I support these jail bond issues

Jails and prisons will be in the local news for quite some time, I predict.

There are three topics that should interest Texico - Farwell folks.

First, there's the special election Oct. 22 on the \$5 million Curry County jail bond issue. I support any bond issues involving more jails and prisons.

This is a tough one for Texico voters, since they also will have a bond issue in February for new school class rooms, and unless the state comes through with half a million dollars for fixing the KKR Well contaminant problem, you can expect a bond issue there, too.

Well, the school bond issue won't raise taxes, says Supt. R.L. Richards, because it merely replaces one that has just ended. And I'm optimistic that the state will help on the contaminant problem.

Knowing how government works, a new jail will be mandated by the courts in Curry County even if a bond issue fails. It's better to keep local control than have some judge somewhere decide what's best for us.

And Curry County has been spending hundreds of thousands of dollars - of your money - to house inmates elsewhere because the current jail can't handle the load.

How will the bond issue affect you? If your home is appraised at \$30,000, you're looking at only an extra \$20 a year.

So let's support the new Curry County jail.

A public information meeting on it has been set by Curry County Commissioner David Snider at 7 p.m. mdt Oct. 14 at the Texico School administration building. He and Curry County Sheriff Mike Jackson will be there to answer questions.

Secondly, Parmer and Bailey counties can soon expect to see work crews of local jail inmates at work on various civil and school government projects.

District Attorney Johnny Actkinson (Parmer and Bailey counties) informs us that new Texas legal procedures virtually mandate counties keeping more prisoners. We're not talking about murderers and rapists here, but the kind involved in thefts and burglaries.

Instead of sending the latter type to the state pen for a year or two, they will stay in local jails. So we can see a return to the old "work crew" of old.

You folks in charge of local cities and schools in the two counties better start making a list of jobs for these folks. It's free labor.

Thirdly, Texans will vote on 13 proposed constitutional amendments at the Nov. 5 election. Proposition 4 is for a \$1.1 billion bond issue for new prisons and mental health facilities.

Proposition 4 should be supported. The crime picture in Texas, as elsewhere, isn't getting any better. And it sickens all of us to read about a murderer or rapist getting out of prison after a year or so due to overcrowding.

Cong. Larry Combest (R-Lubbock) informs us, in view of the furor over bounced checks and unpaid restaurant bills at facilities in the U.S. House of Representatives, that his account at the House Bank has never been overdrawn and he pays his bills on time at the House restaurant.

Closed motel is Texico topic

The Texico City Council Tuesday took action on the dilapidated Westerner Motel.

Deputy Marshal Kirk Roberts called the closed motel "a fire, safety and health hazard." He said people have been living there, and he has found dead animals, food, soiled clothes, and an axe under a mattress. Windows and doors have been broken out.

Building inspectors have checked the building but found it sound and won't condemn it, he said. City employees recently spent 5 hours clearing weeds from the property.

A letter had been sent to the person recorded as the owner but it was returned "addressee unknown," said Roberts. Other attempts to locate the owner have failed.

The city plans to put a lien on the property, since it cleared the weeds. A possible foreclosure is in the future.

In other business, the council:

- Discussed a \$900 bill from city engineer Bob Lydick, Clovis. It was for checking on the annual street seal coating project.

The agreement with Lydick is to pay him \$55 an hour. Also, he had an observer in Texico during the street project, at \$25 an hour.

Some of the councilmen felt the bill was excessive

although legitimate. The bill was paid but councilman Oran Jay Autrey will seek an explanation of the fees from Lydick.

- Gave Roberts the go-ahead to advertise for bids for a new police car. Also, two of the current three vehicles will be sold. The expense will probably be in the \$4,000 range and is covered through state funds for police.

- Roberts and Marshal Fry Urioste recently checked the police department inventory and "found a lot of things we don't need," said Roberts.

