Kay Dee, Rucker cited

Yields of 199.33 and 198.02 bushels per acre recently gave Rusty Rucker and Rucker Farms, Inc. of Texico second and third places, respectively, in the Ridge-Till Irrigated division of the 1991 National Corn Growers Association National Corn Yield Contest in New Mexico.

The honors came from entries of Pioneer ® hybrids 3245 and 3124. The second place entry was planted April 24, and the third place entry April 26, 1991, in 40 - inch rows at planting rates of 29,800 seeds per acre. Both were fertilized with approximately 20 pounds of nitrogen, 60 pounds of phosphate and 12 pounds of potash per acre.

The fields that produced the winning entries had been planted to wheat in 1990. The 1991 crops were grown using a ridge - till tillage system, and planted with a Buffalo 4500 planter. Both were harvested Oct. 14, 1991 at 17.9% and 23.9% moisture, respectively.

Rucker applied atrazine preplant incorporated at 3.00 pounds per acre to control weeds in both entries. Broadcast applications of 1.00 pint of Disyston and .06 pints of Asana were used to control insects. The crops were watered with sprinkle irrigation.

A yield of 254.02 bushels per acre recently gave Kay Dee Farms, Inc. first place in the Irrigated division of the 1991 National Corn Growers Association National Corn Yield Contest in Texas.

Kay Dee Farms is owned by members of the Howard family including W.D., and sons Mark and Greg.

Kay Dee Farms took the honors with an entry of Pioneer ® hybrid 3162. The winning entry was planted April 17, 1991 in 30-inch rows at a planting rate of 36,000 seeds per acre. It was fertilized with approximately 315 pounds of nitrogen, 90 pounds of phosphate and 25 pounds of potash per acre. Operators also applied 25 pounds of sulfur, 12.5 pounds of magnesium, 10 pounds of zinc and five pounds of manganese per acre.

The field that produced the winning entry had been planted to corn in 1990. The 1991 crop was grown using a minimumtill tillage system, and planted with a John Deere planter. It was harvested Sept. 27, 1991 at 27.2% moisture.

see Richard come home from the San Antonio Stock Show. Sherree, Melody and Sarah were on hand to watch 10-12 lambs born while Richard was gone. Luckily, warm weather made the chore a little more pleasant than it might have been.

Nature usually takes care of the ewe and its lamb during birth, but there needs to be someone to call a veterinarian in case of a serious problem.

Sherree and the girls also watched to see if the ewes rejected the lambs at feeding time, or if the lambs were strong enough to nurse.

The Montgomerys usually move the ewes and lambs into a shelter for the first few days of their lives to protect the lambs and to make the checking easier.

Sherree says that everything went smoothly during the time that Richard was gone, but it was a lot of responsibility. Some years lambing season is really a problem. If the temperature is extremely cold, someone has to be handy to move the ewe and lamb indoors so that the lambs don't freeze. A cold spell can mean lost lives and lost profits.

Some of these teams will participate only on the local level. Some of them will progress to the state and hopefully, the international competition.

This year there are three different problems that teams can attempt to solve: Hybrid Relays, The Omument, and Alice in

In the Hybrid Relays competition the teams are asked to design 5 different vehicles from free or inexpensive materials. Each vehicle must be powered by a different method of propulsion: batteries, mechanical, pneumatics, vibration, and one free choice.

The vehicles must meet specific specifications. They must also be able to perform specific tasks including: travel a course, break balloons, pull a weight, move flags, climb stairs. The vehicles must also be designed within a very specific price range. Accurate records must be kept. The whole project must then be presented in a creative manner.

That sounds like a lot of "musts," for a competition that aims at teaching youths to think creatively to solve problems without being hampered by preconceived notions. Luckily, the procedure is designed to make the constraints as pleasant as possible.

"Style can carry you even if the vehicle doesn't work," says coach Paula Leighton.

The scoring system helps to place the emphasis on creativity rather than simply on producing a product. At each step in the process the team is asked to do certain things which help to prepare them for the competition. The final presentation is only part of the scoring procedure.

According to coach Nadine Maben, one of last year's teams won in spite of some major last minute problems. The members who were present were quick on their feet during the short term problem solving section, and they were able to succeed in spite of some major problems.

"They are looking for a cooperative effort in problem

solving," says Mrs. Maben.

The process involved in preparing the projects is one of developing a real team which is able to work together to solve complex problems rather than simply producing a

"Never underestimate the power of cooperation and creative thinking," says Ms. Leighton. Through cooperation and teamwork the team members learn to strive for consensus rather than compromise.

The Alice In Omerland project challenges team members to write a creative play similar to Lewis Carroll's "Alice in Wonderland." The play must be accompanied by sound effects and music. Team members must design animated props to accompany their stories.

The Omument project challenges the team members to invent a monument and create a play to explain why this specific monument was constructed. Planning costumes and music are part of the project.

Elementary School principal Joel Pate started Texico's first Odyssey of the Mind Competition three years ago. Each year Texico's interest in it has grown.

"Schools aim at convergent thinking. In this competition five people must work together. There are a multitude of answers possible. This works on divergent thinking, risk taking, and cooperative thinking," he noted.

According to Pate, one of the key elements of the competition is teaching the team members "never be negative when you first approach a problem."

The process relies on brainstorming and writing down all possible solutions instead of simply jumping at the most common solutions. During practice sessions, the team members participate in activities to help foster creativity.

For instance, in one practice session team members are given a time limit, some eggs, putty and toothpicks. They are asked to stand the eggs on end within the time limit. After struggling for a while with the putty and toothpicks they are shown a video tape of a person who has won this competition- he has simply cracked the bottom of each egg so that they will stand on end.

"Nobody said you had to solve the problem without cracking a few eggs," said Pate.

Mrs. Maben said that she thought "Odyssey is probably more work, but it's team work. Science Fair is only one person doing a project. In Odyssey there is something to present as well as solving a spontaneous problem."

director over Faye Siegler. This is the area around Bledsoe and is the southernmost portion of the cooperative. Lewis was first elected in 1988.


