Give Thanks to Who?

Did the Pilgrims gather in an attitude of thanksgiving to the Indians for their survival? Were these founding fathers owing their lives and survival to the Indians?

In many public school classrooms and in many textbooks it is being taught today that our founding fathers, the Pilgrims, gathered together on that first Thanksgiving Day celebration to give thanks to the Indians for their survival of that first horrible winter. Let's look at the words, attitudes and actions of the hearty and admirable men and women that founded our great nation.

As their ship was leaving the shores of England, they dedicated this long perilous journey by reading from Psalm 107, "They that go down to the sea in ships that do business in great waters, these see the works of the Lord and the wonders of the deep." They sang hymns and prayed that God would protect them and provide for them. They were brave men and women who were willing to weather the seas and the storms thereof to be able to live in a land where they could worship their God without government interference. They expected hardship, hunger, hurricanes and horrible savages, but the price was worth the effort.

From the personal accounts of the Mayflower, on Dec. 26, 1620, with shouts of praise to God, the Pilgrims from Scrooby Village in England came ashore at New Plymouth. The able bodied knelt on the snowy, rocky ground and gave Him thanks for the stormy voyage across the Atlantic. Others lying on pallets recited Psalms and sang hymns. They recognized fully where their help had come from. They were deeply committed and believed that God was able to meet their needs in this strange and foreign land because they believed in God.

Upon their arrival on shore, Gov. John Carver sent Captain Miles Standish to explore and locate an appropriate campsite and wrote, "God protected them from wild beasts, and in one encounter, they chased off attacking redmen with gun powder and shrieks. Thank God, no lives were lost." There had been lives lost on this difficult trip. William Bradford had lost his wife as she had fallen from the ship and drowned. Others had perished from sickness, disease and exposure, but their first encounter with the Indians was anything but pleasant. Searching for their reason for making such a journey and suffering such personal loss and pain, Edward Winslow, a printer, later said, "We had come for purely religious purposes, we ask only liberty to practice our faith."

The Indians certainly had nothing to do with bringing these Pilgrims to the new land. Robert Cushman, a wool carder, said, "146 souls made it safely to this land. There were times when we thought all of us would be dumped in the briny. Once the main beam bowed and cracked. We knew one sudden twist could break the ship in two. We prayed, and a giant screw was the tool used to hold the beam together." God willed for the screw to be put on board. The Pilgrims were people who were constantly aware of God's great providence and His ability to protect. They didn't worship the sea and make sacrifices to the angry sea god. In their daily life, in prosperity or in peril, they consistently prayed, expected and received help from this great and gracious God that they had traveled so dangerously to worship in freedom and liberty. The entire ship was riddled with event after glorious event of these Pilgrims recognizing God's great and gracious hand in the very minutest details of their lives. They faced the dangers looking to Him for help. They were not bitter or angry for having to face difficulty and tragedy. When the situation was over, they thanked God for His mercy and His deliverance. Did they really understand what they



were saying and doing?

The Mayflower Compact reads, "We are knit together in a body in a most strict and sacred bond and covenant of the Lord, of the violation thereof we made great conscience, and by virtue whereof we do hold ourselves strictly tied to all care

