It includes everything from dentists wearing separate clothes at work (that must

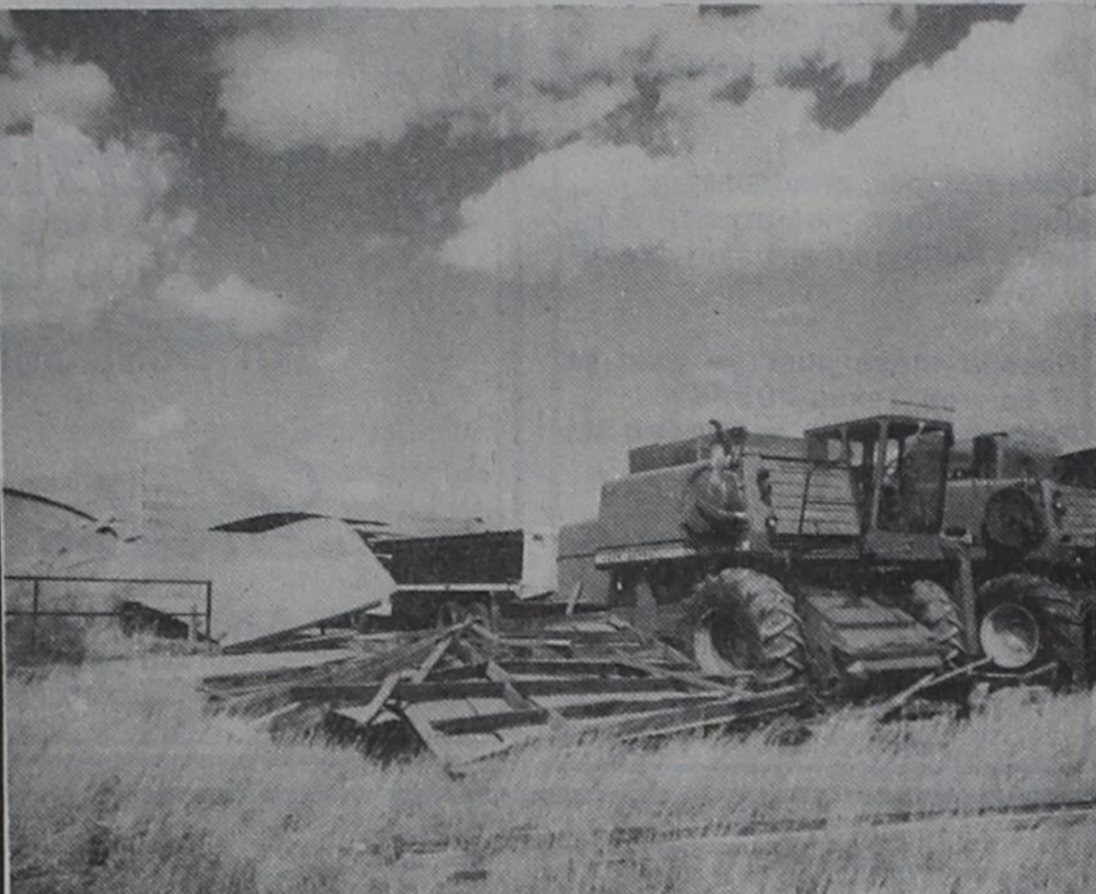
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Tornado strikes our area

