Vets' memorial looking good

I'm really proud of how that Parmer County Veterans Memorial looks at Farwell City Park.

The whole county can feel good about that good-looking structure.

I know Ralph Franse isn't going to like this - but my hat is off to him for spearheading the project. Yes, he's received a lot of help, but Ralph has done a super job.

The Tribune plans to run a 4-page special pullout section in our May 27 issue - just in time for the May 30 memorial dedication.

The section will feature background and photos on the servicemen who will be honored.

Of the 34 servicemen whose names are on the memorial, we have some background on 32 of them, plus 24 photos. All we know of two servicemen are the facts that they enlisted in Parmer County and what wars they died in.

Also, we will distribute free copies of that pullout section at the May 30 memorial. I plan to print up about 300 extra copies of the Tribune.

I hope one of the Friona VFW members reads this column and stops by the Tribune after May 27 to pick up some copies for the post.

We got a note from Don Ford, of Fort Worth, (and a check for the Parmer County Veterans Memorial), after he read a recent Banter column.

Don wrote about Harley Cole, who lived in Farwell in the 1930s and 1940s, and who died during the Korean War.

This was the first I have heard about Harley, so I assume he left Farwell before enlisting in the Korean War. His name isn't on the memorial, which has been completed.

But I want to share what Don wrote about Harley:

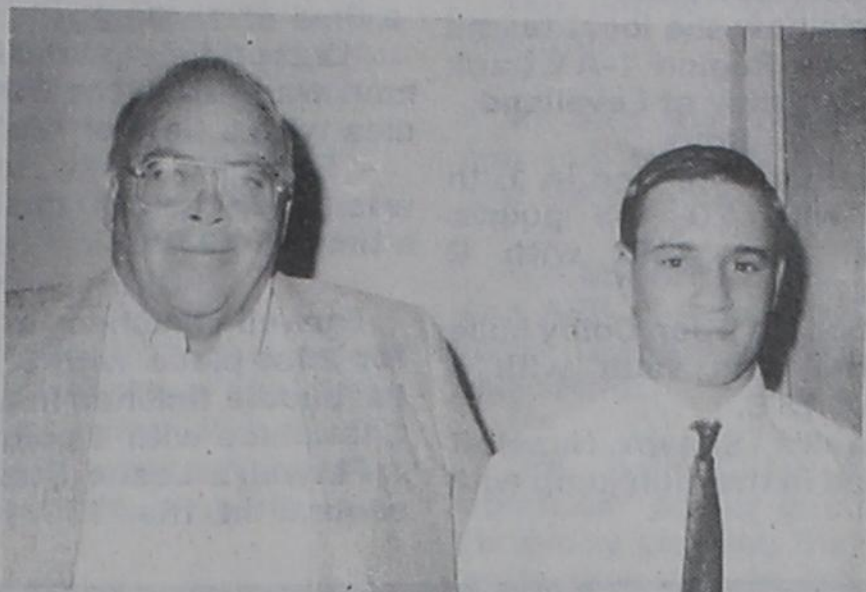
"Big Harley was a powerfully built youngster with oak stump arms and fence post legs. Flanked on the side of Bob Dollar, the Dive Play would have been declared illegal in the late '40's, but Harley stayed in Steer Town.

"Memory fails me when Harley's family moved from Farwell. I read about his demise in the Tribune while I was attending TCU. I'm betting Big Harley took some with him prior to his stout body absorbing whatever it was that took his life.

"Big Harley was as much of Farwell as the Water Tower, Jess Newton's Cafe, Rose Drug and Bill Hall's Grocery Store."

Here are the results of our area's local elections:

Farwell School Board

Parmer voters also reject proposed state amendments

Parmer County voters were in sync with Texas voters in rejecting all three proposed Constitutional amendments in Saturday's statewide elections.

The propositions were:
* Proposition 1 - allowing limited redistribution of ad valorem taxes for schools, authorizing the legislature or local districts to set a minimum tax rate in county education districts and placing a cap on the ad valorem tax levied by county education districts.

This proposition was turned down by Texas voters with 63 percent opposed and 37 percent in favor.
In Parmer County, 1,045 persons voted against it, and 335 were in favor.

