## Border Banter

**We congratulate the Texico marshal and Parmer County sheriff departments**

The Texico marshal's office and Parmer County sheriff's department must be complimented for the fine work both did in solving the recent spate of burglaries and vandalism in the Twin Cities.

We have very fine professional law enforcement personnel in these departments and it paid off in the arrests of the six juvenile boys involved in much of the recent criminal mischief.

We're very fortunate to have these skilled professionals help safeguard our communities. When you see these folks, please be sure to say thanks for a job well done.

About six years ago, I wrote a column saying that Farwell ought to hire a night watchman. I haven't changed my mind.

When I look back over the years I've lived in Texico - Farwell, I feel our community has been blessed with a minimum of crime. But that idyllic viewpoint has changed.

The fact is: police protection is needed here, especially late at night on week-ends.

Texico has two city police officers. Farwell has none, but relies on the Parmer County sheriff's department.

Once again, I will write what I did years ago: that Farwell needs to come up with a way to help "cover" those late-night hours when much of the crime occurs here.

\*\*\* We'd like to alert our readers to something special that will be carried in the ad that runs each week on Page 3 for Farwell United Drugs.

Pharmacist - owner Donna Ratke will be giving general information about the use of medicines in that ad. I think you'll find it interesting.

Information about the proper use of medicines is of two types. One type is drug specific and applies to a certain medicine or group of medicines only. The other type is general in nature and applies to the use of any medicine.

The information in the Farwell United Drug ads will be general in nature. But Mrs. Ratke notes: "For your own safety, health and well-being, however, it is important that you learn about the proper use of your specific medicines as well. You can get this information from your doctor or pharmacist, or find it in various leaflets, brochures or books."

## Farwell stock show on tap

The 24th annual Farwell FFA-4H Livestock Show will be held at the Farwell Community Center Jan. 11.

Farwell ag teacher Richard Montgomery has asked that each person who intends to show an animal at the Farwell Livestock Show notify him by Friday (today) of the number of entries they will show, the breed of each animal and its weight.

This information will help the show officials to decide the number and types of classes that will be needed for the show. It will make the show go more smoothly on Saturday.

Animals will be checked in before 11 a.m. Saturday. The show will start at 12:30 p.m. with the heifer show, which will take place behind the building.

It will be followed by the lamb show, the pee wee show, and the barrow show.

Montgomery said the show has been moved up a bit this year because of the large number of entrants, and also because some of the entrants plan to show animals at the Denver livestock show.

Jessie Holloway, Debaca County Extension Agent, will be the judge. W. M. Roberts will be the announcer, and Mack Heald will be the show secretary.

Trophies will be given to the Grand and Reserve Champions and Showmanship trophies will be given. Ribbons will be awarded to the class winners.

The 4-H Club will sponsor a snack bar during the show.

The parents and committee members started setting up the Community Center for the

show earlier this week. They had to cover the floor and set up the pens. They will also have to clean up after the show on Saturday.

"It's really a big job to have this show, but if everybody takes care of his own part, it all gets done," said Montgomery.

The local show gives Farwell students experience before they go to the county show Jan. 24-27 in Friona. Sometimes an animal that may not be of prime weight and development for our local show will win at one of the big shows. The showmanship experience gained locally will be of importance to the animal's owner.

### Lazbuddie

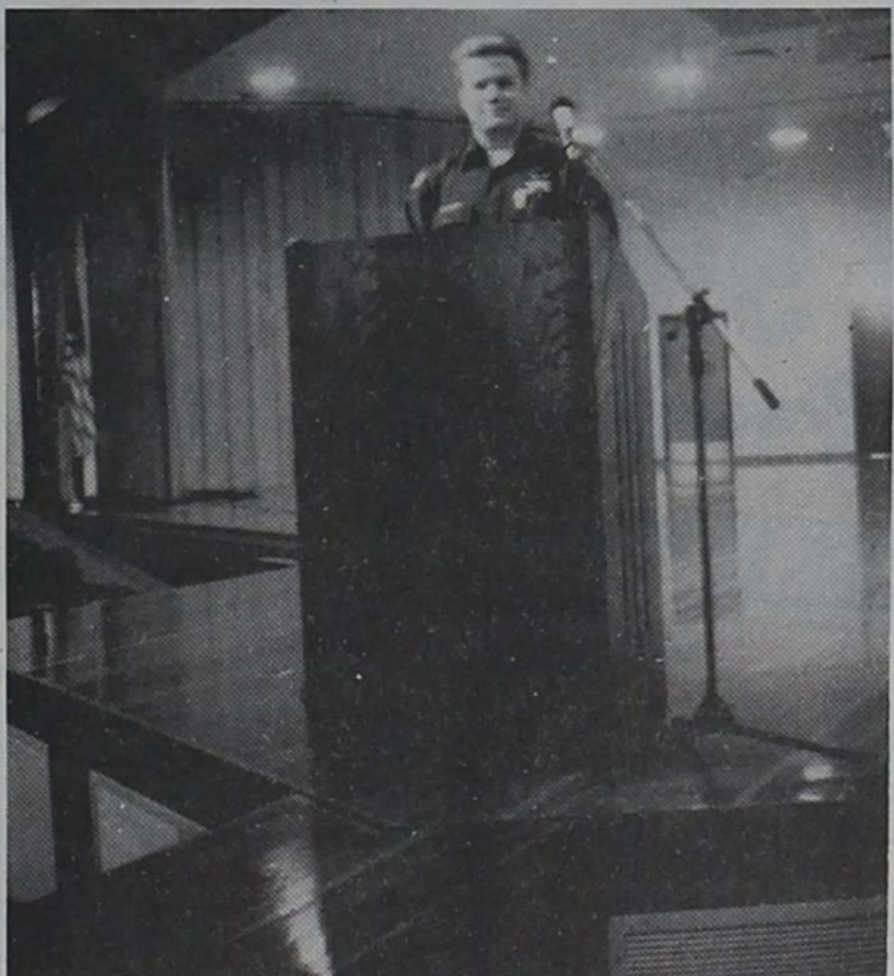
The annual Lazbuddie Livestock Show will be held on Jan. 18 at the old Co-op building 1 1/2 miles west of Lazbuddie on Hwy. 145.