The council gave approval to trading 4 such items - two .44 magnum Winchester rifles (which haven't been used), a .32 Derringer, a Colt python revolver and a .37 magnum revolver to Allan Myers, of Texico, for two Springfield. 40 caliber semi-automatic handguns. No money is involved. Roberts was told to ensure that state rules are followed in this trade.

- Heard Councilman Butch Tharp ask that large calendars be placed on the walls of the room where the council holds session.

- Agreed to have Texico participate in the newly-formed Metro Task Force (for Curry County) as long as it meets state statutes.

Hearing conducted on Texico request

Texico city officials journeyed to Roswell Oct. 2 on the first leg of their attempt to get state funding to help solve the KKR well contaminant problem.

At Roswell, they asked for \$554,000 from the Community Development Block Grant Council, a 12-person unit. If they favor the project, or part of it, they will recommend funding to a board of state officials, which convenes in November in Santa Fe. If they don't favor the request, they recommend against it.

Attending the hearing were Mayor Doyal LaRue and councilmen Butch Tharp, Ronnie Warmuth and Carolyn Burroughs.

Texico is seeking funds to find a new site for a new well and build it, to connect the KKR Park well to the Tower Well, and to eliminate the contaminants. The latter

is very costly.

Before the hearing, Texico had sent the CDBG Council background information on the well problem. LaRue reported that the council listened to Texico's presentation, then asked a couple of questions.

As part of the process in seeking the state grant, Texico employees surveyed the community Sept. 26 to find out their income levels.

The survey was taken in August but had been done without getting residents' names. It was ruled invalid by state officials for that reason. At that time, it showed 86 percent of the city's residents fell into the low to moderate income class.

The new survey taken Sept. 26, with residents' names, found that 83 percent were in the low to moderate income categories.

Texico School Board hires 4 staff members

The Texico School Board Tuesday hired four staff members.

Amy Bonham will teach first grade. Others hired were pre-school aide Lawana Stone, custodian Elisa Chavez, and dishwasher Carol Litzelman.

The board accepted the 1991 school audit as presented by Sandra Johnson, CPA.

Members of the FFA appeared before the board to ask approval of their annual trip to the national FFA convention. Present were: FFA sponsor Charles Jackson, and members Chad Dunsworth, Kenny Shaw, Dara Jenkins, Amber Bruce, Mike Litzel-

man, Marsha Hamilton, and Chanda Campbell. The board approved the trip.

The resolution for the proposed bond issue will be voted upon at the November school board meeting. The proposed date for the election is Feb. 4, 1992. The board also discussed the 2 mill tax levy.

The board voted to continue negotiations with Rural Vision, an educational cable TV network.

The board also heard reports from Ken Shaw, Anna Southard, and Joel Pate about the open house, and from Dewey Pierce about the community survey.

Texico to get Enhanced 911 emergency number in January

The Enhanced 911 number, known as E911, is tentatively scheduled to go into effect for Texico around the first of the year.

Currently, Texico residents have a 911 number. Even with the change, residents will still dial "911" for emergencies. The number won't change.

An E911 system allows the receiver in Clovis to know the address of the person dialing 911 immediately. Also, information on elderly and ill persons can be stored in the E911 system.

The finalized agreement to install the system was made at a meeting last week of state officials, represen-

tatives of US West, Curry County Commissioner David Snider and Texico employees.

Both Hardage and Ortiz were 17 off the tie breaker; thus, each received a cash prize of \$5 for sharing second place.

