Texico cleanup chairman Ronnie Warmurth was very happy with the results of Saturday's big cleanup.

Texico looks at major water rate hike

It was a downbeat Texico City Council meeting Tuesday as city employee Matt Meeks reported on the water situation.

Due to the federal Safe Drinking Act, which goes into effect July 1, 1993, and the need to replace some water mains, the council is looking at raising the water rates. Currently, the average rate is \$14.28 a month. This may jump to the \$21 or \$22 a month range.

Also, the city has received a letter from the state's Environmental Improvement Division urging that the city raise its sewer rates because it needs to increase its contingency fund for the sewer plant. Currently, the rate is \$4 a month.

Meeks first discussed the new federal mandate. It includes city workers going into 20 homes each 6 months to check homeowners' water, looking for lead and copper levels in particular, along with a lot of other chemicals. Homes built in the 1980s will be targeted, when copper piping was used.

Meeks also told about old cast iron water main along the highway that needs replacing, from near Lamar Street west. He anticipated that the entire project, based on today's costs and built over 5 years, would be between \$60,000 and \$70,000. The need for this new main ties in with the Safe Drinking Act guidelines.

He noted that the state offers loans, with very little possibility of a grant for this. But the council indicated a preference to raise the funds itself, especially after it was said that if a loan is gained, and the city has trouble repaying it, the state would have the authority to raise the city's water rates.

Discussion will continue at the next meeting.

In other business, the council:

- Heard deputy marshal Kirk Roberts, chairman of the Texico Community Activities Organization, present plans for a metal building to house a community center, including a senior citizens center (which increases the hope of getting a state grant).

- The building, which would be constructed on city property across from KKR Park if a grant is received, would have two floors. One above ground would be 100 ft. by 100 ft.; the one below ground would be 100 ft. by 50 feet. The plans were drawn by Texico student Brandon Schauf.

- Application for the grant will be made in December or January.

- Approved a quit claim turning over Avenue F, east of

Lazbuddie to stay with 6-man football

Lazbuddie School Board members were informed Tuesday that Lazbuddie will continue to play 6-Man football for at least the next year or two.

Supt. Phil Warren reported that Lazbuddie has an enrollment of 246 students. Most of these students are enrolled in elementary school.

UIL policy changes have set 79 as the maximum total high school enrollment for schools that play 6-Man football during the 1994-95 school year. Warren explained that current enrollment figures show that Lazbuddie will qualify to play 6-

County trash is topic

The Parmer County Commissioners last Friday discussed the problem of unauthorized trash being placed in the Friona dumpster.

Commissioner Ernest Anthony is in charge of this county dumpster.

The dumpster has a fence and gate. A building to house an employee will be constructed and \$5 a load charged for trash brought there.

Anthony will decide later what days to keep the dump site open.

The commissioners also discussed the Bovina dump site but no action was taken here because it wasn't having the same problem that Friona was having.

Commissioner Tom Ware is in charge of this county dumpster.

In other business, Porter Roberts was named temporary county judge Oct. 12-16 while County Judge Bonnie Clayton was attending a seminar with the county commissioners. That's why the commissioners' meeting was held early.

Credit asked

Texas retail customers of SPS should see a credit in an upcoming electric bill.

SPS has filed with the state Public Utility Commission to credit about \$10.1 million to its Texas retail customers for savings in fuel costs and related interest. The proposed credit includes \$9.1 million in actual fuel savings and almost \$1 million in interest, based on an annual rate of 11.7 percent.

A Texas residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month would get a one-time credit of \$15.94.

"We expect commission approval in time to apply the credit to customers' December bills," said Gerald Diller, SPS group manager of rates and regulation. The credit would cover fuel expenses from July 1191 through August 1992.

Handicapped cards changed

Parmer County tax assessor - collector Doris Herrington said Texas has approved new handicapped cards for motorists.

The current cards being used will be invalid after Dec. 31.

Persons can get the new cards by exchanging their old cards at the assessor's office in the Parmer County Courthouse.

South Garwood, to Steve Meeks.

- Heard Mayor Doyal LaRue commend Ronnie Warmuth for his fine job directing Saturday's city cleanup.

- Heard councilwoman Carolyn Burrows report on conversations she heard with county commissioner Paul Dee Barnes.


Barnes told her that College Street from the highway to Avenue F is slated to be resurfaced by the county next year - if it's not on the city's work list. So the council voted to remove that segment from any future city plans, thus making sure it's considered a county road.

