Although the turnout was light, I believe participants had a fun time "playing" golf. Like Jayme Bethel who had a hole in one by knocking her shot into the commode on No. 6!

And every participant won a prize.

I played in the tourney and had my usual poor game. But the fellowship was fun, and that's what really counts.

I'm looking forward to next year for the 2nd annual Great Texico Golf Challenge.

Well, 8 weeks ago I had picked the New York Knicks over the Phoenix Suns in the NBA finals. One out of two aint bad.

The Chicago Bulls really surprised me. Without Michael Jordan, I doubt they would have won 30 games last year. But with him they are the best "team" in pro basketball.

Normally, I don't root for "teams" dominated by one player. I prefer good teamwork. So I was wishy washy watching the NBA finals. If Chicago (my hometown) won, fine. If not, that's okay, too.

But it's a real pleasure to watch Jordan play. It's a thing of beauty.

I've been watching pro basketball since the mid-1950s, when the stars were Lovelett, Yardley, Pettit, Cousy, Hagan, etc. Jordan is, by far, the greatest basketball player I've ever seen. He simply can do more - across the board, at a higher level, than anyone else I've seen.

My first "hero" was Bob Pettit. He was a great forward when he led the St. Louis Hawks in the old days. Then came the Boston Celtics' dynasty. I cheered for Bob Cousy, who made the "behind the back" pass famous.

I never rooted much for the Celtics, led by the great Bill Russell - who had the best timing of anybody I ever saw - and the Jones boys (K.C. and Sam) and John Havlicek and Don Nelson, etc. They were just too dominant a team; you had to root for the underdog (unless you were a New Englander).

Those were great series - the Celtics vs. the L.A. Lakers. L.A. had great guards - Jerry West and Gail Goodrich. I think West, coming out of West Virginia, was the best pure shooter I had ever seen - until Jordan came along.

Let's not forget the old Philadelphia Warrior teams, with Wilt "the Stilt" Chamberlain, assisted by Wally Jones and Luke Jackson. Chamberlain was almost unstoppable when he chose to be.

There have been other great players along the way - Julius Erving, flying in off the right wing; Larry Bird, who had the best court sense of all of them; Oscar Robertson, the finest all-around player - until Jordan; Kareem Abdul Jabbar, with his deadly sky hook; Magic Johnson, the magician of the courts; and so on.

But when it comes down to being the best - including passing, scoring, dribbling, steals, leadership, rebounding, assists, and clutch shots - there's no question who fills the bill.

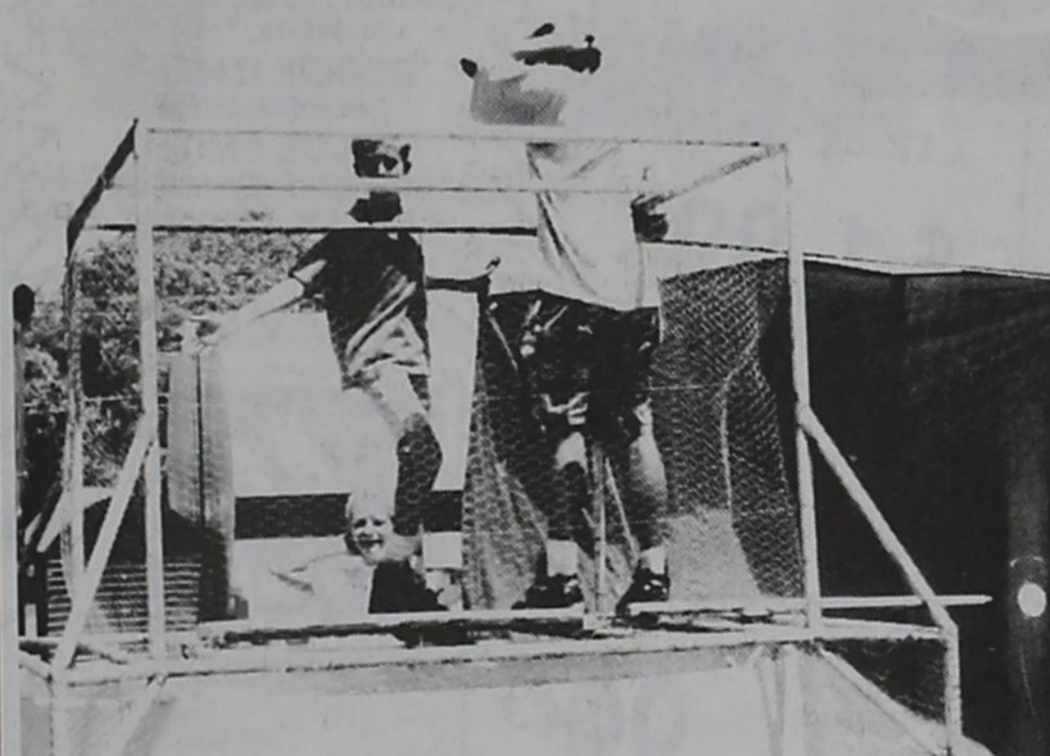

* If you have an after-hours emergency, dial "911", which will connect you with the Clovis Police Department dispatcher.