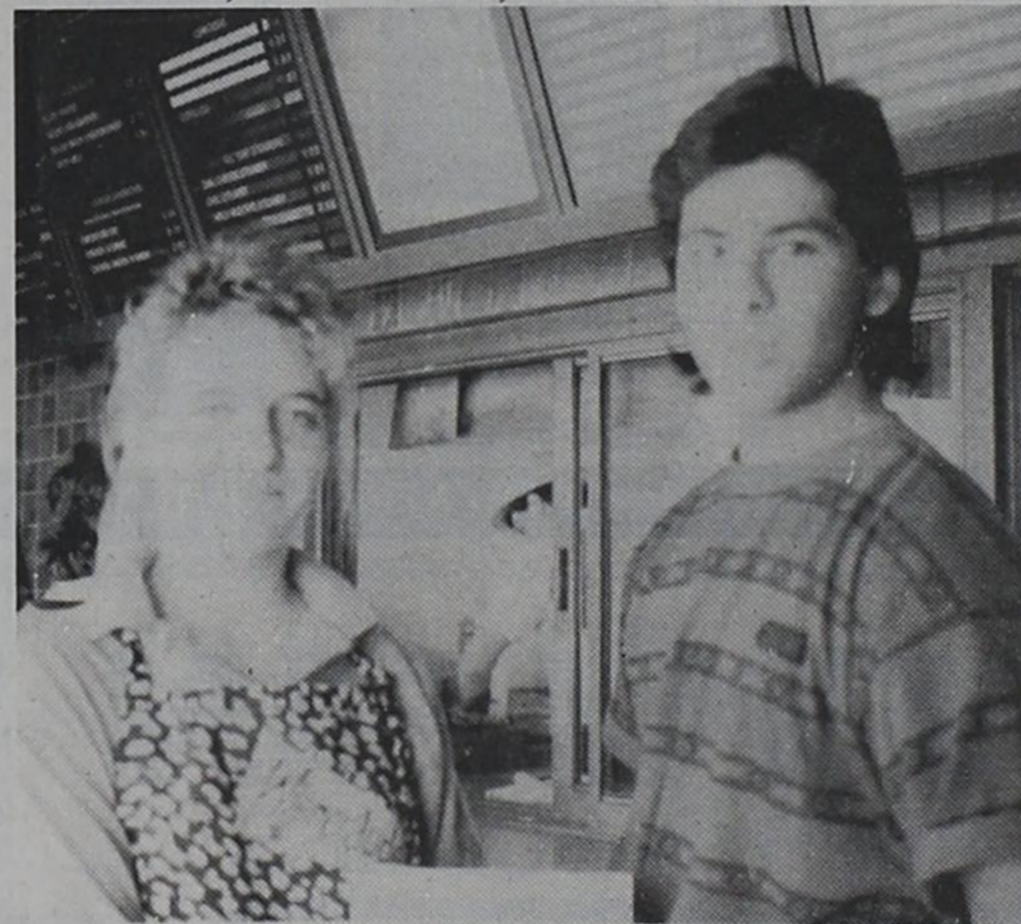

Councilman Fred Chandler responded that the schedule has been to pick up trash every two weeks. But he said he has heard other complaints about garbage pickup "and something needs to be done in this area. This is the worst year for complaints."

Dee Hammitt said 4 loads of grass are being hauled daily to the landfill, where they also must be covered.

- Adopted an ordinance to update service in the Texas Municipal Retirement System.

- Adopted a resolution to authorize flexible spending plan for health insurance payments.

- Heard Hammit report that one pit is still available at the landfill for burying grass, limbs, etc., but it's likely it will have to be closed within 2 years by the federal government.

Texico's Wolverines stayed unbeaten as they dominated Springer last Friday in an away game, 31-7. The 5-0 Wolverines are now 1-0 in district.

Texico hosts Hagerman tonight (Friday) at 7:30 p.m. mdt. The game began with Springer kicking off; Joe Chavez returned it to the 40. Two runs by Kelvin Gooden gained a first down. But Springer recovered a Texico fumble.

On defense, Greg Akers, Pepe Gonzales, Billy Rogers and Gooden made strong tackles. On a 4th down play, Louie Delgado broke up a Springer pass in the end zone.

The Wolverines moved the ball again, behind runs by Gooden, Kenny Shaw and Gonzales. A catch by Johnny Salinas helped, and then Texico scored on a 13-yard gallop by Gooden at 4:17 of the first quarter. The kick failed and Texico led 6-0.

