### Texico Mayor LaRue resigns

The Texico City Council Tuesday received a short letter from Doyal LaRue, saying he was resigning as mayor.

LaRue's term was to end next year.

Although no explanation for the resignation was given,

Texico's council for the past several months have been having more and more executive sessions to discuss "personnel." LaRue, as city personnel officer, reportedly has come under criticism from one or more councilmen during these closed meetings.

City Attorney Duane Hamar will check into what is legally needed to be done to have a new mayor. Butch Tharp, who was mayor pro tem, ran Tuesday's meeting.

Speculation is that the council will pick councilman Ronnie Warmuth, a retired Texico school teacher, to be

the next mayor. During the meeting, councilwoman Carolyn Burrows read a prepared statement dealing with the recent hiring of Larry Garrison as deputy

Two bids were received -Appian, Hereford, \$91,212; and K. Barnett, Clovis, \$90,829. Barnett got the award.

City Engineer Bob Lydick said that the bid award will be cut back to \$63,000, because that's the amount of state highway money available for the work.

Also, Lydick said bids will be opened in August for the annual seal coating work. The quantities bid will be cut back to the \$32,000 level - again, with funds coming from the state.



When he was considering being mayor, I tried to discourage him, saying the job would take him away from his regular duties - LaRue Jewelry, in Clovis - too much of the time.

But Mr. LaRue is that special kind of individual - a man who believes in public service, even at a cost. As a concerned Texico resident, he wanted to do all he could to improve his community. So he made the time.

Folks know I'm not a great fan of "politicians." Most readers probably feel the same was as I do.

But Mr. LaRue is not, nor was he ever, a "politician." He was a public servant, the kind of citizen everyone of us ought to aspire to be.

cannot tell you of the number of hours Mr. LaRue has worked on Texico concerns the past few years. Or the number of meetings he attended in towns ranging from Roswell to Tucumcari to Santa Fe.

During his tenure, some important issues confronted Texico - cleanup, KKR park contamination and new water well, police, street work, etc. He attacked those problems vigorously, even to the point of personally seeing Gov. King when necessary.

We all know that a year ago, the state gave Texico over \$100,000 to build a new well. I can tell you folks that if it hadn't been for Mr. LaRue at that meeting to push Texico's request, it would

never have been approved. And the cost of that well in itself could have bankrupted the community.

I am saddened by Mr. LaRue's sudden resignation. I know he planned to resign at the end of his regular tenure - the job takes a toll.

The Texico community owes Mr. LaRue a deep debt for the outstanding work he did in leading the Texico council through heavy thickets the past few years.

He will be missed.


Texico Junior High's new addition will house a science lab, a computer room, new classrooms, new restrooms, and office space.

The board voted to make the second to last payment on the building project. All that is owed after their payment is


New computers were purchased for the high school, and the high school's old computers were moved to the junior high school.

## Area gridders to report

It's football time! Here's how the workout schedule looks for area teams:

#### Farwell

Pre-season, 2-a-day workouts for Farwell Steer football players begin at 7 a.m. Aug. 4 at the Farwell football field. All returning players, and all new players need to be there.

The first week of practice will stress running and conditioning, learning basic plays and safety. Helmets, pads and other equipment will be passed out later when the team begins working on blocking and tackling.

Players will practice each day from 7 - 9 a.m., and then take a break. They may bring food to eat during their break, but they will not be able to go home during the break. They will practice about 1 1/2 - 2 hours after the break.

Players will need to bring their physical forms and insurance forms to coach Stan Stroebel by Aug. 5. They are also encouraged to bring a pencil and a notebook the first day of practice.

Farwell's first scrimmage will be held against Hale Center on either Aug. 19 or 20. The Steers will also scrimmage at Morton at 6 p.m. on Aug. 27.

#### Lazbuddie

The 6-Man football squad will be working under the direction of veteran Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson this year.

"This is probably the last year for 6-Man football," said coach Scisson. The school's enrollment will probably cause the consistent 6-Man champions to move into class 1A, and they will have to have an 11 man team for that.

The Longhorns are currently ranked No. 2 in Texas, and one poll even ranks them as the No. 2 6-Man team in the U.S.

"It is a real challenge to be ranked that high. Everybody is out gunning for you," said coach Scisson. Luckily, Scisson will have 13 lettermen returning this year. The team lost 6 seniors last year, but only 3 starters.

Scisson has the advantage of knowing his team well. He has been a coach and teacher at Lazbuddie for several years. The Longhorns begin 2-a-day workouts at 7 a.m. on Aug.

4. They will have one workout at 7 a.m. and a second one at

7 p.m. each day. The workouts will begin with non -contact activities such as conditioning exercises and learning basic plays. Contact activities will begin about a week later.

### Greenthaner: 'Don't judge Australia by Crocodile Dundee'

"Don't judge Australia by Crocodile Dundee," advised the Rev. Edward Greenthaner on his return from a visit there this spring. "We didn't see any kangaroos or koalas or sheep!"

