Goodbye, barrels; hello, dumpsters

The Farwell City Council Tuesday discussed its new trash pickup system.

Dumpsters are now in use throughout the city.

The barrels that residents have used for many years have been turned upside down by city workers and burning is not to be done in the barrels anymore.

Grass is to be placed in dumpsters.

The barrels will be removed by city workers next week. Residents wanting to keep their barrels must remove them from the alleys beforehand.

Although the new pact with Waste Management of Lubbock will mean the same tax rates, at present, for city residents, four problems were cited at the meeting.

The rates will jump for Farwell Schools, from \$50 a month to \$270 a month; for Farwell Convalescent Center, from \$90 a month to \$300 a month; and for Dairy Queen and Capitol Food, both from \$13.50 a month to \$130 a month. Each has multiple dumpsters

The council said they must charge someone at least what they must pay to Waste Management.

They also discussed having a large open dumpster available.

It also was stated that Waste Management is undergoing a reorganization and that Texico, now handled by Waste Management of New Mexico, and Farwell, handled by Waste Management of Lubbock, may be put into one division. If that occurs, it was said, both cities may end up with the same kind of dumpster.

In other business, the council:

- Scheduled the election for May 2. Three council posts will be on the ballot - Martin Kube, Gloria Hutchins and Fred Chandler.

- Unanimously tabled discussion on adopting a no-burn ordinance. The council sentiment was to continue allowing burning, such as for grass and tumbleweeds. "My constituents favor burning," said Mrs. Hutchins.

- Discussed the possibility of hiring Parmer County sheriff's deputies to work part-time for the city. At least one such deputy is amenable and will talk with Sheriff Rex Williams about it.

The plan would be to give overtime pay to one or two deputies. Due to expenses, the county commissioners have been strict on allowing sheriff's deputies overtime pay (at time and a half).

Also, city clerk Cynthia Thigpen has checked with two counties that she had heard share expenses with cities for paying police officers.

Post pays half the cost of its county police officers, except for the sheriff and jailors. Garza County has 6 deputies. The cost to Post is \$13,000 a month.

Cochran is looking to hire a "code enforcement officer." It is believed that he would need less certification than for a police officer. Mrs. Thigpen will check further on

this.

- Heard that the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission has listed Farwell's request for state funds for a water main to help some First Street residents as 32nd on its list of 36 requests that go to the state.

- Noted that with the enhanced 911 emergency phone system now in place for Parmer County, it is important for rural residents let officials know their exact addresses and locations for speedier response in times of

emergency.

It was said that about 90 percent of folks living in the "825" phone area haven't turned in address forms yet, for example. Forms are available at City Hall or the sheriff's office.

- Heard Chandler report that it's possible that Preston Martin's barn (between Franse Irrigation and Nutri Tech) may be used for an auction barn. Councilmen appeared amenable to that operation, although a variance may be needed for it.

Reynolds to leave

David Reynolds, principal at Farwell High School the past four years, announced his resignation at Tuesday's Farwell School Board meeting.

It becomes effective in June.

Reynolds said he loves Farwell and enjoys being a member of the volunteer fire department. But his parents are elderly and in bad health in Madisonville, Texas - a 13 1/2 hour drive from here.

Reynolds' mother is in a nursing home. His dad is 85 and partially blind. "We need to be closer to them," he said.

Reynolds called the high school teachers "the best staff in the area." He said he will work on a smooth transition with whoever is named his successor.

The board re-hired Jerry Dee Owen as principal for grades kindergarten through 8; Gwen Corn as assistant administrator, and Rex Cump-ton, as athletic director and head football coach.

In other business, the board: - Discussed the much higher garbage rate it must pay the city (see Farwell City Coun-

cil story in this issue). Supt. Richard Boothby will ask the city what can be done to lower the cost.

- Approved the senior trip to Los Angeles. Student representatives Cody Monk and Amanda Curtis made the presentation on behalf of the seniors.

- Scheduled the annual open house during Public School Week for 6:30 p.m. March 5.