Chad Dunswoth made the tackle on the Springer punt returner. Steve Horner and Gonzales contributed good stops. Then with 2:25 left in the quarter, Akers intercepted and ran back 52 yards for the second Wolverine TD. The pass for extra points failed and it was 12-0 in Texico's favor.

Springer had a long runback of the punt, with Louis Estrada making the tackle. But then Springer got on the board with an 18-yard pass from Phil Medina to Dean Crockett with 1:50 left in the quarter. The kick was good and it was 12-7.

In the second quarter, Texico got stopped twice on fumbles - the Wolverines had 5 for the game - and interceptions. On defense, Matthew Williams had 2 QB sacks and other good tackles. Finally, with just 10 seconds left in the first half, Akers grabbed an 8-yard TD throw from Gonzales. The pass failed and the half ended in Texico's favor, 18-7.

In the third period, after Springer was held, Shaw broke loose and knifed his way for a 57-yard TD run at 9:34. The Estrada kick made it 25-7.

On defense, Dunswoth, Gooden and Gonzales contributed strong tackles. Then Garcia recovered a fumble. The Wolverine defense held Springer time and again. And with 10:10 left in the game, Gonzales busted loose for a 43-yard TD run. A fumbled snap on the kick left the score at 31-7.

Springer wasn't able to make much headway as Akers and Williams had good tackles. Garcia recovered his second fumble, stopping another Springer drive.

In the last 4 minutes, Coach Bruce Scroggins put in a lot of younger ball players.

(1) In the future elections, there will be nine (9) Election Precincts. Plus the early voting polling place.

(2) Commissioner Precinct 1 contains 101; Commissioner Precinct 2 contains 201, 202 and 203; Commissioner Precinct 3 contains

301, 302, and 303; Commissioner Precinct 4 contains 401, and 402.

(3) These Election Precincts and the polling places in each precinct will be defined as follows:

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 1

Polling Place 101

Polling Place 101 is the consolidation of old Election Precinct Numbers 2-1, 1 and 8. It has been designated 101 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 1, Polling Place Number 1. Polling Place 1 which was located at the Black Elevator in Black, Texas, and Polling Place 8, located at the Dee Willard residence in Lakeview, Texas, have been eliminated to provide secrecy of balloting and for voter convenience. The polling place is in the Calvary Baptist Church, Cleveland Ave., Friona, Texas.

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 2

Polling Place 201

Polling Place 201 was previously known as Polling Place Number 3 and has been designated as 201 to coincide with Commissioner

Precinct 2, Polling Place Number 1. This polling place remains in the EMS Building, formerly called the American Legion Hall, 3rd Street, Bovina, Texas.

Polling Place 202

Polling Place 202 was previously known as Polling Place Number 2-2 and has been designated Polling Place Number 202 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 2, Polling Place Number 2. This polling place remains in the Parmer County Community Center, Friona, Texas.

Polling Place 203

Polling Place 203 was previously known as Polling Place Number 7 and has been designated Polling Place Number 203 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 2, Polling Place Number 3. This polling place remains at the Community Center, Rhea, Texas.

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 3

Polling Place 301

Polling Place 301 was previously known as Polling Place Number 4 and has been designated Polling Place Number 301 to coincide

with Commissioner Precinct 3, Polling Place Number 1. This polling place remains at the Community Center, Farwell, Texas.

Polling Place 302

Polling Place 302 was previously known as Polling Place Number 6 and has been designated Polling Place Number 302 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 3, Polling Place Number 2. The old polling place at the Community Center on Highway 105 has been eliminated. The polling place will be in the Methodist Church on Highway 1731, Oklahoma Lane, Texas.

