Volunteerism at its best

There are several local folks who did an outstanding job Saturday in a volunteer capacity.

First, some background:

Two years ago, the Texico - Farwell Lions Club voted to undertake a special project: renovation of the Water Tower Park in Texico. This is the small park (I would guess about 4 acres) in back of the First Baptist Church of Texico.

It was felt that it would be nifty for Texico to have nice parks on both sides of town - KKR Park on the west and Water Tower Park on the east.

But Water Tower Park was full of rocks, bricks and concrete, much of it from an old building that had been demolished years ago. There was an unusable basketball court there, with its concrete busted and hoop long gone. Bushes and trees that had been planted there years back had long since died due to lack of watering. In a nutshell, the "park" was in bad shape.

So the club asked approval from the Texico City Council back in '91 to undertake renovation of the park, which would be renamed "Lions Park" in recognition of what the club planned to do. The council voted to do so.

Well, it's one thing to say you're going to renovate something, and another to do it. A job like this takes people, money, time and expertise. And we're talking "volunteer" here.

First, it was understood that there was no sense trying to renovate the park unless a sprinkler system could be installed. The club had put in bushes years back that withered and died.

This worked out well. The City Council received a state beautification grant - and enough money was part of it to buy a sprinkler system. Then Lions Club member Joe Helton volunteered to pay for the automatic control on the sprinkler system to ensure that the park would get enough water.

The next step was the toughest - and this was accomplished in the past few weeks. First, Butch Sharp, Texico's mayor, used his equipment to prepare the ground. This had been held up for quite awhile due to the lack of moisture we've received this year - the ground was hard as a rock!

Then on Friday, Lions Club member Bill Whitesides ran a tiller over the park. And Saturday was the big work day.

Lions Club member Hal Helton and his son, Kyle, rented a ditch digger from Clovis and work started about 9 a.m. While Hal and Bill ran the ditch digger, Lions Club members John McGimpsey and Mike Pomper went to the city barns to get the sprinkler system piping. And City Council member Oran Jay Autrey rounded up over a dozen Texico kids to help remove rocks, bricks and concrete from the park.

But the key worker was Matt Meeks, a Texico city employee. Saturday was his day off. He worked the whole day - from 9 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. - and didn't receive a penny for it. It was strictly volunteer on his part.

Matt, and city water Supt. Billy Hammit, showed the Lions Club members how to correctly put in the sprinkler system. Then Matt spear-headed putting in the lines, with Lions Club members assisting.

The project went well, although it took quite awhile.

Friona council ends ultimatum

There's good news for Friona rural residents who have been worried about the City of Friona's threat to cut off rural fire protection.

The Friona City Council met Monday. City Manager Paula Wilson told the Tribune Tuesday that the council appears satisfied with the proposal that the Parmer County Commissioners approved Sept. 13 regarding payments to the county's volunteer fire departments.

Wilson said it doesn't appear that the council will stop its fire department from answering calls outside the city limits on Oct. 1.

She said the City Council agreed to send a letter to the county commissioners asking for two things:

1. That the City Council be notified each July or August of the county commissioners' intentions involving funds to the fire departments within their upcoming budgets.

2. That the county's payments to the fire departments begin sooner than December 1994.

The County Commissioners' next meeting is Monday.

The crisis came about when the City of Friona gave Parmer County a deadline of Oct. 1 for the county commissioners to sign Friona's proposed contract dealing with fire protection, or Friona would not make rural calls after that date. The county commissioners rejected that contract in August.

After the meeting Sept. 13 with representatives of all the county's fire departments, plus Friona officials, the county commissioners made this decision on how to split up its \$50,000 budgeted for fire protection in 1994:

Rhea-Hollene Fire Department would get a flat \$5,000. The remaining \$45,000 would be pro-rated to the other four departments (Lazbuddie, Farwell, Friona and Bovina) based on the percent of total rural fire calls made in 1994.

The \$45,000 would be pro-rated in December 1994 based on quarterly reports made by each fire department chief. The reports would reflect the total rural fire calls made during that year.

