



Apparently the Carter Administration badly underestimated the Russians in the latest SALT negotiations. Cyrus Vance got the boot from Moscow in a hurry. We believe that this administration has made other serious errors of judgment, one of which is the decision to change the course of our nuclear research program.

This error is based, apparently, upon the assumption that the United States has a monopoly on scientific brains. This is not true in any sense. Over the span of the last several centuries men of science from practically all nations have contributed greatly to our knowledge. What we have had is a near monopoly on the technology necessary to put scientific theory to practical use.

The theoretical knowledge of nuclear research, for both peace and war, is known by many nations. What they have lacked in the past is the ability to translate this theory into practicality. When the national and economic incentive is strong enough, these nations can acquire the hardware to put their theories to everyday use.

So, by reducing the United States leadership position in nuclear use we are forcing other nations to acquire same for their national needs. When they do so acquire, we will have absolutely no means of stemming world-wide proliferation of nuclear energy for purposes of war.

Yes, President Carter can force this country to look to coal for our energy requirements because we have coal. Other countries without coal still must, repeat must, have energy to survive. Therefore, they will develop the technology for nuclear production and then we will have absolutely no handle on them.

You've heard about how the "Charlie's Angels" star got her name? Seems she took a course in Egypt in plumbing so she became a Pharaoh Faucet Major.

We have come to the firm conclusion that small communities, on a per capita basis, have many more activities than the metropolitan areas. Area WIFE Group To Form Chapter

An overflow crowd turned out Monday night at the community room of Bovina State Bank for the organizational meeting of Wives Involved in Farm Economics (WIFE).

The assembly heard talks by special guests Bedford Forrest of KVII-TV in Amarillo and representatives of the Spearman chapter of WIFE, Mesdames Verma Marie Strawm, Georgia Holt, Bobbie Novack, and DeAnn Dunnihoo. The Spearman chapter was the first WIFE chapter to organize in Texas.

The one purpose of WIFE is to raise the price of raw farm products, according to Mrs. Novack. "We want legislation that will preserve, protect, and insure profit for farmers," she said.

"Agriculture represents only four per cent of the American population, but this number could represent a lot of power because people cannot live without the food and fiber produced by farmers," said Mrs. Strawm.

According to Forrest, the American people have the freedom of religion, which is used, and the freedom of speech, "but we don't use it properly."

"It's WIFE's job to educate people in Washington, D.C., about our situation," Forrest said. "Farmers should support WIFE but not drop their

support of the other organizations to which they belong."

Forrest told those attending to "educate yourself, inform the people, and present yourself and your ideas well," in order to get the best response from the people in Washington.

According to the Spearman representatives, they have already spent a lot of time and "a lot of money" in writing letters and making phone calls to people in Washington, D.C., and, "we are making progress with our efforts."

"At least they (Washington) know who we are now," said Mrs. Novack.

WIFE chapters have been organized in Washington, Kansas, Oklahoma, Illinois, Colorado, and Texas. The organization began in Sydney, Neb., when farm wives met in early December to protest low farm prices and escalating costs.

The plight of the farmer today, according to WIFE, is a direct result of the government's urgent request to plant from fence to fence; then an embargo that shut off markets; the roll-back in beef prices; the loss of the Sugar Act; and consumer boycotts and lobbying for low prices.

The WIFE plan is to get 13 counties in the Panhandle area to form an organization. Men are encouraged to participate in the organization in order to express their opinions on what

needs to be done to keep the farmer in business.

WIFE encourages everyone to write letters, make phone calls, send mailgrams and telegrams, etc., to their Washington, D.C., representatives and to put WIFE after the signature. Addresses and telephone numbers may be obtained from WIFE representatives Mrs. Ellen Marie Estes of Bovina.

The next meeting for the area WIFE organization will be Tuesday at 8 p.m. CDT at the Bovina bank. A nominating committee has been appointed to nominate officers for the area chapter and the officers will be elected at the Tuesday night meeting. Regular meeting dates for the group will also be set at the meeting. All interested persons are encouraged to attend.

King is a rancher and feeder and part owner of King

Butane Co. in Stanley. He graduated from Stanley High School and attended the University of New Mexico before serving in the field artillery in World War II. King is a member of Stanley Union Church where he serves on the Board of Directors.

One of King's concerns is the loss of potential business, civic, and government leaders through migration of many of the state's young people. He hopes to create youth opportunities through industrial and agricultural development and improved educational pro-

grams and vocational training.