The weigh-in will be held from 8 a.m. to noon. The show will begin at 1:30 p.m.

The judge will be assistant Deaf Smith County Agriculture Extension Agent Wade Shackelford.

According to Rick Copp, principal of Lazbuddie High School, the entry fee will be \$3 per head, but there will be no limit to the number of entries.

Belt buckles will be given to the grand champion and to the junior and senior showmanship champion in each division. The grand champions will receive rodeo jackets. There will also be prize ribbons given to other winners.

## Texico marshals to seek curfew

The Texico marshal's office plans to ask the City Council Tuesday to approve a curfew for juveniles.

In the wake of a recent surge in vandalism and burglaries in the Twin Cities, the Texico marshals checked on curfew laws and found that the city lacked one.

Also, Randall Harris, Curry County district attorney, has

been asked by Texico councilwoman Carolyn Burrows to attend Tuesday's meeting. He will answer questions about curfews and how they work.

At Monday's Texico school assembly (see related story on this page), students had many questions about curfews. So Mrs. Burrows thought it would be good to have Harris present to discuss it.

# Police solve crime spree

Many of the burglaries and much of the vandalism that have occurred in the Twin Cities the past few weeks has been solved with the apprehension of two Texico juvenile boys.

Combined work by the Texico marshal's office and the Parmer County sheriff's department resulted in "closing" the cases.

Police said they involved the several vehicle burglaries on the south side of Farwell, burglaries at Pierce's Beauty Shop and Red's Barber Shop, pickup and house burglaries in Texico and major vandalism at Texico schools.

Last week, the Texico old gym was broken into. Chemicals were poured on the gym floor and set afire. An area about 2 feet by 3 feet was destroyed.

In addition, several computers and a copy machine stored in that building were vandalized. And the fire extinguishers were used, too. The cost is expected to run into the thousands of dollars.

At first, it appeared a whole new floor, estimated to cost \$90,000, might be needed due to the way the floor was laid. But the appraiser checked on the floor Monday and told Supt. R.L. Richards that just the portion that was damaged would need to be repaired. This cost will be under \$2,000.

The computers and copy machine that were destroyed were surplus equipment and were to be auctioned off, said Richards.

The two youths who were involved are not among the four Texico juvenile boys who were apprehended last month for shooting out business and vehicle windows with a BB gun in the Twin Cities. These four youths will be in court later this month.

The break came in the case when Texico Marshal Fry Urioste took footprints and bicycle tracks off the Texico gym floor. Then in talking about the case with Parmer County sheriff's deputies, they noted some Texico youths who had come to Farwell "looking for a fight" last week.

So Texico deputy marshal Kirk Roberts and Brent Byrum, a Parmer County sheriff's deputy, went to talk with the youths. Urioste said one youth confessed to the burglary and vandalism spree.

## Herington seeks Texico judge's post

Candidates filed Tuesday for Texico elective offices.

The two City Council incumbents, whose posts are on the March ballot, signed up to run again - Ronnie Warmuth and Carolyn Warmuth. Neither is opposed.

Municipal Judge Howard Billingsley, who earlier had said he would seek re-election, changed his mind and decided to retire. He served 14 years in that job.

George Herington signed up to run for the municipal judge's post. He is unopposed.

## 'Have respect for yourself'

Texico School officials took steps to reduce vandalism in the area Monday by inviting Texico Deputy Marshal Kirk Roberts and Curry County Sheriff Mike Jackson to address the junior high and high school students about their responsibilities in the community.

Supt. Dr. R. L. Richards opened the program by admonishing the students: "When some people do something (wrong), it makes the whole school look bad. Have respect for yourself and for others. Be careful of who you are running around with."

