Center found to be 'deficiency-free'

Farwell Convalescent Center Thomas Shumate reports that the last inspection by state officials of the center found it "deficiency free" for the first time in its history.

I've enjoyed watching the emergency of H. Ross Perot as a contender for the presidential nomination.

Right now, he's flying high - enjoying the disenchantment of many voters with the traditional political parties.

Now you remember in the coming months what I have just written. You watch for the relentless attacks on Perot. Just remember Gary Hart. And look what's been written about Bill Clinton's "character."

I heard one story just last weekend, where former employees of his business castigated Perot. Heck, there are some folks I fired from other newspapers I worked for who would tell you what a low-down creep I am, too.

I really don't have an answer to this problem. It's just part of the price we must pay for having participatory democracy. All I can say is that we need to have an overview of our candidates and we must dismiss the smaller nuances.

I ran into a real unusual Texas law the other day.

It involves another Panhandle newspaper, but it's something that Texas schools, such as Farwell, Lazbuddie, Bovina, etc., ought to be aware of.

I had always assumed that schools, being non-profit, were tax exempt.

WRONG.

Here's what happened: Another newspaper, which was audited by the state comptroller's office, was cited for not getting sales tax for publications it printed for its local public school system.

You read that correctly. When I first heard about this, I assumed a mistake had been made. Not so. In fact, I was shown the law where it is specifically stated that all Texas schools must pay sales taxes for educational materials it has printed.

The same law exempts non-profit groups - but specifically doesn't include public schools.

I guess that means that public schools are profit-making groups, right?

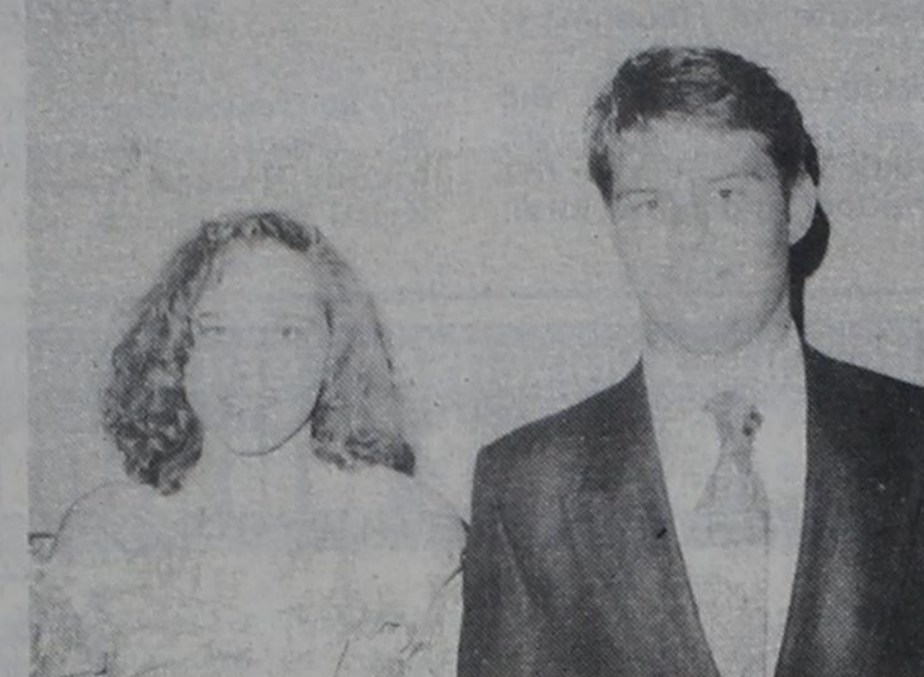
I realize that this sounds kind of flaky, but all I can say is that it's correct.

So you school superintendents better pay heed to it. When you have a publication printed, you have to pay sales tax to the state on it.

It's a funny world, isn't it?

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New Mexico primary nears

New Mexico voters will go to the polls on June 2 for the primary election.

According to the Curry County Clerk's office, 13,393 voters have registered for this election - down from the county's 15,000 voter high.

Only those registered as Democrats or Republicans will be eligible to vote in the primary.

