the meeting and also presented a bid for worker's compensation insurance. This is normally sought each fall by the council.

The TML agent asked the council to award both bids - liability and worker's comp. So the council asked representatives of Town & Country Insurance, Farwell, and Henry Insurance, Muleshoe, (who carried the city's insurance last year), to come back in one week with bids for worker's comp, too.

At a special meeting the following week, the council received a letter from Henry, declining to bid. Town & Country and TML presented bids in both insurance categories.

The council had the option of awarding both bids to one company, or splitting the awards between the two companies. The council chose to award both bids to TML, the low bidder in both categories.

Town & Country presented two bids:

- The one for general liability (property, vehicles, police, public officials) was for \$11,934.

- The one for worker's compensation was \$10,947.

TML presented two bids, also.

It should be noted that TML's general liability bid included some different insurance limits because TML didn't bid according to the advertised specs. Town & Country followed the advertised specs.

Also, TML, which is a legitimate, fully approved firm, doesn't have to follow the same guidelines for bidding worker's compensation because it isn't a state-regulated insurance company like Town & Country is. Thus, TML can bid much lower on worker's compensation than companies like Town & Country can.

TML also had two bids:

- The one for general liability was \$11,490.

- The one for worker's compensation was \$4,843.

Thus, if the council had chosen to accept Town & Country's bid for liability insurance, it would have taken the higher bid - by \$444.

If the council had chosen to accept both of Town & Country's bids, it would have taken the higher bids - by \$6,104.

Also, TML's general liability insurance total was contingent on both of its bids being accepted. This means that if Farwell had just accepted TML's liability insurance bid, that total would have been higher. An exact figure wasn't given but it was inferred it would be higher than Town & Country's.

If just TML's worker's compensation insurance bid was accepted by Farwell, that total would stay the same - \$4,843.

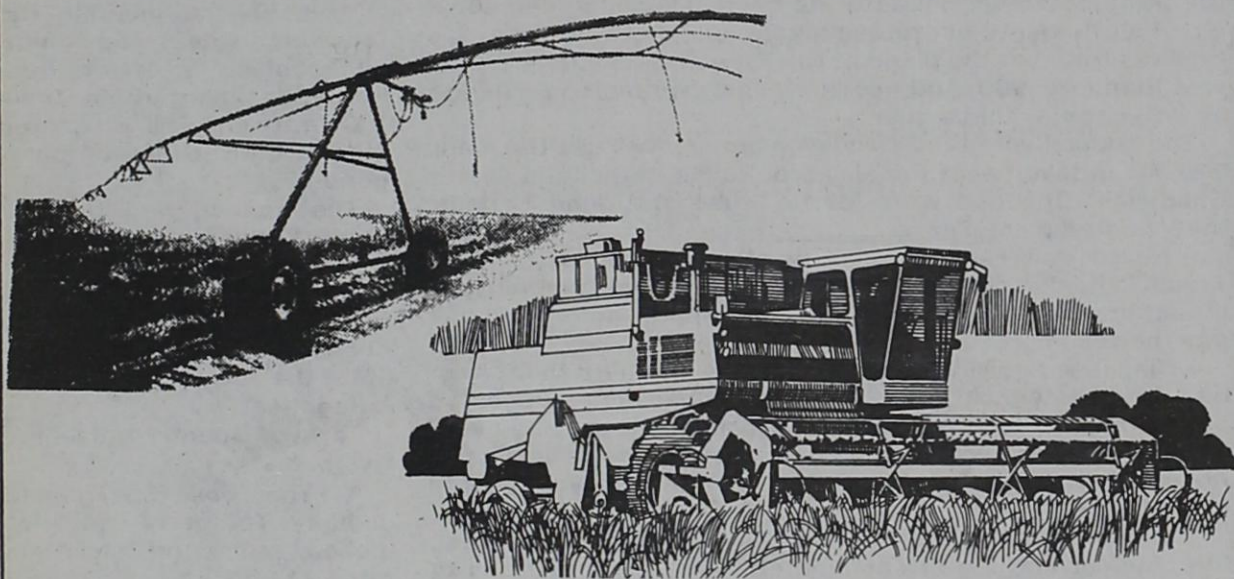
moisture level for planting. The map shows the Lariat area needing only 2-0" of moisture.

According to this map, the Bovina area needs 4-6" of moisture for the top five feet of soil, and the Lazbuddie area needs 6-8" of moisture on the top five feet of soil.

Crenwelge said producers should note that there is a good probability that precipitation events in April and May will reduce some of the soil moisture deficits.

The Water Management Note, Estimating Soil Moisture Conditions By Feel and Appearance can help producers gauge soil moisture conditions. The publication is available free to residents of the Water District.

# Tiller, Trull re-elected to 5 Area Co-op board

Two incumbents were re-elected to the Five Area Telephone Cooperative Board at its annual meeting Saturday - Billy Tiller of the Bula Exchange, and Ernest Trull of the Lehman Exchange. And one new member, Joe Sowder of the Maple Exchange, was elected to replace Bob Foley.

Foley retired after serving 12 years on the board, including two years as president, and several years as secretary/treasurer.

Following the election of directors, General Manager Hubert Kidd discussed the financial report which had been distributed to the membership, and the positive impact of the Five Area Telephone Cooperative on the local economy.

Kidd discussed improvements in the company. A new fiber optic toll route line has been installed to Lubbock. He explained that the telephone cooperative is no longer using microwave towers to relay telephone messages; they are using cables instead.

"The technology changes overnight," said Kidd. So do the government regulations that apply to the technology. "We spent more than our share of time in Austin getting ready for the State Legislature," he said.

Kidd discussed the technology of cellular telephones, and the way that Five Area works in conjunction with several other telephone cooperatives to provide cellular service to those who want it. "There have been 10,000 cellular customers in the South Plains in the past three years," said Kidd.

He also talked about the ongoing construction involved in replacing old telephone cables for regular telephone

subscribers. And, he also talked about the ongoing process of upgrading computer equipment.

A few years back the local telephone cooperatives had discussed the option of getting involved in the cable television business. Kidd said Five Area had "elected not to go into TV right now. It's kind of gambling right now."

Kidd explained that while the cooperative had carefully investigated the idea of providing television service to rural areas, telephone and television companies operate under very different regulations. He said, "I suggest you buy a satellite dish and don't wait for us to put a cable to your house right now."