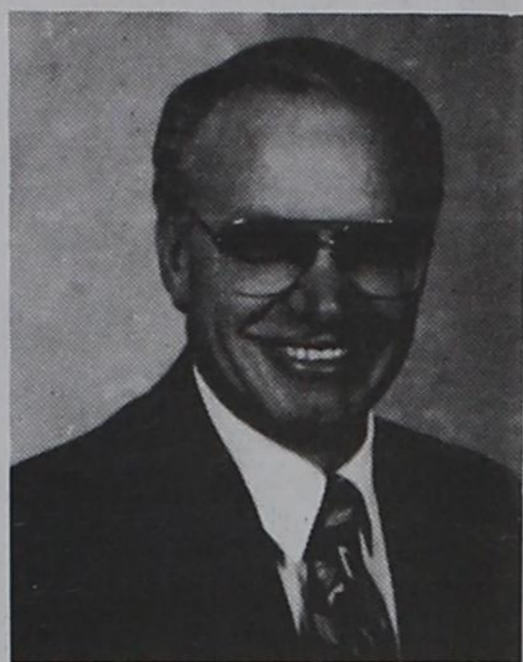

The revival will begin with the 11 a.m. Sunday morning service on July 25, where Broadhurst will speak on the topic "Don't Miss the Joy," based upon Matthew 5:14-30. He will return for the Sunday evening service with the message, "Rejoice," from Joel 2:21-29.

On Monday through Wednesday there will be a noon day pot luck luncheon and study of Phillipians led by Broadhurst. On Monday his topic is "Stop Talking; Start Walking," on Tuesday, "No Parking," and on Wednesday, "Needs Not Greeds."

The evening topics will be presented at 7 p.m. They will include: Monday, "Is It Nothing," from Lamentations 1:12; Tuesday, "A Successful Farmer," from Lamentations 3:30-5:6; and Wednesday, "Formula of Faith," from Matthew 15:21-28.

Rev. Broadhurst has pastored churches in Texas and Colorado since 1955. He has also been involved in overseas missions and revivals across the country. He is now serving on the Executive Board of the Baptist General Convention of Texas and the Christian Education Coordinating Board. He attended Hardin - Simmons University and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Rev. Brogden was ordained to the Ministry by First Baptist Church of Friona in 1978. He has directed church choirs and been involved in music ministries since 1968 in Amarillo; Liberal, Kan.; Memphis, Texas, and Friona.

His musical talents are shown by the fact that he was selected to a soloist for the Australian Baptist National Convention Ordination Ceremony in Melbourne, Australia in 1985. He was also soloist for the Singing Men of Texas while on tour in Brazil in 1983 and Australia in 1985, and he was soloist for the Evangelism Conference of the Baptist General Convention in 1983.

He is currently working on a Master of Theology degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. He already holds a Graduate Diploma in Theology from Southwestern which he earned last year. He also holds a Diploma in Educational Ministries from Southern Baptist Seminary Extension Department of Southern Baptist Convention.

Parmer, Bailey cotton stats listed

Parmer County cotton producers have enrolled a much lower percentage of their cotton in the 1993 cotton program than growers in neighboring counties.

According to the Cotton News from the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., 72% of the Parmer County cotton acres have been enrolled in the cotton program. In Bailey County 80 percent of the crop has been enrolled.

Early enrollment figures from the High Plains area indicate 91 percent of the effective cotton base acreage was signed for the 1993 cotton program.

The Lubbock - based producer organization expects

total cotton plantings to be slightly higher than 1992 due to the 2.4 percent decrease in the Acreage Reduction Program for cotton in 1993. Early estimates place cotton acreage near 3.28 million acres although several hundred thousand acres are expected to eventually fail because of scattered dry conditions on the High Plains.

Preliminary 1993 enrollment figures for Bailey and Parmer counties show:

Bailey: 114,175 - 1993 effective base acres; 80.0 - 1993 percentage acres enrolled; 92,593 - 1993 intended plantings.