Polling Place 303

Polling Place 303 is a new polling place. It has been designated Polling Place Number 303 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 3, Polling Place Number 3. To comply with the one man, one vote mandate of the United States Constitution, Commissioner Precinct 3 boundaries include a portion of the City of Bovina. This polling place was created to provide voters in Election Precinct 303 access to a polling place within the city of Bovina. The location of this polling place is at Ridgelea Elementary School, 1000 Highway 86, Bovina,

Texas.

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 4

Polling Place 401

Polling Place 401 is old Election Precinct Number 5. It has been designated Polling Place Number 401 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 4, Polling Place Number 1. The polling place remains at the Lazbuddie School Building, Lazbuddie, Texas.

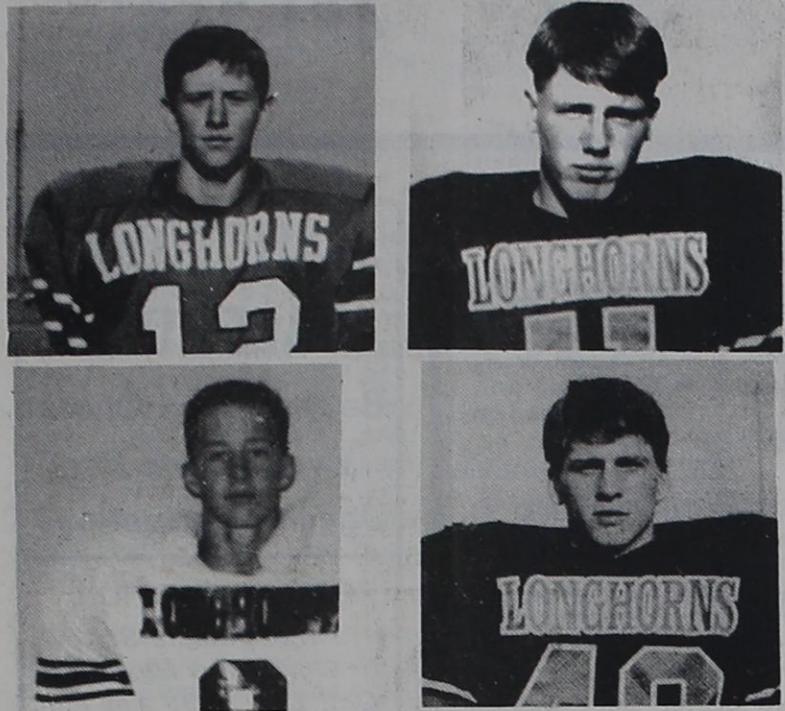

Williams. "We must have dropped the ball 12 to 15 times. It was Homecoming and there was a bunch of silly stuff going on all week." Despite the lack of concentration, the Longhorns managed to pull the game out of the hat at the end of the night. The Jesus Chapel Chargers took an 8-0 lead during the first quarter. The Longhorns came back with a 45-yard TD

run by Matt Cozby, and a kick by Luis Gonzales to tie it up at 8- all. Lazbuddie took the lead with 8:31 left in the second quarter when Frank Gonzales grabbed a 17 yard TD on a pass from Brett Thomas. Eric Williams caught a pass from Luis Gonzales to give the Longhorns a 15-8 halftime lead. The Chargers responded with a 12-yard TD run but the kick failed so Lazbuddie went into the half with a slim 15-14 margin. There was only one score in the third period: El Paso tallied on a 5-yard run. The kick missed and it was 20-15. Then came the heroics. With 19 seconds left, Leland Brockman caught a pass from Mario Zamora for an 8-yard TD. The Luis Gonzales kick was good and Lazbuddie won.

The Farwell Yearlings beat Bovina 8-0 Oct. 3. Farwell's TD was made by Chase Hardage on a pass from Nicolas Ketcherside. Hardage caught a 30 yard pass,

and then ran it in. Brock Anderson scored the points after.

On its weekly "New Mexico honor roll," the Lubbock paper listed end Greg Akers for his game against Springer - caught two passes for 38 yards and 1 TD, returned an interception 52 yards for another TD, participated on six tackles and broke up a pass.

