Our family had a mini-vacation last weekend in Scottsdale, Ariz.

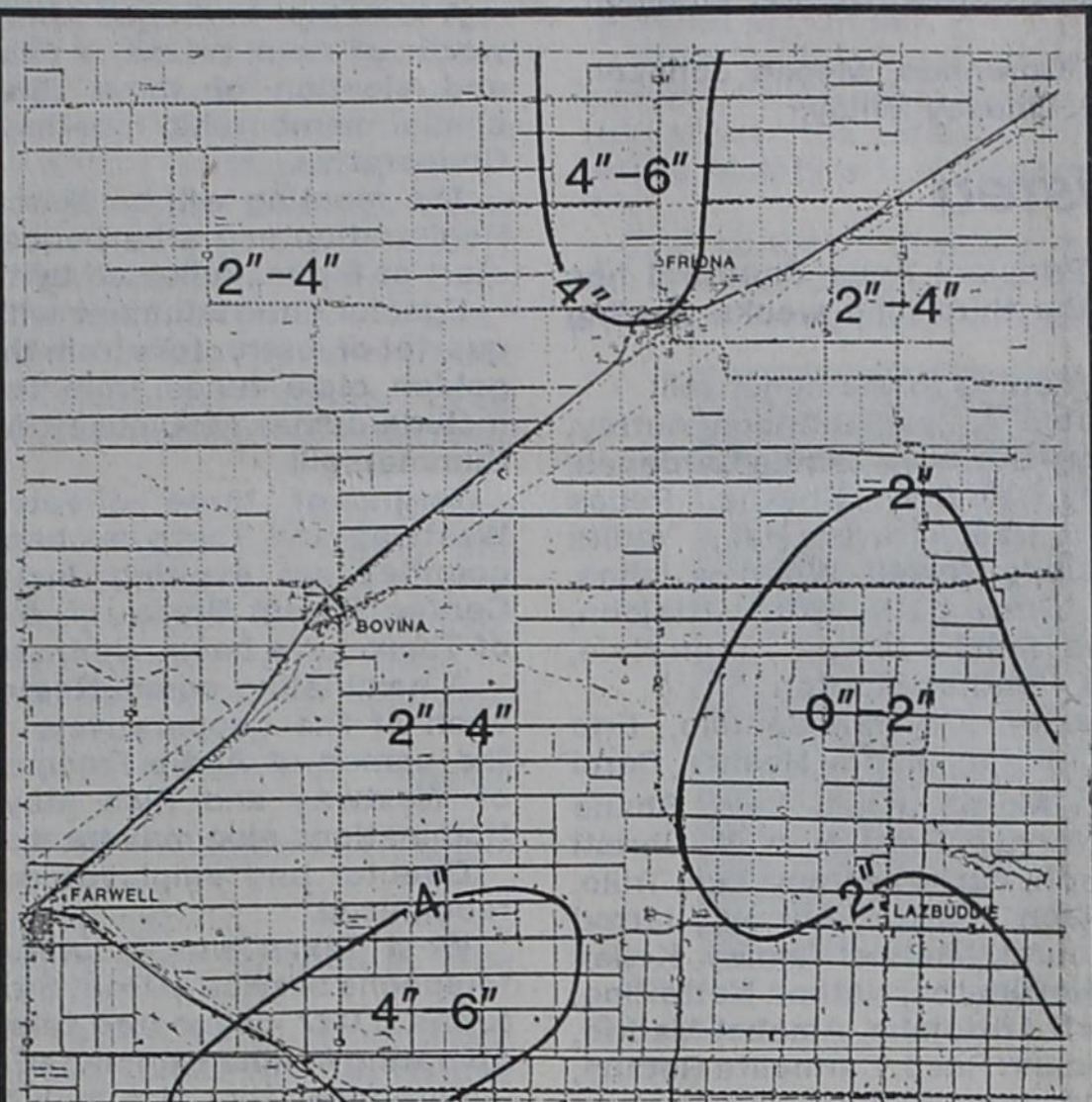
That area is the land of Mercedes, BMWs, Corvettes and Porsches. Or so it seemed.