All of the voters will be able to vote for the U.S. president and for Congressional races. After that, there are 34 different ballot combinations possible in Curry County due to redistricting. Voters may have either a Democrat or a Republican ballot.

Texico voters will be voting for State Representative District 66. They will pick from Michael G. Miller and Earlene Roberts on the Republican ballot or Dewey F. Langston for the nomination on the Democrat ballot.

Texico voters will also vote in State Senatorial District 42. The Republican ballot will have Billy J. Mc Kibben as the only candidate for the State Senatorial race.

Incumbent County Commissioner Joel David Snyder, a Democrat, is unopposed.

Pleasant Hill voters have only one choice for State Representative. Blake B. Curtis, a Republican, is the only candidate.

Pleasant Hill voters will have a choice for Senatorial District 7. On the Democrat ballot they may pick from Paul E. Davidson or John L. Morrow. On the Republican ballot they may pick from Sacramento H. Baca or Patrick H. Lyons for this office.

County Commissioner Paul D. Barnes, a Democrat, is unopposed.

There are six Democrats and a lone Republican vying for the magistrate judge Division 1 seat held by Democrat Caleb J. Chandler. Ben Salazar, Henry W. Bayless, Jakelyn A. Zimmerman, Danny Tipton, and Jerry Sparks are the Democrats. Republican Gordon W. Hayes is the only Republican candidate for this office.

The new districting will pose challenges for both the voters and for the county officials, but most of those challenges have been met by extra work.

"It will be confusing for the voters and confusing for us. We hope that we will be getting the right ballots to the right polls," said Connie Jo Lyman, the Curry County Clerk. "We're gonna have to live with this new districting system for the next 10 years, so we better get used to it."

Texico may raise water rates

The Texico City Council Tuesday approved its working budget for submission to the state for final approval. A rise in water rates may be called for.

In other business, the council:

- Decided to take back 25 cents of each \$2 fee paid by users of the community swimming pool this year due to maintenance costs. Previously, the city got back a dime on each \$2 fee. Heard Steve Meeks report the pool is about ready for filling.

- Approved Texico's participation in the Curry County DWI Task Force. There's no financial obligation to the city. Some overtime funds, from a state grant, are given to Texico's police. After the vote, it was felt that Texico is short-changed on how much money they get from this program.

- Postponed discussion on two subjects because City Attorney Duane Hamar wasn't present: a request to block streets and use city land for the planned 4th of July jamboree, and the mobile home that was moved on to the Ralph Autrey Jr. property without approval.

- Heard councilwoman Carolyn Burrows say she felt that the city wasn't getting all the gross receipts taxes it was due. She is investigating.

- Approved shredding the wheat on the new land bought for the city cemetery.

- Heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey urge that a tree he said was about one-third dead at KKR Park be cut back. He got an estimate from a firm for \$45 an hour for 5 to 7 hours to do this job.

Shot's Tree Trimming, Clovis, and the state highway department will be checked with first before a decision is made.

- Called an executive session at councilman Butch Tharp's request to discuss the community building.

Lottery to start

With the lottery starting May 29, here's how you play:

The first game that will be offered by the Texas Lottery will use scratch-off / instant-win tickets. On-line games will begin later this year.

The initial theme is Lone Star Millions. In this game, you can win \$2, \$5, \$10, \$20, \$50, \$100, \$1,000, or \$10,000 instantly or a chance to enter the weekly drawing for \$1 million.

To play, you purchase a ticket for \$1. Scratch off the latex covering the entire play area. If three dollar amounts match, then you win the amount of money. For example, if you uncover three \$5 symbols, then you win \$5.

If you uncover three ENTRY symbols, your ticket qualifies as an entry in the weekly million dollar drawing. Fill out the information on the back of the qualifying ticket and mail it to Grand Drawing, P.O. Box 149777, Austin, Texas, 7874-9777.

Prizes of less than \$1,000 can be redeemed instantly by the retailer. Prizes of \$1,000 and \$10,000 must be claimed at any one of the 24 Lottery claim centers across the state, or by mail using a form provided by the retailer.

