But Fred will always stand out in my mind for offering common sense solutions to delicate problems. And he has never been afraid to speak his mind, especially to someone he feels is attempting to rip off Farwell. He's always stood up for his family and his community. That's the way it ought to be.

It's important for me to write this column because most folks rarely if ever attend city council sessions. Thus, most folks don't know what an outstanding job Fred has done for Farwell over the years. I want all to know.

Farwell will miss Fred's presence on the council. He is to be complimented on being an excellent example of a citizen-official.

As just one Farwell resident, I want to publicly thank Fred for his public service.

Kelley attends National Youth Leadership Forum

Texico High School junior Peggy Kelley, of Pleasant Hill, was one of five students from New Mexico who participated in the National Youth Leadership Forum on Security and Defense March 10 - 15 in Washington, D.C.

The Kelleys aren't really sure how their daughter was chosen for this honor, but they thought it might have something to do with her scores on one of the tests that students are asked to take these days.

"Who would have thought that they would pick someone from little ol' Texico?" asked Mrs. Richard Kelley.

During the course of the fast paced forum, about 300 participants from 47 states and Puerto Rico had the opportunity to meet several influential people in Washington. As soon as the group had assembled, Admiral Crowe addressed the assembled group the first evening. There were as many as 6 lectures per day while they were there.

Peggy's itinerary for the trip was full each day. Between attending lectures, touring sights, participating in group discussions, and just staying up chatting with the friends she made on the trip, Peggy was really worn out by the trip.

On the first full day, participants toured the sights on Capitol Hill. Each met with members of Congress. Peggy met New Mexico Sen. Pete Domenici and Rep. Joe Skeen.

She toured the Supreme Court building and others in the Capitol Hill area that day. A highlight was the Air and Space Museum.

"On Wednesday night we saw all of the monuments. It was really pretty," said Peggy. The group saw the Lincoln Memorial, the Washington Monument, and the Jefferson Memorial.

"There are so many stairs!" she said of the buildings in Washington. It's definitely a town where comfortable shoes are appreciated.

One disappointment that evening was "the Vietnam Veterans' wall wasn't lit very well. We didn't see it very well," she said.

During the course of the trip the group heard speeches by Gen. Alexander Haig, and former top national officials Frank Carlucci and Michael Doubleday. They also observed a panel of reporters from the National Press Club question some of them.

An artist showed the group a collection of sketches he made, "In Living Color - Combat Artist At the Front," while covering the Gulf War.

Another speaker, a Navy Seals Commander, told the group that the Gulf War, "wasn't like the movie. It was a lot rougher. It was not just fun and games."

They also heard a captain address the group on the aftermath of the Gulf War, "The Shifting Sands of the Middle East."

"Mostly they talked more about the proposed military cutbacks, not about the war," Peggy noted. "Even Pete Dominici talked about cutbacks."

The young people also toured the Pentagon that day. On Friday they visited the War College at Fort McNair. One trip was to Arlington National Cemetery where they observed a wreath laying ceremony and the changing of the guard as well as seeing the grave of John F. Kennedy.

In addition to tours and speeches, the group broke into small groups to work on simulated problems. In one session the students were given a hypothetical case involving the protection of the President, Vice President, and Cabinet members. Some youth were elected to portray people in these positions, and the others advised them about what to do.

Peggy's group, obviously influenced by the dramatic events of our country's past 30 years, hypothesized what would happen in an assassination attempt. Their Secretary of Defense was the culprit.

Texico works at well problem

Councilwoman Carolyn Burrows gave an update at Tuesday's Texico City Council meeting on the water well problem.

She and city engineer Bob Lydick met with School Supt. R.L. Richards to seek to find a spot to dig a new well.

Currently, the city has only one well functioning and fears a problem may be nearing, especially with warmer weather approaching.

Mrs. Burrows said Richards had taken an informal school board canvas and there was no objection to the city putting a well on school property.

She said Lydick wants to build the well close to Craig Street, which would be far enough away from the closest other well, on the Skaggs property. And it still would be far enough away from the contaminated KKR well so the state would approve it.

Speaking of the contamination, Mayor Doyal LaRue said the state Environmental Division has asked the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to seek to find the extent of the contamination.

This move was made because the EPA has "Superfund" money available for such projects. This could save Texico a lot of money, especially if the EPA bears the cost for an air stripper at the KKR Park well. An air stripper costs about \$80,000 - money the city doesn't have available.

It's hoped the extent of the contamination would be found in June.

City Attorney Duane Hamar noted that for a well to be built on school property, the school board would have to okay the land "donation" and a lot of paperwork is involved.

Mrs. Burrows also said Richards wants a concrete building placed around the well, if it is built on school property, for safety purposes.

She said Lydick liked the school area because if he goes further north it would be too close to the sanitation plant.

In other business, the council:

- Discussed selling the city's old tranquilizer gun.

- Heard LaRue say bids will be sought for a chain link fence around the cemetery and also for a partial fence, since part of the cemetery already has a fence.

Cemetery board members asked LaRue to see if the elm trees there could be topped out.

- Heard Mrs. Burrows report that county commissioner Paul Dee Barnes said it appears the county would put down caliche on the east road leading to the cemetery. He also said Paul Skaggs, a cemetery board member, may donate caliche for a road inside the cemetery and, if so, the county would put it down.

