Williams, who is a leader in several agricultural organizations, explained the negative impact of the Clinton administration's proposed energy tax plan. The energy tax, if passed by Congress, would hike the cost of production of farm produce dramatically. Irrigation wells, tractors, trucks, and harvesting equipment all use petroleum products. Fertilizers and insecticides are also petroleum-based products that farmers use. The cost of production of food would rise due to the proposed tax.

Since the interview with Williams was done, the Clinton administration agreed to trim its energy tax plan and seek more spending cuts instead. Exactly how much will be trimmed remains to be seen.

On June 22, a pizza and sash party will be held. The time and place will be announced at the Coke Party.

The committee plans to schedule individual appointments for complete beauty makeovers and imaging at Vogue Beauty College for the contestants.

A style show will be sponsored by Rip's Ladies Wear, of Texico. It will be held at 3 p.m. cdt July 10 at the Texico Educational Complex.

On July 28, a rehearsal for the dinner and talent will be held. The time will be announced later.

On July 29, will be the dinner and talent judging at the Farwell Community Center. All the judges will be from out of town. All the contestants will vote for "Miss Congeniality."

The contest is open to any girl attending Farwell or Texico High Schools and living in either Texico or Farwell school district.

BTQ Queen Contestant Rules

1. Entries are open to any girl residing in Texico or Farwell school districts and attending Farwell or Texico High School next year.
2. She cannot be over the age of 18.
3. Entrant must be of good health and of good moral character.
4. There will be a scholarship awarded to the queen upon completion of high school and enrollment to further her education or training.
 - A. She will be given a certificate at the park when she is crowned Queen during Bordertown Day's activities.
 - B. The scholarship account will be set up as Bordertown Day's Queen with her name and the names of the President and Secretary of Bordertown Days.
 - C. The scholarship must be used within 3 years of completion of high school.
 - D. The Queen must attend a college, university, trade or vocational school.
 - E. The scholarship check will be made payable to school of choice of the Queen.
 - F. The queen will forfeit the scholarship if she does not complete her term as Queen or does not further her education after completion of high school.
 - G. Interest build up in this account will be used for future scholarships.
 5. There will be an automatic forfeit if the Queen marries, becomes pregnant or does not complete high school during her year as Queen.
 6. The crown will be passed on to the first runnerup or 2nd or 3rd, if necessary.
 7. If substitute serves as Queen then she cannot be a contestant that year, but will be eligible for the next year.
 8. Each year the Bordertown Days Queen Committee has the right to set guidelines on suggestions for judging, activities, and prizes.

Farwell police chief to issue tickets

Farwell Police Chief Roy McGaa is notifying city residents that because of the number of complaints he has received about illegal parking, he will start issuing tickets for violations.

Laws say that vehicles must park parallel to and within 18 inches of the right-hand curb or edge of the

roadway.

Starting this weekend, McGaa will issue written warnings for first offenders. Second and subsequent offenders will get tickets.

After July 1, no more written warnings will be given.

The fine and court costs for this violation total \$47.50.

The Farwell School Board voted Tuesday on pay raises for employees.

Supt. Richard Boothby said the state mandates \$1,140 raises for all returning teachers. This translates into pay hikes of between 3 percent and 4 percent.

