Just think about it: about 90 percent of the contestants come from Texico-Farwell, and you have to be at least 12 years old to enter. That's a good chunk of the community.

What's especially fun is the number of companies and groups that have their own contests based on the Tribune's. They include:

Today (Friday) there will be a pep rally, a senior class supper before the game, and the coronation of the queen at halftime of the big game against Jesus Chapel.

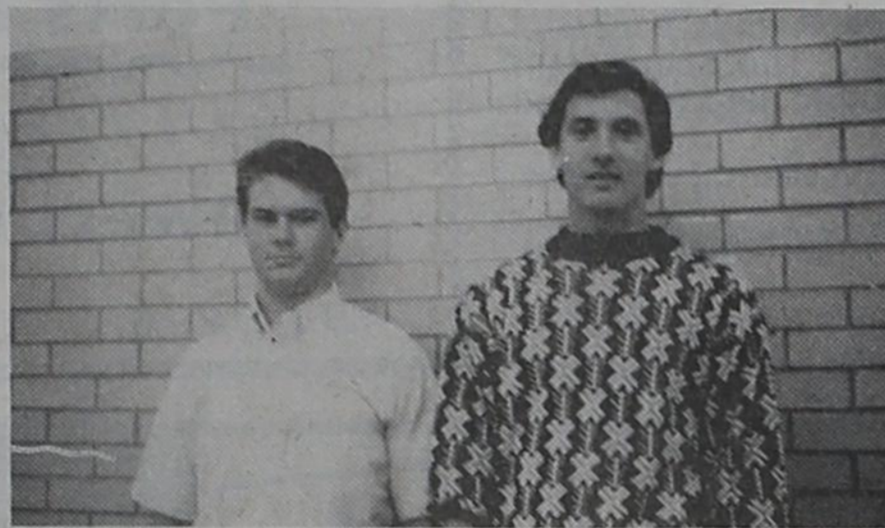
There was also a bonfire on Oct. 3 following the return of the junior high and JV teams.

Mural restored

Clovis artist Cherokee has completed his restoration and repainting of the mural on Farwell City Hall, and it is now back in place.

The mural was first commissioned in honor of the Texas Sesquicentennial celebration in 1986. It was to depict the history of our area.

Art appreciation buffs may notice a few changes in the current edition of the mural. Cherokee has changed the perspective and proportion of some parts of the painting, and added some details since he painted the original for Farwell's portion of the Texas sesquicentennial in 1986.

Viewers may note some additional changes, but here are a few that were noticed.

- The new mural features fewer cumulus clouds and less blue sky. The right side of the new mural has more orange sky and lots of wispy stratus clouds.

- The new edition has lots of birds in it that weren't in the original. There is an eagle on the left side, and two birds of prey on the right.

- There are two chickens - one white and one brown - caught on the cow catcher of the engine. The white one almost looks like a rampant eagle from some European crest.

- There are also lots of migratory birds heading north in the new edition.

- Below the mural the caption now reads "1905 Farwell Texas 1991" instead of "Sesquicentennial Farwell Texas 1836- 1986".

- The new mural has more yucca plants or bear grass than the original to note the fact that more local property has been turned over to CRP land.

- The land that the farmer is tilling also appears rockier in the new edition.

- The pumpkins in the new painting appear bigger and brighter.

- Some new people have been added to the new painting. There are more people driving the wagon train, and a bearded man has been added to guide the oxen pulling the wagons.

- A black child holding a watermelon has been added behind the white child eating a slice of watermelon.

- Both paintings feature two Native Americans and one cowboy beside the steam engine. In the first version of the painting, one of the Native Americans appears to be a spirit in the sky. In the newer version the three figures are grouped closer together, and they are all more lifelike. The facial features appear more prominent. The top Native American appears very lifelike, and he wears a full warbonnet instead of a few feathers.

- The center figure, a Native American, no longer wears a rosette of feathers on his arm nor does he

Texas changes laws for liability insurance

Justice of the Peace Louise Hancock alerts Texas motorists about new laws that affect them.

A major change concerns the need to show they motorist has liability insurance. If a person is convicted a second time of not having that insurance, his vehicle will be impounded for 6 months. And the impoundment will cost the motorist \$15 a day.

This means that, with a second conviction, even if the motorist shows proof of liability insurance the day after the conviction, the vehicle still will be impounded for 6 months.

And in order to get the vehicle back, the motorist

must show proof of having two years' worth of liability insurance.

Also, Mrs. Hancock noted that the schedule of fines has increased. Here are some examples:

Speeding: 60 - 64 miles per hour, from \$25 to \$35; 65 - 69, from \$35 to \$40; 70 - 74, from \$40 to \$50; 75 - 79, from \$45 to \$60; 80 - 84, from \$55 to \$75; 85 - 89, from \$80 to \$90; 90 - 94, from \$120 to \$140; 95 and up, from \$215 to \$228.

Running a stop sign - from \$30 to \$45.