King is a strong supporter of the programs for senior citizens and is dedicated to the American principle of law and order. He is a member of the Santa Fe chapter of the American Red Cross and is on the Board of Directors of the Federal Intermediate Bank of the 9th District and also the Farm Credit Bank in Wichita, Kan.

Country Club Hopes Alive

Members of the Farwell Country Club met Monday night at the club in an effort to find a solution to the financial situation which has plagued the club for the past several months.

Walter Hughes, board president, said the board will try to collect the \$68,110 which was pledged in the recent fund drive.

The board will put the part of the \$68,110 they can collect into the bank to draw interest and a new corporation will then be formed to take over ownership of the Farwell Country Club. The new corporation will purchase the club from the existing corporation owner.

The new corporation will draw up a separate set of by-laws, elect a new board of directors and sell stock in the club, using the money to bring the FHA loan up to date.

Money raised in the recent fund drive will be used as a reserve fund and some of it will be used for club repairs, according to Bob Anderson of Security State Bank.

According to Hughes, the club has until May 1 to wrap up the details of the plan before the FHA takes the club

over. If the new corporation plan takes effect, the club dues will be raised, along with an increase in green fees for the golf course.

The total debt owed by the club is \$183,000, some \$17,000 more than the original debt because of failure to make monthly payments on schedule.

The date for the election of the board of directors for the new corporation has not yet been set, according to Hughes.

Needed Rains Provide Boost To Area Crops

Twin Cities residents rejoiced last week as the long awaited and much needed rains began to fall late Wednesday night and continued intermittently through Sunday.

According to Mack Heald, Farmer County extension agent, an estimated one and one-half to one and three-fourths inches of rain fell in the county with some spots receiving as much as two inches.

Heald called the rain "beneficial to farmers," adding that it provided a tremendous boost to wheat, barley and corn crops. He also commented that more rain is needed.

Several area farmers termed the rain a lifesaver for their wheat and corn crops, as well as providing significant savings in irrigation costs. The rains which fell last week increased chances for a good harvest on dryland crops, improved grass for cattle, and saved many thousands of dollars in irrigation and energy costs.

Mrs. B.A. Rogers of Texico, who reported .9 inch in the town proper and 1.3 inches in the country, said "the dryland wheat crop could not have held up any longer."

Measurements of .6 to over one inch were reported south of Farwell and in the Oklahoma Lane community.

Asa Smith of Lariat said 1.10 was recorded at the elevator. He remarked that the rain was the best thing that could have happened to the area.

Alvin Woodburn, National Weather observer in Clovis, officially measured .84 of an inch early Thursday.

Earlier this week cloudy overcast skies and cooler temperatures dominated the weather scene and an additional inch of moisture fell county wide. Winds and other turbulent weather also visited the area as evidenced by the various weather alerts in force through Tuesday night.

third in typewriting; Billy White, second in shorthand, and Sherri McCully, third in shorthand.