Farwell faces water rate hike

Water Supt. Dee Hammit recommended to the Farwell City Council Tuesday that the city's water rates be increased.

Currently, city residents pay 55¢ per 1,000 gallons and users outside the city pay 65¢. Hammit suggested they be raised to 75¢ and 85¢, respectively.

Hammit said more funds are needed due to new federal mandates. For example, he said the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency may charge Farwell \$10,000 per city well (there are three city wells) to check for insecticides. Farwell has asked for an exemption from this upcoming task, which is enforced by the Texas Water Commission.

Another EPA mandate involves testing water in 20 residences for copper and lead (at \$14 per sample). Texico began this testing last year. More testing will probably be done in January. And next year it's time to test for organics, which costs \$500 and is done every two years.

Unhappiness was expressed over these federal mandates that local cities must pay for.

Hammit also said one of the water towers will need to be cleaned next year, at a cost of over \$5,000.

No action was taken on Hammit's suggestion but the topic will come up again at the council's October meeting.

In other business, the council:

- Approved 5 percent pay raises for city employees. The annual raises were due last January but had been put off because the council wanted to see how finances looked after a city police department was begun.

- Heard Police Chief Roy McGaa report a radar gun has been installed in his car and he gave out three tickets during the past five days. Overall, in his first three months here, the police department generated about \$1,000 in fines. Depending on the type of fine, the state gets some of the money and the city keeps the rest.

- A complaint was heard that since the City Council meets the third Tuesday of each month, the bills it pays may cause a problem for some suppliers who need to be paid earlier so they can get discounts on what they buy for the city.

It was stressed that City Clerk Cynthia Thigpen has the authority to pay some bills earlier, once she gets the proper signatures on the check. So if any supplier needs to be paid earlier than when the meetings are, he needs to tell Mrs. Thigpen so she can take care of it earlier.

- Heard Mrs. Thigpen report that 7 letters had been sent to property owners where junked or abandoned vehicles were found. One problem has been eliminated, two are being worked on and 4 have ignored the city's letter, she said.

McGaa will check with city attorney Charles Aycock on the next step. The council stressed the need to enforce the ordinance.

- Heard a request from Dean Strange, of Wilbur Ellis, asking if the city could provide water and sewer to that firm, which is on the north side of Farwell along the Amarillo highway. Four-laning the highway has caused a drainfield shortage for the company, it was said.

Hammit replied that for the city to help out would be costly - pipe would have to go down 3rd Street and under 4 railroad tracks. And a lift station, costing \$12,000 minimum, would be needed.

Strange noted that his firm's request was one alternative they were looking at.

- Heard Hammit say that Gary Singer wanted to put a 35-ft. boxed-in van next to his garage for storage. Neighbors will be polled.

- Waived the usual rental fee for the Farwell Chamber of Commerce to use the community center for a Christmas on Parade event in November.

- Approved a variance for Mario Posada to put a trailer in town. Nine letters were sent to neighbors. Four responded favorably. No one was opposed. A trailer had been parked at the site in the past.

- Nominated Mark Schwertner to continue serving on the Parmer County Appraisal District Board.

- Scheduled a public hearing for 6:30 p.m. Sept. 28 at City Hall to increase the tax rate by 7.99 percent (see legal ad elsewhere in today's paper). The rate would go from .3012 per \$100 valuation to .3221 per \$100 valuation.

- Received a copy of the building condemnation ordinance used by Bovina. The council will study it and suggest any changes, and it will be discussed again at the Sept. 28 meeting. Under new state laws, building condemnation ordinances have been strengthened to allow cities more leeway in tearing down structures.

There is no grandfather clause in this new ordinance.

