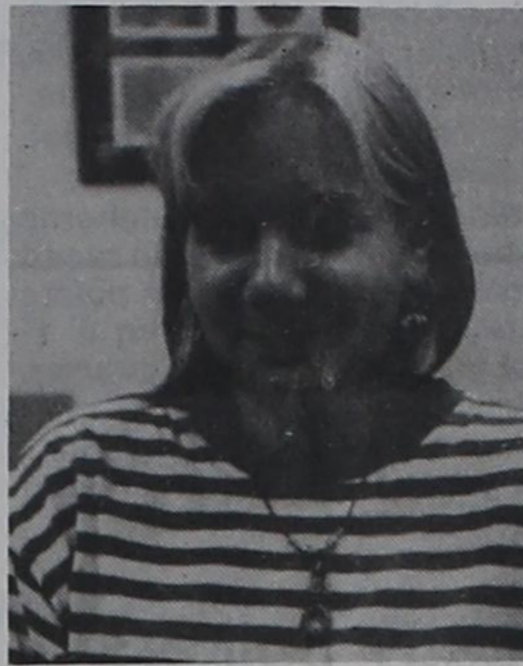

German girl studies here



Juliane Schaeuble

Juliane Schaeuble is Farwell High School's foreign exchange student from Gengenbach, Germany a town of about 10,000 people near Freiburg.

While she is in Farwell, Juliane will be staying with the Gorman Byrd family.

Juliane has visited the United States before, so coming to Farwell didn't present the kind of culture shock that it does to some of our foreign visitors. She was previously involved in a three week cultural exchange program that took her to the Chicago area. Her father has also traveled to the U.S., so she knew what to expect here.

When asked about her first impressions of this part of the USA she replied, "there is more space around here for farming." She added that she is accustomed to a more hilly and woody terrain back in Germany.

Folks here have made Juliane feel welcome here. "Yesterday I attended a birthday party for Texico's German foreign exchange student, Tina Hartmann," Juliane said. It was held in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Waylan Thomas just west of Texico.

Folks at the Baptist Church have also made Juliane feel right at home. "I enjoy church here. At home it is more strict."

Religion is a class that students in Juliane's school must study. They have a choice of attending religion classes taught by either Catholic or Protestant teachers. She also takes Latin, English, French, German, mathematics, physical education, biology, chemistry, physics, art, music history and theory, politics, and world history. She attends 6 of these classes per day which means that she does not attend all of them every day.

There is normally plenty of studying to do when she gets home from school at about one o'clock in the afternoon.

"If you want to play a special sport, you join a club," she says. These clubs do not normally meet at the school, they are extra enrichment that the parents provide for their children.

As Juliane was being interviewed for this story, coach Patsy Camp brought in an ice pack for Juliane to hold to her knee. She had injured the knee earlier in the day while playing basketball. Obviously, Juliane must enjoy sports because she didn't allow the injury to stop her from smiling.

Juliane says that she enjoys all sports, especially volleyball, skiing, swimming and tennis.

She also plays piano. And, if she has nothing else to do with her time, Juliane and her friends go to one of the larger towns like Frieburg, Germany or to Strassbourg, France.

Juliane's parents are Wolfgang and Ingeborg Schaeuble. He father holds a political position in Germany. He is active in the Christian Democratic Union party.

Her family also includes one brother, Hans-Joerg, and two sisters, Christina and Anna.

When she returns to Germany Juliane will complete her studies, and then she will go to the university where she will either study sports or journalism.

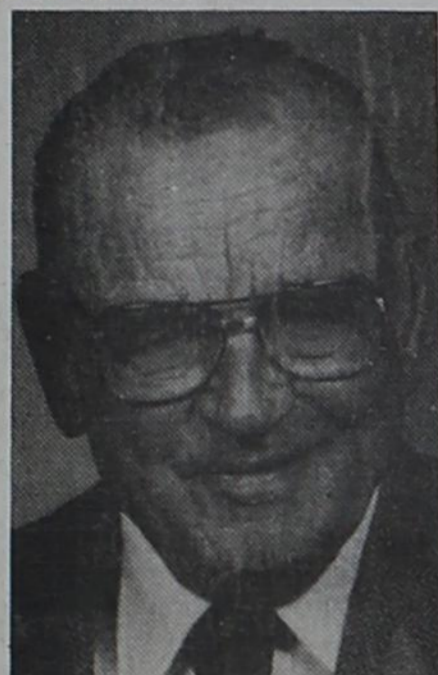
Jose Martinez

Longhorns blast Christoval

The Lazbuddie Longhorns showed they are a power to be reckoned with as they blasted Christoval, the state's 2nd ranked 6-Man football team, Saturday at Ackerly, 42-6.