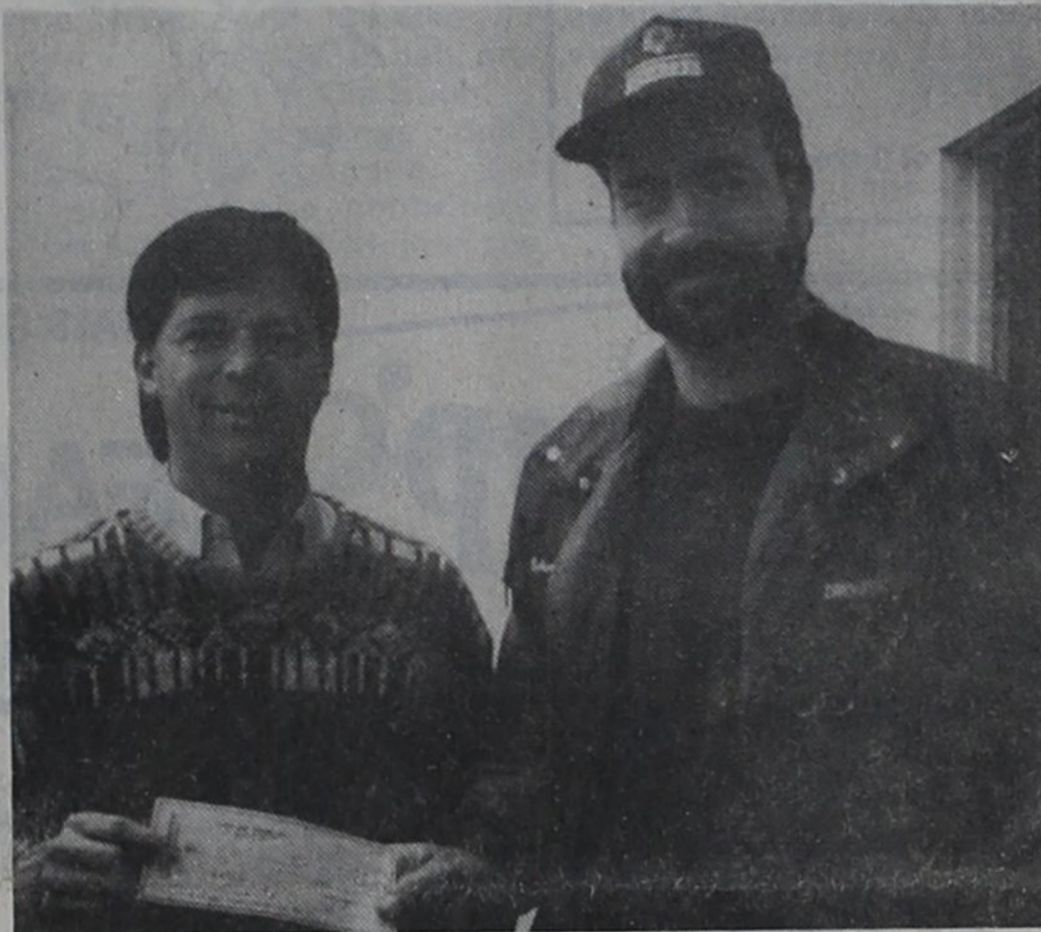

Farwell refuse pickups discussed

Representatives of Waste Management Inc. of Texas met with Farwell officials and residents at a special meeting Nov. 21 to discuss the company's proposal to haul the city's trash.

If all goes well, it appears that Waste Management would begin hauling Farwell's refuse in January or February. Once the negotiations are completed, Waste Management needs 3 to 4 weeks to get their containers set up.

Waste Management has received approval to use the Clovis landfill. It prefers that method since the closeness of the landfill. But Waste Management hasn't checked yet on whether approval is needed from the state of New Mexico to cross state lines.

If New Mexico says no, then Waste Management will haul Farwell's refuse to the Lubbock landfill.

Either way, the cost will be the same to Farwell residents. Even though the Clovis landfill is closer, it costs more to use than the Lubbock landfill, it was stated.

Currently, Farwell residents pay \$12 a month, plus tax, for refuse. Under the proposed contract, which is under negotiation, that cost would remain the same.

Waste Management wants \$11.75 per resident from the city. The proposed pact is for

5 years. The cost would be tied to the Consumer Price Index so rate changes are likely each year.

The refuse firm was represented at the meeting by Clyde Blakelly, general manager of Waste Management of Lubbock, and Jackie Howell, an associate with the firm.

They propose to place a 3-yard container in the alleys for every four households.

If there are fewer households in an area, they would place 1 1/2-yard containers there (such as the one displayed in front of City Hall). Each container would handle one or two families.

"The alleys seem to be in excellent shape," noted Howell.

Residents would be billed by the city. Everyone who is on the city water line would be billed. Refuse would be picked up once a week. The equipment will be maintained in Farwell.

The firm will make arrangements for residents and firms not on the city water line directly. They encourage such Parmer County folks and firms to contact Howell at (806) 762-2650.

A business would pay \$23.50 a month for a 1 1/2-yard container. If two businesses share a container, each would pay \$11.75. The largest con-

tainers available are 4-yards, at a cost of \$63 a month. A 3-yard container would cost \$47 a month.

Once Waste Management takes over, open burning in Farwell will cease. It was suggested that residents will need to take their barrels out of the alleys if they want to keep them. Barrels left in the alleys may be taken by the city and gotten rid of.

