And, just like with the Judge Bork hearings, I got to watch Sen. Howard Metzenbaum (D-Ohio) in action. I have no use for that fella. I believe that when the FBI completes its probe into who leaked Prof. Hill's allegations, it will have emanated from Metzenbaum's staff. He ought to resign.

I also think it's time for Sen. Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.) to call it a day and retire. I believe he's in his 80's and it shows.

And I thought committee chairman Sen. Joe Biden (D-Del.) did a fine job in running the hearings.

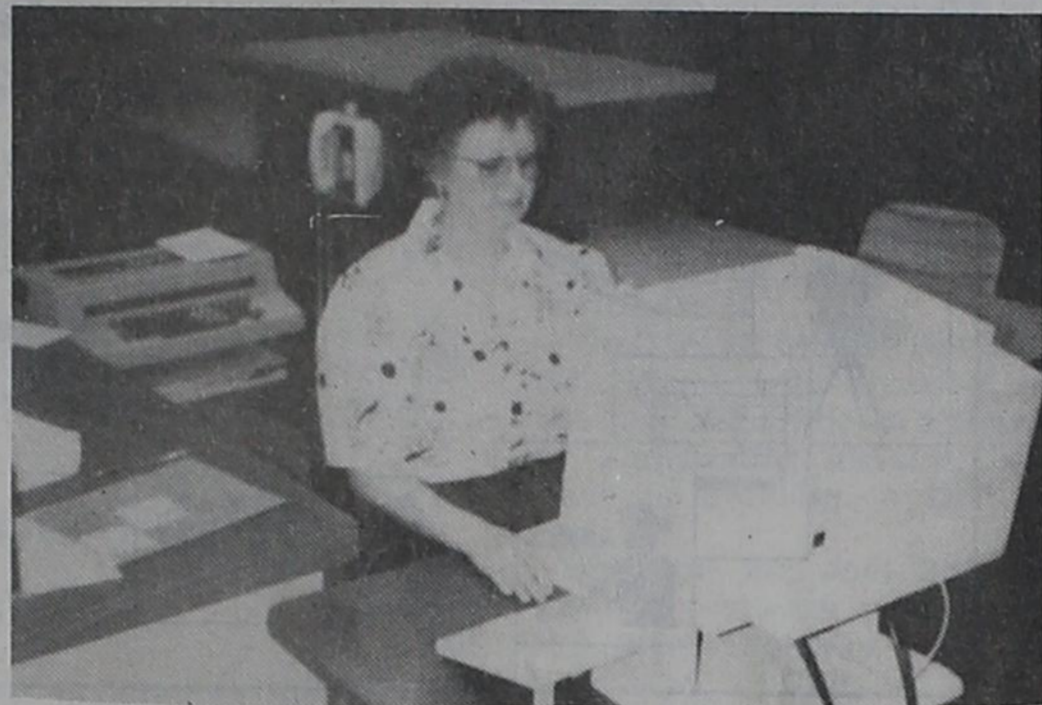

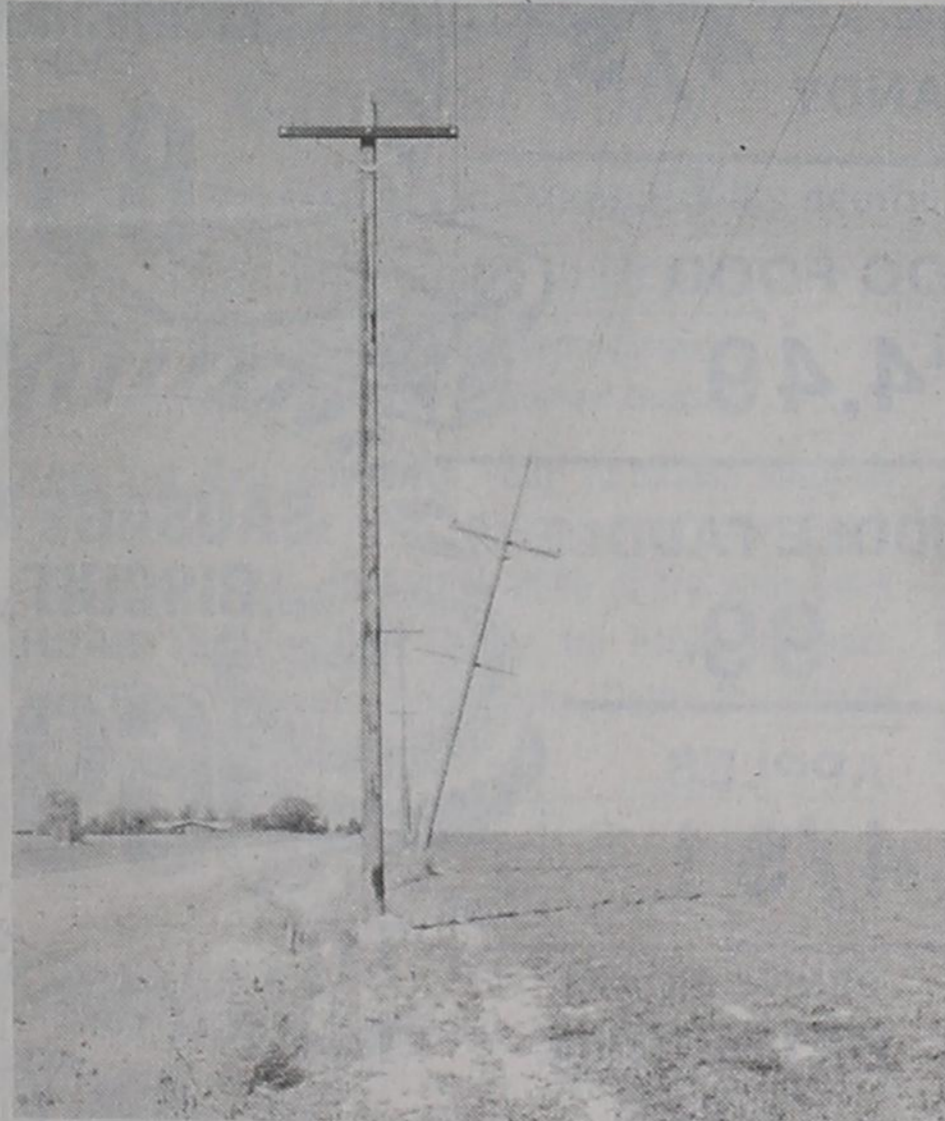

## Jail bond issue OK'd

Curry County voters approved a 2 mill bond issue Tuesday to fund a new Curry County Jail.

According to the County Clerk's office, unofficial totals for the election include: 4,239 total votes cast in the election; 2,843 for the bond issue and 1,864 against.

Texico voters cast 56 ballots for the bond issue and 41 against; Pleasant Hill voters cast 47 for the bond and 52 against.

The plans call for a new jail could house 150 inmates.

## Texico speeds up tax process

The Texico City Council Tuesday approved a faster way of raising the city's gross receipts tax.

Gross receipts taxes in New Mexico are similar to sales taxes in Texas.

In June, the council voted to hike the rate from 5.25 percent to 5.5 percent, effective Jan. 1, 1992. Now, when July 1, 1992, rolls around, the rate will jump to 6 percent.

The state only allows gross receipt tax rates to be increased twice a year - July 1 and Jan. 1. And the paperwork takes a lot of time.

Back in June, the council thought it could only raise the rate 1/4 percent at a time. So it appeared the 6 percent figure - which was its goal - wouldn't be reached until Jan. 1, 1993. But City Attorney Duane Hamar said Tuesday, after checking, that the city could increase the tax any amount it chose as long as it was in increments of 1/4, 1/2 or 3/4 percents.

Clovis currently has a 6 percent tax.

In other business, the council:

- Authorized Mayor Doyal LaRue to sign the Eastern Plains Council of Government Joint Powers Agreement after he checks it out. It costs almost Texico \$1,900 a year.

- Upped the city's fee for mowing private property owners' weeds from \$15 an hour to \$40 hour, and placing a lien on the property.

- Discussed the parking problem at the Texico flea market. The city has been asked for a recommendation by the state highway department on what type of parking should be allowed.

Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows said she wants all parking banned on the highway (Wheeler Avenue). A committee of Mrs. Burrows, LaRue and street Supt. Matt Meeks will study the parking situation.

- Discussed trying to find out the size of a sewer line between Turner and Garwood. City Clerk Marie Christian said she had tried to contact the state inspector but he won't return her calls.