You must be 18 years of age or older to play. All winnings are subject to federal income tax. Winners receiving more than \$600

will receive \$5,000 or more will have 20 percent of their winnings withheld for taxes.

Farwell teachers encourage computer improvements

The Farwell Schools Technology Committee presented a program on computers to the school board on May 19. The staff collected two years worth of data and prepared a program that demonstrated the software and hardware needed to network the computers in the computer lab to allow students to work at different levels at the same time.

"They worked out all the software and all the hardware suggested by the teachers actually in the classroom," said Junior High Principal Jerry Dee Owen. "This is site based management right out of the classroom."

If it goes through, the technology plan suggested by the teachers is estimated to cost about \$100,000.

"If it goes through, it is because the board believes in these teachers and their recommendations to update the computer labs," Owen added. "I'm proud of that committee. They went to the trouble to see what was needed and had the courage to ask for it. It was a good all-

out effort.

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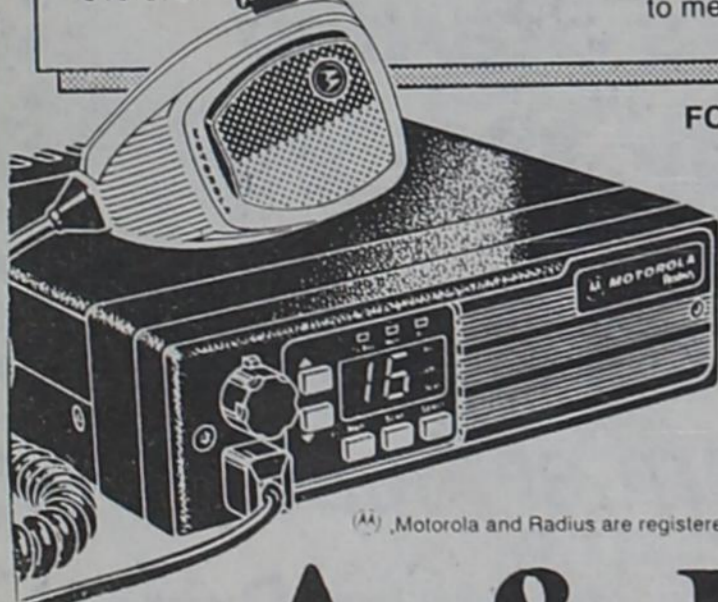

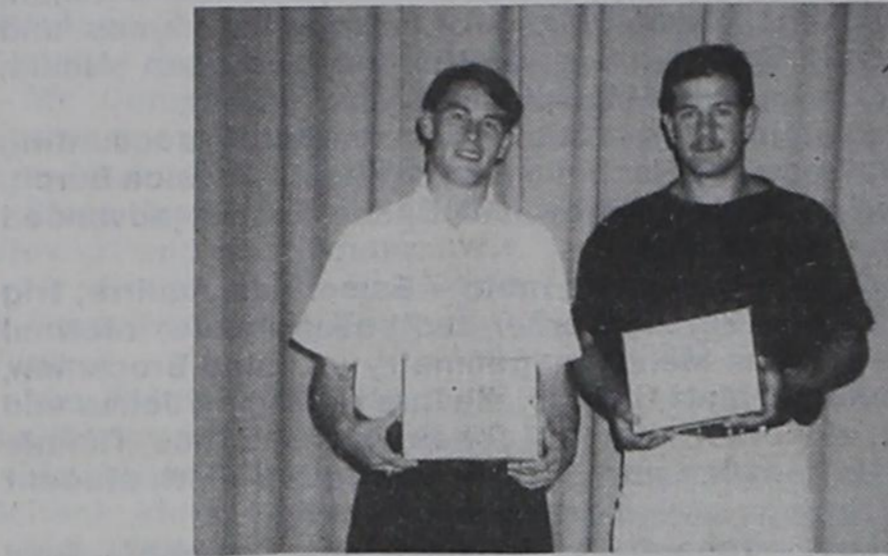
Mrs. Martin said that when Greg and his wife Cathy arrived in Turkey they were re-