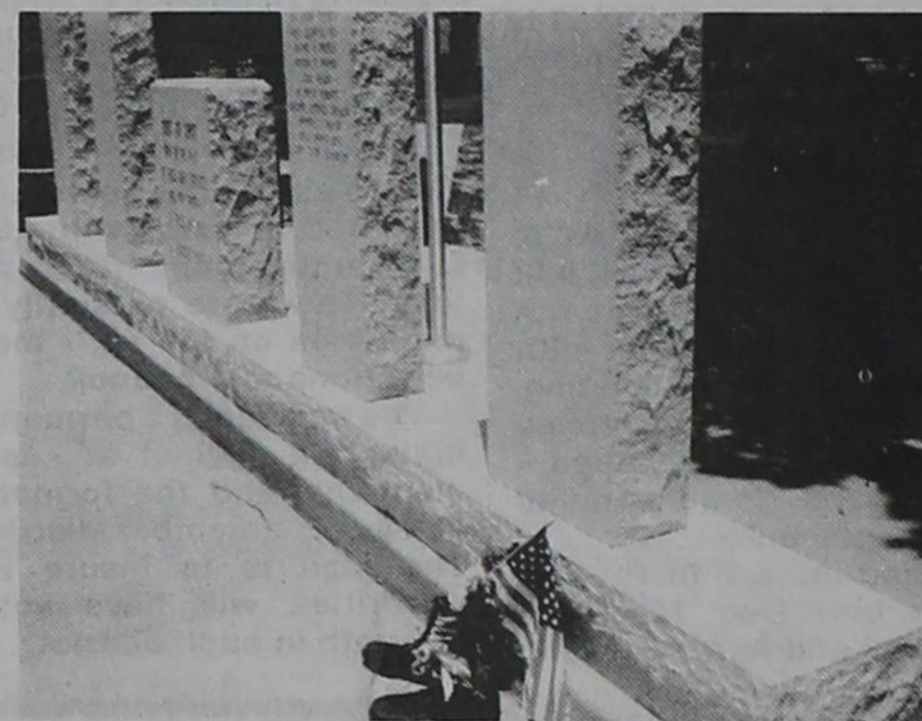
The same percentage raises will be given support personnel.

Hutchison wins Texas race for U.S. Senate

Republican Kay Hutchison whipped Democrat Bob Krueger in Saturday's election for U.S. Senator from Texas. Hutchison won by a two-thirds majority statewide - and by over 87 percent in Parmer County.

Gov. Ann Richards appointed Krueger to the Senate post earlier this year when Lloyd Bentsen was tapped for U.S. Secretary of the Treasury by President Clinton. In Parmer County, Hutchison had 963 votes. Krueger had 138.

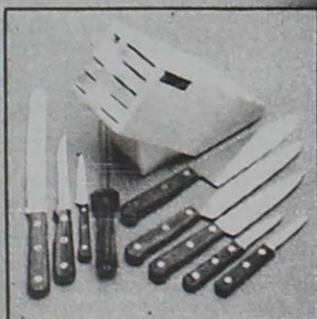

On June 2, they were called to a possible vehicle fire on Hwy. 84 toward Lariat at 6:45 p.m. There was no fire.

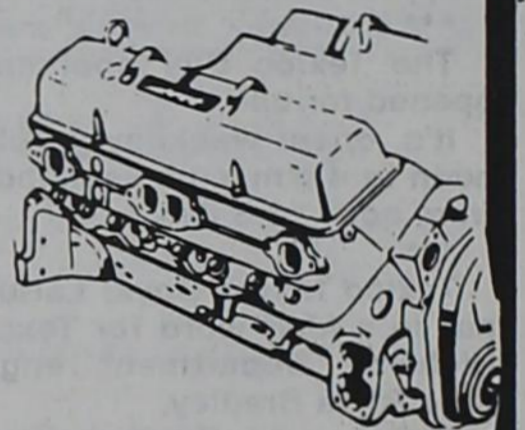

Beware bagworms

Bagworms are one of the major pests of junipers and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in late May and early June when the bagworms are small.

In the spring, bagworms larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on foliage. They soon begin to construct their own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until the bags are about 1 1/2 inches long. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in the egg stage on trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on a tree contains from 500 to 1500 eggs.

Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest. But if bagworms were present on plants last year and control measures were not applied, chances are very good that an insecticide will be needed this spring.

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion and orthene. The biological insecticide Bacillus thurengiensis can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. Always read and follow the label instructions when applying insecticides.



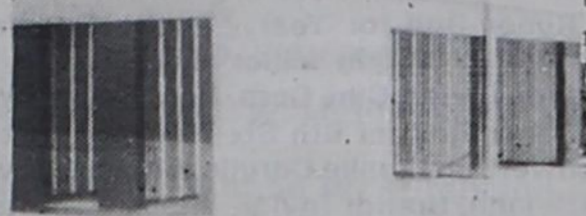

Texico seeks new police officer

The Texico City Council held a special meeting June 4 to accept the resignation of City Marshal Fry Urioste, who cited personal reasons for his decision.

A week earlier, the council had asked for the resignation, giving Urioste a deadline of June 4. He had served as city marshal more than a year. Earlier he had been deputy marshal under Brent Byrum.