Hamar will check into it.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey say some street signs are hard to read. City employees will work on this during the winter.

- Heard Mrs. Burrows say that the city lot on Griffin has been cleaned up and looks great. The cleanup was done by Autrey.

- Heard Meeks ask whose responsibility it was to cut high weeds in alleys. He was told the property owners are responsible. He will put out notices to them.

- Conducted an executive session to discuss possible land acquisition and pending litigation.

Hamar said he has received a complaint from Marie Esparza and attorney Jim McDowell about the city granting a variance for a mobile home in the 400 block of Turner Street last month.

## Muleshoe bank may open branch here

Muleshoe State Bank has begun the process of applying to state and federal regulatory agencies to open a branch bank in Farwell.

They plan to open an office at 801 Ave. A - the current Byrd Realty building.

Byrd Realty and De'Aun Willoughby, CPA, likely will find new sites here.

The process of filing with the State of Texas and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation normally takes between 2 to 6 months, said Bob Finney of Muleshoe State Bank.

Muleshoe State Bank hopes to solicit additional loans and deposits from this area.

"We think it will be a good opportunity for the people of Farwell to have the services we offer," said Finney. "We currently service a number of customers in the area."

Once the bank has approval, the officials plan to start small in this area and expand their services according to demand.

# Nazareth tops Steers at Homecoming

The Nazareth Swifts defeated the Farwell Steers, 41-6, at a Homecoming game at Roberts Stadium last Friday. Farwell, 0-6-1 overall and 0-2 in district, hosts Kress at 7:30 p.m. tonight (Friday). Nazareth won the coin flip and decided to kick off, due to strong winds. The ball carried into the end zone and Farwell started on its own 20. Ryan Williams was at quarterback due to an injury to Chad Byrd, who is expected back this week or next.

On the second play, Farwell lost a fumble and the Swifts started on the Steer 17. Brian Johnson made a tackle for a 5-yard loss but on the 3rd play Nazareth scored on a 23-yard TD run. The kick was good and Nazareth led 7-0 at 10:00.

Lupe Garza returned the next kickoff to the Steer 25. On the second play, Farwell lost a fumble. After Nazareth completed a pass, the Swifts lost a fumble on the Steer 11. The Steers were held and Garza boomed a punt to midfield. Nazareth scored on a 45-yard pass at 6:47. The kick made it 14-0.

Brent Harrison returned the kickoff to the Steer 32. But Farwell lost a fumble at its 30. Nazareth scored on a 23-yard run around end at 5:04. The kick made it 21-0.

Garza returned the kickoff to the Steer 28. Farwell was held and the punt was partially blocked, with Nazareth starting on the Steer 47. The Swifts moved the ball, scoring on a 15-yard run at 1:54 of the first quarter. The kick was wide and it was 27-0.

Lance Anderson, who had been out with a leg injury since the first offensive play of the season (although he had limited play the previous week), returned the kick 10 yards to the Steer 37 as the first quarter ended.

After the Steers were held, with the wind behind them, Garza punted 50 yards to the Swift 10. Johnson recorded a QB sack for a 10-yard loss. Williams then intercepted at the Steer 32 and returned 12 yards. On offense, Harrison ran around end for a 13-yard gain. But Nazareth intercepted.

On defense, Johnson recorded another good tackle. Nazareth maintained possession, though, until the half ended.

In the third quarter, Harrison returned the kick to the Steer 23. On the second play, Farwell lost a fumble. Nazareth scored on an 18-yard run at 10:10. The kick made it 34-0.

A short kickoff helped Ruben Lucio return it to the Steer 35. Farwell was held and punted to the Swift 41. At 5:12, Nazareth scored on a 33-yard pass. The kick made it 41-0.

Farwell started at its 13. Harrison and Kirk Lingnau runs gained a first down. Harrison then gained 12 but a holding penalty put Farwell back and the Steers had to punt. Dean Rubio, in place of an injured Garza, punted to midfield.

In the final period, Farwell held and Nazareth punted to the Steer 8. Two runs by Lingnau gained a first down. But an end-around pass was intercepted at midfield. Nazareth was held and punted to the Steer 28. Nazareth intercepted again, was held and punted to midfield.