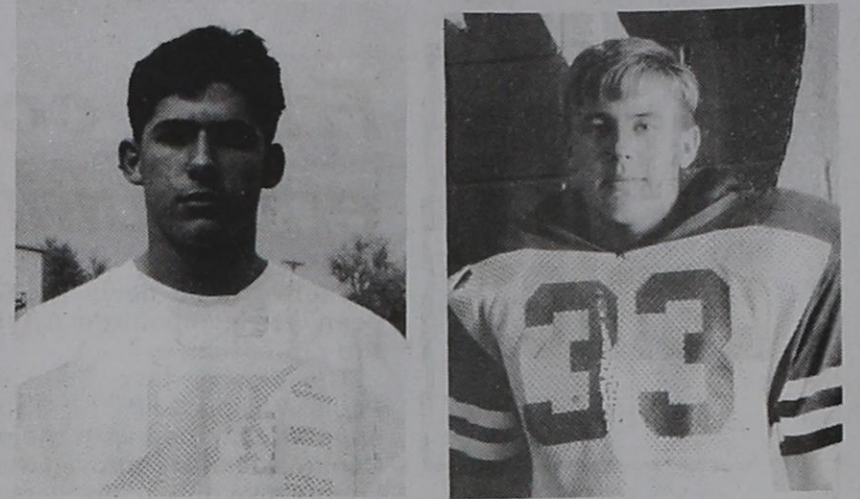
Another bright spot was Barba's two interceptions.

McGaa opens vacuum cleaner service

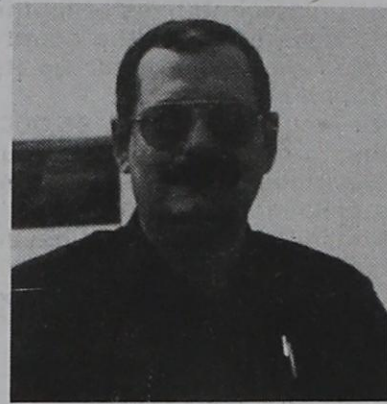
Roy McGaa has opened a new business: Roy's Vacuum Cleaner Service at 106 Ave. A, Farwell.

Farwell falls, 14-3

The Farwell Steers fell to Turpin, Okla., 14-3, at Dumas last Friday. The Steers, 0-3, host Whiteface for Homecoming tonight (Friday) at 8 p.m.

Turpin took the kickoff and moved downfield, finally scoring from the 1 yard line.

Blaze Hardage took the ensuing kick and returned it to the Steer 25. On 3rd down, Turpin intercepted at the Steer 40. Derrick Haseloff and Brock Anderson combined on a strong tackle for a 2-yard loss by the Turpin runner. Then Brent Harrison intercepted at the Steer 15.

The Steers began moving the ball well. After Harrison gained a first down, Haseloff ran for 17 yards to the Steer 42. But Farwell was held and punted.

On defense, Jeremy Ortiz, Blaze Hardage, Haseloff and Kip Atwell recorded tackles as the first quarter ended. Still on defense, Brock Anderson and Klay Camp had two tackles. Finally, Turpin was stopped and Farwell took over on offense.

Anderson hit a short pass to Jon Sullivan. But Farwell was stopped and Lupe Garza punted. Turpin was held again as Ortiz and Mahaney pressured the QB into incomplete passes. Hardage returned the punt 12 yards to the Steer 44.

The Steers moved the ball on the ground behind the running of Haseloff and Harrison. But Turpin recovered a fumble at its 37. At the Steer 44, Turpin went for it on 4th down by Mahaney got the QB for a 13-yard sack at the Turpin 43.

In the final seconds of the first half, Anderson had an interception and Farwell got the ball at the Turpin 15. A pass off a fake field goal attempt failed as the half ended.

In the third quarter, Harrison returned the kick to the Steer 15. Harrison ran for 10. Jason Taylor hit Harrison with a 4 yard pass, and a 3-yard pass to Haseloff. The Steers were stopped and the Farwell punt was locked, Turpin taking over at the Steer 41.

Tackles were made by Ortiz and Haseloff. And Farwell started on offense again. Taylor hit Haseloff with a 33-yard pass. Harrison ran for 22 yards for a first down at the Turpin 9. But a Farwell fumble was recovered by Turpin at its 8.

