Dangerous gas leak controlled

The Farwell Fire Department was called out to the First Baptist Church Saturday evening to help with a gas leak.

Pastor Rick Sullivan reports that Mrs. Sullivan had heard some strange noises from the furnace in the parsonage at about 7 Saturday evening. When the pastor went to check on the noises, he discovered that pressure had been causing gas to leak out into the furnace room.

When the furnace went on, the gas ignited and Sullivan reports seeing flames shoot out into the room. Their son, Marcus, grabbed a fire extinguisher to extinguish the flames. The Sullivans then called the fire department so that they could check the ceiling to see if any of the flames might have set something in the attic aflame.

Larry Cochran of Southern Union Gas checked all of the gas lines in the church, the parsonage, the classrooms, and the fellowship hall. Cochran found gas had leaked out of every one of the furnaces.

Sullivan guessed that if the fellowship hall, "had filled up with gas and then blown up, it probably would have taken several blocks out." It would certainly have blown up the whole church complex.

According to Sullivan, firefighter Lee Hutchins stayed behind all night to completely rebuild the parsonage furnace, and Ricky Stewart replaced all of the thermo-couplers.

Texico raises utility rates

The Texico City Council Tuesday raising its water and sewer rates. The changes are:

- The rate increases from \$11 a month to \$14.75 a month for the first 4,000 gallons of water used by city residents. Persons outside the city, but on city lines, have their rates increased from \$15.30 to \$19.05
- The next 2,000 gallons used in a month (after the first 4,000 gallons) will cost \$1.65 per 1,000, up from \$1.15 per 1,000.
- The next 1,000 gallons (after 6,000 gallons) will cost \$1.25 per 1,000, up from 75 cents per 1,000.
- Each household will pay 35 cents more per month for sewer fee.

The council voted 4-1, with Butch Sharp opposed, to raise the rates. The new rates likely will be reflected on the utility bills going out at the end of February since the new rates don't go into effect until after they are put into ordinance form and published. This will take a few weeks.

The new rate structure was recommended by city water department employees. Their original suggestion called for boosting the \$11 monthly fee to \$18.50, and from \$15.30 to \$22.80 for persons outside the city.

But employee Matt Meeks reported that a lot of the federal mandates under the Safe Drinking Act won't have to go into effect until 1994. So the council decided to halve the two recommended rates. But it's likely another rate hike will be needed next week, probably close to the original recommendation by the city employees.

The money to be raised will go for: a new water line under the highway through the city; repairs; meeting new federal mandates (\$22,000 annually) and to begin a sewer contingency fund. It was noted that because the water rate is below \$18.50 a month (for the first 4,000 gallons), the city loses points when it seeks state grants involving utilities.

In other business, the council:

- Heard a report from Meeks on an Environmental Division meeting he attended. He said new mandates call for less testing for chemicals in the water than first ordered.
- Called an executive session to discuss land acquisition and personnel matters. The executive session involved the city police officers and Lewis and Ann Cooper.
- Voted to write a letter of complaint to the Santa Fe Railroad about trains more frequently stopping at the crossings and for longer periods. Sometimes, all four city crossings are blocked.
- Deputy Marshal Kirk Roberts said the law says trains must move after 15 minutes. He twice has warned engineers to do so and they have complied, he said. The problem is all the train has to do to comply is move a foot or so.
- It was said the trainmen like to stop at the Town & Country store.

- Discussed the Burris - Montano sewer line, now in its fifth year as a topic. The problem is the sewer line is too small - 4 inches. City Attorney Duane Hamar said since it's on private property, the city legally can't improve it and it's up to the property owners to solve.

- Rezoned the area where the former Westerner Motel is from commercial and multi-family to single family zoning. City Clerk Treasurer Marie Christian said she sent out 38 letters and got 14 responses - 10 supporting the rezoning and 4 against.

- Discussed a proposal to let city police give field sobriety tests. Hamar will check into this more.

- Heard Roberts and City Marshal Fry Urioste blast the Regional Task Force, an anti-drug unit of which Texico is a member. In a nutshell, the officers said the task force gives them zero help.

It costs Texico \$342 a year to participate and the matter was tabled until Texico gets more assurance that some help will be given its officers.

Roberts said the task force won't let Texico use its equipment and won't help in any way except to take the city's money. Complaints have been made but all Texico gets is "a pat on the head."

The Task Force is directed by an officer appointed by the state. In this area, the lead agency is the Clovis City Police. It involves Tucumcari, Portales, and Curry County.