The St. John Lutheran Church of Lariat pastor and his wife did see some of their family members while they were there. The Greenthaners did not spend their vacation visiting the tourist sights because they have seen many of them before. Years ago the Greenthaners sent their children to school in Australia while they were missionaries in New Guinea, so they had the opportunity to visit Australia frequently. Since then they have returned to see their son and his family.

This trip they spent most of their visit with their son Mark, a Lutheran minister, and his family. The Rev. Mark Greenthaner and his wife, Christine, live on the campus of Luther College, near Melbourne. They have two children,

Nathanael, 6, and Joanna, 4.

Rev. Mark Greenthaner is both a chaplain and a teacher at a state - supported religious high school in Croydon, Australia. The students he teaches would be about the age

of our 7th -12th grade students.

"The school is supported by tax money, and they follow the curriculum guidelines of the state system," said Rev. Greenthaner. "They follow the English Protestant school traditions. For instance, the kids wear uniforms to school every day. Our six year old grandson wears a shirt and tie and blazer when he goes to school everyday."

The uniforms help to build school spirit and a lasting bond between the students. Greenthaner said that high school grads in Australia, like British graduates, often wear their old school ties even when they are out of school. It is a way of

identifying other grads.

The Australians have some ideas about education that are very different from ours. Unlike our system, the Australian government decides each year how many students will be able to attend college. "My son knows that only about 6,000 students in the whole country will be able to go to college next year. The rest have to do something else, like attend a trade school or get a job," said Rev. Greenthaner.

"They never over-educate; if they only need 10 doctors, they only educate 10 doctors," he said.

Those who do go to college will be educated in the fields that the government decides it needs them to study. If a student wants to study medicine but there are no job openings in the field, the student is advised to study something else.

On the other hand, the college costs are paid by the government, not by the students or their parents.

Luther College is different from other Australian schools because it is a Lutheran school rather than Anglican. Lutherans are something of an "oddity" in Australia, as are

Rev. Greenthaner estimated that are only about 200 Lutheran congregations in all of Australia. The first Lutherans arrived there in the 1800's about the same time German Lutherans settled here in Texas. Both Lutheran groups were Wendish speaking people from an area of Germany near Prussia. Those who came to the U.S. settled in Lea County, Texas, and those who went to Australia went to Adelaide.

In general, "Australia is not a church going country," Greenthaner.

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Since World War II, Australia has seen nearly 20% increase in population due mostly to immigration. The immigrants have brought religious diversity with them as well as ethnic foods, restaurants, and new traditions.

Christine Greenthaner's parents came to Australia after World War II when New South Wales Electric Power and Light company imported German immigrants to run an electric power plant. The country needed people with skills, and the immigrants had these skills. This group of German immigrants settled in Australia as a whole community. When

the coal that powered the power plant had all been mined, the electric company moved the whole community - houses and all to a new location.

Germans weren't the only immigrants to Australia. Most come from Great Britain and its former Commonwealth nations. Greenthaner says that Melbourne shows great ethnic diversity. Melbourne is now the second largest Greekspeaking city in the world. There are also Korean and Thai sections of the city.

#### About those Aussies ...

After Pastor and Mrs. Greenthaner stopped by the Tribune office to chat about their trip to Australia, I had to check an almanac for spelling of city names and some of the recent population figures so that I could write the story.

Some things about Australia's population figures really captured my interest.

1. Australia is much, much less populated that the U.S. The two nations have similar land masses, but Australia only has 5.4 people per square mile compared to 66 people per square mile here.

2. Australia's population is more urban than ours. About 85 percent of Australians live in cities compared with 79 percent of Americans. Many folks there rely on public transportation to get to work, so they live in the cities.

3. Australia's population is racially less diverse than ours, but it is changing fast. They changed their immigration policies in 1973 to allow minorities to enter, and many people have emigrated there since then.

4. Australia's population is younger than ours. Because they do not encourage their children to go to college the way we do ours, Australians tend to marry a younger and have their children earlier. About one-quarter of their population is made up of youngsters.





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

### Sherry Curtis turns avocation into a vocation

Sewing has been a hobby that Sherry Curtis has enjoyed for several years. Now she has turned her avocation into a vocation. Sherry has opened "Seams to Dreams," so that she can sew for the public in her own home.

The new business provides an outlet for her creativity, flexible work schedule, and some additional income.

"This is better for my family. I am here in the house. My sewing can be interrupted if something comes up. I can start sewing when the girls go to bed and sew until two o'clock in the morning if I want to."

For many years Sherry sewed only for herself and for the Curtis' five daughters, but then friends started to ask her to sew for them.

"People lack the time to sew for themselves. Some don't care to sew, and some don't know how to sew," says Sherry. "People like to have something that no one else has. If you have a garment made, it's more or less original. You won't see yourself every time you walk down the street."

Getting proper fit is the other reason why people sew for themselves or have garments made. "Tall people have a terrible time getting things long enough, and short people need everything shortened. With patterns you can always alter a garment. You can make it longer or shorter; longer waisted or shorter waisted, or whatever you need so that it will fit."

