## Texico residents asked to help

Texico residents are being asked by city officials to help find the person responsible for dumping large amounts of oil along South Garwood Street.

At Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting, councilwoman Carolyn Burrows asked that anyone who saw the oil being dumped should contact deputy marshal Kirk Roberts at Texico City Hall.

Roberts said he has a suspect in the dumping but needs the community's assistance to verify it.

In other business, the council:  
- Unanimously denied a variance request from Nora Netcher dealing with a setback requirement for her mobile home at 807 Turner St. The 5-foot setback next to the adjoining property line wasn't observed when the home was put there. Twelve letters were sent nearby property owners. Two came back - one for and one against.

Mrs. Netcher said the letter that was sent out to the property owners didn't state clearly that they should return their comments in order to be counted. She said some of those property owners told her they didn't object to the variance but didn't realize they needed to return the letters.

It was indicated that another variance will be sought. And councilmen Oran Jay Autrey and Mrs. Burrows were asked to develop a plan for folks to get a copy of city ordinances that affect buildings when they decide to build or bring in a mobile home.

- Heard councilman Ronnie Warmuth announce that Oct. 10 will be the city's annual cleanup day. He has talked with the three school principals and poster and essay contests

## Parmer passes budget

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday held a brief public hearing before approving the annual budget.

No community members attended except for county officials.

The vote was 3-2 in favor of the budget. In favor were commissioners Robert White and Tom Ware plus county judge Bonnie Clayton (who broke the tie). Opposed were commissioners Ernest Anthony and Raymond McGehee.

Anthony and McGehee said they voted against the budget because it included pay raises for the county commissioners plus higher travel allowances. They didn't want to accept two raises.

All the elected county officials and county employees received 3 percent across the board pay hikes.

The travel allowance was raised from \$300 a month to \$400 a month for the commissioners. This hike was made because several taxes, such as Social Security and withholding, are now taken out of the total. So the \$400, with taxes, is designed to get closer to the \$300 that was without taxes.

The new tax rate will be at .3113 cents.

## C.E.D. hikes tax

The Parmer County Education District Board voted unanimously Tuesday to set the tax rate at .8250 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The rate is up 12 percent. Each school district in Parmer County will also set its own tax rate. Each school's rate, plus the C.E.D. rate will equal the total school tax.

Last week, Farwell Schools, anticipating the higher C.E.D. rate, lowered its own rate to keep the school rate the same as last year - \$1.215.

The C.E.D. Board also conducted a public hearing Aug. 20 on the property tax hike. No residents attended.

## Texico totals up

Texico School Supt. R. L. Richards reports an increase in enrollment this year over last year's first day figures.

Texico Schools showed a total enrollment of 525 compared to 493 the past two years.

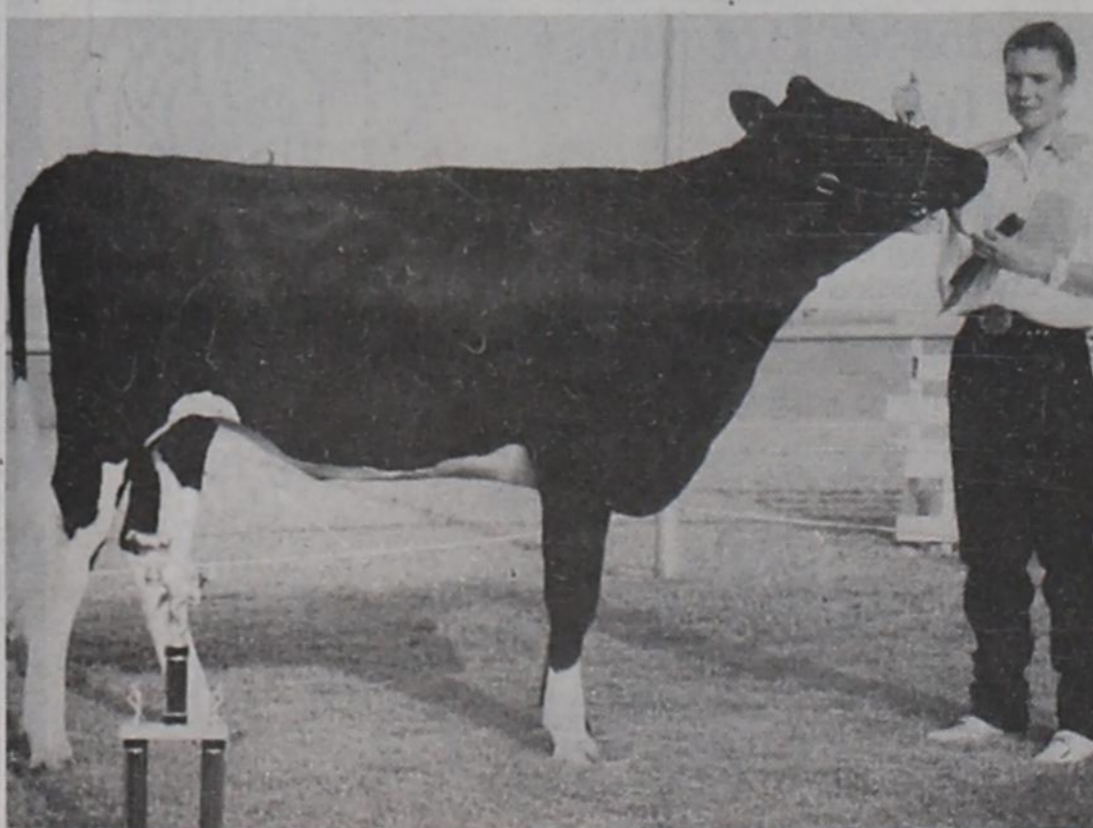
Texico High School enrollment jumped from 144 to 165.