Barnes also said the problem of standing water north of Texico on the Pleasant Hill highway will be attacked. The county plans to reopen a culvert there and push runoff water into a ditch onto the Paul Skaggs property - which he has agreed to. The Texico and Pleasant Hill fire departments will help clean the culvert.

- Talked about putting a sign at the city's western limits, but pointed out it's not known there the limit is. Some say 1/10 of a mile past the Port of Entry, others say Max Martin's road, others say past the trailers. LaRue said the limit needs to be ascertained.

- Heard that tree limb burning is only allowed on a person's property after they get a permit from the EID and tell City Hall. Yard residue can be burned, not garbage. It cannot be burned in the alleys - city property. It is urged that homeowners haul such residue to the city landfill rather than burn it.

- Agreed to publish notice that it will decide at its next meeting on a recommendation from city marshal Fry Urioste to change the blood alcohol content for determining DWI from .10 to .08, which is what Clovis recently did.

FLBA reduces rates

An 8.50 percent on existing and variable rate loans became effective Oct. 1, reported the Federal Land Bank Association.

"The favorable interest rate climate and the FLBA's strong performance this year combined to make the reduction possible," said Michael Davis, president of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas.

Interest rates for new fixed rate loans of 3, 5, 10 and 15 years will also fall later this month. Also, a new 7-year fixed rate loan is scheduled

for introduction this fall.

The FLBAs have also announced new fixed rate financing for rural property improvements. Under this program, borrowers can finance such things as home construction and remodeling; fencing; pasture improvement; land clearing; irrigation and sprinkler systems; and repair of livestock, poultry and fish-producing facilities.

"Many rural property owners have told us they have put off making improvements to their property due to lack of affordable financing," said Davis. "We hope this new program will encourage the enhancement and development of rural estate."



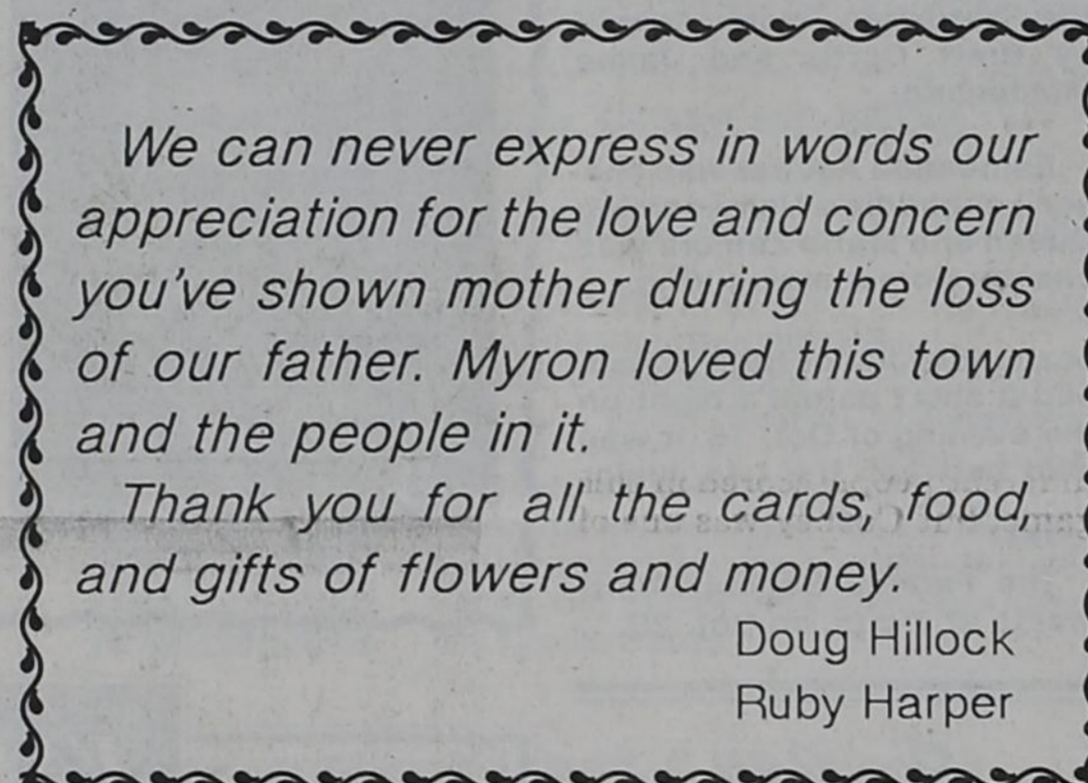

Nash Armstrong quarterbacked for the Steers in the second half after Williams was injured late in the first half.



