# A look at the Adult **Probation** Department

"If I can turn one around, then my job is worthwhile," says Parmer County Adult Probation officer Ed McPeak of his work with convicted criminals. In the past few years, McPeak has had some very successful experiences.

For instance, one young man McPeak has worked with was tried as an adult and sent to "boot camp" as part of his probation experience. There he had several weeks of strict military style discipline, and time away from the environment that may have contributed to his problems. Following the experience, the young man returned to a high school in this area, where he became an honor student.

Not every person on probation needs anything as drastic as boot camp. Often they can be helped through counseling.

One client entered probation because he had a problem with drunk driving. The person is now in his second year of sobriety following indepth alcohol counseling. McPeak estimates that about 15 percent of the people he sees have serious problems that include alcohol or drug abuse.

Not all of McPeak's cases are successes. Nearly 60 percent of McPeak's clients return to the criminal justice system following probation. Adult criminals have a much higher rate of repeating crimes than juveniles do, according to McPeak.

McPeak sees folks who have been found guilty of many types of crimes including murder, felony DWI, theft, cattle rustling, aggravated assault, and sexual assault. Currently McPeak has a caseload of 172, but only 74 of these must be seen on a regular basis. Of these, 52 are felons.

When a client comes into the McPeak's office he is asked to fill out a report form so that the adult probation officer can help to assess the areas where the client needs help.

Often a client is referred to an agency where he is given psychiatric testing to find out the areas where he needs help. "I use the psychiatric report to verify or repudiate my impressions," says McPeak. "If used in a proper manner, they are an effective tool," he said.

Then the client receives counseling in the areas where he needs help. It might be given through the probation officer, or through a mental health clinic or from a minister of the person's choice.

McPeak estimates that 90 percent of the criminals he sees have no church affiliation. A religious background helps a person to learn right from wrong. But the probation office does not force the clients to see clergy members because the office must, of course, keep a separation of church and

McPeak also estimates that 90 percent of the clients he sees are from disfunctional families. Problems includes broken homes, one parent families, and homes where drugs or alcohol are abused. In some cases, clients are sent to drug rehabilitation clinics or hospitals for residential treatment for

their drug problems. Once a person has been evaluated, he begins the probation process process. He is told that for the period of probation (normally 2-10 years), he may not use any alcohol or drugs. He may not associate with criminals. He must support his dependents and he must not violate any laws.

Probation clients have to undergo urinalysis on a random basis to check on their ability to avoid alcohol and drugs.

"The biggest thing we don't have here is a very large job market," says McPeak. Some probation clients have to leave the Farwell area to find employment. They are served by probation officers in the area to which they move.

In cases where there is a violation of probation, the person is returned to jail when he is caught. According to McPeak, there is no statute of limitations on a probation violation warrant even if there is a statute of limitations on the crime that the person was convicted of in the first place. Normally there is no bond set in violation of probation cases, although it may be set if the judge decides to.

"Once in jail on probation violation, the probation officer cannot get them out," said McPeak. Clients must "request a speedy trail in writing," and then it may take 20 days to get

In one case it took more than 3 years to locate a person who had violated his parole here. They still locked him up.

And, again, the committee voted to give tickets, worth a free ride on the train, all children who enter the decorated bicycle contest but don't win any money.

Mrs. Cooper gave a detailed financial report, which was accepted.

Last year's proceeds totalled \$3,294.35. Expenses totalled \$2,832.53. Since the committee keeps a \$2,000 bank balance (for emegencies), the current total in the savings account is at \$2,181.74 (including interest).

In addition, there are two separate accounts for past queen's contest winners, totalling \$500. They are eligible to receive the money if they attend an institution of higher learning within 3 years of high school graduation.


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
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# Texico teams nab firsts at THE track meet

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**Guidelines For** Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

I. 35-40 years of age -One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age -A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental xrays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$65.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Ex-

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Breast cancer cannot be prevented, but early detection can save many lives. Breast cancer will strike one in nine American women. The American Cancer Society predicts about 44,000 women will die of breast cancer this year.

Experts estimate that if every woman had regular mammograms according to guidelines established by the American Cancer Society, nearly a third of the women who die of breast cancer would survive. The guidelines are:

\* Begin mammography by age 40

\* Age 40-49 - mammogram every 1 - 2 years

\* Over age 50 - annual mammogram \* Monthly breast self-examination (BSE)

\* Regular breast exams by a physician