Among Six-Man teams, Lazbuddie ranks 8th on team offense, averaging 334 yards a game, and 9th on team defense, allowing 301.2 yards a game. Kirk Jesko is 8th among the rushers, with 143.8 yards a game. Brett Thomas is 1st among the passers, with 63 completions in 93 attempts for 959 yards. Among the receivers, Leland Brockman is 3rd with 19 catches for 302 yards, Jesko is 6th with 13 catches for 140 yards, and Matt Cozby is 9th with 14 catches for 248 yards. Jesko is 10th among the scorers with 66 points from 11 TDs.

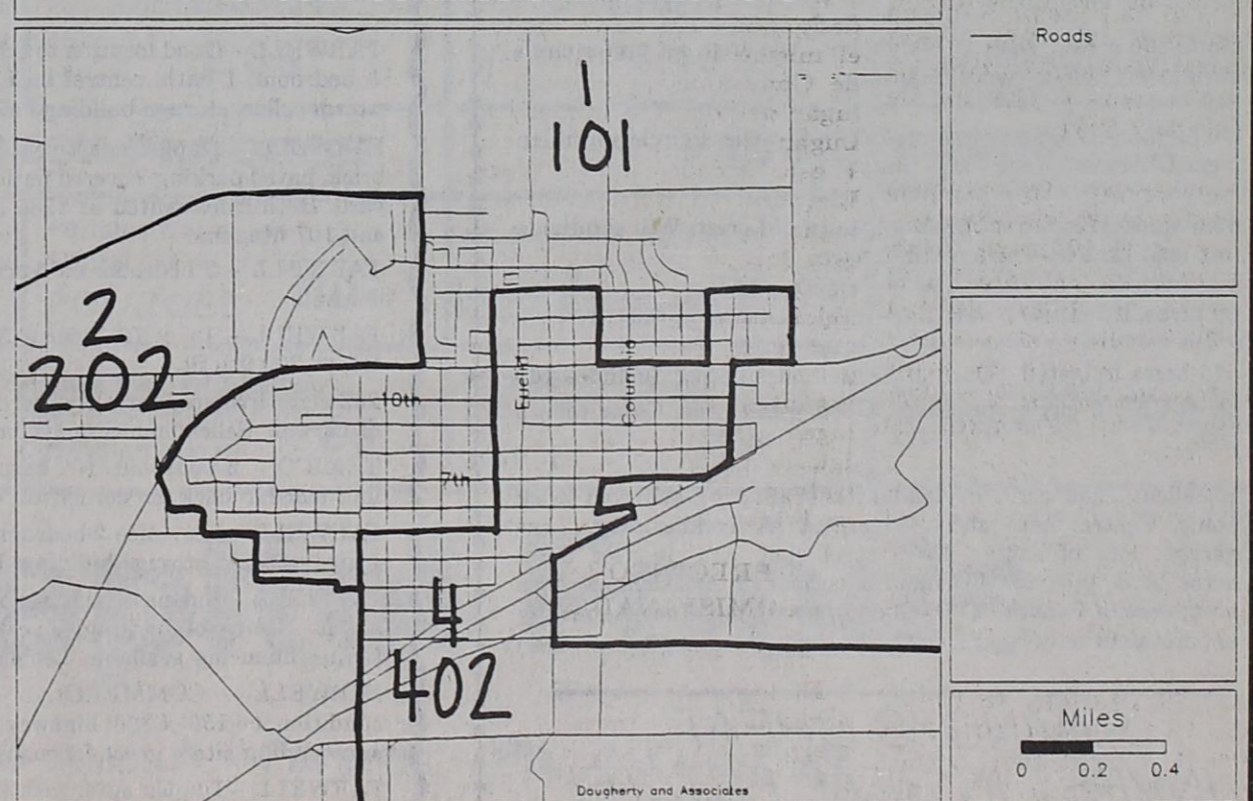
Parmer County Commissioner Precincts