- Discussed a citizen's complaint that you have to go through the state to get a city building permit, which is very complicated and lengthy. Texico will again check with Clovis about using Clovis building inspectors. This was discussed last year but put on hold.

Government closings don't include us

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is considering plans to close 1,200 of its 7,405 field offices nationwide, but folks contacted here believe that it shouldn't affect this area very much.

Parmer County ASCS director Kurt Miller said the office in Farwell is not one of the 78 offices slated to be closed in Texas by USDA.

FM 145 to be improved

State highway department engineer Rhea Bradley, of Littlefield, has given the Tribune an update on the 4-laning of the Amarillo highway between Farwell and Summerfield (7 miles west of Hereford).

Bids for 4-laning the highway between Farwell and Bovina are scheduled to be opened this week.

As for the segment between Bovina and Friona, Bradley said that it's "coming along fine. We are about 3 months ahead of schedule on it, but then we've had bad weather since Thanksgiving."

Bradley estimated that the segment of road between Friona and the Deaf Smith County line (Summerfield) is probably about 6 months behind schedule. It's in its third year.

Darlene Way of the State Department of Highways and Transportation in Lubbock said the overall project is "going right along real fine. It will take several months to get going. They have to slow down every time it gets a little bit wet or something."

Also, Bradley reported that bids are being taken on another local project - to improve FM 145 from the underpass (at the Lubbock highway entrance) to Oklahoma Lane.

Elvis stamps 'hot'

"People are really going for it," said Texico Postmaster Weldon Smith of the new Elvis postage stamp. "You'd be surprised who's buying them."

He said the new postage stamps appeal to a wide range of collectors. Everyone from the traditional stamp collector to country and western music fans to Gospel fans to teen rock 'n roll fans to elderly ladies with fond memories have been buying these stamps.

"This really surprised me how people did really go for it," said Smith. "I didn't know we had this many Elvis fans around here."

"I talked to my son in Kansas, and he said that the radio station there has been playing Elvis music, and the post office had a window clerk dressed as Elvis," said Smith.

Farwell Postmaster Lynne Mahaney said Monday that she had already sold out of the corner blocks of stamps that collectors prefer.

"I've got some Elvis stamps left, but not a whole lot. I've got some partial sheets," said Mrs. Mahaney.

She reports she will be able to order more Elvis stamps later this month if folks are interested in buying them.

"As far as we know right now, nobody is going to lose their
job," he said.

Marcy Pena of the FmHA office in Farwell offered the
opinion that, "Right now it won't affect the Panhandle at all.
We're so heavy into farming in this area, that it won't affect
us right now - it might later on, but not right now. With a new
President coming in, who knows what will happen?"

Debbie Pollard of the Parmer County Agricultural Exten-
sion Service Office in Farwell said that she had heard that
the closings would mostly be in East Texas, but she didn't
know for sure.

More than one person suggested that some USDA offices
may be consolidated as an effort to save on expenses. Which
offices might be closed, and how soon they will be closed is
still a matter of conjecture.

"I don't know how much money it would really save to
close offices," said Jacquelyn Ryan the bookkeeper for the
Parmer County Soil Conservation Service office in Friona.
"Each person is still going to need electricity and phone
service wherever they are."

"Co-location (consolidating offices) is something they are
really talking about," she said. Ms. Ryan noted that the ASCS
and FmHA offices in Parmer County rent office space, but the
SCS office in Friona owns its building.

According to Ms. Ryan, the SCS closed three area offices
in October.

Students voice concerns in essays

Pet owners must keep their animals in control. It will reduce the death of family animals getting run over and your feelings hurt.