Soil moisture conditions improve

Soil moisture conditions are better than they have been in many years for Parmer County producers within the High Plains Undergruond Water Conservation District No. 1.

No pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the 5-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity for the 1992 growing season.

"The top 3 feet of the 5-foot soil profile are near field capacity, with small soil moisture deficits occurring at the 4- and 5-foot levels. This is the opposite of recent years where the deficits were in the top three feet of the soil," said Willie Crenwelge, USDA-SCS soil scientist.

Two to four inches of water will be needed to wet the top five feet of soil to field capacity over most of Parmer County, according to data collected during the annual joint pre-plant soil moisture survey by the High Plains Water District and ASCS.

An area requiring zero to two inches of soil moisture is found in southeastern Parmer County. This band begins near the intersection of FMs 1172 and 86, then continues southeast along Running Water Draw to the Parmer-Castro County line.

Two areas requiring four to six inches of moisture are found in Parmer County. One area begins at the Parmer-Deaf Smith County line and heads south along FM 1412 to a point just north of Friona. The other area starts at the Parmer-Bailey County line and extends northeast through the Lariat Community, just south of the Oklahoma Lane Community and ends west of Clay's Corner.

Crenwelge suggests that producers let normal rainfall replenish the deeper soil moisture, since the probability is good that enough precipitation will fall between now and the growing season to fill the deficits.

Soil moisture conditions were surveyed from Nov. 13 through Jan. 23 at 270 soil moisture monitoring sites within the 15 county District service area.

However, some sites received additional precipitation after the measurements had been made. In order to provide the most accurate soil moisture information possible to District residents, personnel re-read rain gauges from those soil moisture sites measured from Nov. 14 through Dec. 16. They found that additional rainfall had been received at these sites. A second set of soil moisture readings were made at selected sites, and the data was adjusted to reflect these findings.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube. Soil density data and rain gauge readings are also recorded during the survey.

Engineer hired

The Texico City Council held a special meeting Monday to take steps to solve its water well problem.

The city has decided to use Clovis engineer Bob Lydick, who was retained last year as the city's engineer.

The Weston Co., the Albuquerque firm which has been helping Texico over the past year, has been dropped. City officials were not happy with Weston's assistance.

At the Feb. 25 meeting, Texico officials had indicated they didn't have the money to engineer a well. But city clerk treasurer Marie Christian said funds have been found.

The state has approved a grant of \$125,000 for a new well to replace the contaminated KKR Park well. But these funds cannot be used for engineer work.

The council also will seek more state grants to construct a well.

Lydick and Brown Edwards, area representative of the state's Environmental Division, attended Monday's session. Lydick will attempt to find a site for a new well, preferably east and-or north of the KKR well.

Mayor Doyal LaRue said a site has been offered on Craig Street. Also, school officials are amenable to helping and Lydick will contact them.

Edwards pointed out that the state recommends that wells be at least 650 feet apart, and there are other wells in the area.

Edwards also said the state will seek the source of the contamination that has caused the KKR well to be shut. Although the contamination was discovered nearly two years ago, serious efforts to find its source have yet to be made.

The council is eager to have a new well built because Texico is serviced by only one well, at Lions Park. It was stated the casing is bad on that well and it "may go at any time."

A third well, on Santa Fe property, is unusable.

Shaw doesn't get new contract

The Texico School Board has not issued a new contract to longtime High School Principal Ken Shaw, Supt. R.L. Richards said.

No reason was given, he said.

Shaw's contract ends at the end of the current semester.

The board didn't offer Shaw any other post, Richards said.

Farwell City Council

Three posts, held by Martin Kube, Gloria Hutchins, and Fred Chandler, are on the ballot.

Two candidates filed - Pat Howard and incumbent Kube.

Farwell Hospital District

Four seats are on the ballot. They are currently held by Troy Christian, Bert Williams, Tom Nichols and Frances Kube.

Williams, Nichols and Kube filed.