- Appointed a committee to make recommendations on building new facilities. To be considered are a new gym, computer lab and more classrooms.

- Noted that a lawsuit has been filed against the new County Education Districts, the taxing unit for local schools in Texas. SPS is among those suing, said Boothby.

The method of state tax funding has been ruled unconstitutional by the Texas Supreme Court but the court is allowing taxes to be collected through the CED method through June 1, 1993, while the state tries to come up with a different plan.

Plans to renovate courthouse discussed

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday discussed plans for renovating the second floor of the courthouse.

The main object is to create a meeting room for the grand jury. Part of the former county extension agent's office will be used for this. The extension offices are now on the third floor.

Other parts of the extension agent's former offices would be used for a district court secretary's office, a legal library and an office for the Justice of the Peace, who is currently housed on the third floor.

In addition, the district court clerk's office may be expanded.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Took no action on a request from Excel Corporation to get a 50 percent tax abatement on its cooler expansion project.

At the last meeting, Fiona commissioner Ernest Anthony announced he had received

a letter from Excel asking for the abatement. He moved that Excel be granted 50 percent tax abatement on the new addition only.

His motion was not seconded because the commissioners wanted more information from Excel.

Excel officials haven't asked to meet with the commissioners yet.

- Approved having the flag pole painted and repaired.

- Received one bid for some Fiona property, believed to be the site of the old Congregational Church. Realtor B.K. Buske bid \$1,000.

The commissioners voted to sell the property to Buske, but final action has to await other government entities to which are owed back taxes for the site.

- Heard that Panhandle Community Services is looking into the feasibility of placing a van to provide transportation to anyone who needs it.

When a huge, heavily laden truck starts rolling down hill the little cars better get out of the way or they will be rolled over.

If the driver of the semi-truck tries to slam on his brakes to stop the downhill descent, we are apt to jack-knife across the highway and tip over spilling the entire cargo.

An experienced driver knows that he must slow up as he approaches the crest of a tall peak, not when he is halfway down the slope. He also knows that he is better off to feather the brakes instead of slamming them on too fast.

Our government (not just the President) has a lot of tools available to feather the economic brakes. The Treasury can print more money or take some of it out of circulation. They can also change interest rates on government loans and bond issues. And, they can change the prime lending rate that banks are charged to borrow from the government.

Congress can appropriate money to start some needed projects that would put more people to work. They can fund research projects or purchase items that were developed through private research.

Government regulatory agencies like the Securities and Exchange Commission can watch market trading carefully, and turn off the computers when trading gets too fast and furious and potentially destructive.

Our courts regulate business, too. The way they rule on patent and copyright cases, for instance, can affect the ability of our economy to grow. They regulate business in many, many ways.

The future of our economy is a team effort, not simply an act by one person. It takes several agencies of each branch of the government working together to change the course of our big semi truck economy.

If you were wondering what is going on at the building next to Capitol Food, behind the Helton Kard Stop, Mr. and Mrs. Joe McGimpsey are planning a "Surplus City," selling various kinds of tools there.

But it won't be open for several more months.

Angie White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert White of Farwell, was named to the Hardin - Simmons University President's List for the 1991 Fall semester.

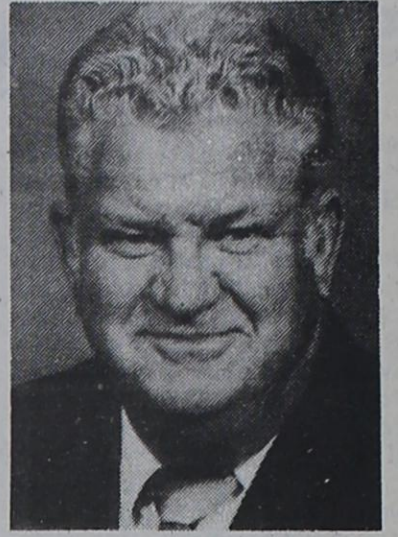
The new district runs from Lovington to Texico, but does not include Clovis. The boundary is Sugar Beet Road.