The Longhorns are now 4-0. Christoval fell to 3-1. Lazbuddie hosts Jesus Chapel tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. Lazbuddie was ranked 8th in the state going into the game.

As usual, quarterback Brett Thomas was on target, completing 15 of 22 passes for 209 yards.

The first quarter saw both teams tally. The Longhorns scored on the opening kickoff when Leland Brockman raced 80 yards for the score. Brockman then kicked the points after and Lazbuddie led 8-0. Christoval retaliated on a 1-yard plunge. The kick failed and it was 8-6 after one quarter.

Lazbuddie then turned it on in the second period, scoring a trio of unanswered touchdowns. Matt Cozbey hauled in 3 TD passes from Thomas, for 10 yard, 17 yard and 27 yard

scores. Brockman's kick was good on one of three attempts and Lazbuddie led at the half, 28-6.

The Longhorn defense continued playing strongly in the second half, not allowing Christoval to score at all. Meanwhile, Brockman tallied on a 27-yard TD pass from Thomas in the 3rd quarter, followed by a good Brockman kick. And in the final period, Lazbuddie capped its victory with a 10-yard TD pass from Mario Zamora to Cozbey.

Lazbuddie had 323 yards on offense, while Christoval was limited to 216.

Coach Mark Scisson commented, "It was a hot, windy day and we were concerned about the wind affecting our passing attack. It had some impact. But we had a super defense. It really came through early even though we had two fumbles and an interception. Christoval only got 215 yards overall - 188 rushing and 27 through the air. Christoval tried 18 passes but they dropped a lot of them."

Matt Cozbey was named Offensive Player of the Week, for catching 4 TD passes. Cozbey also punted for an average of 52 yards, including a 67-yarder. Coach Scisson named the whole team as Defensive Player of the Week. He substituted freely and the entire squad held Christoval in check.

Underdog Steers whitewash Whiteface, 17-0

The underdog Farwell Steers whitewashed the Whiteface Antelopes last Friday, 17-0, in an away game.

Farwell, 2-2, hosts Anton at 8 tonight (Friday) at W. M. Roberts Stadium. Farwell, which was overwhelmed in its first two games, has come back with two big wins.

The game opened with Farwell starting at its 37. Shawn Haseloff gained 7 and Lance Anderson galloped for 11 more. Ryan Williams hit Shawn Haseloff with a 6-yard pass. Farwell went for it at the Antelope 45 on 4th and 6 but Williams was sacked.

On defense, Derrick Haseloff and Rob Pomper had good tackles. On 4th and 9, Whiteface elected to go for it at the Steer 41. But Kade Kent collected an 18-yard sack. Farwell was stopped and punted to the Whiteface 18.

On defense, tackles were made by Clint Austin, Pomper, Michael Mendoza, Nash Armstrong, Jody Mahaney and Derrick Haseloff. Whiteface was stopped at midfield and punted. Brent Harrison returned it 10 yards to the Steer 33 as the first quarter ended.

Farwell couldn't move the ball and Lupe Garza unloaded a 45-yard punt to the Whiteface 22. On defense, Shawn Haseloff, Jeremy Ortiz and Mahaney had good tackles. Ortiz recovered a Whiteface fumble at the Antelope 47.

Anderson then broke away for two strong runs - for 28 yards, then for 15 yards to the Whiteface 15. With 2:47 left

in the half, Clay Corn hit a 35-yard field goal to give Farwell a 3-0 lead.

Whiteface got the ball back at its 28. On defense, Mahaney, Pomper and Mendoza had tackles. The Antelopes punted to Harrison whose twisting 7-yard return for an apparent TD was called back due to penalties. Farwell went into the locker room up 3-0 at the half.

Corn opened the 3rd quarter by kicking to the Whiteface 17. Tackles were made by Harrison, Derrick Haseloff and Pomper. Whiteface punted but regained the ball on a fumble at midfield. Pomper made a strong stop on 3rd down, forcing Whiteface to punt. Farwell was stopped and Garza punted to the Steer 40.