Lazbuddie School Board

Two seats are on the ballot, currently held by Mike Miller and Scott Brown.

Brown and Rick Seaton filed.

Farwell School Board

Two seats, held by Ronald Byrd and Tom Nichols, are on the ballot.

Byrd, Nichols and Maria Lopez filed.

Pay raises given

Farwell city officials have received several calls recently about whether the city still had a dog catcher.

It was stated at the March 12 City Council meeting that city employee Michael Robinson will go out when called about stray animals.

In other business, the council:

- Approved 5 percent across the board pay raises for city employees.

- Ordered the city election for May 2 at the Farwell Community Center. Edwina Owen will be the election judge. Roene Stewart and Colleen Stover will be the election clerks.

- Discussed the proposed 1st Street water line expansion project. Water Supt. Dee Hammit was asked to check with contractor Harry Sheets about what he would charge to do the job. Hammit also will see if he can trade pipe he has in stock for the pipe size needed for the work.

Fire strikes storage facility

Farwell firefighters were called to extinguish a fire in a storage building owned by New Light Baptist Church Monday evening.

The building had been used to store some feed and miscellaneous items.

Neighbor Stella Vidana said that she had called the fire department a little after 10 p.m.

Eusebio Vidana noted that "when I woke up there was just a little fire in the middle of the building." He thought the fire spread from the middle of the building outward. He also said that something "popped pretty bad."

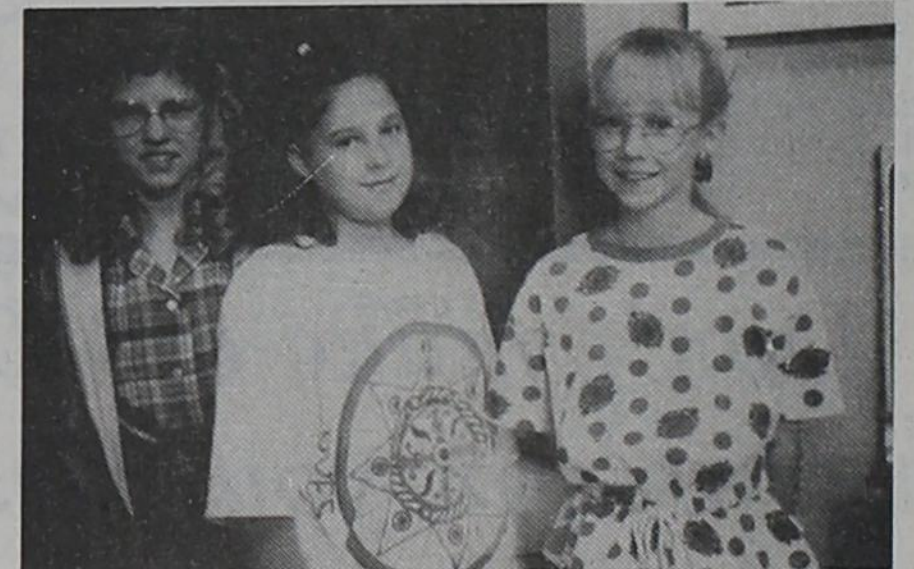
Portions of the roof are still intact at both ends of the building. The outside walls of

the building still have wood attached to them. However, the walls and roof in the middle of the building were completely destroyed.

The Rev. Tim Askew postulated that sparks from the burning trash piles might have started the fire. "We were blessed that the wind was out of the south and not out of the west," he said. If the fire had spread, the church itself might have burned.

Church deacons worked at the site Monday afternoon to clean up weeds, but places where trash was burned are several feet from the building itself.

The fire is under investigation by the fire marshal.