* Proposition 2 - exempting a school district from the obligation to comply with unfunded state educational mandates.

Fifty-one percent of Texas voters opposed it, and 49 percent favored it.
In Parmer County, 748 voters were opposed, and 616 in favor.

* Proposition 3 - authorizing the issuance of \$750 million in state general obligation or revenue bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities, authorizing the state to forgive payments of loans made to a school district for partially financing facilities, and repealing the authorization for \$750 million in state revenue bonds guaranteed by the permanent school fund.

Statewide, Texas voted down this proposition by a 56 - 44 percent margin.
In Parmer County, voters opposed it 962 - 398.

As for the U.S. Senate race, the top two vote-getters were Interim Sen. Bob Krueger, a Democrat appointed to the post by Gov. Ann Richards after Lloyd Bentsen became U.S. Secretary of the Treasury, and state Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison, a Republican.

Statewide, both Hutchison and Krueger got about 29 percent of the vote. Tied for third were two Republicans, Jack Fields and Joe Barton, both with about 14 percent of the vote.

Parmer County voters went big for Hutchison, giving her 507 votes. Fields got 281, Barton 253 and Krueger 192.

Besides the graph showing the vote totals for the top U.S. Senate hopefuls, others receiving votes in Parmer County were:

Lou Zaeske, independent, 4; Chuck Sibley, Republican, 6; Jose Gutierrez, Democrat, 19; Lottie Hancock, independent, 2; Charles Howell, Republican, 5; Thomas Spink, Republican, 3; Don Richardson, independent, 7; Stephen Hopkins, Republican, 12; Gene Kelly, Democrat, 8; Richard Fisher, Democrat, 50; Herbert Spiro, Republican, 2; Roger Henson, Independent, 2, and Billy Brown, People's Party, 1.

Three candidates had vied for two posts on the Farwell School Board - and the two incumbents who were seeking re-election won.

Re-elected were David Norton with 229 votes and Charles Christian with 260 votes.

Teresa Ancira had 90 votes.

Lazbuddie School Board

Five candidates ran for three school board posts.

Elected were Steve Foster, 91; and incumbents Robert Gallman, 124, and Tommy St. Clair, 135.

Others running were Larry Jesko, 49, and incumbent Lloyd Bradshaw, 72.

Farwell City Council

Farwell Mayor Chris Gikas was elected with 149 votes. He was unopposed.

Three candidates vied for two city council posts.

Elected were Jerry Stover, 126, and incumbent John Carlson, 105.

Also running was incumbent Royce Bethel, 90.

Farwell Hospital District Board

All five incumbents were unopposed so all were elected:

Annette Black, 244; Jack Allen Kirkland, 255; Jerry Monk, 258; Rick Sullivan, 260, and Mike Ratke, 257.

Bovina City Council

Elected to the City Council were Galen Hromas, 140; Garry Beauchamp, 111, and Leon Ware, 116.

Also running were Radford Venable, 67, and Stan Miller, 62.

Friona City Council

Elected to the City Council were incumbents Joe Tongate, 310; Mike Hanes, 213, and Bill Stovell, 267.

Also running was Mike Hutson, 172.

Friona School Board

Elected to the Friona School Board were incumbent Kathryn Goddard, 266; and Alan Monroe, 249.

Also running was Terry Wilcox, 195.

Rick is the pastor of the First Baptist Church of Farwell and has been on the Hospital District Board of Directors for three years. He also

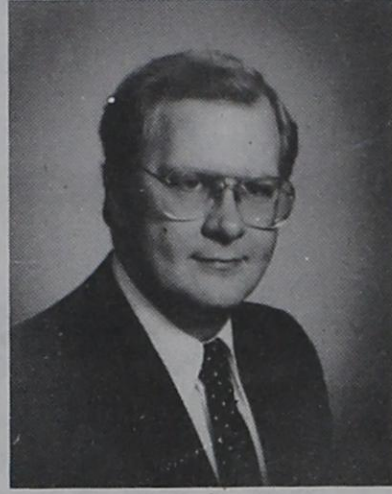
serves as the center's chaplain, conducts daily devotionals and worship services at the center and was instrumental in starting a chaplain's program at the center.

