to 5,000 licensed and certified appraisers to keep pace with the volume of real estate transactions in the state, but only a few hundred appraisers are expected to be licensed or certified by the state at end of this year."

The same situation will occur in Texas and New Mexico.

If you are a landowner or homeowner, get ready for a problem. You know how economics works: if there are too few folks in a profession, you pay top dollar. And that's if you can find someone.

In addition, the new rules are jacking up the price of appraisals. Here's another quote from the newsletter:

"Security State Bank in Littlefield, Texas, said residential and commercial real estate appraisals that now cost \$250 to \$1,500 and take from 7 to 21 days to complete are expected to cost \$500 to \$5,000 and take from 7 to 45 days to complete."

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That's horrifying news - especially in these recessionary times. What's wrong with government? They are not part of the real world.

Folks, do you realize how that will affect rural areas? J.B. basical, was saying that the new rules virtually make it unwise for him to keep his appraisal license because of all the extra costs and schooling involved. Plus you have to take a test which he estimated that not more than 5 percent of current state appraisers could pass.

Why the new rules? Once again, when government tries to solve one problem, they create another. This is part of the savings and loan bailout law and was intended to exert stricter controls on S&L's and banks. But government went overboard.

Folks, when these rules become effective, get ready for a real problem when you try to sell or buy property in New Mexico or Texas.

To quote one last time from

China is still officially closed to missionaries, but the program offered an opportunity for Christian teachers to come into contact with Chinese and vice versa. For many Chinese students, it was the first contact that they had had with Americans.

China was closed to travel by Westerners from 1949 when the Communist Revolution closed the nation's doors to outsiders until the late 1970's or early 1980's when a few visitors were allowed to enter. Since then the number of visitors has increased each year.

"In some ways the Christians we met there may be stronger Christians than they were when the missionaries were there," noted Pate. "They call the Baptist church the "Three Self Help Movement."

The teachers in Pate's group taught English as they were asked to do, but they also looked for opportunities to incorporate discussions that dealt with moral issues and values.

Teaching in China was a very different experience in China than it is in the USA.

"It took three days to get students to stop standing up to recite answers in a very formal way," noted Pate. "They would also stand up whenever a teacher approached their desks."

When teachers approach a Chinese classroom, they are greeted by students standing by the door with their heads bowed. If a student is late for class, he will stand in the doorway with his head bowed waiting for the teacher tell him to enter.







## Moisture total above normal

December rains have brought the year's moisture totals ahead of normal for the area.

Normal rainfall in the Panhandle is about 16 to 17 inches of moisture for the year, according to area weather buff, Lonnie McFarland, manager of the Sherley Anderson Grain Elevator in Lariat.

McFarland measured 23.39" of moisture in Lariat as of Dec. 23. "This is great for dryland wheat farmers," he noted. "The rain is what will green up the land."

On the other hand, rain the past two weeks will not be too good for the cotton farmers. When the cotton modules get wet, the cotton usually does not get as good a grade as it does when it is dry and fluffy.

McFarland measured .35" of moisture on Dec. 18; .36" on Dec. 19, and 1.53" on Dec. 21 for a total of 2.26 in the past week. Additional December moisture also fell on Dec. 11.

His father, John McFarland, measured 3" of moisture in the past week at his home in Farwell.


Mike Pomper measured 3.7" of moisture for the month at his home on the south side of Farwell.

Fred Chandler measured 2.75" at the Sherley Anderson Pitman Elevator in Farwell during the whole time.

Scott Brown measured 1.9" of moisture at the Sherley Anderson Elevator in Lazbuddie with about 2.2" for the whole week. He estimated that the moisture was "quite a bit above normal," in Lazbuddie.





### Joel Pate in China

"They will not show any disrespect," says Pate. Because of the extreme respect shown to teachers, classes of 50 - 60 students each are possible. In Pate's opinion, school officials have more authority than parents in China.

Pate noted that the students he taught were extremely motivated to do well in his class. They had paid about the equivalent of a month's pay (about \$60 -\$70 in American money) for the privilege of attending the class. And, they had to score above a 550 on an examination to qualify for the class.

Most of these students spoke British- style English,

and they were interested in learning American English. They were always looking for opportunities to practice their English. Many of these students hope to study in the USA one day.

Before all the US teachers make a mass exit to teach in the serenity of China, it should be noted that Pate's teaching schedule was arduous. He taught from 8:40 -11:40 a.m. and from 3 - 5:30 p.m. on Mondays - Fridays with required activities on Monday - Thursday evenings. He also taught on Saturday until 11:40 a.m. Veteran teachers know that time in front of a class is only part of a teacher's work; the paper grading, planning and preparation for class takes guite a bit of time, too.

Pate and his companions were able to use Sundays for travel.

Chengdu is in Sichuan Province in the Southwestcentral part of China. The countryside features rolling hills and some mountains. It is about 200 - 300 miles from the awesome Himalaya mountains of Tibet.

Pate's group visited several tourist attractions while they were on this trip. Mt. Emei is a majestic mountain about a 10,000 ft. peak. There is a temple atop the mountain. Sichuan Province has several mountains and rivers. The peak called Gongga Shan is 24,790 ft. tall.

Pate visited the Giant Buddha of Luishan which is carved out of the side of a mountain. It is about 10 stories high, and it took about 100 years to carve.