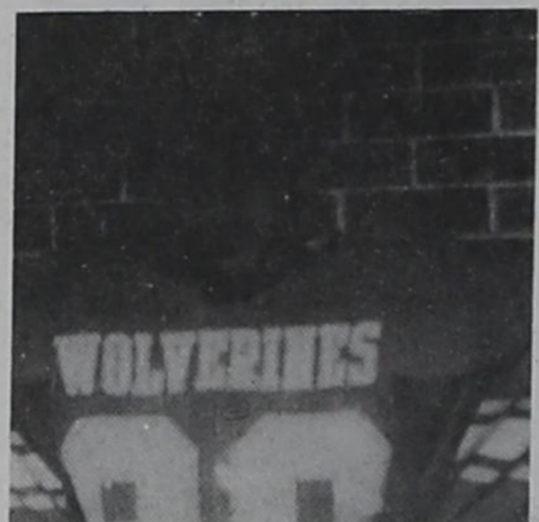

Hagerman executed an onside kick, recovering on the Texico 37. But the Wolverine defense held strong.

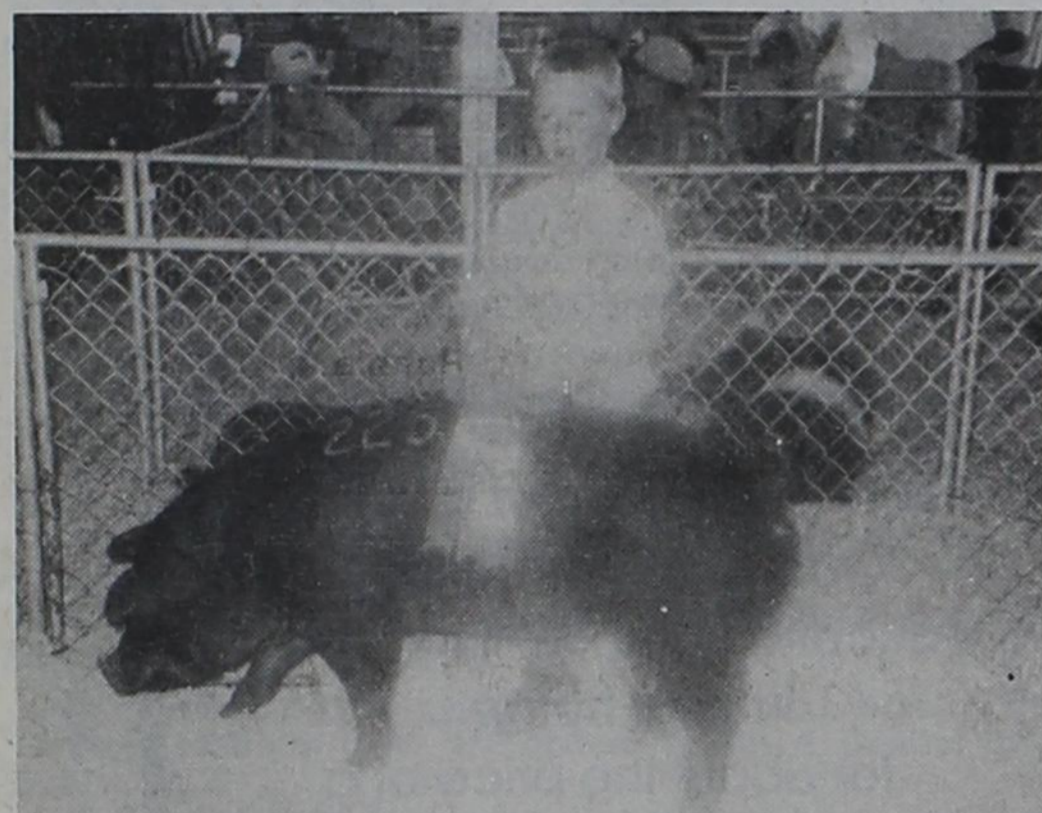

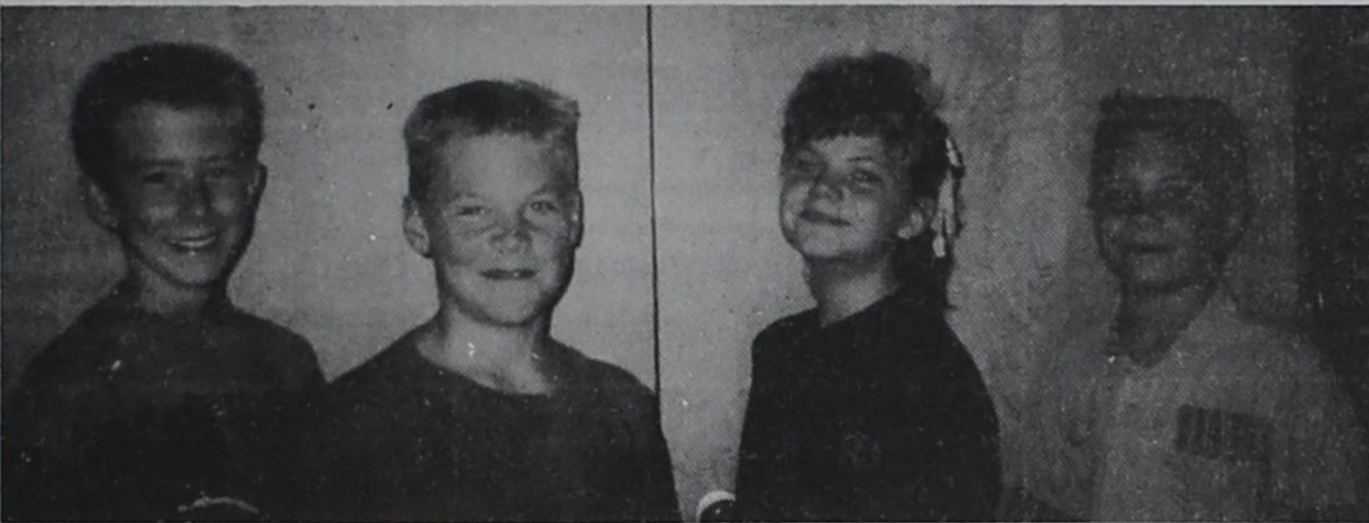

