Texico cleanup chairman Ronnie Warmurth was very happy with the results of Saturday's big cleanup.



## Texico looks at major water rate hike

It was a downbeat Texico City Council meeting Tuesday as city employee Matt Meeks reported on the water situation.

Due to the federal Safe Drinking Act, which goes into effect July 1, 1993, and the need to replace some water mains, the council is looking at raising the water rates. Currently, the average rate is \$14.28 a month. This may jump to the \$21 or \$22 a month range.

Also, the city has received a letter from the state's Environmental Improvement Division urging that the city raise its sewer rates because it needs to increase its contingency fund for the sewer plant. Currently, the rate is \$4 a month.

Meeks first discussed the new federal mandate. It includes city workers going into 20 homes each 6 months to check homeowners' water, looking for lead and copper levels in particular, along with a lot of other chemicals. Homes built in the 1980s will be targeted, when copper piping was used.

Meeks also told about old cast iron water main along the highway that needs replacing, from near Lamar Street west. He anticipated that the entire project, based on today's costs and built over 5 years, would be between \$60,000 and \$70,000. The need for this new main ties in with the Safe Drinking Act guidelines. He noted that the state offers loans, with very little possibility of a grant for this. But the council indicated a preference to raise the funds itself, especially after it was said that if a loan is gained, and the city has trouble repaying it, the state would have the authority to raise the city's water rates. # **Credit** asked

Texas retail customers of SPS should see a credit in an upcoming electric bill.

SPS has filed with the state Public Utility Commission to credit about \$10.1 million to its Texas retail customers for savings in fuel costs and related interest. The proposed credit includes \$9.1 million in actual fuel savings and almost \$1 million in interest, baed on an annual rate of 11.7 percent.

A Texas residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month would get a one-time credit of \$15.94.

"We expect commission approval in time to apply the credit to customers' December bills," said Gerald Diller, SPS group manager of rates and regulation. The credit would cover fuel expenses from July 1191 through August 1992.


## Handicapped cards changed



#### Tina Hartmann

When asked for first impressions of the United States, Tina Hartmann, expressed how surprised she was during the part of her flight from Dallas to Lubbock to see the ground from the air much of the way. The cloudless west Texas skies allowed her to see the pattern of straight highways, treeless plains and large farms that are so unlike her homeland, Germany.

Tina Hartmann is Texico High School's foreign exchange student from Kreuztal, Germany. She is staying with Mr. and Mrs. Waylan Thomas while she is here.

Tina's home is located between Frankfurt and Cologne, in a very hilly area. She lives in one of the rather new communities on the edge of the town. She guessed that her home is probably about 10 years old. Many of the people in her town work for the Hoesch corporation which has two factories nearby.

Tina's father, Wolfran Hartmann, is a pediatrician, and her mother, Gizela Hartmann, is a clerk. Tina has one younger sister, Silke.

Before she made the trip to the United States, Tina read a lot about the country. For instance, she knew that she would be expected to drink tap water instead of mineral water here. And, she knew that, "the bread here wasn't very good." In Germany there are many bakeries.

She has learned to enjoy Mexican food, a new taste treat for her.

"In Germany we don't eat in restaurants very much," she said. Tina says that her family eats a lunch together each day. Then they have cold sandwiches for supper.

Some of the larger cities have American fast food restaurants like McDonalds, Burger King, and Pizza Hut. There are also restaurants that sell local specialties. Tina misses some of the regional specialties from her area. She mentioned: dark breads, sauerbraten, reibekuken (a bread) and backel.

Tina also misses the bells of the church in her town. "The bells ring every hour. Sometimes people can't sleep because of them, but when I hear them I know I'm at home," she says.

"I don't mean that I don't like it here, but I also miss my area at home - especially the forests and hills," she said.

New friends have helped to make Tina's visit here fun. Her host family, Mr. and Mrs. Wayland Thomas, hosted a

birthday party for Tina on Sept. 1. One of her classmates sent her balloons with a Snickers bar attached in honor of the occasion.

According to one of Tina's teachers, Kendale Burch, "Tina is a neat, neat kid." During the first week of school Tina was one of the winners of the Unique book cover contest in Mrs. Burch's class. Tina designed a book cover for her American government book that says, "I'm Barely American," and it is covered with teddy bear designs. The other winner of the contest was Barbara Autrey.

While Tina is here in Texico, she hopes to take some English- style riding lessons. She has taken seven years of riding lessons back home. Tina's hobbies also include playing piano, reading, and dancing.

"We do dances like the waltz, and the fox trot and Latin American dances and some funky dances, too." She was surprised that some of her friends in Texico don't dance much.


Farwell lost a fumble at its 12. Sudan scored from the 4. The kick made it 58- 6 at 2:51.