Mahaney had another QB sack, for a 6-yard loss. Farwell got the ball back deep in Turpin territory but was stopped by a tenacious run defense. Garza hit a 32-yard field goal to close the score to 7-3 with 40 seconds left in the quarter.

On defense, Nic Ketcherside deflected a pass. Turpin punted to the Steer 16. Illegal motion penalties hurt the Steers and Garza connected on a beautiful punt to the Turpin 35.

Harrison borked up a pass and Turpin punted to the Steer 35. Turpin recovered a fumble at the Steer 44. On defense, Mahaney, Haseloff and Ortiz had big stops. Reace Bennett stopped a runner for a 4-yard loss.

Turpin punted to the Steer 12. Turpin intercepted and returned it to the Steer 18. Ortiz, Blaze Hardage, Klay Camp and Michael Phillips had tackles. But Turpin hit a 7 yard TD pass with 1:41 left in the game.

Harrison returned the kick 36 yards to the Steer 46. Taylor hit Harrison with a 9 yard pass and a pass to Hardage. Turpin intercepted at its 28.

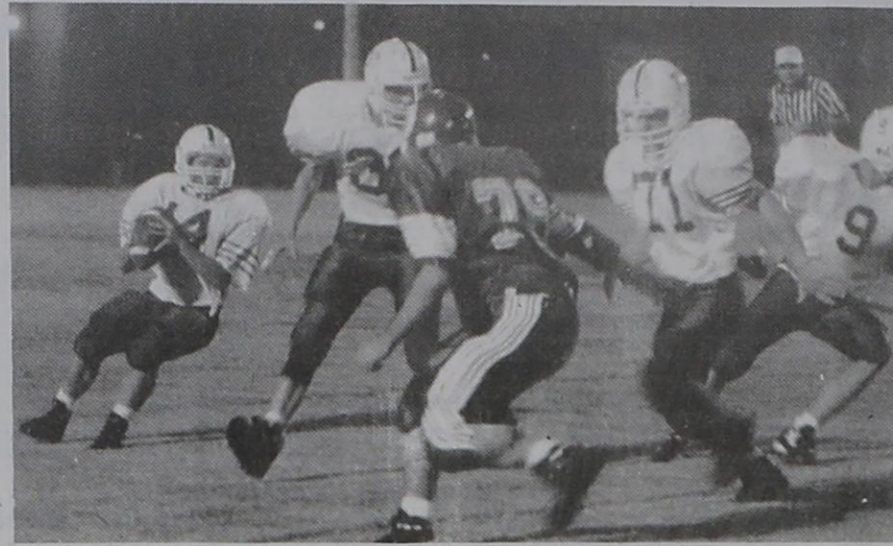
Coach Stan Stroebel commented, "We beat them on paper - getting 257 yards to Turpin's 207. But we shot ourselves in the foot, with 8 turnovers and 55 yards of penalties."

Individual statistics included: Harrison gained 101 yards rushing, and Haseloff added 39 on the ground. Taylor passed for 41 yards and Armstrong for 52.

Farwell gained 155 yards on the ground and 102 through the air. Turpin rushed for 90 yards and got 117 via passes.

Recipe of Week

Fruit Leather

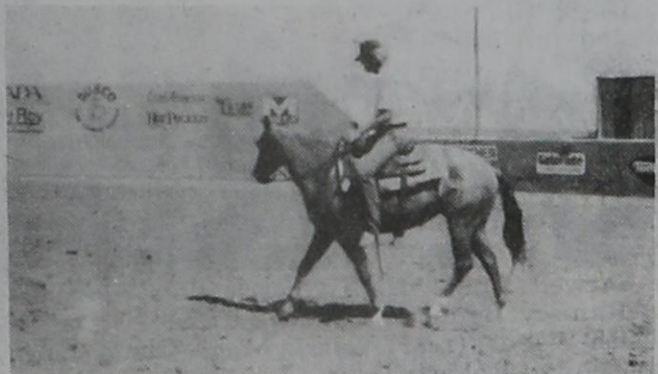
- 1 lb. dried fruit
- 1 c. boiling water
- 2 tsp. grated lemon rind
- 2 c. confectioners' sugar