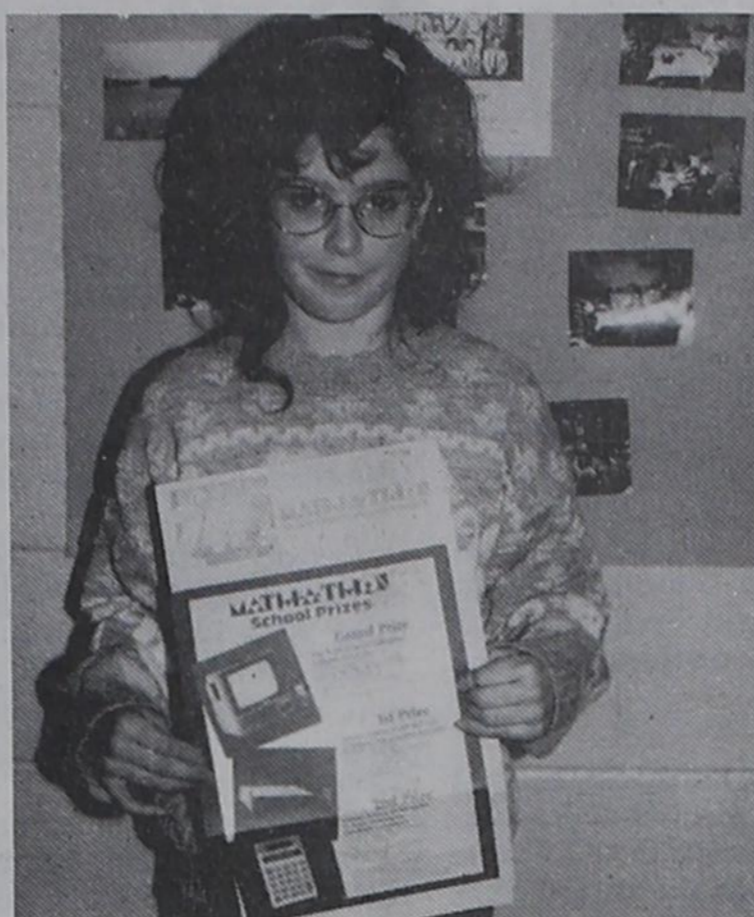
activities and services within Texico.

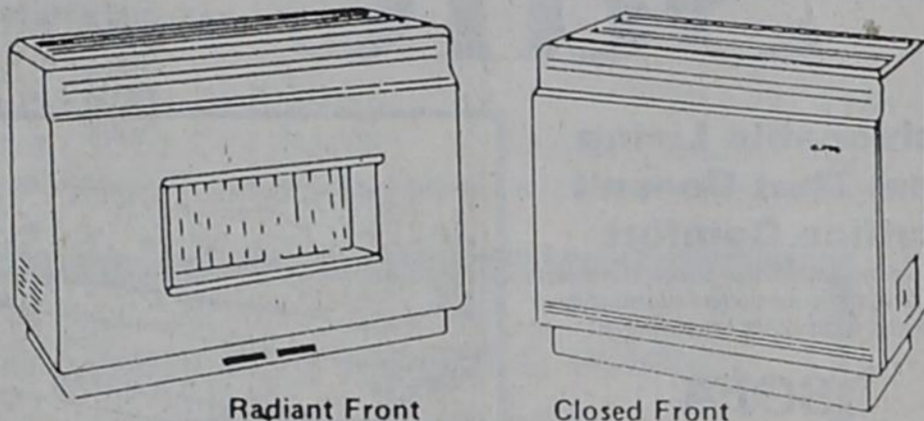
#### Stewed Dried Fruit

## 5 Area members re-elect Seales, Layman

Incumbents Don Seales of Lariat and L. G. Layman of East Lazbuddie were re-elected to the Board of Directors of Five Area Telephone Cooperative Saturday.

"As long as you're behind us, we can survive in this world of change," said Five Area manager Hubert Kidd in his yearly address to the membership. He thanked the directors for providing the new equipment that the cooperative needed to keep up with changes.