Parmer: 69,544 - 1993 effective base acres; 72.0 - 1993 percentage acres enrolled; 51,482 - 1993 intended plantings.

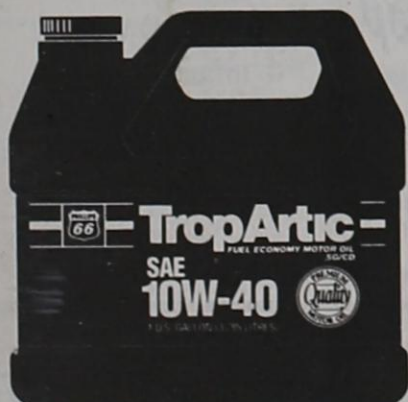

Health Tip For the Week

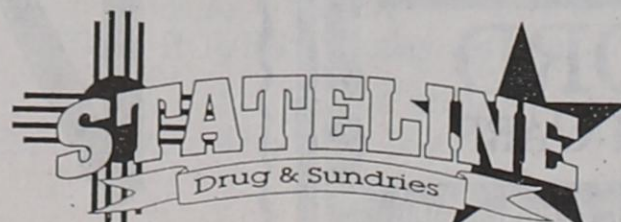

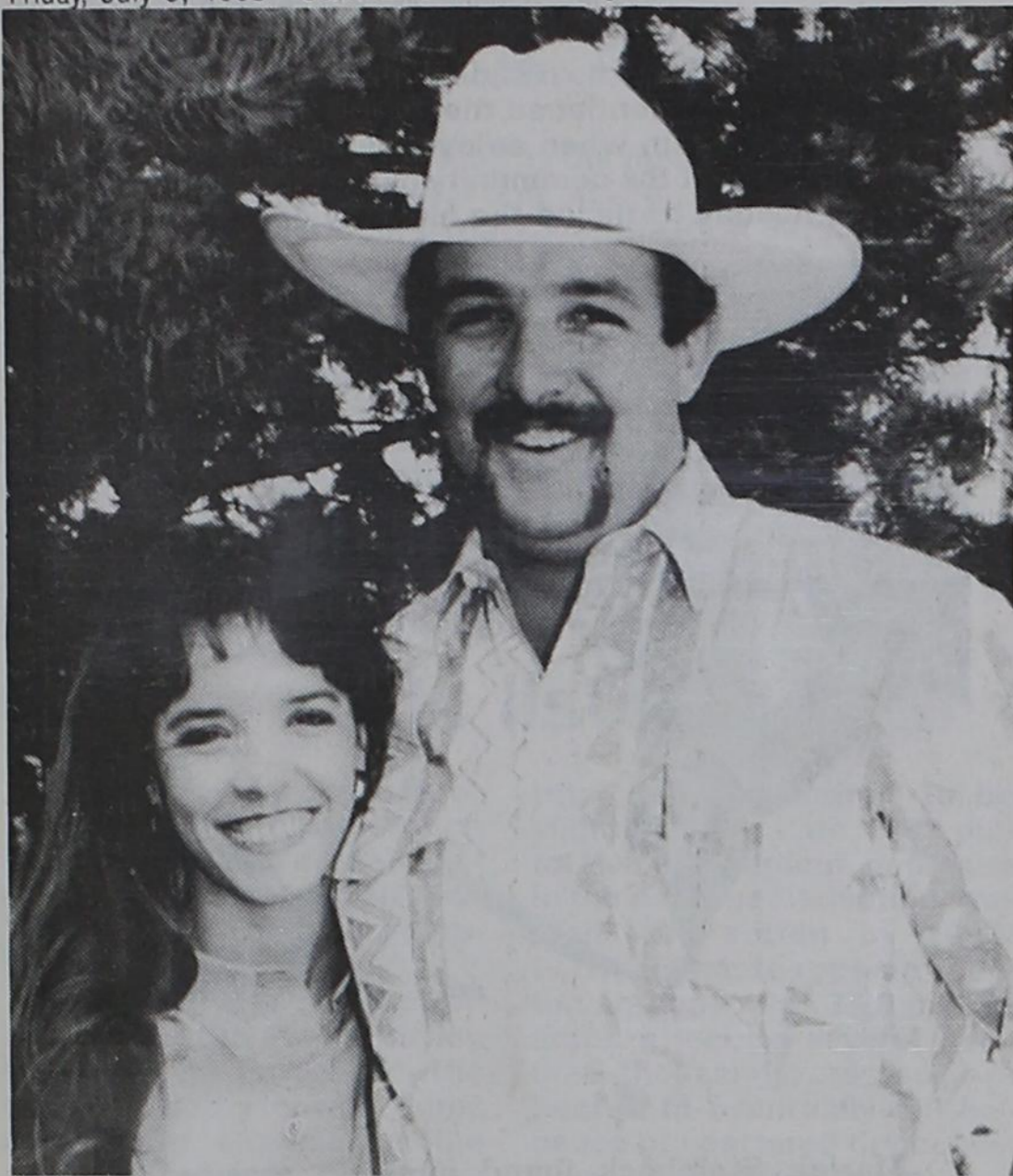

Burton assists with Lubbock July 4th celebration

This information came from the Lubbock newspaper:

Former Farwell High principal and band director Lynn Burton played an important part in Lubbock's Independence Day celebration.

Burton helped to synchronize the city's fireworks display

with the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra's Evening concert.

As the concert reached a certain point in its program, Burton was positioned several blocks away with a telegraph link to the concert, a head set, the orchestra's musical score, and the city's fireworks. Burton directed the company firing the pyrotechnics when to light which fuse.

Burton got a copy of the music ahead of time and a list of the fireworks that were available. He worked closely with the conductor of the symphony and with representatives of the company that provided the fireworks to see that each one knew what the other was doing. They marked the musical score so that Burton would know when certain types of fireworks would be appropriate. Then Burton figured out how far in advance the fuses would have to be lit so that the fireworks would sail through the air and the display would appear at just the right moment.

If the music called for "amber waves of grain," golden fireworks would be ignited at just the right time. If it called for cannons to boom, the fireworks company would ignite rockets which could be both heard and felt.