Passing violations, from \$40 to \$45.

Failure to yield right of way, from \$40 to \$45.

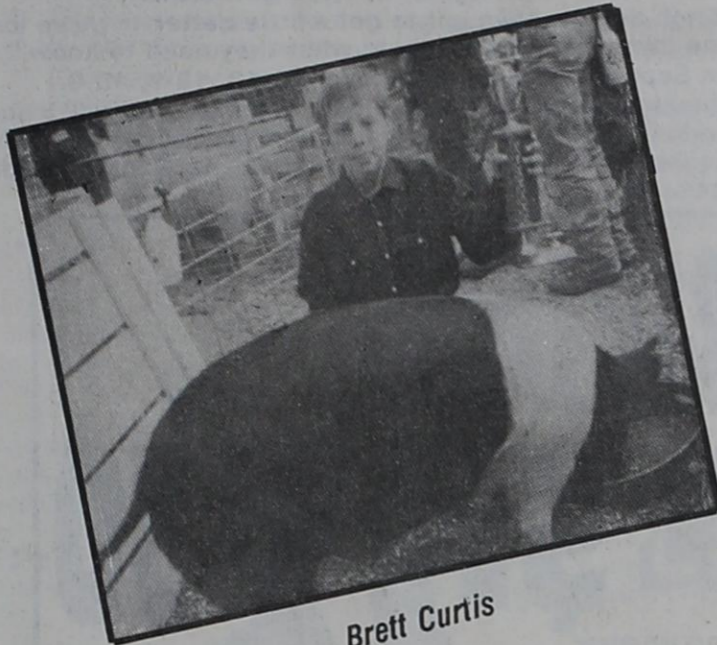

The Twin Cities are fortunate to have two active 4-H organizations in Parmer and Curry Counties.

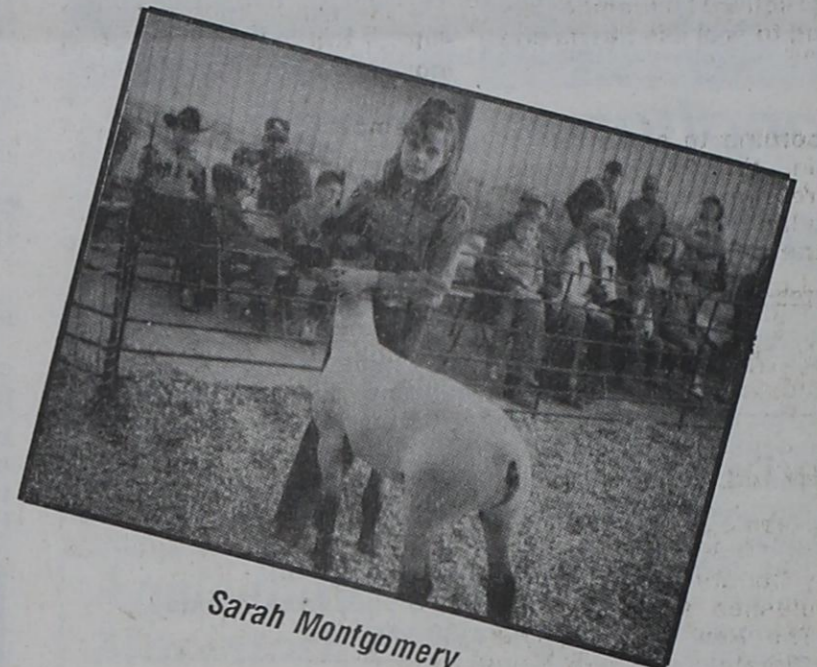

Sudan defeats Farwell, 22-6

The Sudan Hornets beat the Farwell Steers last Friday in a home game, 22-6.

Farwell, 0-3-1, has an open date this weekend before starting district play against Bovina next Friday.

The short-handed Steers showed a lot of gumption after falling behind at the half, 22-0. They didn't give up, but actually outscored Sudan 6-0 in the second half, plus being stopped by inches at the Hornet 1 yard line on another series.

After Farwell started on its own 22, Sudan intercepted a pass at the Steer 29. With 30 seconds left in the half, Sudan scored on a 10-yard run. The kick was good and it was 22-0. Sudan intercepted its 4th pass of the half just before halftime.