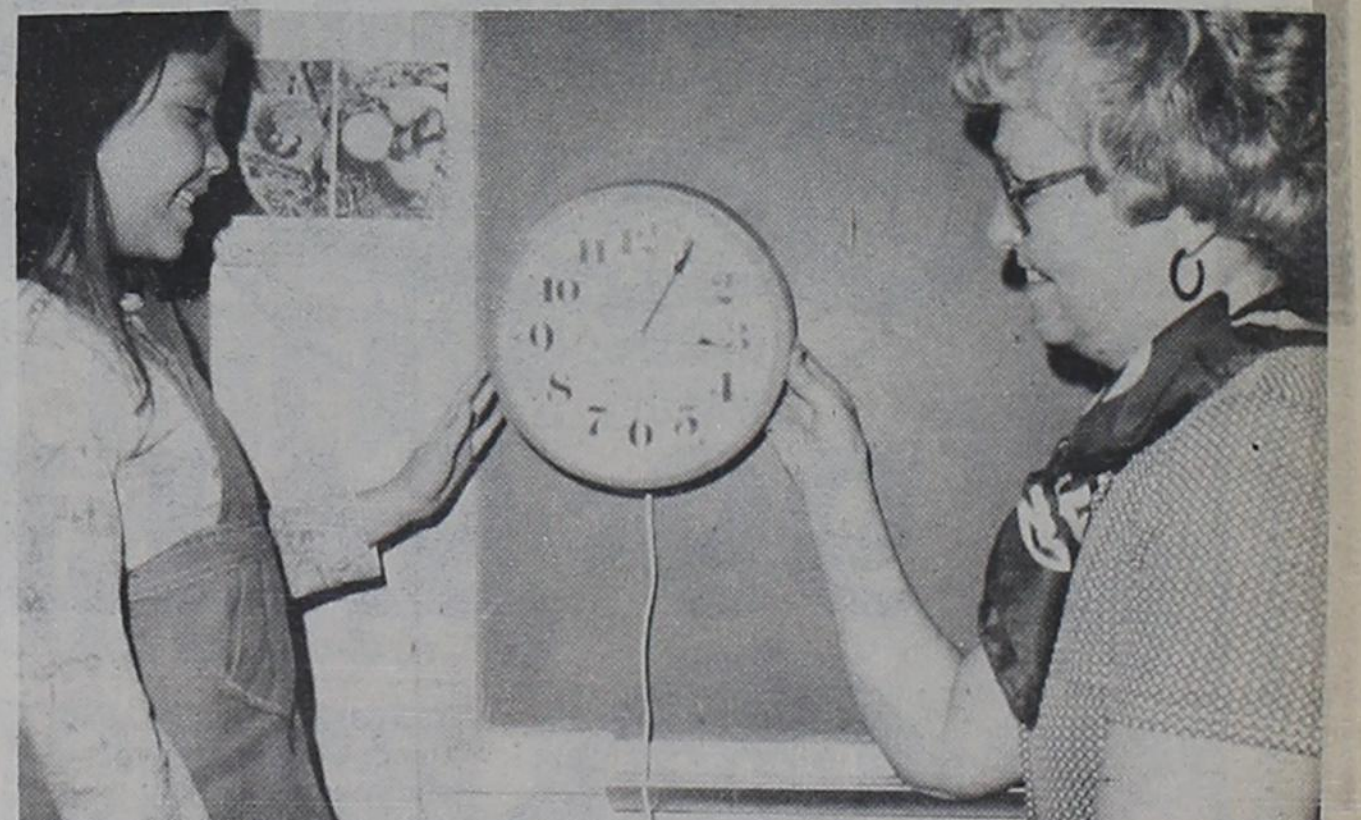

Clean-Up Progress Noted; Pool Renovation Hits Snag

Saturday was a busy day in Texico as residents and civic organizations alike turned out for clean-up day. Participating in the project were the City Council, volunteer fire department and interested Texico citizens and clubs.

The Senior Citizens organization sponsored a free luncheon for all workers at the community center.

Max Carter, Texico trustee, said, "We accomplished our goals for the most part, especially as far as hauling away debris is concerned." He added that many residents cooperated by assembling their debris to be hauled away.

A major focus of the work day was the renovation and general clean-up of the swimming pool. The project was jointly sponsored by the City Council and the Texico Woman's Club. Carter said many people were out of town, adding, "we did not get as much work completed as had been originally planned." However, he said, rubbish, weeds, etc. were cleared away from the outside area, and further renovation is expected to continue at a later date.

According to Audrey Kittrell, spokesman for the Texico Woman's Club, the plan to renovate and re-open the swimming pool "has hit a snag." She explained that they have been working in conjunction with the Environmental Improvement Agency in Clovis to improve the conditions of the pool in time to re-open it this summer.

Mrs. Kittrell said that two weeks ago the EIA had okayed a partial renovation and clean-up plan. Now she says the agency has reversed itself and is demanding "that we completely renovate the pool

for this year, plus apply for a grant to build a new swimming pool."

The Texico woman says the grant would only pay for 25 per cent of the total cost of building a new pool, adding that to attempt such a project would only serve to place the community in debt for years. Besides, says Mrs. Kittrell, what would we do with the old pool?

In an effort to seek a solution to this problem, representatives of the City Council and Woman's Club met Tuesday in Clovis with New Mexico Governor Jerry Apodaca. According to Mrs. Kittrell, Gov. Apodaca said he did not feel that the EIA agency had the authority to make the demands they have voiced. She said he also commented that even if they did have the authority it was not practical for them (Texico) to follow that course of action.

Mrs. Kittrell further reported that Gov. Apodaca intended to check into the matter and

In a late development Wednesday morning, Texico City Clerk Clara Wiehl informed the Tribune of the EIA's new decision. According to Cade Lancaster, head of the organization, a variance has been granted to Texico to re-open the pool this season, provided that a three-fold renovation plan be completed or at least successfully implemented by the 1978 season.