This was the second year that Burton has coordinated the fireworks and music for Lubbock's July 4th celebration.

Burton came to Farwell in 1967. He directed the band until 1984 when he became high school principal. He left Farwell in 1988 to become band instructor at Estacado High School.

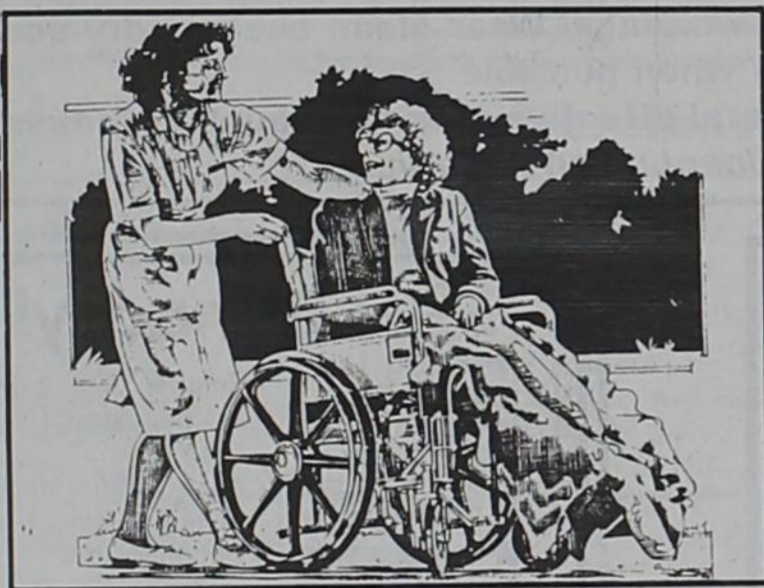

The Chief's Corner

by Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa

I asked Mike the other day if he could spare a little corner of his paper in order for me to talk to the citizens of Farwell. This is the result.

From time to time, I am asked questions that I think a lot of you would like answered. There are also times when there may be matters of public interest that you would like to know about and that is the reason for this column.

If you have a question you would like answered, simply write it down and send it to the Farwell Police Department, P.O. Box 338. I'll do my best to answer you.

Q. How come you didn't wave back the other day?

A. Sorry, but it wasn't on purpose. Your waves make my day perfect and I do appreciate them. I may have focused on a car, person or location, or I may have been watching something in my rear view mirror. In that case, I will probably miss your wave. If it happens, please know that it is because I'm working, not that I refuse to return your wave.

Q. Why have you set the fines so high?

A. I haven't. Peace officers cannot set fines or make laws. Even the city of Farwell doesn't have complete say so regarding fines. Just for example: you are caught speeding 10 miles per hour over the limit on Avenue A. The fine set by the Municipal Judge is \$10. The court cost is \$5. But you pay a total of \$38.