Born Sept. 17, 1920 in Peoria, Ill., he was a lieutenant colonel in the Marine Corps during World War II. He married Jo Ann Miller in Missouri in 1941. They moved to Farwell in 1948.

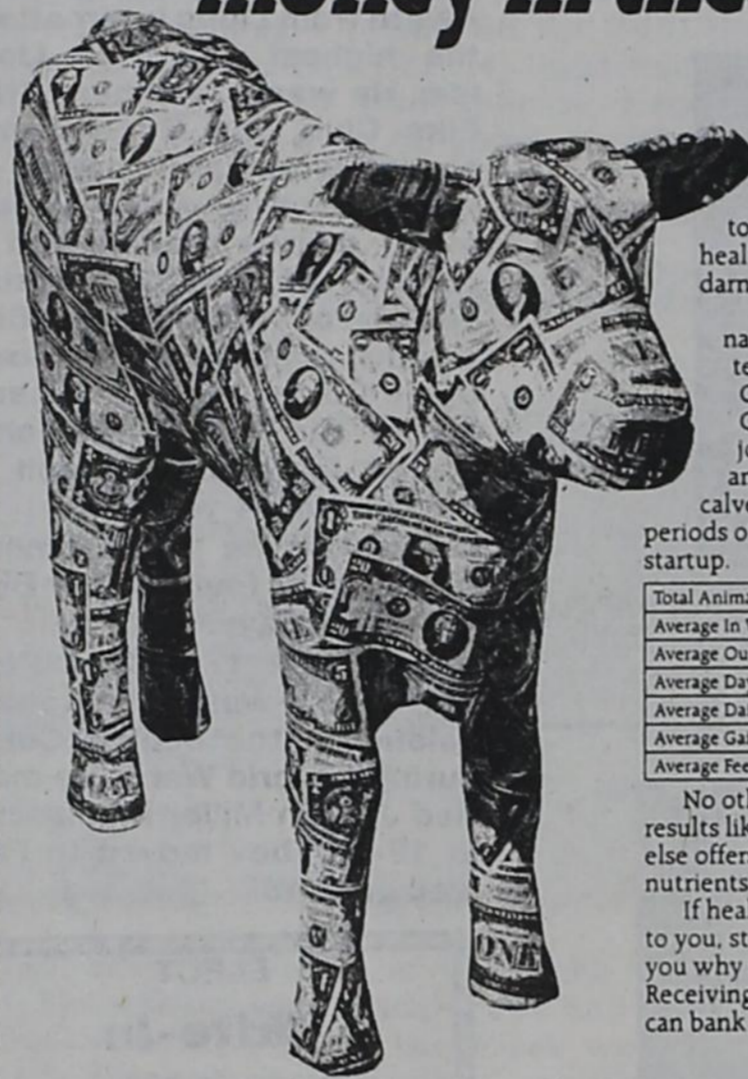