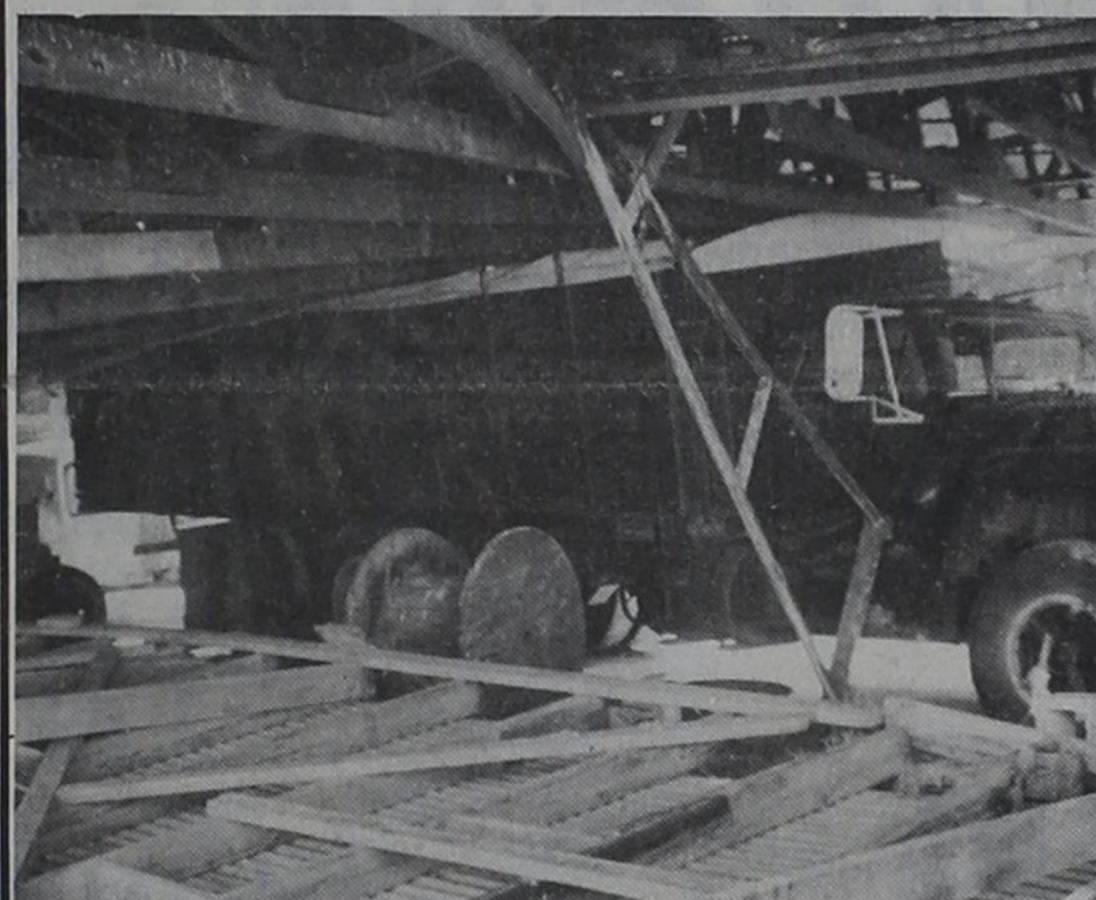
A tornado hit the Texico-Farwell area early Friday evening. Fortunately, the twister, with winds up to 80 miles per hour, skipped over Farwell. It seems to have started up near Don Oppliger's place several miles south of Farwell and jumped Farwell while heading northeast.

The main damage was done to an area about six miles northeast of Farwell. Windows were blown out at the Olan Cole residence. Damage was reported at the David George, Gary Patterson and Gerald Norton homesites plus Caprock Feeders. No injuries were reported. More than a dozen sprinklers were overturned.

Here are the speeches that were given:

Tom Nichols

Our 1992 Man of the Year is a college graduate from California. He has been married for 16 years. He graduated from SMU with a degree in business and spent one semester in summer school in England.

He and his wife moved to Farwell in 1979. During the 13 years he has lived in Farwell, our Man of the Year has served as president of the Chamber of Commerce and president of the Farwell Hospital District Board of Directors. He is a member of the Farwell School Board, and he currently serves as vice president of the Hospital Board and treasurer of the Rotary Club.

He was instrumental in having the title of the old bowling alley transferred to the City of Farwell enabling the community to renovate it into the Community Center. He also obtained the title to the current drug store building for the Hospital District.

He has been active in coaching his sons on different sports teams and is responsible for organizing the soccer teams in Farwell. He was also on the AYSO Soccer board in Clovis. He is a member of the Farwell Youth Commission which helps with raising money for our area youth activities. He has coached several youth basketball teams for the Little Dribblers and Play, Inc.

He is an active member of the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell. He enjoys following Farwell's school sports. He really loves to play golf and can't seem to get enough of it. He also enjoys tennis and travel.