Kidd talked about many of the changes in the industry that the board has been wrestling with over the past several years - cellular telephone service, 911 service, computer changes, upgraded switching, and regulatory changes from Washington D.C. and Austin.

He reported that Cellular III of Texas, an association of area cooperatives working together to develop cellular telephones for this area, has exceeded anyone's expectations.

It has already surpassed 2,000 customers, and is producing at a level that they expected to reach at the end of the third year of service instead of the first year of service.

The Cellular III of Texas group works in close conjunction with Cellular III, a subsidiary of ENMR Telephone Cooperative in New Mexico.

Kidd said Five Area will need to upgrade the computerized switching process by 1993 or patrons will be unable to make calls to 800 numbers from their homes.

"The industry is traveling so fast the regulatory people are not keeping up," said Kidd. He reported that 42 pieces of telephone legislation were presented to the state legislature in Austin during this year, and all but three of them died.

Speaking of the continual changes in the industry, he joked: "Computers are never ending ... even little kids have got to have their Mario III."

He also reported that the board had re-drawn the voting districts for members of the Five Area Cooperative.

The Lazbuddie District was split into two districts because it was so large, and also because so many people had moved out of the Dodd district.

The Cooperative's attorney, Johnny Actkinson of Farwell, explained the several by-law changes, and the reasons for these changes to the assembled group. The by-laws were written more than 40 years ago, and the board had asked for some changes to reflect the manner in which business is actually conducted.

The membership voted to pass seven by-law changes and also a waiver to the nepotism rule at this meeting.

The changes include:

- The \$5 membership fee will no longer be collected because it is difficult to keep track of members who have moved out of the district to pay capital credits or refund this money.

- There will no longer be a limit to the number of years a person may serve on the board.

- There will now be an appointed nominating committee instead of one elected from the floor.

- The wording of the by-laws was changed to reflect the fact that the secretary need not actually write the minutes himself (since the meetings are recorded) and that the treasurer does not actually count all of the money for the cooperative (since this is done by staff members in the office).

- Unclaimed capital credits will be retained by the Cooperative for the scholarship fund instead of sending them to the state comptroller's office under the laws of escheat. Ray O'Brien asked if this was legal, and he was told that this amendment will only take effect if the state law changes.

The board also voted to waive the nepotism rule so that the board could hire a worker who is related to a member of the board of directors because it is so hard to find qualified workers who will work in a rural area.

All of the items requested by the board were passed by the membership.

Following the meeting, a chicken fried steak dinner was served to the members and their families.

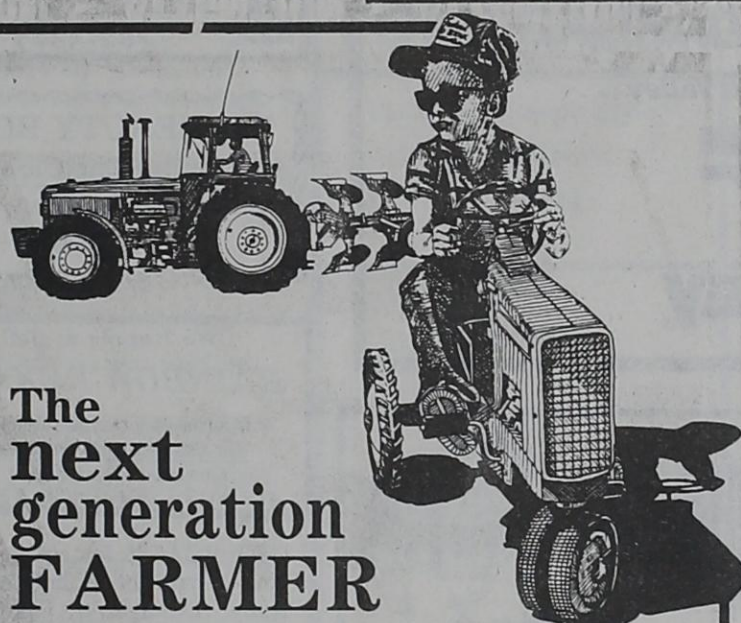

# Street lights okayed along Avenue F

The Texico City Council Tuesday voted to send a formal letter of request to SPS so that street lights may be installed on Avenue F at its intersections with State, Florence and Garwood.

Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows had found there were dark streets in their neighborhood and asked the council to take action.

In other business, the council:

- Received proposed plans for the new addition to the Texico Cemetery from engineer Bob Lydick. Plans call for fencing the area, laying out plots for grave sites, and constructing a road through the cemetery. No action was taken because no cemetery board members were present.
- Directed city workers to construct a fence at the KKR well site using the specifications presented by the state highway department.

Councilman Butch Tharp said summer is rapidly approaching, and the city still has only one well functioning. No one from the state has come to inspect the well situation yet. They were supposed to come to Texico in January. Tharp asked that the city contact the Environmental Inspection Department people about this matter.

- Agreed to accept bids on the cleaning of the lots across the street from City Hall.

- Discussed purchasing a building for a recreation center from someone who owns two buildings at Cannon AFB. Mrs. Burrows said some of the buildings there have asbestos insulation. She called them "one of those bargains that backfired."

Councilman Oran J. Autrey said that before the buildings leave the base they would have to have the asbestos stripped off of them.

- Discussed work needed before the city swimming pool can be used this summer. Mayor Doyal LaRue asked how much the work of sandblasting the inside of the pool and repainting the surface would cost. Autrey said about \$750 - \$800. Tharp noted that the council also needs an estimate on work inside the building.

- Mrs. Burrows said that she had been approached by members of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club about work that needed to be done at the Lions Park. LaRue asked that when

bids are received for cleaning the lots beside City Hall that bids also be taken on cleaning the park.

- Councilman Ronnie Warmuth said the Curry County Chamber of Commerce is offering cash incentives for cleanup projects if they are done on LEAP Day (Feb. 29). He suggested that someone look into the possibility of doing the cleanup that day.

- Mrs. Burrows said a judge in Clovis assigns community service projects to juveniles who have broken laws. She thought that maybe the council might want to talk to the Texico judge about this later in the year.
- Autrey asked Water Dept, manager Billy Hammitt if

people who failed to pay their water bills were able to move and then have water connected at their new address. Hammitt answered that they could not. "The only one who moved wasn't in arrears," he said.

He did note, though that sometimes one member of a family would be in arrears in their bills, and after the family moved the request for water service would be made in the name of another person.

- No action was taken on the Fire Code until the city attorney gets a copy of the revised fire code.
- No action was taken on the U.S. West franchise proposal because they do not have it yet.