Area cotton producers 'waiting a little longer'

High Plains cotton producers aren't taking any chances with the 1993 crop, according to Plains Cotton Growers.

Producers seem to be taking a "wait a little longer" approach to 1993. The major-

ity will be content to wait for the arrival of the areas optimum planting period instead of trying to get a jump on the growing season. Typically the bulk of the area's cotton is planted in the two weeks between May 5 and May 20.

Extension Corn Specialist Kater Hake of Lubbock says

there are several reasons why producers are holding back. One of the biggest is that in general the area remains on the deficit side of the moisture scale, especially in predominantly dryland areas south of Lubbock.

"Moisture levels have been creeping up over the last

few days due to scattered showers across the area. However, we still don't have enough moisture to plant in most of the dryland areas," said Hake.

Hake also reports that some early planted cotton in the Gaines County area is not doing very well.



The two Texico organizations would like to make this an

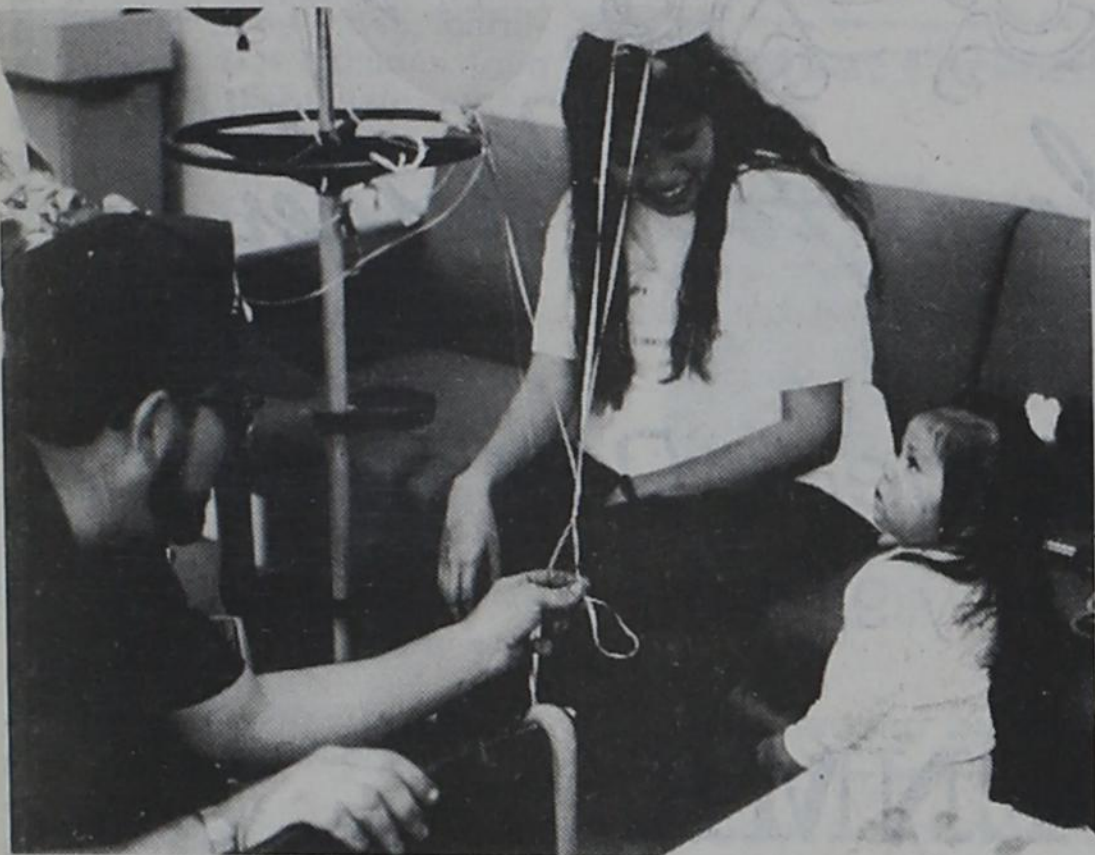

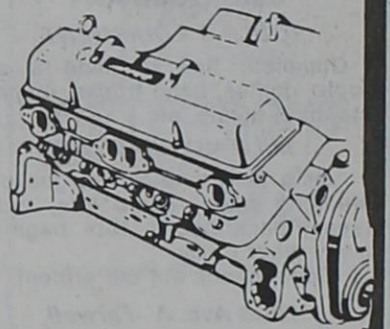

Notice is hereby given that Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative, Inc. (the "Utility") intends to decrease rates for electric utility service effective July 6, 1993, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ending December 31, 1992, the decrease requested is \$740,000 or 4.465% of actual test year revenues. The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility.