He and his wife, Terri, have four sons: Logan, Jourdan, Taylor and Tate.

Bert Williams

Our Agriculturalist of the Year for 1992 has been involved in farming for many years. It's hard to say just how long since he grew up on a farm and was by his dad's side trying to help even as a small child. Once, when his wife was filling out a questionnaire that asked how long he had been farming, he said, "Just put all my life."

He has seen many changes come about in agriculture. He started farming riding behind his dad's mules, and now drives 300 HP tractors. He has seen farming go from "dry land" to "irrigated" and is now striving to conserve the use of water so that the aquifer will be sufficient for future generations.

He increased his farm acres from 1/2 section to a few thousand acres by renting land and purchasing some during a span of some 30 years. When asked why he didn't slow down and take it easier, he said that he wanted to have enough land so that when his three sons were grown that they would have land to farm if they chose to do so. He was so busy during those years that he didn't pay a lot of attention to farm organizations, but after his sons took over some of the farming he became more interested in farm organizations and politics. He has made many trips to Washington and Austin lobbying on behalf of farmers. He is an avid reader of publications dealing with farming, religion, and world affairs.

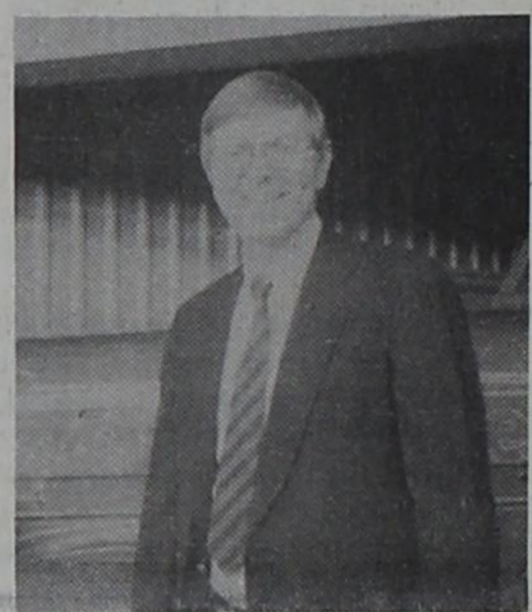

meeting. These ballots, with Flood's and Brown's names on them, must be returned within 10 days.

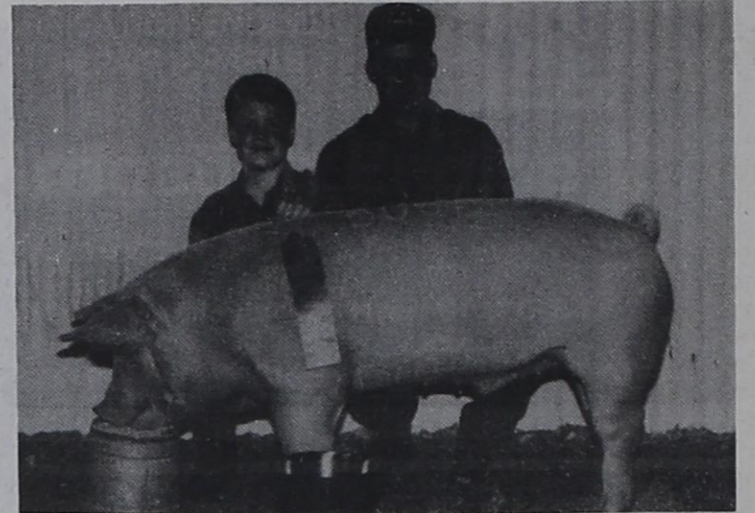
One of the reasons more ballots are needed is because by the time the election counters double-checked the ballots that had been turned in, a good portion of the members who attended the meeting had left.

The cooperative showed a net margin for the year of \$594,563.