Reagan Williams was now quarterbacking the Steers. A pass interference call against Nazareth and some good running helped move the ball to the Swift 10 with 17 seconds left. 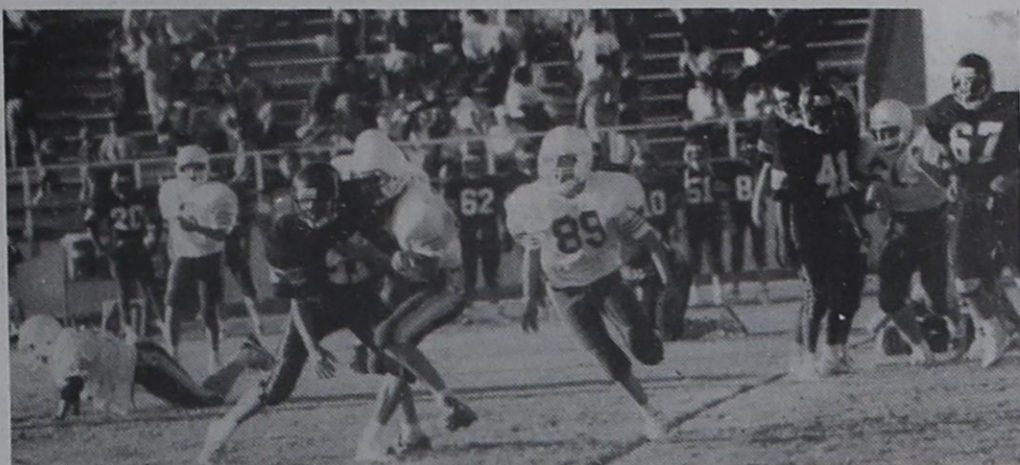

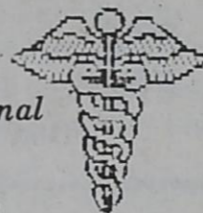

Texico made another apparent TD but it was called back due to penalty.

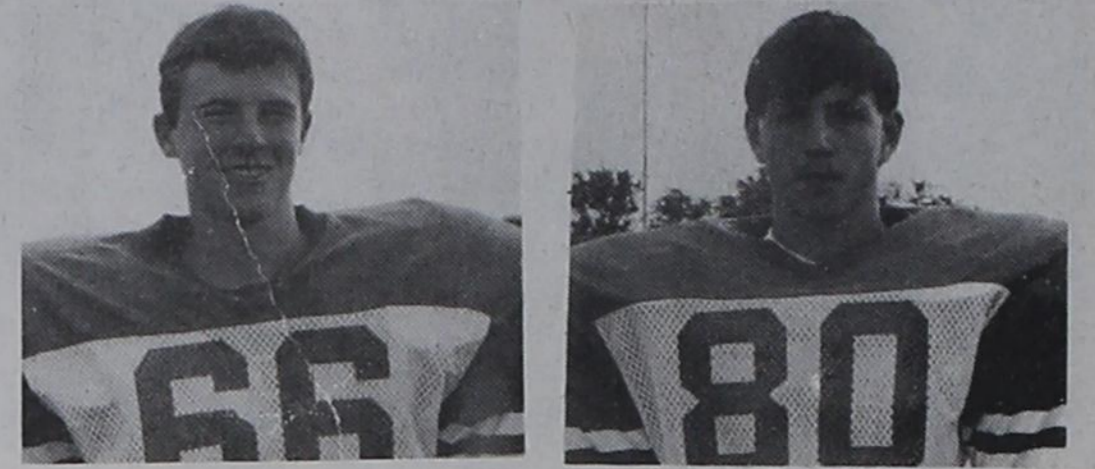
Louie Delgado and Kenny Shaw both intercepted passes for Texico.