WASHINGTON --A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

Recipe of Week

Oriental Chicken

1 1/2 lbs. thinly sliced boneless chicken
2 Tbs. soy sauce
1 tsp. garlic salt
1/8 tsp. pepper
2 Tbs. oil

Coat the chicken with the soy sauce and spices, and stir fry on high for about 2 minutes until cooked through. Set aside while you stir fry the vegetables

2 Tbs. oil
2 slices fresh ginger root
2 carrots, julienne sliced
1 red pepper, chopped
1 - 6 oz pkg. frozen snow peas
1 c. cashew nuts or almonds
2 Tbs. soy sauce
1/2 tsp salt
2 tsp. sugar.

Heat oil in a wok or skillet on high heat. Add remaining ingredients. Remove the ginger root before serving. Mix the chicken into the vegetable mixture.

More nitrogen urged

With optimum cotton planting dates nearing, a Texas Tech University researcher is encouraging area cotton farmers to replenish the amount of nitrogen that was leached from the surface of the soil to a depth of 18 inches by heavy spring and fall rains.

"There should be 20 to 30 pounds of nitrogen in the top foot of the soil prior to planting for maximum seedling growth. However, most soils in the region have less than 2 parts per million of NO3 nitrogen at this time. This is very low and represents only 8-10 pounds of nitrogen per foot of soil. If a producer has not put out additional nitrogen prior to planting, then he will need to do so shortly after the cotton crop is established. Otherwise, the cotton seedling's above-ground growth will be slow until its roots grow enough to encounter deeper soil nutrients," said Dr. Dan Krieg, professor in the Agronomy Department at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

He adds that the sandier the soil, the deeper the plant roots will have to go to reach the carry-over nitrogen leached into the lower part of the plant root zone.

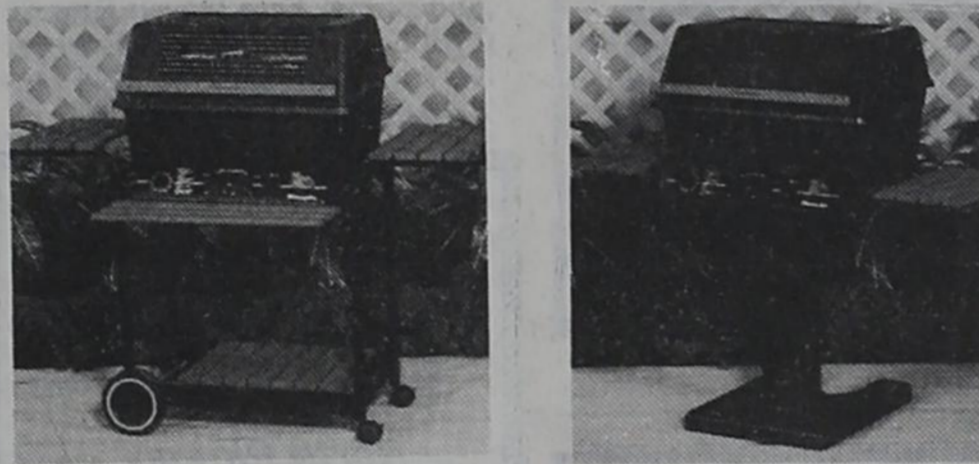
"The cotton seedlings will need a little kick to help them start growing this year. With the excellent soil moisture conditions, it's as if they were sitting in pure water. There is simply not enough soil nutrients to get them off and running," said Krieg.

Krieg cautions cotton producers not to add nitrogen during planting. "If farmers put nitrogen down at planting, they could cause toxicity damage to the cotton seed. It's best to wait until the crop is established before adding additional nitrogen, if it has not already been done.