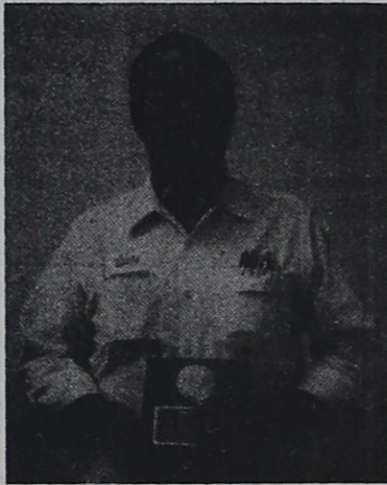


Grand Champion

Recipe of Week

Milanese Torta Rustica (a baked sandwich)

1 package (13 3/4 oz.) hot yeast roll mix plus water and egg as specified on the box

2 Tbs. beaten egg to join the pieces of pastry together (filling)

1 c. packed fresh spinach, minced

1 c. ricotta cheese

1/2 c. shredded Parmesan cheese

1 egg yolk

1/2 tsp. garlic salt

1/8 tsp. seasoned pepper.

Prepare hot roll mix as directed on the package. After the dough has risen, turn onto a lightly floured board and knead to expel air bubbles.

Divide dough in half; roll one portion on a floured board into a circles 9" diameter. Fit dough in bottom of a floured 9" cake pan with removable bottom. Cover evenly with filling. Shape the remaining dough into strips, and weave a lattice pattern, as you would for a pie. Fasten the dough together with beaten egg. Bake at 350 degrees for about 35-40 minutes.

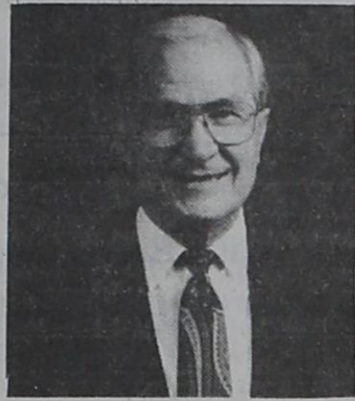

Our Farmer of the Year has a strong belief in the value of being involved in farm organizations and politics. He served on the Plains Cotton Growers Association Board for many years and was a delegate to the National Cotton Council.

He has been a member of the Texas Farm Forum since its inception about 10 years ago and is an active member of the Texas Farmers Union. He has been serving on the board of the Texas Corn Producers since 1984, and helped to organize the American Corn Growers Association, which is a national organization about 4 years old. He is also a member of the American Ag movement.

He would not say that his accomplishments were achieved alone, but that he had the support of his family and loyal and energetic employees.

He was born near Hollis, Okla. and moved to the West Camp Community with his family when he was three years old.

He graduated from Farwell High School in 1944 and after a service in the Merchant Marines, started farming fulltime. He has three sons, Mark, Barry and Eric, who farm in the area and a daughter, Lee Ann, who lives in Knoxville, Tenn., where she and her husband are veterinarians. Another daughter, Tracy, lives near Farwell and is involved in farming with her husband.

Frances Boling

Our Woman of the Year is a professional who retired in 1986. She was reared on a cotton farm and helped her large family by hoeing and picking cotton.

She attended college one year and taught school in a one room school house to earn money to continue her education. She attended Wayland Baptist College a year, and then moved to Canyon where she graduated with a BA degree.

While she was at Canyon she met and married her husband of 40 years, Billy Boling. They moved to Texico in 1957. She began teaching at Farwell Junior High in 1961.

Frances has been a member of the Texico Baptist Church and has served as a Sunday School teacher and department leader of various age groups. She was instrumental in organizing the bus ministry there and after it was organized, she was the driver.

One of her friends remarked that, "When someone is ill, by the time I get around to visiting them, she has already been there and taken a meal."

Frances and her husband have four children, two boys and two girls. One son is a pharmacist, the other is a doctor; a daughter is married to a Baptist minister and the other is a court reporter.

Frances has been an active member of the Convalescent Center Auxiliary for many years, and she is now serving as secretary. She has the insight to recognize the needs of the residents and ways that the Auxiliary can be of help. Each week she is a volunteer in the Beauty Shop styling hair. This is a service that ladies in the center really look forward to. She always assists the Auxiliary in its many "money-making" projects.

In 1986 she received the 1st Chamber of Commerce Teacher of the Year Award.

Eva Dean Stephens

Our 1991 Teacher of the Year was chosen by the staff of Farwell Schools. The teachers first voted for one candidate from each building; they chose Nancy Roberts from the Elementary School; Marion Hudson from the High School, and Eva Dean Stephens from the Junior High. Then they selected Eva Dean from the field of three candidates.