The three-part plan is as follows:

1. Runways must be repaired and sloped (approximately 1200 square feet of the deck is in need of repair).

2. Inside of the pool must be conditioned for and repainted.

3. Bathhouse is to be repaired and repainted and vestibules added on east entrances for shower rooms.

Mrs. Wiehl commented that "meeting these requirements should not present a problem if Texico citizens and civic clubs cooperate as they have in the past." 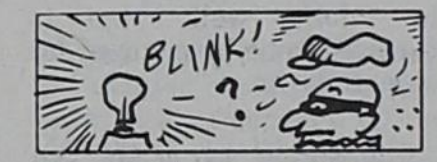

In his short address, Pierce said it was important for seniors to visit college and university campuses before making their final selection of which college to attend. Rodgers played the guitar and sang two songs.

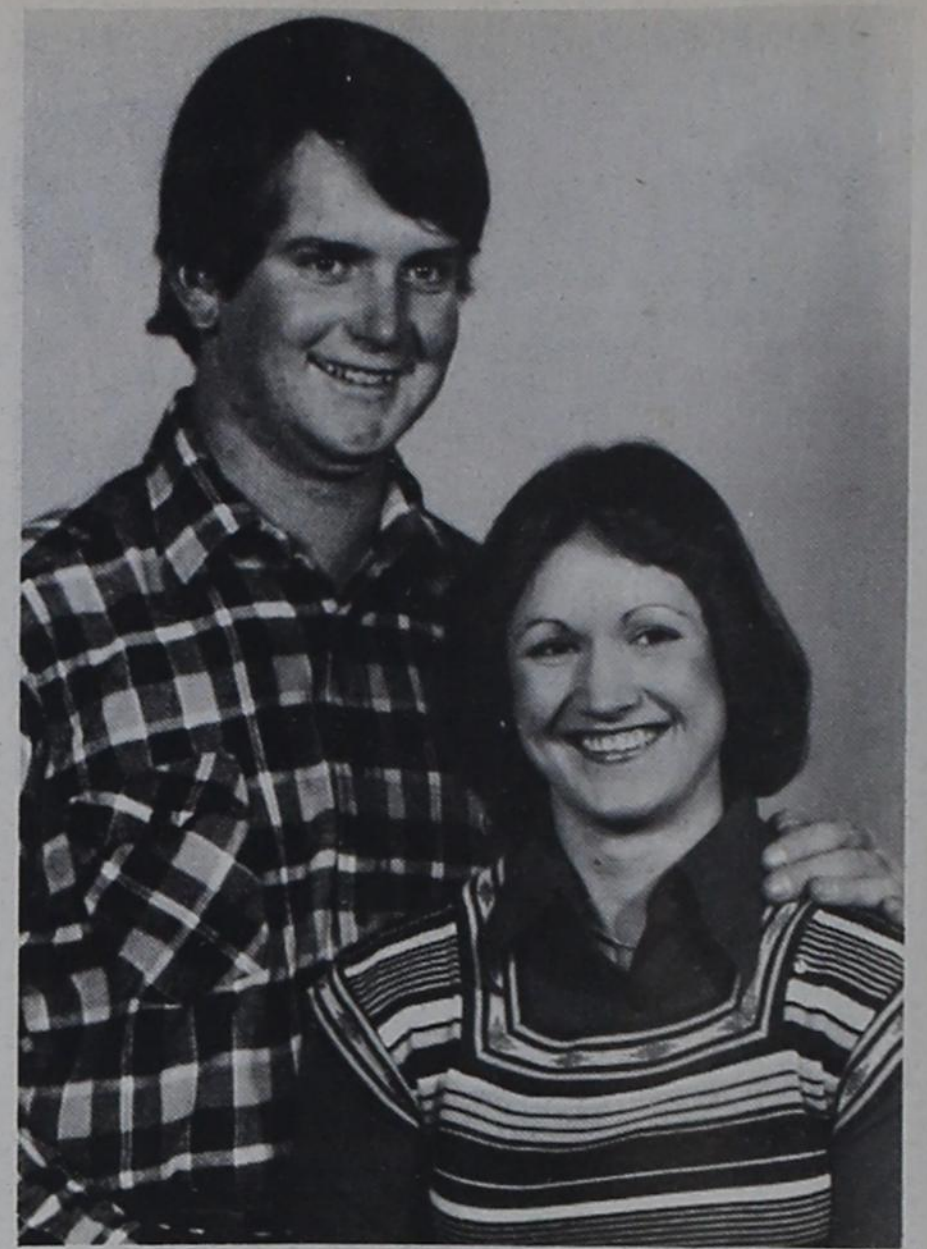

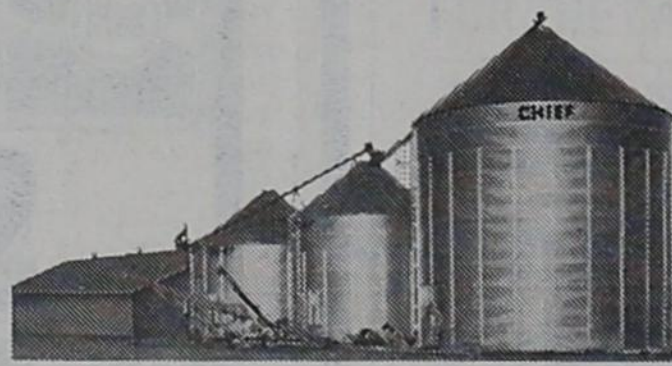

Trophies and medals will be presented immediately following the conclusion of all events.