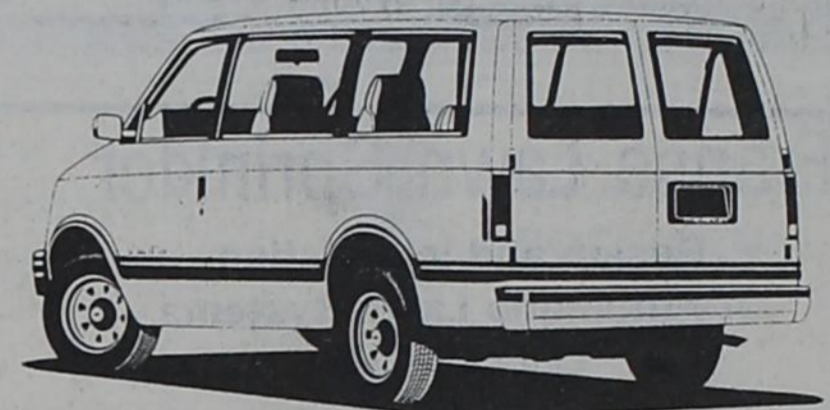

# Jesko helps spark Longhorns past Cotton Center

The Lazbuddie Longhorns kept their record unblemished with a 70-22 trouncing of Cotton Center last Friday. The victory boosted Lazbuddie to 7-0 overall and 2-0 in district. Cotton Center is now 2-5 and 0-2. Lazbuddie is tied with Silverton and Amherst for the district lead. It was another game shortened by the 45-point rule, ending in the third quarter. At first, though, the game was close. Lazbuddie opened the scoring on an 8-yard run by Leland Brockman. Luis Gonzales kicked the points after and it was 8-0. Cotton Center scored on a 60-yard run, the kick failing and it was 8-6. Then Lazbuddie's Kirk Jesko ran 48 yards into paydirt; the kick failed, and it was 16-6. Cotton Center scored on a 10-yard pass. Then the Longhorns began to dominate, scoring like this:

- A 33-yard run by Jesko; Gonzales kick good.
  - A 50-yard punt return by Jesko; the Gonzales kick good.
  - A 20-yard pass to Jesko from Mario Zamora; the Gonzales kick good.
  - A 16-yard pass to Gonzales from Matt Cozbey; the kick failed.
  - A 6-yard run by Brockman; the kick failed.
- Then, after Cotton Center scored on a 60-yard pass, Lazbuddie added two more second quarter TDs - a 58 yard run by Brockman, and a 15-yard interception return by "T.D." Darling. The game ended early in the third quarter when Cozbey

returned the kickoff 60 yards for the final Longhorn TD. Jesko ended by rushing for 140 yards on 8 carries. Lazbuddie racked up 393 total yards. "We didn't play very well to start off, but we really got rolling the second quarter," said Coach C. W. Williams. "We were a lot stronger than they were, and the defense did a good job after the first quarter." Lazbuddie next plays Three Way. Williams is looking forward to this game with a bit of apprehension since he formerly coached at Three Way. "Three Way is tough. They'd rather beat me than anybody since I came from there. Their offense is pretty potent."

## Thomas cited

Texico has fallen to 5th place in the New Mexico Class 1A poll by Associated Press writers after losses to Hagerman and Tatum. Tatum ranks 1st and Hagerman 2nd in the state. Lazbuddie continues to rank No. 2 in Texas behind Ft. Hancock.

Area leaders compiled by the Lubbock newspaper show: New Mexico are: Texico ranks 9th on team offense, with 284 yards a game, and 6th on team defense, allowing 190 yards a game. Kenny Shaw is 7th among the rushers with 654 yards - 93.4 yards a game. Pepe Gonzales ranks 7th among the passers with 21 completions in 55 attempts for 431 yards.

Among area Six-Man teams, Lazbuddie is 9th in team offense, with 330 yards a game, and 9th on team defense, allowing 270 yards a game. The Longhorns probably would be higher on offense except their last two games ended early in the third quarter because of the 45-point rule. Kirk Jesko is 6th among the rushers with 866 yards - 144.3 yards a game. Brett Thomas is 1st among the passers with 63 completions in 93 attempts for 959 yards - 191.8 yards a game. The Longhorns have 3 receivers in the top 10 - Jesko, 6th, with 16 catches for 166 yards; Leland Brockman, 7th, with 346 yards, and Matt Cozbey, 10th, with 324 yards. Jesko ranks 5th among the scorers with 120 points off 20 TDs.

On the newspaper's area honor roll, Jesko the 5'6, 145 lb. senior tailback for Lazbuddie, was listed for gaining 140 yards and 2 TDs on 8 carries, catching a TD pass and running a punt back for a TD against Cotton Center.