Mrs. Stephens was not present at the banquet because she had been ill. Her husband, Darrell, accepted the award from Farwell School Supt. Richard Boothby.

Historically, one of the primary problems of the working woman has been maintaining a balance between her home, her family, and her profession. Only those who are special are able to maintain such a balance and to be productive in each area. Eva Dean Stephens is one of those "special" women, and it is with the greatest sincerity that she is hereby nominated for the 1992 "Teacher of the Year" award.

Her parents were Leland and Odessa Ivy. Her original home was in Lazbuddie, where she graduated from high school in 1962. Her farm life nurtured her values and those values became defined as she attended Texas Christian University, graduating in 1966 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Home Economics. She returned to Lazbuddie as the home economics teacher for two years, later teaching in the Muleshoe system, then joining the Farwell system in 1969.

Her master's degree in elementary education was completed at Eastern New Mexico University in 1971. She is a member of the Texas Association of Professional Educators, Texas Joint Council of Teacher of English, and Texas Science Teacher's Association.

In 1967, she married Darrell Stephens, and the couple live on a farm south of Farwell. As a farm couple, they continue to reinforce the values of home and family. When their first child, Kendra, was born in 1971, Eva Dean resigned her teaching position, for she felt her family should take precedence over her career. In 1973, Kaci was born, and Chansé arrived in 1977. When Chansé was in the first grade, Eva Dean returned to teaching and has been back with the Farwell Schools since 1983.

However, her conscientious concern has continued to nurture her home and family, even with the many demands of the teaching profession. She voluntarily serves as a class parent, hosted a foreign exchange student and supported her activities, supports many, many activities in which her three children are involved, she presently teaches an adult women's class, and she taught for nine years a first/ second grade Sunday School class at the First Baptist Church of Farwell - evidencing that her concern for home and family extends beyond her own family to others.

As a public school teacher, Eva Dean exemplifies the attributes a teacher should possess, for one teaches not simply subject matter, but teaches by example as well, and perhaps what one does sometimes speaks more clearly than what one says. She was a high school student council sponsor for three years - a job that demands countless hours of outside devotion; she sponsors the science fair; Invent America; she reinforces her instruction through numerous field trips, including a trip to Carlsbad Caverns for the last seven years, and to the Christmas Pageant in Amarillo, Texas for the past two years; she utilizes various community resources for teaching - thus implanting pride of community in students.

Over and above these school related contributions, she has been a member of ESA, a 4-H adult leader in food and clothing projects, and has assisted with Bible school and youth groups at church.

Eva Dean's concern for her students does not end when those students pass through her classroom door. She was instrumental in one student receiving a new wardrobe at Christmastime one year. She is constantly searching for ways to build children's self-esteem; she evidences her love and concern for every child by her quiet nature and her twinkling eyes; and she follows through on those students with special needs, making her classroom physiologically safe for every individual child with whom she comes in contact.

It is only the sincere individual who can impart to both children and adults the genuine Christian concern that Eva Dean maintains. It radiates from her like a magnet. Her daily behavior is an inspiration to all who come in contact with her, for she exemplifies those virtues to which we all aspire.

Truly, she is that rare individual who has maintained the balance between home, family and profession; one who teaches not just a subject, but teaches through example as well; and one who deserves to be recognized as your "Teacher of the Year-1992".





COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT PROGRAM CITIZENS PARTICIPATION PLAN

Introduction

In accordance with the 1987 revisions to the Housing and Community Development Act and in an effort to further encourage citizen participation, the City of Texico has prepared and adopted this Citizen Participation Plan.

Objective A

The City of Texico will provide for and encourage citizen participation within their areas of jurisdiction with particular emphasis on participation by persons of low and moderate income.

1. Adopt and circulate an Open Meetings Resolution which provides citizens with reasonable notice of City upcoming meetings, actions, functions.

2. Develop press releases on City meetings, actions and hearings and circulate to newspapers, radio and television media.

3. Develop and maintain listings of groups and representatives of low and moderate income persons and include on mailing lists for announcements, notices, press releases, etc.