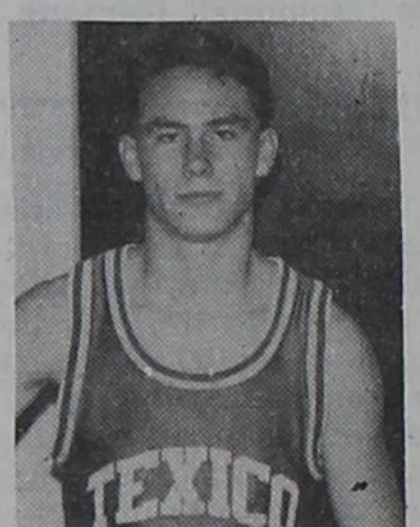
- Approved a request by Max Carter to cut the street on Mildred between Anderson and Garwood to put in a sewer. The street would be blocked about 2 days. He would use hot asphalt to patch it up.

- Scheduled a work session on the budget for 8 a.m. March 28 at Texico City Hall.

- Heard city employee Glen

da Mosier report she checked into the suggestion that McDonald's Restaurants might

donate playground equipment for Lions Park. She said she was told they don't do this.

Ground water levels decline

Parmer County ground water levels declined an average of 1.02 feet in 1991 in 96 privately-owned wells measured by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

This decline represents a reduction of 83,538 acre-feet of water from storage in the Ogallala Aquifer last year in Parmer County.

Ground water levels in Parmer County decreased 1.28 feet during the 10 year period from 1982 to 1992. A decline of 1.37 feet was recorded during the five year period from 1987 to 1992.

Ground water levels in the Ogallala Aquifer within the 5.5 million acre Water District service area had an average decline of .73 of a foot from January 1991 to January 1992. This is a net reduction of about 602,250 acre-feet of ground water from storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District service area.

A network of 1,025 privately-owned observation water wells is used to determine the annual change in the quantity of water in storage in the Ogallala Aquifer within the High Plains Water District. The depth - to- water measurements are taken in January and February of each year in order to allow water levels to stabilize from the pumping during the previous growing season.

Of the 15 counties or portions of counties making up the High Plains Water District, 14 showed an average decline in the depth-to-water measurements.

Renovation under way

The Parmer County Commissioners Monday awarded bids on the renovation of the second floor of the courthouse.

Lee's Electric of Farwell got the bid for electrical work, and Sherrill Lumber of Bovina got the bid for construction.

The commissioners voted

to award the bid on courthouse janitorial service to Melissa Taylor of Bovina.

The commissioners also voted to allow Judge Bonnie Clayton to have authority to hire a surveyor instead of calling a Jury of View in response to the road petition in Pct. 4.

6th grade change OK'd

The Lazbuddie School Board Monday finalized its decision to change the 6th grade from a self-contained class to departmentalized class.

Once they voted to do this, they extended a contract to Gay Williams to teach junior and senior high school math.

They also voted to extend a contract to James C. Stewart

to teach driver's education after school during the spring quarter.

There is at least one position that the board has not yet filled. The board may meet within a few days to take action on this. If the position is not changed by the board by April 1, state law calls for current staff members to be automatically re-hired.

Highlights included interest rate reductions to variable rate stock holders from 9.75 percent at the beginning of the year to 8.95 percent currently; developing a lend-

ing division geared specifically to the needs of agribusiness, and introducing an adjustable rate loan program with rates tied to a Treasury index.

Also, the district bank returned \$14 million in patronage refunds to district FLBAs last year to help them build financial strength.

The FLBA of Muleshoe has \$25 million in long-term ag loans to farmers in two counties. The 10th Farm Credit District has about \$3.6 billion in loans outstanding to nearly 60,000 borrowers.

To register, a child must have immunization records and a birth certificate. Only official copies of birth certificates are accepted and must have been obtained from state offices. Social Security numbers are also required.
Rebecca Smallwood, school nurse, will be available to review immunization records during registration.

Pre-K/Headstart requirements
To be eligible, a child must be 4 years old prior to September 1st, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced-price lunches), and is a resident of the Farwell School District.
Headstart requires proof of participants meeting Federal Income Guidelines so Income Verification, such as check stubs, should also be available for review.
Headstart also extends its services to handicapped children.
Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.

2 bylaw changes opposed

Dear Mike,
The Board of Directors of ENMR Telephone Cooperative is recommending that nine bylaw amendments be presented for consideration by membership at the ENMR annual membership meeting March 28 at Clovis High School in the Lecture Hall. Also a resolution recommending a future bylaw change will be presented from the floor by members.
As a former board member for 32 years and a past president of the Board, I suggest strongly that ENMR members look very closely at the bylaw changes to be presented. At least two need to be defeated.
In Article IV, Section 4, the ENMR Board recommends

deletion of the language allowing for nominations from the floor in the election of Board members. This will not be good for the membership as a whole, for this will leave only two methods for nominating Board candidates. These are, by petition - at least 20 days before the annual meeting, or by Board appointed committees."
In Article VII, Section 2, the ENMR Board recommends the addition of new language which says that "the terms and conditions of all rules and regulations adopted in writing by the Board," shall constitute and be a contract between the Cooperative and each patron. Existing language states further that, the patrons are bound by such contract as fully as though each patron had individually signed a separate instrument containing such terms and provisions. It is wrong to do this. No Cooperative member-patron should be contractually bound by every action of the Board which

they put in writing and call a rule or regulation."
Also to be presented at the meeting will be a resolution directing the Board to divide the Cooperative serving area into 13 Board Member districts of, as nearly as possible, equal population, with such board members to be elected ONLY by the residents of each district. The resolution also asks the Board to provide for mail-in ballots so that elderly and other members unable to attend annual meetings will have the opportunity to vote. Bylaw amendments needed to adopt these changes as bylaws would be voted on at the 1993 ENMR annual meeting.
I urge as many as possible of the 9,673 ENMR members in northeastern New Mexico and the adjoining two counties in west Texas attend the meeting and vote on these issues.

Nineteen scholarships have been awarded for 1992, bringing the total number of scholarships awarded to 70 (\$38,550) since the foundation was established in 1986, said general manager Clifford Stewart.

Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON --A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.