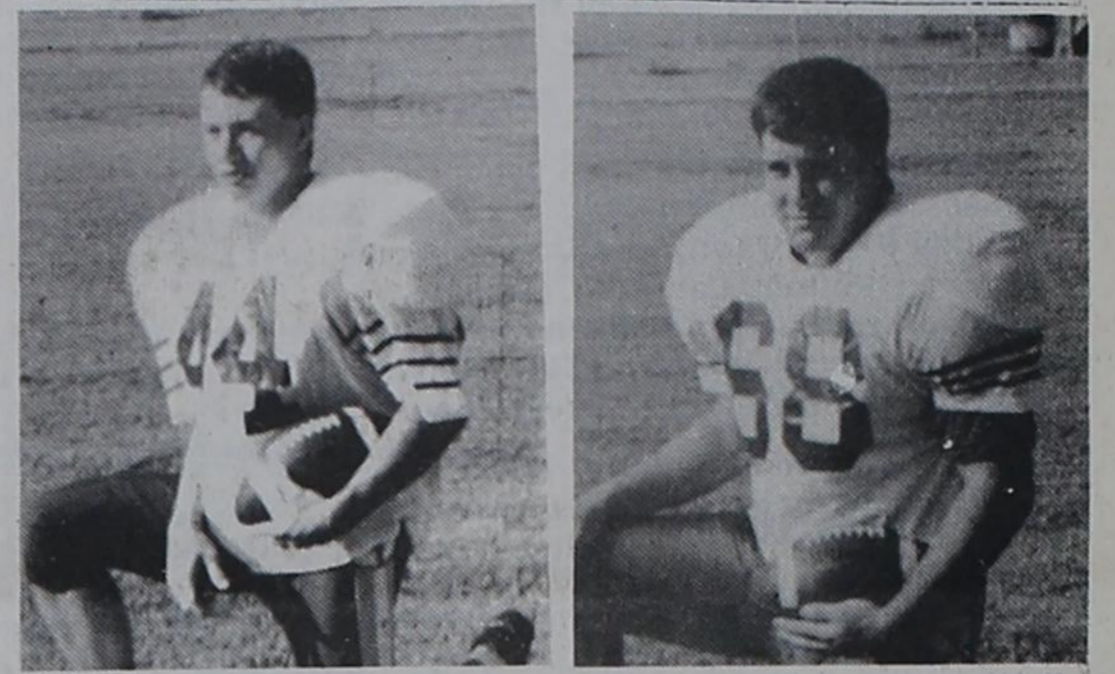

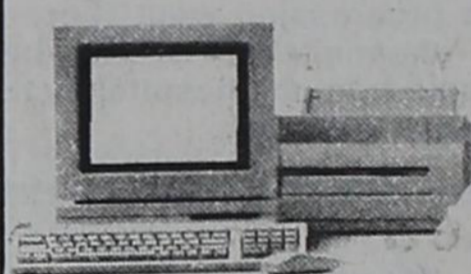

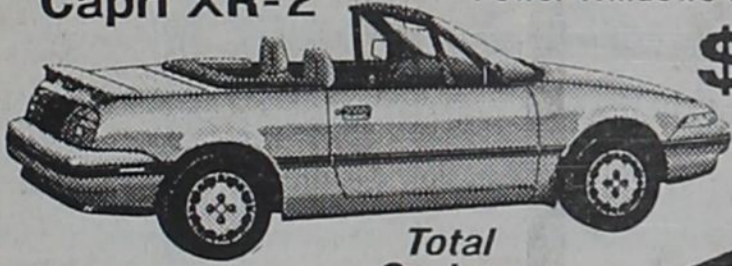

It looked like it might be a high-scoring game but both defenses hit hard and played tough the second quarter. Neither team scored.

In the 3rd quarter, Kenny Shaw ran in 12 yards for a TD, giving Texico the lead. The Estrada kick made it 14-7. Less than a minute later, Jal struck back when Juan Saucedo caught a long 20-yard pass from Kendall James for a Jal TD. The kick was blocked and Texico still led, 14-12.

In the final quarter, Louie Delgado caught a 31-yard pass from Shaw for the final TD. Again, the Estrada kick was good and it was 21-13 in favor of the Wolverines.

Gonzales, Anthony Garcia and Delgado intercepted Jal passes. Akers, Garcia and Delgado recovered fumbles. It was a tough fought game but the Wolverines never weakened.

Individual statistics were: rushing - Shaw, 23 for 119 yards; Levin Gooden, 14 for 94; Gonzales, 13 for 42; Akers, 1 for 2. Passing - Gonzales, 2 for 6 and 29 yards; Shaw, 1 for 1 and 31 yards. Receiving - Delgado, 2 for 53 yards, and Akers, 1 for 7.

Team statistics were: first downs - Texico 13, Jal 10; rushing - Texico, 51 for 257 yards, Jal, 28 for 153; yards passing - Texico, 60, and Jal, 160; total yards gained - Texico 317, Jal 313; passing - Texico 3 for 7, Jal, 8 for 25; punting - Texico, 5 for 24.5 yard average, and Jal, 3 for 33 yard average; penalties - Texico, 5 for 45 yards, and Jal, 7 for 45 yards.

Coach Bruce Scroggins commented: "Our defense is playing very well; the whole team played well, and we got better."

Texico plays Springer tonight (Friday) in an away game. It's the first district game for the defending state champion Wolverines. "We've only beaten them three times in our history, and never beaten them back to back," said Scroggins.

Texico is on the longest winning streak in the state of New Mexico for 11 man football: they have won 12 straight games. "I hope 13 is lucky for us," said Scroggins.