If the Clovis landfill is used, no transfer station would be needed. The trash would be hauled directly to Clovis, probably in 4 runs. If the Lubbock landfill is used, a transfer station would be set up.

Trash would not need to be separated, although it's possible that down the road the government may insist on it. The question at that time will be whether residents would have to separate trash from plastics, for example, or whether that would be done at the landfill.

Mayor Wendol Christian noted that once Waste Management starts up, the Farwell landfill would be completely

closed. Folks who have large items to get rid of - such as concrete, large tree limbs, large appliances, etc. - would have to take them to the Clovis landfill themselves.

Among other points made during the meeting:

- The charges are for all on city water lines, whether or not the person wants garbage pickup. Regardless of family size, everyone would be charged the same rate.

- Waste Management can't use the Muleshoe landfill, because the extra refuse would put the landfill into a higher classification, putting more restrictions on them.

- Looking to the future, unless there's a population base of at least 75,000, an area landfill cannot work "in the black" under new federal guidelines.

- Containers placed in the alleys must be on the same side.

- Anything that doesn't fit into a container won't be picked up. A container can pick up about 1,500 pounds.

- Waste Management might pick up "a little concrete," but if there's a lot of it in a container, it won't take it.

- Since Texico's refuse is also handled by a division of Waste Management, the two firms can work together, such as loaning equipment to each other if needed.

- Waste Management is the largest trash hauler in the world, and handled 17 percent of the U.S. trash, and 25 percent of Texas trash.

- Grass clippings don't have to be bagged, just thrown into the containers. Tree limbs must fit into the container or they won't be picked up.

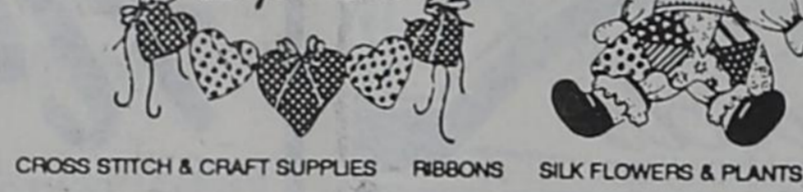

Longhorns smite Guthrie; ready for Fort Hancock

The Lazbuddie Longhorns came from behind to a 46-32 state playoff victory last Friday over Guthrie at Smyer. Lazbuddie, 11-1 overall and ranked No. 8 in the state, now faces its old nemesis Fort Hancock in the regional semi-finals. Fort Hancock, the three-time defending state champion, crushed Wellman 45-0 last Friday. Fort Hancock, rated No. 1 in Texas, has defeated Lazbuddie the past two years in the state playoffs. Guthrie finished 7-5.

The Longhorns play Fort Hancock in the quarter-final game of the state playoffs at Wink, Texas at 7:30 p.m. Saturday.

Coach C.W. Williams praised the playing of Matt Cozbey and Kirk Jesko, who had good games offensively, and Eric Williams who did a good job on defense.

"The turn around came when Cozbey intercepted a pass and brought it back for a TD," said Williams.

As for Fort Hancock, "they are not quite as fast as they were last year, but they are still very good," said Williams.

The Guthrie game saw the return of Brett Thomas to quarterback; he had missed several games due to injury. Thomas hit 13 of 18 passes for 219 yards. Top receivers were Eric Williams, with 6 catches for 103 yards; Leland Brockman, 3 catches for 47 yards, and Matt Cozbey, 3 grabs for 57 yards. Once again, Kirk Jesko provided a strong running game. He gained 99 yards on 15 rushes.

The first quarter saw only one score, by Guthrie on a 29-yard run. The kick was good and Guthrie led 8-0 after the first stanza. In the second period, Guthrie scored twice more

- on short runs of 4 and 5 yards - before the Longhorns finally got on the scoreboard. Cozbey took an 18 yard TD pass from Thomas, followed by the Luis Gonzales kick. Guthrie kicked a 22 yard field goal and led at the half, 24-8.

of each others' good." It is not so strange a fascination as to where these ideas of freedom to worship, freedom to own land and freedom to self-determination came from. Many times it was believed that these fundamental ideas were born at the hands of the framers of the Constitution. But long before they were born, the seeds of liberty had been planted in the Pilgrim hearts of these hardy men, women, boys and girls of Plymouth Colony. They were not simple minded, diluted, confused or superstitious sissies. They were not incompetent men and women who were dependent on Indians for their existence.