Texico Junior High rose from 123 to 136.

Texico Elementary School figures declined slightly from 226 to 224. The elementary school figures include pre-school children who are only in school a part of the day.

will be held. He said letters, in English and Spanish, will be put out at all homes in Texico alerting residents to the cleanup.

Acknowledged that the state has approved the city's 1992-93 budget. It includes cost of living raises for city employees, said Mayor Doyal LaRue, and the council tried to hold the line on all other expenses.

Had a lengthy discussion on the status of Avenue F. Here's the situation: the Meeks family wants the city to maintain it and has a document showing it was deeded to the city. But city attorney Duane Hamar said it's not clear who owns the street, and said it would need to be surveyed.

Hamar said this wouldn't work - you either give it over or you don't. Hamar said they should talk with Curry County about maintaining it. In the past, the county hasn't wanted to, saying it's private property or within the city. Mrs. Burrows said they should talk with county commissioner Paul Dee Barnes.

There were no decisions made. Approved spending \$1,700 of state and federal funds given the marshal's office for a video recorder. Marshal Fry Urioste said there's \$14,000 in the LEA fund.

Urioste also wanted car phones for the two police cars - a total of \$50 a month. LEA funds would be used. This was tabled.

Called an executive session for pending litigation and personnel matters.

Heard LaRue report that the engineer's fee for testing the site for the new city water well would be up to \$12,000 and the city doesn't have that money right now. The state grant is for a new well, but doesn't include engineering fees.

LaRue called the state about the problem and was told that the state will be drilling test holes around KKR Park in September to find out the extent of the contamination. The state official suggested to LaRue that the city wait to see what they find out.

The test holes had been expected to be drilled in July but apparently weren't.

The Farwell Hospital Board Tuesday began the process to make the Farwell Convalescent Center a Medicare certified facility.

Currently, the Center is a Medicaid certified facility, but it is not yet Medicare certified.

Tom Shumate, Convalescent Center director, said all or part of the center's facilities may become Medicare certified.

Shumate noted that the certification process is a lengthy one. First they will have to take a survey, and

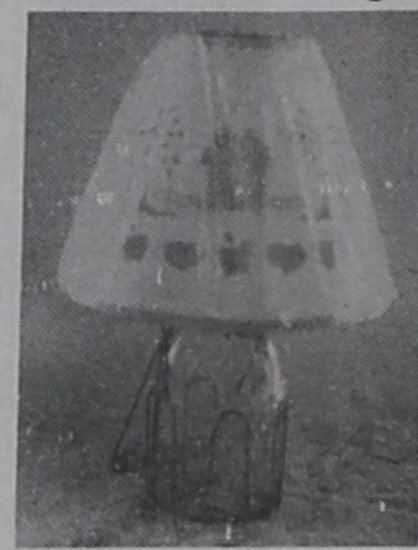



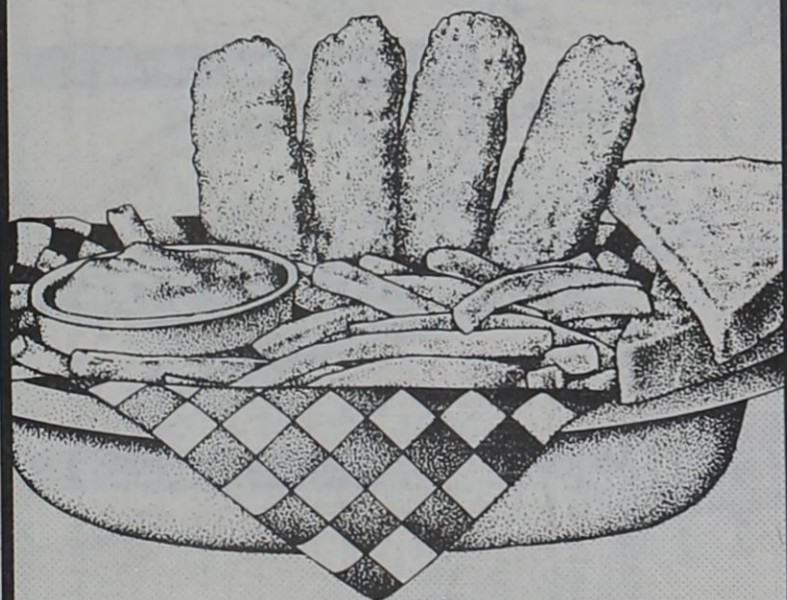

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the Farwell Independent School District in Parmer and Bailey Counties, Texas be authorized to issue bonds of the District in the principal amount of \$1,500,000 for the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor; and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, to be issued in one or more series at any price or prices, and to bear interest at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise and not to exceed the maximum rate permitted by law at the time of issuance of the bonds) as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?"

SECTION 2. The entire District shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the Farwell Community Center, 207 9th Street, Farwell, Texas, is hereby designated the polling place. The persons hereby appointed to serve as the election officers at said polling place are as follows:

- BILLIE BLAIN PRESIDING JUDGE
- ELOISE ROBERTSON ALTERNATE PRESIDING JUDGE

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than five (5) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

Bonnie Warren is hereby appointed the Clerk and Coleen Stover, the Deputy Clerk for early voting for said election, and County Clerk's Office, Parmer County Courthouse, 401 3rd Street, Farwell, Texas 73925, is hereby designated the place for early voting. The hours designated for early voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day, except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays, during the period required by law for conducting early voting.