Combine dried fruit and water in pan. Boil together for 5 minutes. Let fruit stand covered for about 12 hours. Put fruit in food processor with a fine blade. Process along with lemon rind. Mix well. Add 1 c. confectioner's sugar; mix well. Roll fruit mixture into a 12" x 16" rectangle on a surface sprinkled with confectioners' sugar. Sprinkle top surface of fruit leather with confectioners' sugar as necessary. Cut into 1" strips. Coat with confectioners' sugar. Store in an airtight container.

El Cid Futurity held



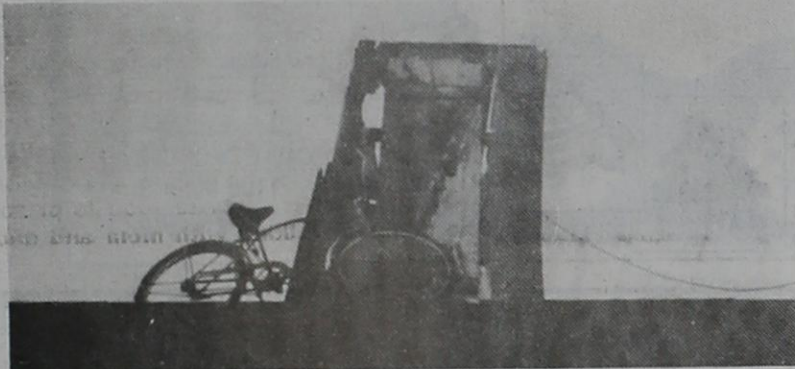

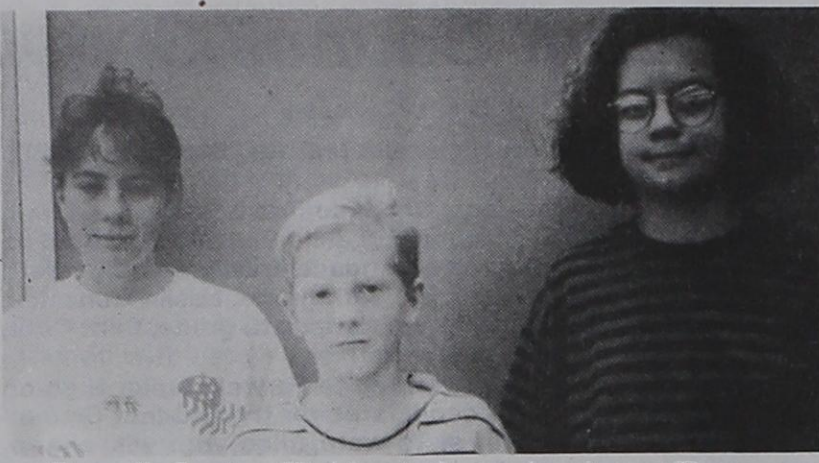

Huelin White, Farwell's student teacher in the music department, is one of only a handful of college students in the state of Texas who are being given the opportunity to student teach for a full year while receiving pay.

Normally, students in teacher education programs get only a few months of experience as a student teacher, and they have to support themselves and pay tuition during that period. White is part of a pilot program at West Texas A & M University designed to give students more experience before they become teachers.

"We are the only college in the state licensed to do this," said Harry Haines, head of the music department at West Texas A & M and also White's student teaching advisor.

"Teachers don't have enough experience before they are thrown into classrooms," said Haines. "We have the only TEA licensed program in the state."

Each year, 5 to 10 people are chosen to participate in such an internship program. This year WT has students involved in internship programs in Midland, Amarillo High, Dumas, Farwell, and Canyon.

"We think student teaching is too little too late," said Haines. He indicated that in a sense, Farwell will have the opportunity to have two band directors this year.

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