At one place they visited, the Americans saw several ancient statutes. Some of them had faces that were painted red, or black or yellow. The color of the face did not indicate race; it indicated the temperament of the person who was depicted. At another place, they viewed Chinese art for several hours. Pate notes that Chinese art is traditionally unframed. It is normally a flat, two dimensional painting that lacks perspective. It often depicts the emotion of the artist rather than a realistic representation of life.



The lyrics of the an American song, "The Sounds of Silence," were the topic of study for Pate's class at Sichuan University one day.

"It's a different approach," Pate notes.

Pate's group also visited the Du Yuan Yen irrigation system, an engineering marvel that is over 2,000 years old, yet it is still in use. It controls flooding as well today as it did when it was built. Sichuan has four major rivers flowing through its borders.

The 400 Buddha Temple was another interesting sight Pate visited, and so was the poet's cottage.

"We had guides everywhere we went," he says. The English speaking guides were very helpful to the Americans since so much was unfamiliar.

The weather in Sichuan Province was quite different from the weather we normally have here in the Southwest. "We had about 2 or 3 days of blue skies and yellow sun in the five weeks I was there. It was



overcast almost all the time, and it rained almost every other day," said Pate.

The rain is so common that bicyclists routinely pack plastic ponchos to wear while they ride along. They just flip the poncho over themselves and their handlebars and go on when the showers begin.

Pate says that Chengdu has 3.7 million people in an area slightly larger than Clovis, and bicycling through the crowded streets is a real experience. The four lane highways are filled with pedestrians, bicyclists, cars, and pushcarts full of bricks and coal.


"The cars honk all the time. There are so many pedestrians and bicyclists that the cars honk all the time. You have to get used to the noise," said Pate.

One of the things that Pate says that he missed while he was away was quiet. "There was no place to get away from the noise. There were horns honking, people talking, and everyone was so much closer together," he says.

Shopping in the crowded markets places quite a new experience for the visitors. Officially, they were supposed to shop in a western style foreign exchange. But, occasionally he was able to accompany his students to the traditional markets.

"They haggle all the time. When you ask about the price, they always ask for a lot. By the time you're done, you pay about half the price they ask for the first time - about 1/3 if you are a foreigner," he says. They try to charge "the big nosed white men a little more,"



### Joel Pate in China

according to Pate.

Pate says that when a customer approaches a Chinese merchant, he first compliments the objects the merchant has for sale, then asks the price. The merchant always asks a high price at first. The customer makes a sour face, and says something like, "It is a very pretty vase, but not that pretty." Then they haggle. "It takes 5 -10 minutes to buy an object," he notes.

Eating in China was another interesting experience.

"If you think Mexican food is hot, you should try Sichuan. Jalapeno peppers are like lettuce to them. It is very, very good food," said Pate. Americans who have eaten Sichuan food in Chinese restaurants here may have seen the provincial name spelled Sechuan or Szechuan or Szechwan or some other variation of the phonetic spelling. Anyway you spell it, much of the food is hot and spicy.

A menu in a Chinese restaurant shows that the Chinese eat a variety of meat, fish, and poultry dishes in their everyday meals. Pate found that many of the Buddhist Chinese people he met in Chengdu preferred vegetarian meals which feature vegetables which are cooked to taste just like meat or fish. "They fix a fish made out of potatoes that tastes just like fish. It looks like a fish and it tastes like a fish," says Pate.

"They must fix tofu (soybean curd) 16 or 17 different ways. It's full of protein," he adds.

Lovers of Chinese food know that there are also many varieties of dishes served in China. Sichuan food offers a great variety of styles and types of food.

Rice is a staple part of the diet in southern China, although wheat is used in the northern part of the nation.

Pate arrived in Chengdu at about rice harvest season. He watched farmers harvest the grain with hand held knives. Oxen were used to pull wagons and to plow.

While he was in China, Pate lived in "The Panda House," a western style apartment complex. Teachers had one bedroom apartments. There was a cleaning lady to sweep the steps and mop the hallways and to change the sheets for the residents of the building.

Pate's guarters were equipped with a television set so that he could see the three Chinese television stations. The national TV station broadcast from 8

a.m. - 10 p.m. There was also a provinical station and a local station which had rather erratic broadcasting schedules. Pate didn't have time to watch much TV, but he did note that during the long afternoon lunch break the TV stations broadcast what he called "easy listening videos" of quiet music and pictures of waterfalls and restful scenery.

Before Pate left China the Sichuan University presented him with a beautiful carved "chop" or signature stamp. He also received many gifts from his students and colleagues there. There was a painting and an album full of photos.


When a person receives a gift in China it is not opened in front of the gift giver. The recipient puts it aside and opens it in private, so that the person giving the gift does not see any sign of disappointment if the gift is not pleasing. The person receiving the gift wants to save the gift giver from loosing face or being embarrassed in public.

"Often the person giving a gift expects a gift in return; that makes it difficult because the person

receiving the gift may not be able to reciprocate. You don't want to give a gift to a person because they may not be able to reciprocate, and they would feel bad because they couldn't."


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Pate said that the Americans were unprepared for the



Gift giving is an integral part of the Chinese way of life. Years of living in a highly structured society have made gift giving rules very complex and formal for occidental visitors to understand.

Another thing that is difficult for foreigners to understand is the reaction of Chinese to complements. When Chinese are complimented, a Chinese person will deny that he is special or outstanding. His reaction is "Oh no, I'm not that special." Americans on the other hand usually react by saying, "Thank you. I try hard."









### Farwell varsity girls win 1st tourney since 1983


The Farwell Lady Blue basketball team won the Meadow Tourney Saturday night.