The same violation in a school zone is also a \$10 fine and a \$5 court cost. But you pay \$58. In both cases everything over the city's fine and cost is set by the state. The state's charges vary according to the violation and the location.

As for what the state does with the money, here is where it goes: some to judicial and court personnel training; to law enforcement management institute; law enforcement officer's standards and education; compensation to victims of crime; criminal justice planning; operator's and chauffeur's license; comprehensive rehabilitation; general revenue; breath alcohol testing; child safety, and traffic.

So you can see, everybody gets a slice of the pie. I believe that the state costs are one way of financing necessary projects while avoiding a state income tax. Have a good day ... Roy.

Danger pointed out

Suzy Langford sent us an article about the dangers of musk thistles to the animal industries in this area.

It is a large plant with sharp spiny leaves and purple seed pods. While not directly poisonous to livestock, it is a plant whose sharp thistles can become mixed up with an alfalfa or wheat silage crop, and it can ruin the whole crop.

Vic Anspaugh, author of the article, says: "This large, grotesque-looking plant, which wishfully should only belong in some far away land where everything stings, sticks or stinks, is becoming far too commonplace in our area." He specifically noted seeing some of it in the Farwell area.

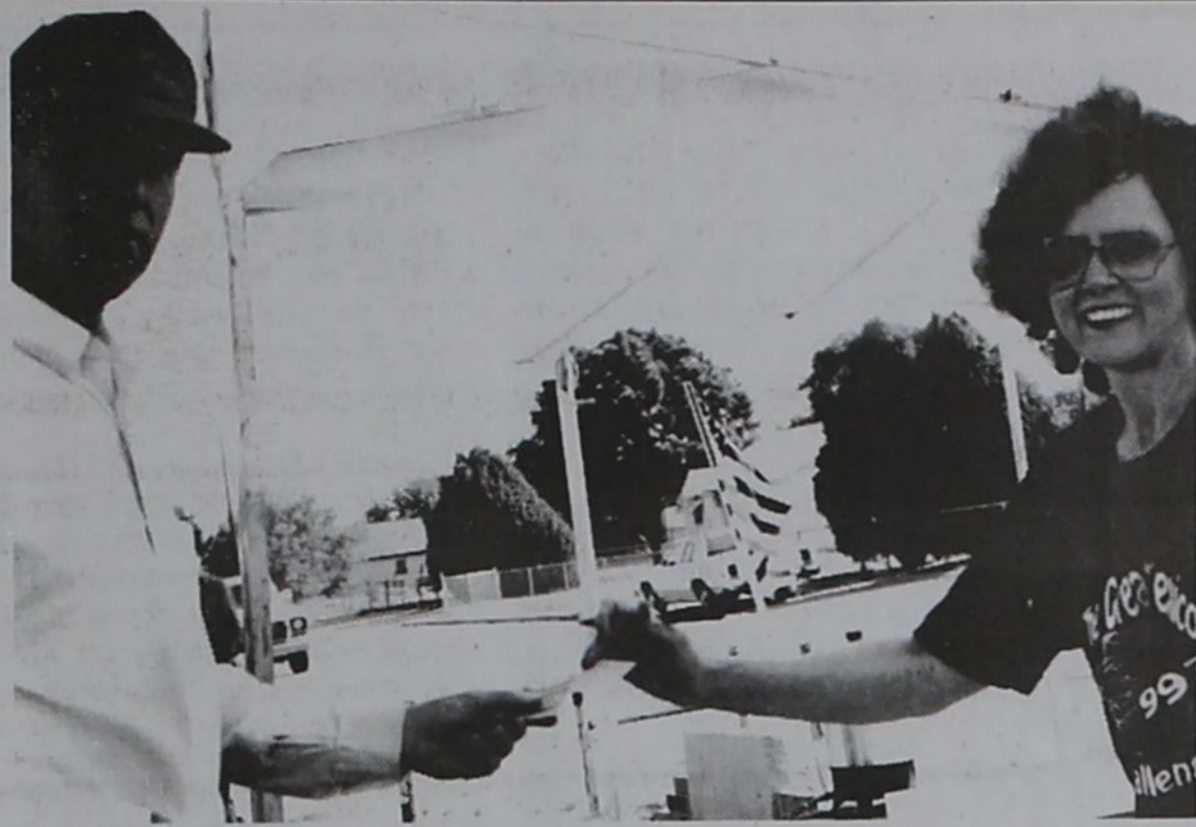

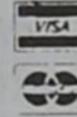