Once settled and living on land, the first permanent building constructed in the camp was a church that served a dual purpose as a general court. Prayers were offered at the opening of the court and before any decisions of importance were made. The people who carved this nation out of the wilderness were men and women who understood the importance of prayer. Their days began with it, and their important meetings opened with it. The Pilgrims taught their children, conducted all of their important meetings and worshipped in their church building. God was the center of their being and everything that happened in their lives was sifted through their grid of faith in the true and living God. When they ate their meals, built their homes and planted

their crops, they knew that the success or failure of them was totally in His control.

Yes, some of the Indians helped. They taught the Pilgrims to use fish as a fertilizer as they planted their corn crop. Maybe they observed the Indians hunting and fishing and learned other valuable skills, but there is absolutely no question at all as to whom the Pilgrims were thanking on that first harvest celebration. He is the same God they looked to and sought in the midst of their voyage. He is the One that they asked to bless the crops as they planted them in the ground, and He is the One they thanked with their hearts on that first thanksgiving day celebration.

The first President of the United State, George Washington, made this proclamation in 1789: "Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly implore His protection, aid and favors...now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these states to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the Beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and protection of the people of this country, and for all the great and marvelous and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us."

We look to George Washington as the Father of our country and he looked toward God as an Almighty One that everyone ought to obey. He believed that everyone of us ought to be grateful for His benefits. Grateful is a word that means thankful and appreciative. Washington did not believe that we ought to relish in the might of our great army and navy. He said we ought to humbly implore God for His protection, His aid and His great and good favor.

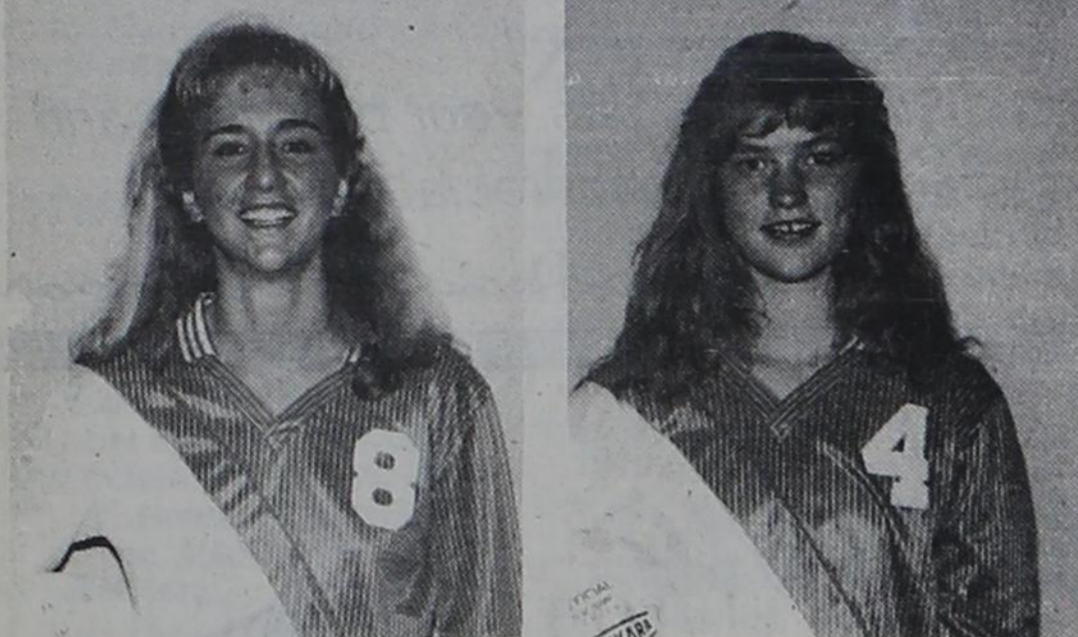
Was Washington really as great a leader and person as we credit him to be? If so, we ought to listen to his counsel, and pattern our lives after his example. Washington says that every good thing that we have comes from God and

we should be grateful and thankful to Him for it. Why did Washington leave out being thankful to the Indians? Did he not understand the facts? Was he an uneducated man in the history of our ancestors and New Plymouth? No, Washington was not only well-educated, but he knew where our blessing had come from and he knew who deserved the praise and the credit for that first Thanksgiving and who deserved them in America in 1789.

