# Tough flick to make

A guest column from wife Judy:

"Jurassic Park" must have been a tough movie to make. Kids love dinosaurs, and this movie promised lots and lots of them.

But the book the movie was based on was strictly adult level reading - not because of sex or foul language - but because it dealt with adult topics such as morality and ethics and the survival of our world as we know it - deep philosophical questions.

Director Steven Spielberg had to make several changes from the book to make a movie that the whole family could watch and understand.

Some critics are unhappy because the movie has "so much violence." They obviously didn't read the book; it has lots more blood and gore. Whole scenes were deleted about park workers winding up as lunch for the park's exhibits. The movie version obviously wasn't designed just to scare little kids or to upset folks with weak stomachs.

The writers cut out a whole subplot about dinosaurs eating babies in their cribs on the mainland near Jurassic Park. The subplot not only added lots of gore tothe book, it raised moral questions about highly advanced genetic technology being turned loose on unsuspecting bystanders.

And that subplot indicated how the dinosaurs could get loose from an "island" and get to the mainland. That probably was too strong for young kids to take.

Had those scenes been in the movie, they probably would have been much too graphic for little kids to watch. Keeping the subplot would also have used a make - believe movie situation to tell our children once again that Americans are bad guys in a world of good guys.

The movie has plenty of scary scenes involving children inter-acting with dinosaurs, but they involved older children who could use their intelligence and strength to defend themselves. They also involved people who had gone to Jurassic Park to see the dinosaurs, not unsuspecting bystanders.

The scary scenes involving dinosaurs are offset by pastoral scenes of dinosaurs munching on grass and leaves, and by scenes of scientists working to save the lives of animals. It is important for children to know that dinosaurs were just animals, not some kind of demonic force set loose in the world.

Some of the children who were in the movie theater the day we went to see "Juras-·sic Park," squirmed in their

seats a bit when the actors explained the process by which dinosaurs were cloned. Michael Crichton's adult audience could go back and reread a difficult passage or look up words in a dictionary so that they could understand the basic biological sequence of events that caused the dinosaurs to be brought back to

The movie contained just about as much scientific explanation as the kids in the audience could absorb in one sitting.

The folks making the movie "Jurassic Park," probably had to walk a tight rope to get enough science into the movie to make the story plausible for adults, but interesting enough for children.

The book raises lots of moral questions about scientists "playing God" with their genetic experiments to bring back to life a species that





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

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# Recipe of Week

Maryetta's Oatmeal Bread

(3 loaves)

- 4 c. boiling water
- 3 c. rolled oats
- 7 1/2 8 c. all purpose flour, preferably unbleached

2 pkg. active dry yeast

2 Tbs. salt 4 Tbs. salad oil

a1/2 c. molasses

Pour the boiling water over the oatmeal in a large bowl and leave to cool. Then stir in 2 cups of flour and the yeast. Place in a warm, draft - free spot and allow to rise, uncovered until doubled in bulk. Punch down and work in the salt, salad oil, molasses, and enough of the remaining flour to make a stiff dough. Turn out on a floured board and knead, adding extra flour if necessary, to make a smooth, pliable, firm dough about 10 minutes, but you can not knead too much. Divide the dough into three equal pieces, and form into loaves to fit three buttered 9 x 5 x 3 - inch loaf tins. Allow to rise again, uncovered, until doubled in bulk. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven 40-60 minutes, or until the bread sounds hollow when removed from the tins and rapped on top and bottom. Cool on racks before slicing.

it is essential to leave the dough uncovered during the two risings.



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

"I really like what I'm doing," says Luscombe. "I like the people - they have been very receptive."