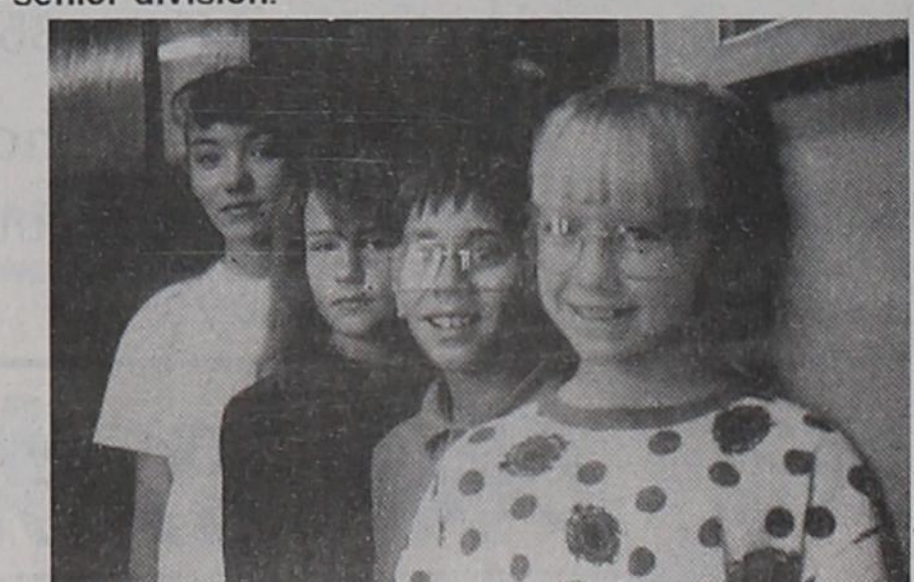
Embry, Morris top county spelling bees

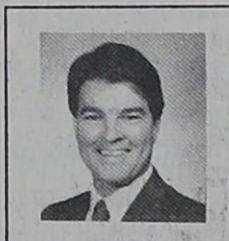

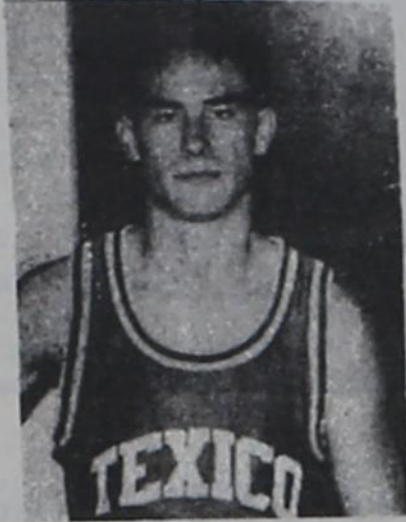

Patronage Capital Credit checks represent profits returned to WTRT members. They are based on the amount of money paid by members for their local phone service,

including equipment, access lines and long distance calls. Members are paid back a percentage of their annual billing totals in the form of Patronage Capital Credits.

The \$10 fee which persons pay upon application for telephone service from the cooperative entitles WTRT customers to membership. Members then become part-time owners of the cooperative. Cooperative by-laws mandate that profits earned by WTRT are to be returned to its members.

Heart attack, stroke deaths decline here

Since 1980, heart attack and stroke deaths have steadily declined. However, these and other cardiovascular diseases remain the No. 1 cause of death.

Someone dies from cardiovascular disease every 34 minutes.

In a 10 year comparison done by the American Heart Association for 1980-1990, cardiovascular disease accounted for 27 of the 63 deaths, or 42.9% of all deaths in Parmer County in 1990.

This is down from the figures on cardiovascular disease in 1980 when 39 of 77 deaths, or 50.6% of all deaths were caused by cardiovascular disease.

The figures are up a bit from 1989 when 39 of 99 deaths, or 39.4% were attributed to cardiovascular disease.