In 1863, President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of November as a permanent and on-going day set apart for the nation to give thanks to Almighty God. It was this day in addition to a National Day of Prayer and fasting that led to the end of the Civil War. Lincoln attributed the healing of our torn nation not to his own great leadership and skill, but to the gracious hand of our great and merciful God. This writer believes that Lincoln was the greatest President that has ever led this nation. He had absolutely no problem giving God credit for making America the great nation it was in 1863.

A personal friend tells of spending a later evening with Lincoln in the White House. He says that he left the President after midnight with his head in hands talking to God and praying for the details of the nation. He said he returned early the next morning to find Lincoln in the same clothes, head in hands, talking to God about all the families that had tragically lost sons, fathers, friends and relatives in the Civil War. His hands were full of tears as he described in deep grief the magnitude of the loss. He had given himself to prayer for the entire night. Lincoln believed in prayer.

It is Thanksgiving and it is time we recognized and taught our children that we give thanks to the God of heaven who made all things. We need to return America to what has made us a great nation and to the one who can heal our land. "If my people who are called by my name will humble themselves and pray and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then I will from heaven and will forgive them sin and heal their land (II Chronicles 7:14). Let's bring America back to God this Thanksgiving.

Adjustments can help farmers

The hard freeze at Halloween and the cool, moist conditions which have blanketed area cotton fields since then are creating widespread problems for farmers trying to harvest their crop.

But there are several adjustments or modifications to cotton strippers which might help reduce costly trash and bark content of stripped cotton, says the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and U.S. Department of Agriculture:

- Allow fields, plants and cotton to dry before stripping, and strip only when humidity levels are low enough to allow the burs to snap cleanly away from the fruiting limbs.
- Use the bur extractor if the stripper is equipped with one. For the extractor to work properly, the cotton has to be dry.
- Space the stripper rolls as far apart as practical. Spacings should be widened until the machine begins to "string" cotton, or leave burs and unopened bolls on the plant. On machines where

such adjustments are easily made, the settings may need to be changed during the day as humidity levels change.

- Consider using 5 brushes and one rubber bat per roll, rather than the alternate brush-paddle arrangement.

- Open the combing pans as far as possible, usually about 2.25 inches, or until cotton is being lost, to allow more fine trash to fall to the

ground. This should remove about 25 pounds of pin trash per bale, the experts said.

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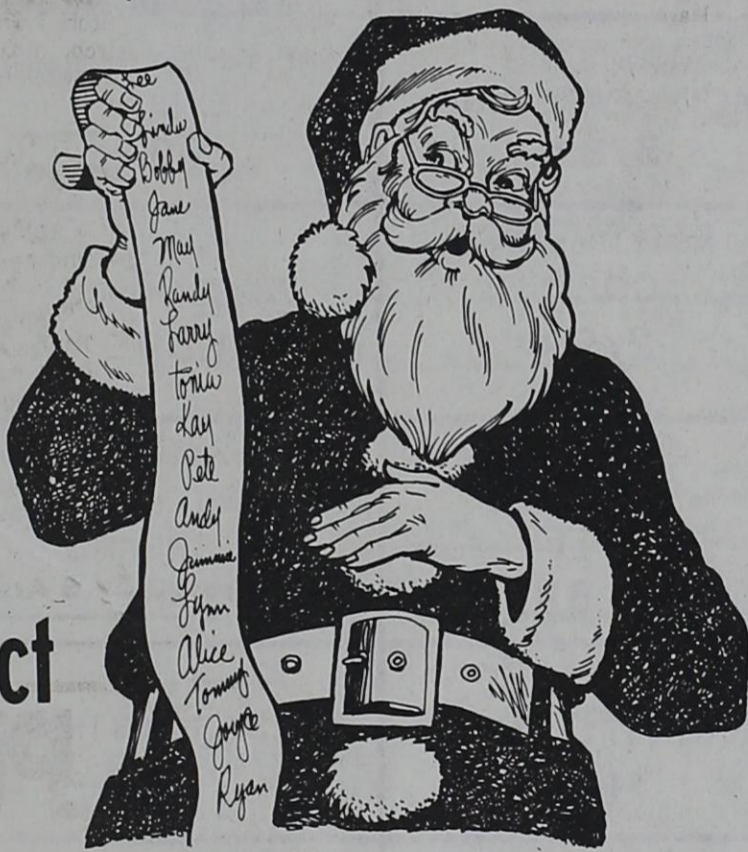