Objective B

The City of Texico will provide citizens with reasonable and timely access to local meetings, information and records relating to the proposed and actual use of CDBG funds.

1. Public notices, press releases, etc., should allow for a maximum length of notice to citizens.

2. Appropriate information and records relating to the proposed and actual use of CDBG funds must be available upon request to all citizens. Personnel and income records may be exempted from this requirement.

3. Meetings, hearings, etc., should be conducted at times and locations conducive to public attendance, e.g., evenings, Saturdays.

Objective C

The City of Texico will provide for technical assistance to groups and representatives of low and moderate income persons that request assistance to groups and representatives of low and moderate income persons that request assistance in developing proposals. (Special note: the level and type of assistance is to be determined by the City).

1. Low/moderate income groups should be advised that technical assistance, particularly in the area of community development, is available from the City of Texico upon request.

2. The City of Texico will document all technical assistance provided to such groups and have documentation available for review.

Objective D

The City of Texico will provide for public hearings to obtain citizen participation and respond to proposals and questions at all stages of the Community Development Block Grant Program.

1. The City of Texico will advise citizens of the CDBG Program objectives, range of activities that can be applied for and other pertinent information.

2. The City of Texico will conduct a minimum of two public hearings:
a. One public hearing will be held for the purpose of obtaining the views of citizens on community development and housing needs to include the needs of low and moderate income people. This hearing will take place prior to the selection of the project to be submitted to the State for CDBG funding assistance.

b. A second public hearing will be held for the purpose of gaining citizen input on the particular application to be submitted to the State for CDBG funding consideration.

3. The City of Texico will review program performance, past use of CDBG funds and make available to the public its community development and housing needs including the needs of low and moderate income families and the activities to be undertaken to meet such needs.

4. Public hearing notices will be published in the non-legal section of newspapers or in other local media. Evidence of compliance with these regulations will be provided with each CDBG application, i.e., hearing notice, minutes of public meetings, list of needs and activities to be undertaken, etc. Amendments to goals, objectives and applications are also subject to public participation.

Objective E

The City of Texico will provide for timely written answers to written complaints and grievances within 15 working days where practicable.

1. The City of Texico will adopt complaint handling procedures of policies to insure that complaints or grievances are responded to within 15 days, if possible.

2. Procedures will allow for appeal of a decision to a neutral authority.

3. A detailed record of all complaints/grievances and responses will be filed in one central location with easy public access provided.

Objective F

The City of Texico will identify how the needs of non-English speaking residents will be met in the case of public hearings where a significant number of residents can be reasonably expected to participate.

1. The City of Texico will identify areas where large majorities of non-English speaking persons reside and make appropriate provisions when issues affecting these areas are to be discussed at public meetings, hearings, etc. Appropriate provisions will include having interpreters available at the meeting and/or having briefing materials available in the appropriate language.

2. Maintain records/rosters of public hearing attendees and proceedings to verify compliance with this objective.

The effective date of this plan shall be five days after publication of same.

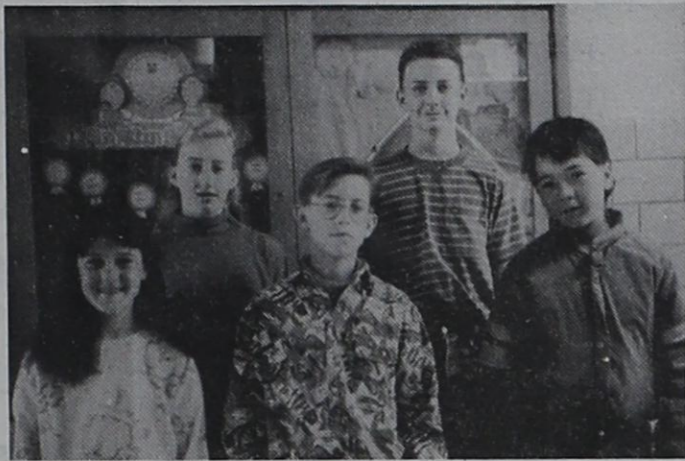

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Tornado

Local firefighters and emergency personnel normally go out to watch storms to detect tornadoes, but they didn't get the usual early warning signal from the National Weather Service about the storm. Texico personnel reportedly also didn't get any word. Some folks did see a "storm watch" on their TV screens, though.