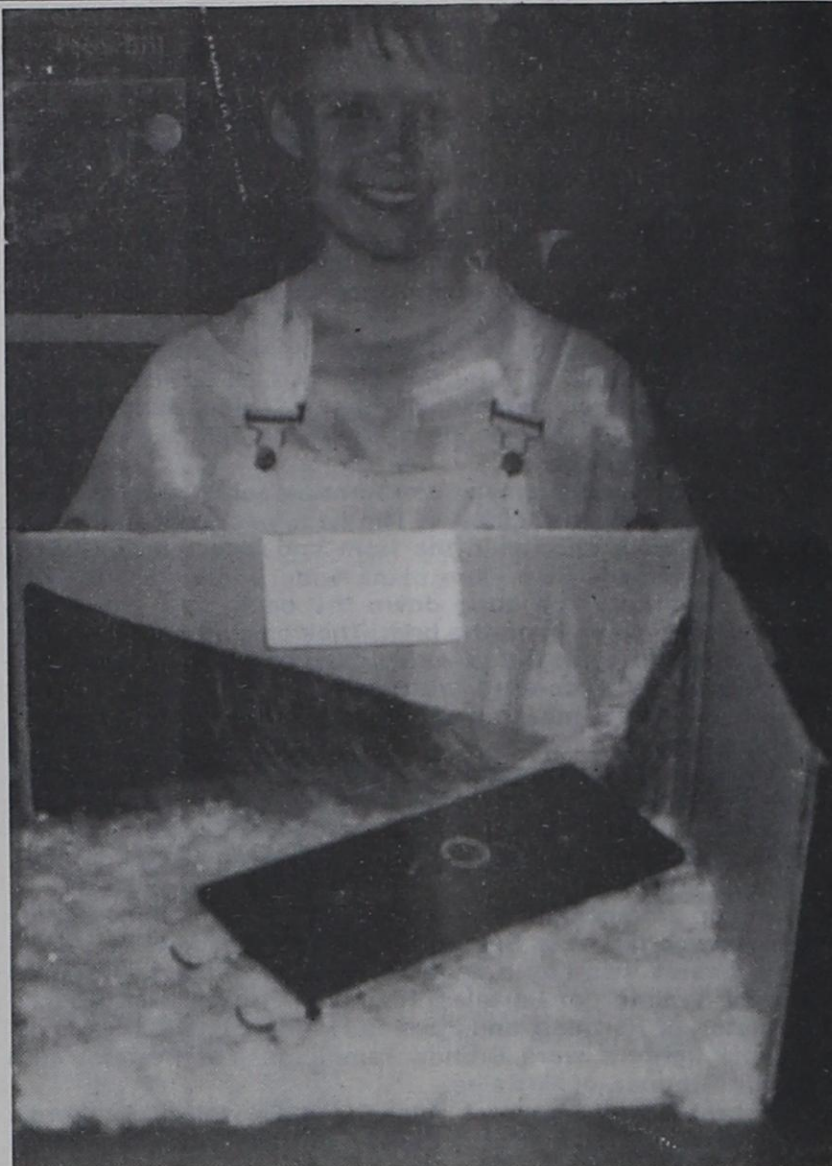

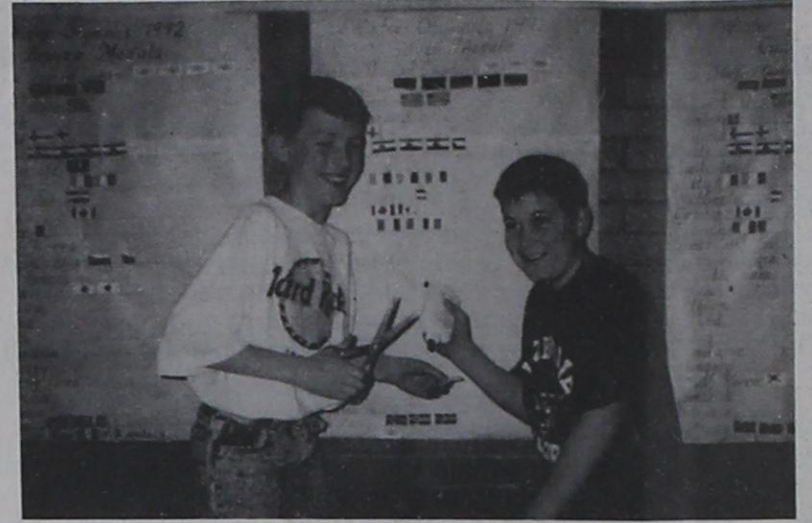

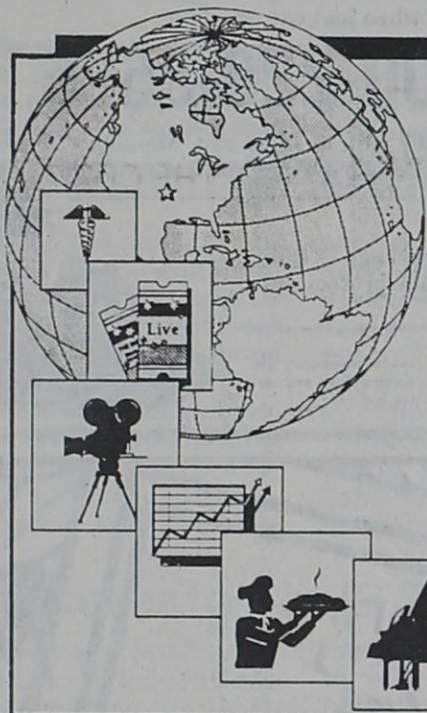

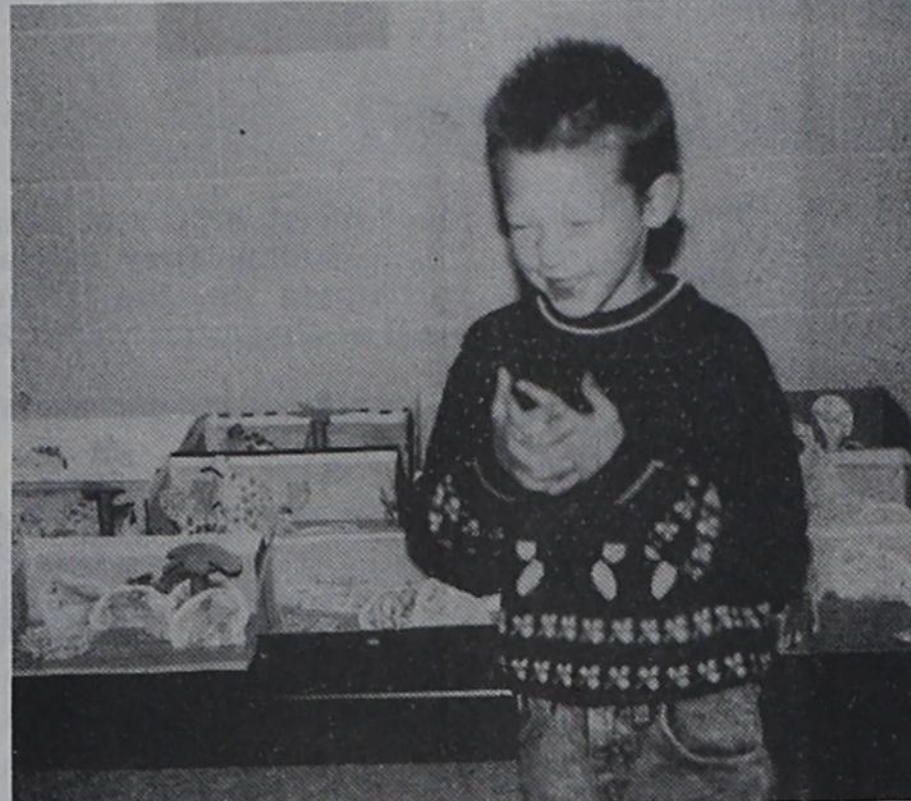

Thursday, March 26, 1992, is the day to register children for next year's Farwell kindergarten and pre-kindergarten / Headstart classes.

To be eligible, a child must be 4 years old prior to September 1st, is unable to speak or comprehend the English language, or is from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is at or below subsistence level (eligible for free or reduced-price lunches), and is a resident of the Farwell School District.

Headstart requires proof of participants meeting Federal Income Guidelines so Income Verification, such as check stubs, should also be available for review.

Headstart also extends its services to handicapped children.

Texas school districts are required to provide Pre-K if 15 or more students are identified.