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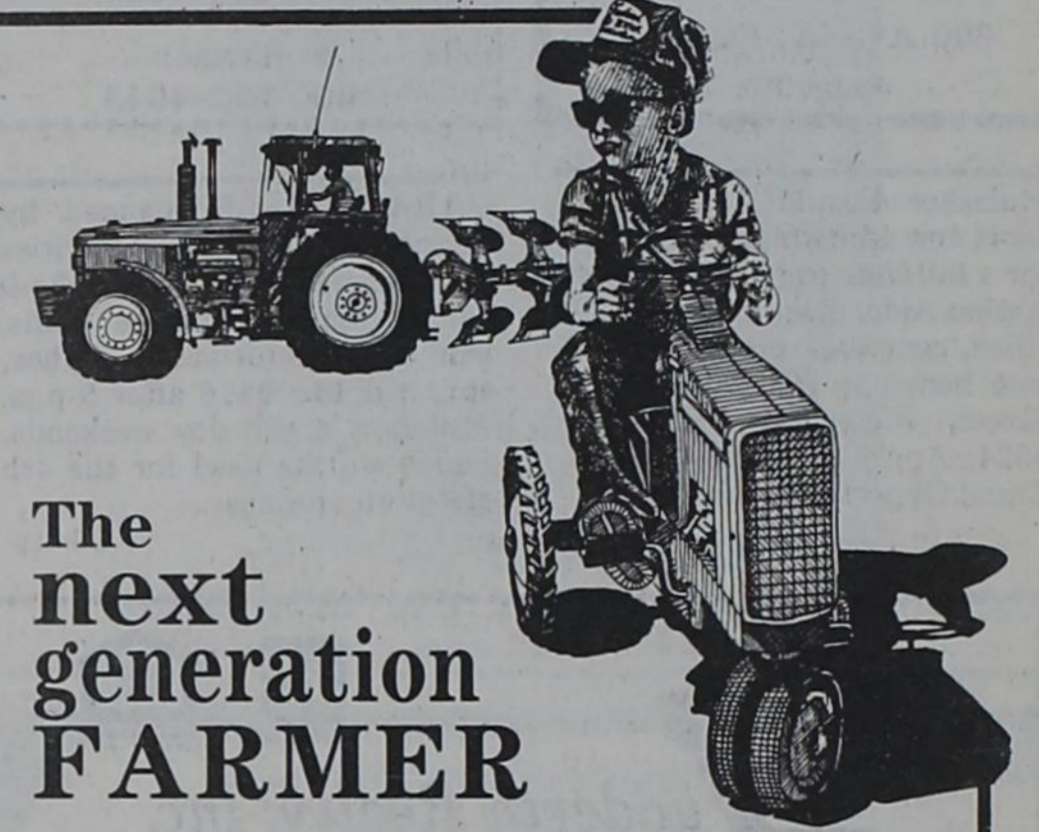

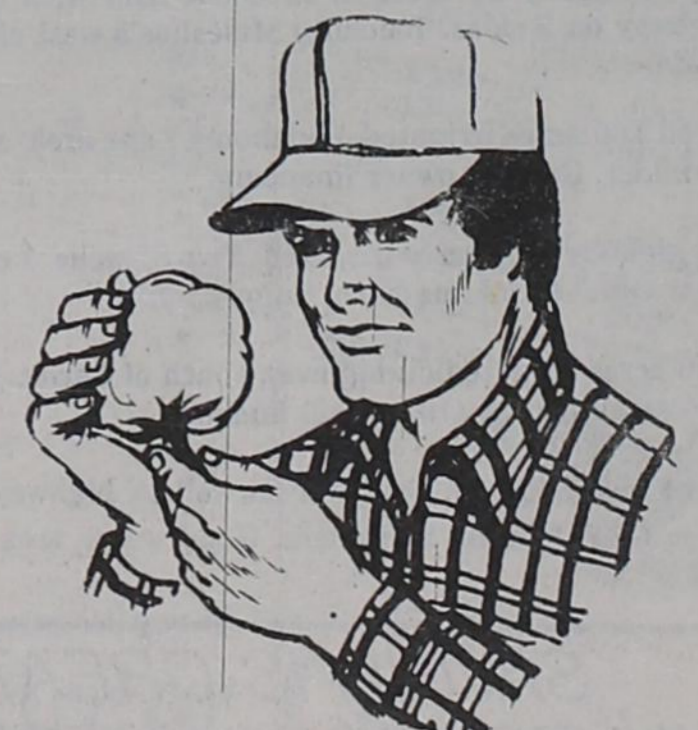

School Supt. Richard Bootby addressed nearly 90 students, parents, teachers and board members. His address included several sage words of advice including:

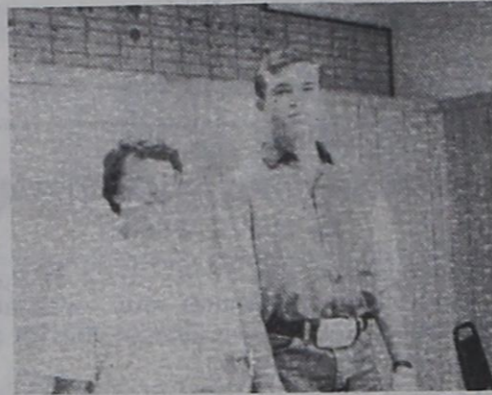

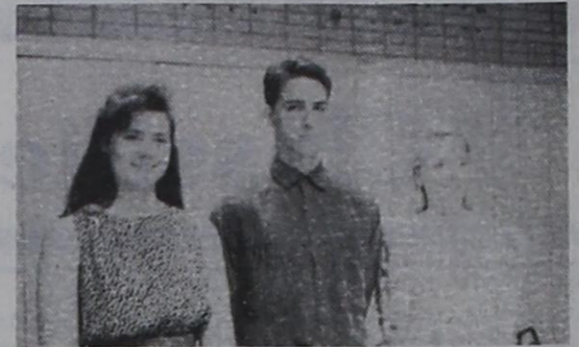

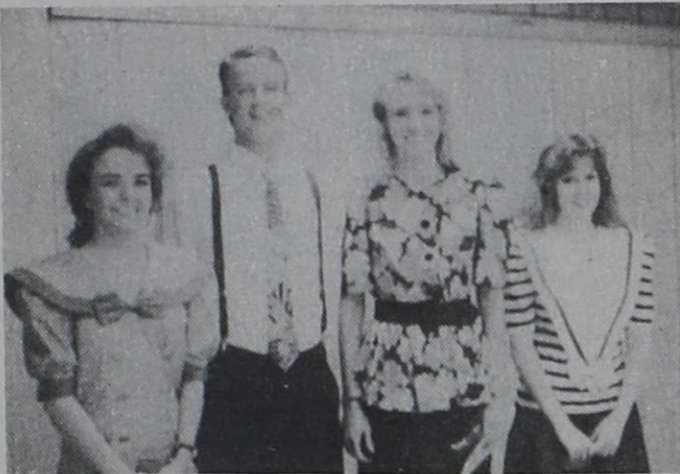

The PTA voted to spend \$240 on books for the elementary school library. The money was raised from the ice cream sale. According to

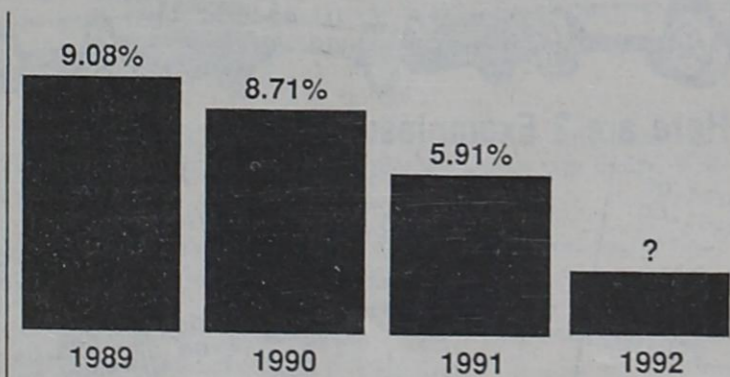
Sheree Montgomery, school library aide, the school will receive 43 paperback books and 20 hardback books from the PTA.

PTA has also collected Campbell's Soup can labels which they exchanged for jump ropes and playground balls for the school. They have also honored the students of the month each month.

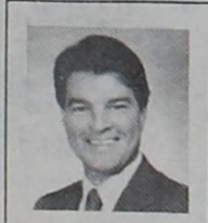