Farwell emergency coordinator Jimmy Curtis met with Jose Garcia, warning coordination meteorologist with the National Weather Service in Amarillo, Tuesday. Garcia said it appeared a tornado(s) did hit here, but also a lot of damage was done due to high velocity downdrafts.

A discussion was held over the problem of word not reaching Farwell about the tornado. Farwell is at the edge of the Amarillo and Lubbock NWS areas. Better communication in the future is likely.

Also, lightning hit the Parmer County sheriff's department communications tower and the radio used by the sheriff's department went out, reducing radio communications.

The Clovis police department dispatcher was not notified by the National Weather Service of any danger of a major storm on Friday.

When they did get the message, Farwell firefighters were active in helping cleanup debris, clearing trees off roads and aiding with traffic control. Also, County Sheriff Rex Williams was called to check reports of trees blocking Highway 60.

Firefighters, friends and neighbors helped clean up debris at several of the damage sites over the weekend. The winds blew glass, mud and tree branches into the Cole home - but no one was home at the time. The home was re-roofed almost completely Sunday.

The storm reportedly tore a porch off and shingles off the roof at the home of Patterson, county extension agent. It also picked up a heavy stock trailer.

Scott Brown of Lazbuddie reported that there were no damage reports from his area Friday.

As for the rain amount, Fred Chandler of Sherley Anderson Pitman in Farwell said 3/10th of an inch fell here. Yolando McFarland reported just under 1/10th at Lariat. Shirley Steinbock said about half an inch of moisture fell in Lazbuddie.

Additional rain fell here March 30 and 31. Lonnie McFarland of Sherley Anderson Grain in Lariat reported .28" of moisture during this period. The rainfall brought the year to date totals to 2.08" of moisture - about .48" higher than the total for last year at this time.

Fred Chandler reported .3" of moisture fell in Farwell, and Brown measured .25" in Lazbuddie.

Curtis reminds Farwell residents that if the siren goes off, residents should take cover because danger is approaching.

tification from KOAT that they will no longer be providing us with a microwave signal. KOAT has been a popular channel here since the early 1970's and I'm sure there will be some unhappy customers when it is gone. But since the loss of the station is due to circumstances beyond our control, I hope most folks will understand," said TCA system manager Gordon Smith.

KOAT notified TCA of its decision in a letter citing economic and viewership ratings as reasons for the move. The letter explained further that due to proposed coverage of local news programming in several additional markets, and unrealized financial return on viewership in the Clovis market, the station was compelled to discontinue its microwave signal.

"We have made no decision at this time as to what type of service we will replace KOAT with," said Smith.

TCA will poll its customers on new channel choices over the next few weeks with viewer interest surveys published in local newspapers (see TCA survey ad elsewhere in today's Tribune).

Customers who wish to have their viewing preferences known can stop by the cable office to fill out an offi-

cial survey form or they may send in the survey in today's Tribune. All requests for new programming must be in writing to be considered.

The siren also sounds every Thursday at 7 p.m. for practice. He also urged residents to watch TV or listen to radio when the weather appears threatening. "If you see something, call the sheriff's office or the National Weather Service. The NWS has an 800 number - (800) 275-8165," said Curtis.

Curtis noted that a **tornado watch** is given when weather conditions are favorable to the formation of tornadoes. A **tornado warning** is given when a tornado funnel is sighted or indicated by radar.

Here are some tornado safety tips:
- If you're at home, avoid windows. The safest place is the basement. Stay out from under heavy objects located on

an above floor. For added protection, get under something strong.

- If you're in a mobile home, leave it. Stay with friends or relatives until the tornado watch is over. If it's too late to leave the area, seek shelter away from the mobile home. For example, lie flat in a ditch.

- If you're outside and caught during a tornado and can't find underground shelter, lie in a low spot such as a ditch. Don't go into a grove of trees because they can be uprooted, or under a vehicle, for the same reason.

- If you're in a vehicle, get out of it and away from it. Again, seek shelter in a low spot like a ditch or ravine.