Also at the meeting, the council reviewed the list of inventory items that Urioste presented.

The council met again Tuesday and decided to open the

application process again for a law enforcement officer.

Since current deputy marshal Gilbert Holguin has only had the post a few weeks, the council probably won't decide on who gets the city marshal's post for some time after a new officer is hired.

In other business, the council:

- Called an executive session to discuss litigation and personnel.
- Heard complaints of children playing after dark on South Garwood and North Lamara streets, causing a dangerous situation for motorists. Holguin will be asked to check on it.
- Received one bid for surplus property, from Twin City Machine Shop, Farwell. It was accepted.
- Received one bid for cemetery fencing, from Triple N Ag Service, Portales. It was accepted.
- Approved closing the 200 block of Turner and 300 block of Hamlin for the First Baptist Church's Vacation Bible School this week.
- Discussed designated parking for city employees. Their vehicles have been parked on the west side of City Hall, but have taken a beating when the commodity giveaways are held. City Clerk Marie Christian will report back on a plan.
- Heard Mrs. Christian say the highway recreation grant will arrive soon. It includes \$300 for summer youth employment (recycling) and \$548 for the sprinkler system that had already been bought for Lions Park.
- Heard David Snider say he needed a higher pressure water meter at his home. The council agreed that, for this hook-up, he would have to pay the difference between the current meter and the new one.
- Approved letting KKR Park be used for meals given under privileged children.
- Again discussed the sewer line planned for the Allie Burris residence. She wants the city to pay for it. City Attorney Duane Hamar said there are legal questions involved.

Texico School Board hires Cheryl Scott

The Texico School Board Tuesday hired Texico graduate Cheryl Scott as a physical education teacher, coach and junior high language arts teacher.

Also hired were: Randy Ragland, high school math; Denise Blevins, speech pathologist, and Krystie Prindle, elementary school special education.

Current employee Evangeline Garcia's hours were increased because she will add some custodial duties to the cafeteria duties she already has.

The board is also considering applicants for a fifth grade teacher and a Chapter 1 teacher.

Salaries for substitute teachers were raised to \$38 and \$42.

In other business, the board:

- Changed the graduation requirements for Texico students. Because the students will have a six period school day, the number of units required for graduation has been reduced.
- Voted to purchase new computers for the high school. The computers currently used in the high school will be used in the junior high computer lab.
- Reviewed summer projects including paving the parking lots and re-roofing the buildings.
- Reviewed the responses that the community made to the accountability report.
- Reviewed equipment needs with the bus contractor. Texico has been denied state funds for new bus equipment the last two years, and the bus contractor will have to maintain the old equipment.
- Heard that Texico Schools will be reviewed by the New Mexico State Department of Education during this school year.
- Received a Department of Energy math and science grant for training and technology. A committee consisting of Don Roberts, Gary Singletery, and Oran J. Autrey, and headed by Joel Pate will oversee this project.
- Granted bids for equipment maintenance to: Singing Sam for sewing machine repairs; Gene Tunnell for typewriter maintenance; and Phillips House of Music for band instrument maintenance.

Lazbuddie okays pay raises for teachers

The Lazbuddie School Board Tuesday hired John Black to be an assistant coach, varsity cross country coach and varsity girls' track coach. The native of Beeville, Texas, was raised in Denver City, Texas.

Also, Supt. Phil Warren will take on an added responsibility - he will coach the varsity girls' basketball team.

In other business, the board:

- Hired Baker Agency for student insurance policy.
- Accepted the career ladder committee recommendations. Put on Level II were Mark Scisson, Deborah Hall, Cindy Furr, Becky Jones, Alice Barber, Diane Hernandez, Chester Jones, Tanya Steinbock and Dick Moore. They will get an extra \$1,684. Put on Level III were Pat Spencer, Hardy Carlisle, Marca Morris. They get an \$3,368.
- Okayed 6 percent pay raises for most of the auxiliary personnel.
- Hired Raymond Zamora as an aide for summer school.
- Discussed goals for the school system. They included improving student achievement through technology, raising statewide academic test scores, and working on students' self-esteem.
- Hired Dean Black as driver's ed instructor.