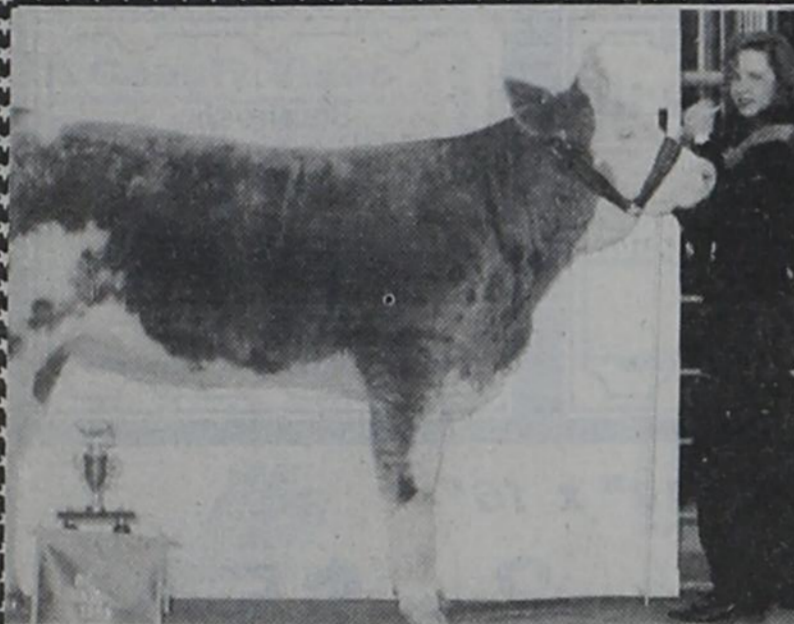

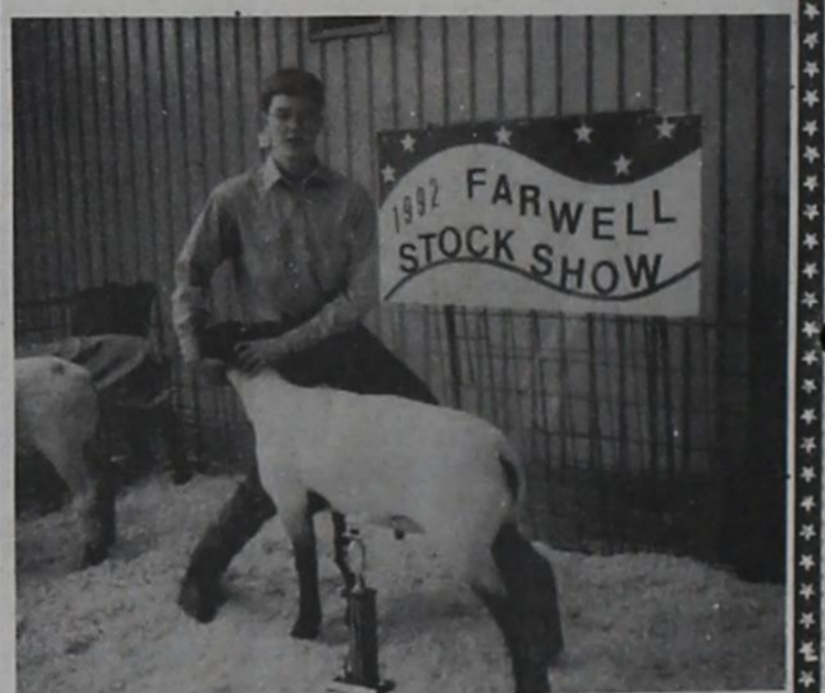

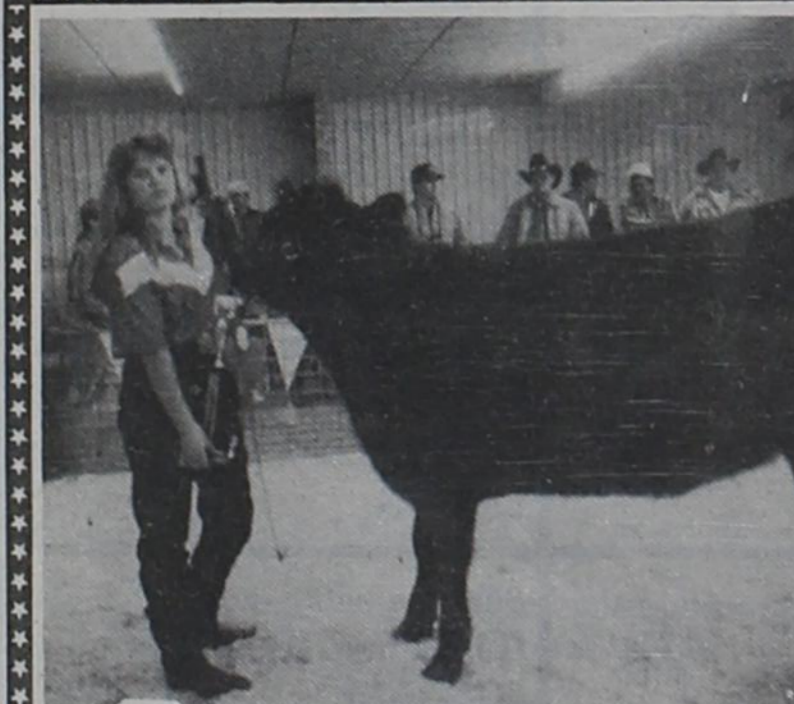