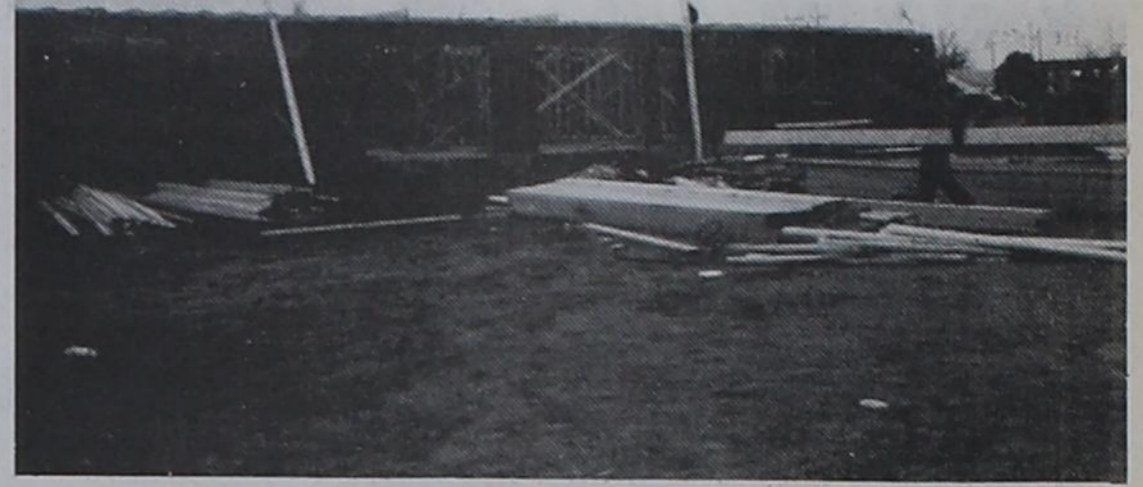

Depth-to-water measurements taken here

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 Technical Division staff are making annual depth - to - water measurements to determine the effect of 1992 pumpage on ground water levels of the Ogallala Aquifer within the 15-county Water District service area.

Measurements are taken in the District's network of more than 1,000 privately - owned observation well network. These wells are spaced at a density of about one well per nine square miles throughout the District.

Water District staff take measurement by lowering a steel tape to the depth of the current static water level inside the observation well. The lower ten to fifteen feet of the tape is coated with blue carpenters' chalk. When the chalked tape comes in contact with the ground water, it turns a darker shade of blue. This section of wetted tape is subtracted from the total amount of tape lowered into the well to determine the depth - to - water from land surface.

After the depth - to - water level measurement is taken, the data is recorded and a vinyl sticker showing the well number, the depth - to - water measurement, and the date the well was measured is affixed to equipment at the well site.

Data collected for soil moisture survey

High Plains Water District and USDA- Soil Conservation Service personnel are collecting data for the annual pre-plant soil moisture survey.

The purpose of the survey is to determine the general soil moisture availability and deficit trends across the 15- county High Plains Water District service area.

Review of the pre- plant soil moisture survey information helps agricultural producers determine the amount of water they need to apply to bring their five- foot root zone soil profile to field capacity without over- irrigating or under- irrigating.

"The soil moisture was low at the start of the 1993 survey. Even though the 1992 growing season started out with the five- foot root zone soil profile at/ or near field capacity, rainfall during late summer was below normal, leaving very dry soil conditions," said Willie Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist. He added that recent snow and rainfall have helped reduce soil moisture deficits in some portions of the District.

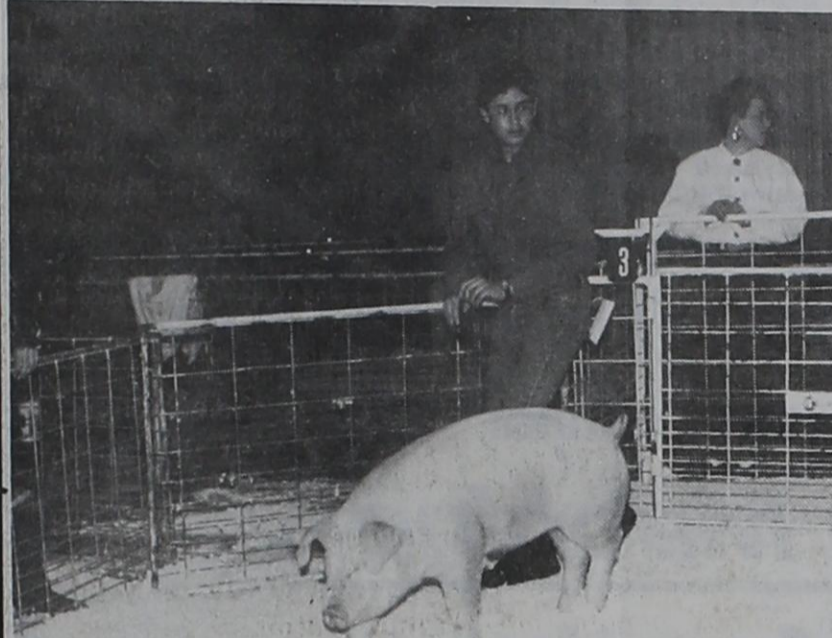