"Think of the difficulties you are causing your parents," Richards turned then to those students who were not involved in acts of violence themselves to help improve the situation.

"If you are not involved, help the rest of the students. If you see someone doing wrong, let them know - this can mean someone's life."

"Begin respecting yourself; respect other people and their property; do what would make your parents proud," said Richards.

Roberts then addressed the group about the gravity of the situation in Texico.

"Texico has a bad reputation," said Roberts. "Parmer County doesn't look in their own community; they look over here."

"You and I have to start a different type of relationship: be more open and respect each other - because if I can't trust people in Texico, I have to take action," Roberts explained.

"Every time I get those calls, it makes me feel bad because I am part of this community," he said.

"It is important to me that changes are made. We have been lenient," Roberts went on to outline the actions marshal's office intends to take if there are further infractions of the laws by juveniles. Laws will be enforced, and the marshals will ask the city council to enact a curfew.

"Being nice just didn't work. Every one of you is a citizen of Texico. You are just as responsible as anyone else for what happens here. If you see something happening and you can stop it - stop it; if you can't stop it - get somebody who can," Roberts admonished the group.

During a question and answer session students asked several questions about the proposed curfew.

Roberts said the Texico City Council had not yet drafted the ordinance. He invited the students to attend the Jan. 14 council meeting.

The high school students were especially interested in the reason why Clovis had repealed its curfew.

Jackson then addressed the group about his experience enforcing the curfew in Clovis. He told the group that Clovis had enacted a curfew because they had looked at the situation from the victim's point of view.

"Some of you will be living on your own in just a few months. It won't be fun to live under a curfew," he told the student body.

"The reason the curfew went in Clovis is that we had some responsible students in the high school who were willing to take some action; I have a lot of pride in the Clovis students."

"It's a shame that 99% of you have to have a curfew because of 1-2% of you," said Jackson. He pointed out that the vandalism that has occurred will cost the school system and the property owners money. What is needed is for people who are willing to take positive action.

"We in law enforcement are not your enemy. We care about you and what you are doing," said Jackson.

"Texico has a reputation that stands on itself. It's a shame that it will be ruined by 1-2% of you. I'm not here to shame you, but we are here to make you realize that you have got to put some effort into it. You have got a lot to gain and a lot to lose," said Jackson.

"There is nothing worse you can do to a person than to take away their freedom. I've taken some the JD (juvenile detention) Center and even to the penitentiary. We want to be an ally, not an adversary."

Jackson then charged the group to talk to their teachers. "If you know someone is messing around, don't take the heat for them," he said.

"You will go on to be home owners and to own your own car, and the shoe will be on the other foot," he noted. "You still have a say in what goes on in your community - the choice is yours."

Richards concluded the assembly by stating, "The best kids in this area, and this whole state are in this room. Are you with me?" To which the group responded "Yes."

Texico Marshal Fry Urioste was not at the meeting because he received a police call just before the assembly was to begin. However, he told the Tribune late last week that if a curfew is enacted, it will be strictly enforced.

Urioste also warned youths about attending any parties where liquor is served. Arrests will be made. "No more Mr. Nice Guy," he said.



### Election signups continue

The deadline for filing for elective offices has been extended in Texas to Jan. 10.

The filing period originally was scheduled to end Jan. 2 but the redistricting mess caused the extension.

The 1990 census caused several changes in election districts in Texas. It was only this week that the latest state redistricting plan was approved.

Parmer County Democrats must file with Wendol Christian, county chairman. County Republicans file with Chris Gikas, county chairman. Candidates also must file with County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

On the Republican side, Randy Geries is seriously considering running for county sheriff. He already has filed with the county clerk and will decide this week whether to officially file with Gikas.

Geries, a former deputy with the Parmer County sheriff's department, is now on the Friona police force. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Don Geries of Farwell.

On the Democrat side, Christian was out of town early this week so the Tribune was unable to get an exact count on who has filed. He returns here at the end of this week to take any late entries.

However, all the incumbents have publicly announced for re-election. They are:

- County attorney, Charles Aycock.
- District attorney, Johnny Actkinson.
- County sheriff, Rex Williams.
- County tax assessor - collector, Doris Herington.
- Pct. 1 commissioner (Friona), Ernest Anthony.

- Pct. 3 commissioner (Farwell), Robert White.

In addition, Bob Stafford of Bovina has announced he will enter the Democrat primary to seek the office of county tax assessor - collector. He will oppose Mrs. Herington.

Stafford was born in Clarendon, Texas and he grew up in Silverton. He earned a degree in marketing from McMurry College, Abilene, in 1964.

Stafford has been assistant vice-president and manager of the Bovina branch of the First Bank of Muleshoe; president of the Golden Valley Ag-Credit in Darrouzette, Texas; and president of the Bank of Crowley.

Bob and Sandra Stafford have two children, Jason, 25, and John, 22.

Stafford attends the Methodist Church. He is a past president of the Crowley Lions Club and a member of the Crowley Masonic Lodge.