Careful measurements are taken when a client comes to the Curtis home. Then the garment is made from a basic pattern. Most garments require two fittings before they are finished - once before the hemming and finish stitching is done, and once after it is nearly complete.

Sherry especially likes to sew for special occasions. "I like to do the formal, dressy things best," she says.

Sherry has made several prom dresses and wedding dresses. She really likes working with satin and lace, beads and sequins.

Once she was asked to design a wedding dress and train that featured a host curly ruffles. She took one look at a

photograph of the dress, and knew that she would have to do some detective work to find out how the dress was made. She had to question several fabric store clerks and other seamstresses before she learned the technique of using curved, nylon thread to make the ruffles.

"On formal things I ask people to allow me two weeks. I don't want to put myself under too much pressure," she says. She tries to take each sewing order in rotation as it comes into her business - that way the customer will get her dress just as soon as possible.

Sometimes customers ask Sherry to help them with decorating as well as clothing. She has made tablecloths, throw pillows, curtains, and other decorative items. "I can do curtains, bedspreads and draperies, but sometimes it is cheaper to buy ready made draperies than to buy the fabric from a fabric store. It really depends on the price you have to pay for the material. If you watch your sales, you can sometimes get good prices."

Sherry learned to sew at home, but she has also taken some classes. In one she learned the techniques of sewing lingerie.

Sherry also sewed for the public when Peggy Haseloff had a shop here in town.

"Peggy had such a wide background. She knew a lot of short cuts. I learned how to construct a dress from a pattern quickly and easily from her. I also learned a lot of tailoring techniques from her."

Sherry worked at Peggy's shop when Norma Sanders of Texico needed a tailored western outfit for her induction into the Cowgirl Hall of Fame. Sherry learned many finepoints of the sewing business from that experience.

Through the years that she has sewn, Sherry has seen many changes in the sewing business.

"Patterns have become easier to read and to use," she says. Many offer a variety of sizes on the same pattern. Some range from size 8 to size 14. Others offer several options such as short sleeves and long sleeves or short skirt and long skirt all in the same package.

One pattern even boasts that the user can make a dress in four hours.

Another advance that has made sewing more pleasurable is the overlock sewing machine. It enables the user to sew a seam and finish the edge of the material at the same time.

Fabrics have also changed. Stretch knit fabrics weren't available when Sherry was a girl learning to sew. There are also many, many other types of fabrics on the market today.

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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### Kendra Stephens weds Darren Head in candlelight ceremony

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

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

The laws which banned non-white immigration were lifted in 1973. Since then immigration has really grown.

He said Australians have some ideas about jobs and pay that we do not have in this country. Unlike the U.S., "You can live off a salary working for a fast food restaurant in Melbourne today, and the health insurance is covered," he noted.

Rev. Greenthaner expressed some very mixed emotions about the salary situation in Australia. They do not reward well educated, skilled professionals as much as we do.

"I'm not sure I agree that a baggage loader on a 747 should get paid the same as the captain," he said. Nor did he feel that a cafeteria worker in a hospital should get the same pay as a surgeon. There must be some incentive for people to work hard and improve their skills.

Australia has some free enterprise mixed with a lot of

government regulation. For instance, when they were at the Melbourne Airport, the Rev. Greenthaner saw about 35 people lined up patiently waiting to be served coffee. There was only one person working at the counter. In this country, there would either be three people working at the counter, or there would be more than one counter. And, we aren't noted for our patience.

He commented upon was the Australia national health system for its workers. It is more like a national health insurance plan than anything else. The government runs the program, and everyone is assured of some type of coverage. Those who can afford it may choose type A health insurance which allows them to pick the doctors and specialists and hospitals they want if they are willing pay part of the extra costs. Those who can't, take a less inclusive health insurance policy. They may have no choice of coverage; they are simply required go to the nearest doctor or hospital.

According to Rev. Greenthaner, the government tells the drug companies, the doctors and the hospitals what they can charge. Because government is involved, cost effectiveness is a priority. Hospitals there sometimes have 8-10 people to a ward rather than private rooms that we sometimes have in

our hospitals.

Transportation is another thing that is different for the average Australian than it is for an average American. Many of them rely on trains to take them to work or to shop in their cities rather than driving cars. Greenthaner estimated that more than 100,000 people use the Melbourne trains each day.

Few cars are made in Australia. "It's cheaper to make them here and ship them there," opined Greenthaner. With a population of only 15 million, a modern automotive plant could make all of the cars the country would purchase in a year in about 2 months. Then it would have to shut down.


Australians really enjoy sports - especially football. There are often four different games going on in Melbourne alone on a Saturday with 100,000 people at each one. The Greenthaners found the Australian version of the game interesting, "I could spend a whole hour explaining the differences in rules between American football and Australian football," said the pastor.

His advice to tourists to Australia is, "If you go to Australia, don't just go to see the Sydney Opera House and Ayres Rock. There is a whole lot more to see."



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

Folks, it doesn't look good this year. However, where there's a will, there's a way. And I'm sure the Cubs have some will.


Look for a burst from the Chubbies – and a spot in the October playoffs.