The Antelope drive was stopped when Austin recovered a fumble at the Farwell 34. Anderson then ran for 13 yards up the gut. Harrison raced around the corner for 27 yards, aided by a strong block by Shawn Haseloff. Then Williams hits Harrison in the end zone with a 25-yard TD pass at 4:33. The extra point kick was wide and Farwell led 9-0.

Whiteface was stopped quickly deep in its own territory. The snap for the 4th down punt was high. Mahaney knocked the ball loose from the punter and Pomper scored a TD by recovering the loose ball in the end zone. The extra point kick missed and Farwell led 15-0 at the 2:23 mark of the third quarter.

Farwell kicked to the Antelope 23. A good tackle by Kent held the Antelopes in check. Again, a 4th down snap for a punt was high. This time, Corn tackled the punter in the end zone for a safety with 45 seconds left in the 3rd period. Farwell now led 17-0.

Whiteface kicked from its 20 and the ball carried near the Farwell goal line. Austin made a strong return to the Steer 30, getting Farwell out of trouble. Farwell moved the ball behind a 20-yard pass from Williams to Dean Rubio and a 5-yard run by Austin. But a pass failed on 4th and 4 at the Antelope 32.

On defense, tackles were recorded by Justin Mahaney, Harrison, Mendoza and Pomper. Although it was on its own 25, Whiteface went for it on 4th and 10. A pass fell incomplete and Farwell took over.

Harrison broke 3 tackles to gain 18 yards to the Antelope 7. But a pass was intercepted at the goal line.

On defense, Anderson recorded a quarterback sack. After Farwell got the ball back, Corn tried a 43-yard field goal attempt which was straight but went under the cross bar. On defense, Justin Mahaney had a good tackle.

Coach Rex Cumpton commented, "Defensively, it was a good ballgame. We held their No. 1 offensive player to minus 19 yards on 17 carries. We executed our assignments on defense well this week. We had some bright spots on offense but still have some work to do. Our focus is changing and

we're improving every week."

Individual statistics were: rushing - Harrison, 10 attempts for 56 yards; Anderson, 11 for 73; Austin, 3 for 3; Shawn Haseloff, 3 for 7. Receiving - Rubio, 1 for 23; Shawn Haseloff, 1 for 30, and Harrison, 1 for 30.

Team statistics were: first downs - Farwell 8, Whiteface 6; rushing - Farwell 33 for 103 yards; Whiteface 40 for 26; passing - Farwell 3 of 11 for 60 yards; Whiteface 3 of 6 for 20; punts - Farwell 3 for 40 yard average; Whiteface 6 for 36 yard average; penalties - Farwell 2 for 20 yards; Whiteface 3 for 20.

Thomas, Gooden still lead

Here's a look at the area leaders as compiled by the Lubbock newspaper:

Texico ranks 8th on team offense with 230 yards a game, and 8th on team defense, allowing 271 yards a game. Kelvin Gooden is first among the area rushers with 752 yards after 5 games - 150 yards a game. Gooden also is 2nd among the area scorers with 43 points - 7 TDs and 1 extra point run. Texico's Louie Delgado is 9th among the area passers with 8 completions in 30 attempts for 155 yards - 31 yards a game.

Among the area 6-Man teams, Lazbuddie ranks 4th on team offense with 392 yards a game, and 5th on team defense, allowing 264 yards a game. Quarterback Brett Thomas is 1st among the passers, with 65 completions in 89 attempts for 937 yards - 234 yards a game. Although Lazbuddie has nobody among the top rushers, it boasts 4 top receivers: Leland Brockman, 1st, with 18 catches for 293 yards; Matt Cozby, 2nd, 17 for 295; Jon Colby Miller, 4th, 15 for 189, and Mario Zamora, 7th, 13 for 106.

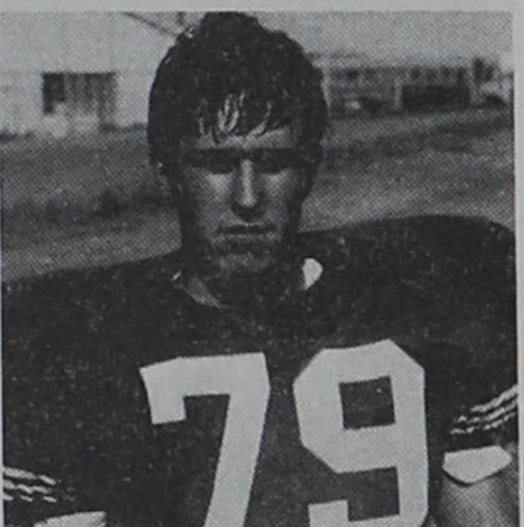

Wolverines fall; look forward to district play

The Texico Wolverines faced a tough Nazareth team last Friday, losing to the Swifts, 35-0, in an away game.