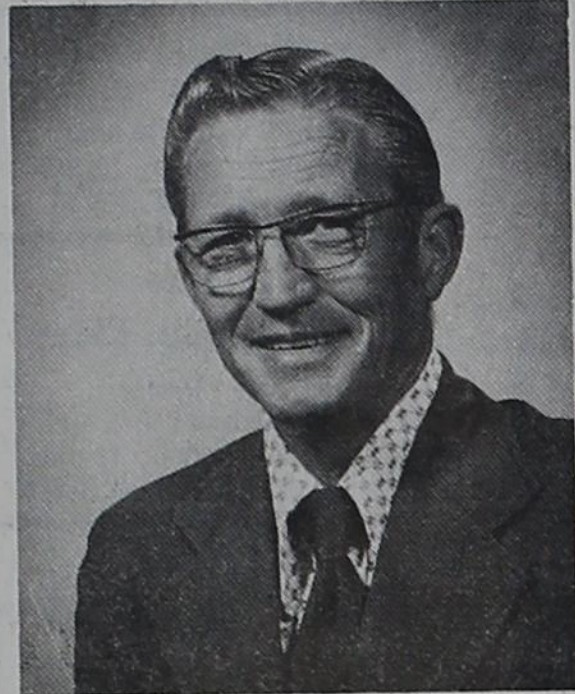

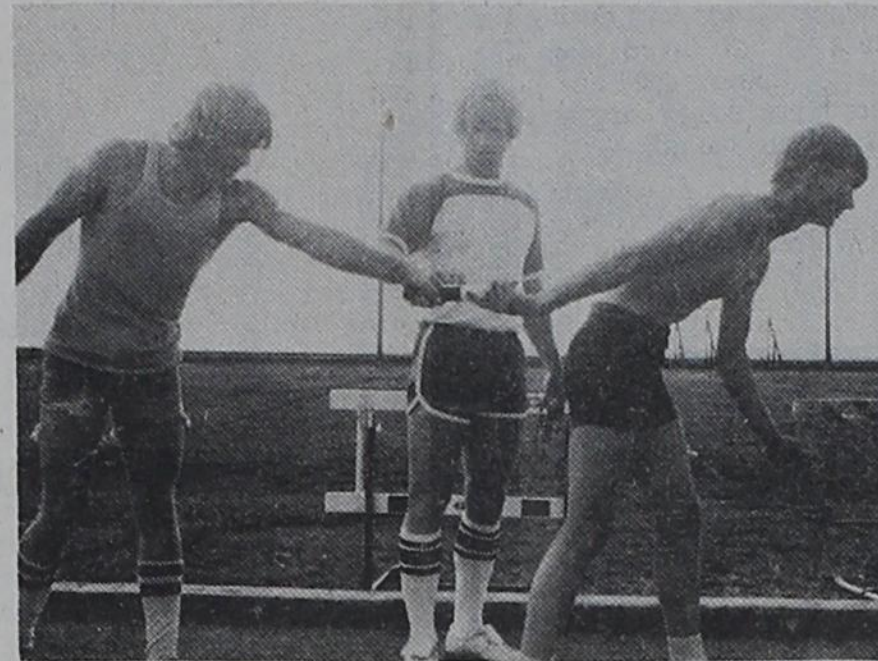

Agricultural economists are painting a brighter picture for the coming market year, at least for world market activities. Market observers say it will be virtually impossible for another world wheat crop to be as high as last year's. They hedge their optimism for farmers by admitting it could take a production drop of as much as 7-10 per cent to significantly raise farm prices. Most of the experts are in agreement that soybean exports should stay strong, perhaps matching or exceeding the 555-million bushels sold in foreign markets last year. Those following the progress of the world markets for beef say that two good signs are the upturns in the past three years of beef buying in both the Soviet Union and the Middle East. For our farmers and ranchers the world continues to shrink.