The Utility proposes to change all rates for Farm and Home, Residential Space Heating, Irrigation, Commercial, Large Power, Industrial, Cotton Gin, and Lighting, including demand, energy, minimum and other charges. The proposed changes are expected to affect the classes as follows: for the 4,416 customers in the farm and home class, the proposed decrease will be \$109,357 or a negative 4.53% change in revenues; for the 147 customers in the residential space heating class, the proposed decrease will be \$7,793 or a negative 3.39% change in revenues; for the 4,060 customers in the irrigation class, the proposed decrease will be \$376,215 or a negative 4.15% change in revenues; for the 774 customers in the commercial class, the proposed decrease will be \$54,019 or a negative 6.17% change in revenues; for the 111 customers in the large power class the proposed decrease will be \$81,413 or a negative 8.11% change in revenues; for the 26 customers in the industrial class, the proposed decrease will be \$95,907 or a negative 3.74% change in revenues; for the 6 customers in the cotton gin class, there will be no change in revenues; and for the 2,888 customers in the lighting class, the proposed decrease will be \$15,296 or a negative 6.11% change in revenues.
The Utility also intends to change its service rules and regulations, including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

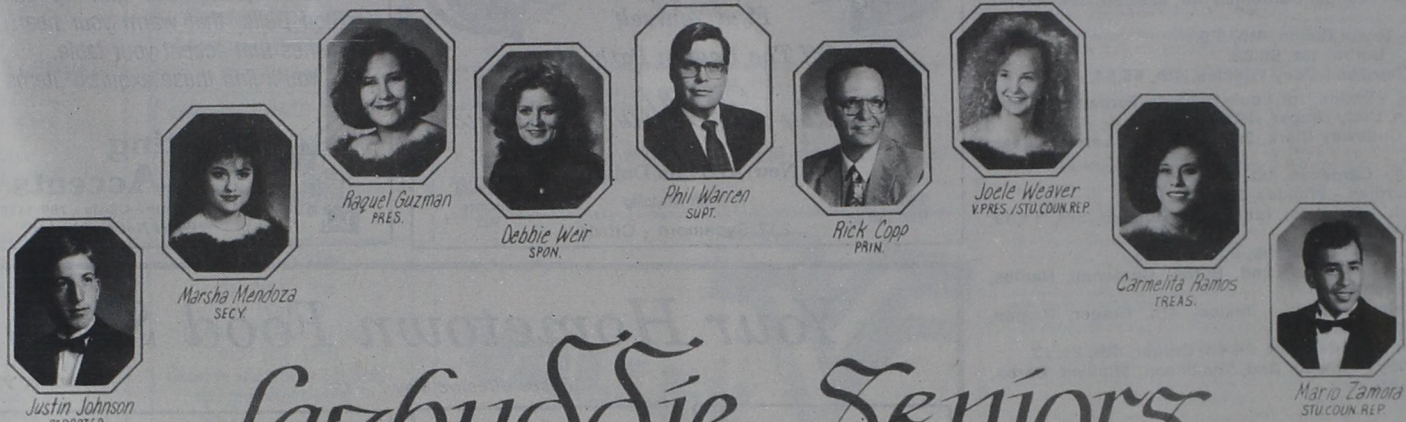

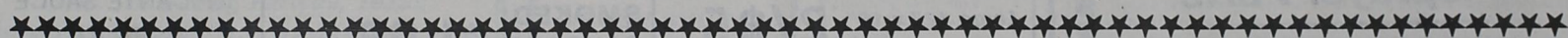