Texico, 2-3, opens its district play against Springer Saturday at home at 1:30 p.m.

Nazareth kicked off and Kelvin Gooden returned it 35 yards. Gooden then carried the ball the next three downs, gaining 9 yards. Due to a penalty, it was 4th and 10 and Texico punted.

Pat Chumley tackled the punt returner. On defense, tackles were made by Corey Horner, Johnny Salinas, Chumley and Steve Horner. The Swifts moved the ball, hitting a pass at the Texico 20 for another first down. At 5:14, Nazareth scored from the 5. The kick made it 7-0.

Salinas returned the kickoff to the 20. Gooden broke through on first down and raced for 40 yards. Gooden then gained 6. Deep in Nazareth territory, Texico lost a fumble.

On defense, tackles were contributed by Salinas, Tyrone Gooden and Matthew Williams. On a key 3rd down play, the Swifts completed a 54-yard pass for their second TD at 2:11. The kick made it 14-0 in the first quarter.

Louie Delgado returned the kickoff to start the Wolverine offense on its 19. Kelvin Gooden carried for 9 yards. A holding penalty stymied the Wolverines and Nathan Katterling punted to the 46.

Nazareth hit a short pass, with Steve Horner on the tackle. Then a Swift runner broke loose for a long run but was tackled by Anthony Garcia. Despite tackles by Tyrone Gooden, Corey Horner, Steve Horner, Garcia, Richard Stephens and Garcia, the Swifts moved the ball downfield. They scored on a 1-yard plunge at 8:27 of the second quarter. The kick made it 21-0.

The return was fumbled but recovered by Steve Cloud. Texico was held and punted. Nazareth moved forward quickly for their 4th TD, scoring on a 17 yard run at 3:46. The kick made it 28-0.

Chumley returned the kick to the Texico 42. Salinas gained a couple of yards, then Kelvin Gooden raced 26 yards to the Swift 26. But Texico was stopped short of another first down just before halftime.

The Wolverines kicked off to open the third quarter. Bobby Winegeart tackled the kick returner. Kelvin Gooden then intercepted a Swift pass, but it was nullified due to a penalty. Moments later, He intercepted another pass - this one was legal.

Kelvin Gooden gained 15 yards. He was injured on the play and came out of the game for a short while. Winegeart, Hadley Gilbert and Mike Eaton took turns carrying the ball but came up short of a first down.

Tackles by Steve Horner, Salinas, Williams and Luis Estrada held the Swifts in check. They punted but Texico lost another fumble. The Swifts moved downfield and were on the Texico 5 when Steve Horner intercepted and returned it to the 22.

Texico was held and punted, with Charles Williams tackling the punt returner. Now in the final period, Nazareth moved the ball again, despite tackles by Corey Horner, Garcia and Salinas. Winegeart deflected a pass from the 5, but Nazareth scored on the ground from there at the 8 minute mark. The kick made it 35-0.

On offense, Gilbert and Eaton runs made a first down. Chumley then caught a 17 yard pass but time ran out shortly thereafter.

Coach Bruce Scroggins commented, "We got down into their territory three times but couldn't get the ball into the end zone. We had a tough time in practice trying to simulate the Nazareth quarterback, who is an outstanding passer. We couldn't get enough pressure on him as he hit the short passes and was finding his 2nd and 3rd receivers."

"We also let them off the hook when we had them at 4th and 18 and 3rd and 20. But we did a better job in the second half, once we got used to their quarterback. And we were hurt by our fumbles and penalties."

Individual statistics were: rushing - Kelvin Gooden, 18 for 137 yards; Salinas, 1 for 2; Gilbert, 5 for 12; Eaton, 3 for 13; receiving - Chumley, 1 for 17; Tyrone Gooden, 1 for 1; Kelvin Gooden, 1 for 10. passing - Delgado, 3 of 8 for 28 yards.
