Bond issue work begins

The Farwell School Board Tuesday voted to start the legal mechanism to call for a \$1.5 million dollar bond issue to construct more school facilities.

The board will officially vote to call for the bond issue on Aug. 3. The bond election would take place on Sept. 22.

"We want to take advantage of the low interest rates, and to try not to increase taxes too much," said Supt. Richard

According to Boothby, the plans call for adding new classrooms to each current building - elementary, junior high

and senior high. A gymnasium with a concession stand area, 2 restrooms

and dressing rooms would be added to the high school. There would also be 2 classrooms added for to the high school.

Plans call for 4 junior high classrooms, 2 additional restrooms which would be shared by the cafeteria and junior high, and a commons area to be shared with the elementary school.

The addition to the elementary school would include 4 classrooms, a library, and boys' and girls' restrooms.

Some of the additional classrooms will house special education classrooms.

The board also voted to go to a self-funded worker's compensation program. "Farwell would be pooled with similar North Texas schools where workman's compensation claims are not so prevalent," said Boothby. The program calls

Lower assessment rate to start July 31

The last of the grower approved reforms to the Cotton Research and Promotion Order go into effect July 31 according to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG). That is the day USDA officials have announced rules authorizing the collection of assessments will take effect, actual collection will probably begin August 1.

July 31 is also the day a lower supplemental assessment rate goes into effect. Beginning July 31 both domestic and imported cotton will be assessed at a rate of \$1 plus five-tenths of one percent of the value of the bale. The new rate will be effective for three years. After three years the assessment will revert back to the

previous rate of \$1 plus six-tenths of one

percent of the value of the bale.

"Many of the producers who voted to end their own right to a refund under the research and promotion program have been concerned with the delay in beginning the assessment of imported cotton," says Larry Nelson, PCG Chairman of the Board and Vice Chairman of Cotton Incorporated's (CI) Board of Directors. "We have finally worked out all the details and are now ready to begin collecting these assessments."

Nelson notes that the payment of. assessments on imported cotton will provide a significant boost in CI's operating budget beginning with the 1992 crop. The lowering of the supplemental assessment rate from six-tenths to five-tenths of one percent of the value of each bale of cotton will lower total collections for the program by an estimated \$4.6 million dollars.

"The reduction of the supplemental assessment by one-tenth of one percent doesn't look like a big drop at first glance," explains Nelson. "In actual dollars that one-tenth of one-percent reduction represents a full 10-percent of CI's projected 1993 budget."

Nelson says that CI's projected budget is based on estimates of overall supply and the estimated price the cotton will bring when harvested. This years crop losses and depressed prices will have a big impact on the eventual size of CI's 1993 budget.

Another item that will be determined from the price farmers receive for their cotton is the 1992-crop deficiency payment. Calculation of the deficiency payment rate is based on a formula that calculates the weighted average farm price of cotton and subtracts that figure from the current target price of 72.9-cents.

Preliminary figures show marketings for the month of May totaled 247,000 bales with an average price received of 52.2 cents per pound. May's preliminary marketing total is the first to come in lower than

marketings for the same month in 1991. Preliminary figures indicate total marketings of 6,321,000 bales so far in 1992. In contrast 1991 marketings didn't top the 6 million bale level until September.

Preliminary marketings and the cents per pound farm prices for January through May are included in the table below.

As she states, Farwell is very much in need of a town marshal or city police department of some kind. While it is helpful to have the Sheriff's Department located in Farwell, it is still a Sheriff's Department and not a City Police Department. They simply can not handle all the calls they get from the citizens of Farwell. We need someone who

can and will handle these calls.

In the July 17th issue of the State Line Tribune, there is an article on the possibility of raising the trash fund in order to provide Farwell with a city police officer. It also stated that the council is considering a referendum, giving Farwell residents a chance to vote on this. We urge everyone in Farwell to vote "YES." Farwell needs a city policeman. Please do everything that you can to see that Farwell gets an officer.

There is a lot more going on in Farwell than most people would like to think. Just last month there was a police report in the paper stating that drug related arrests were made right here in Farwell. Yes there are drug dealers living in Farwell. There are also many other problems that occur in town that only a city officer can take care of and put a stop to. Again, we urge all of you to write letters as Joyce did, to call the Mayor and Councilmen and to vote yes to a city police officer of Farwell. Sincerely,





On one of my trips to Peshawar, at the Pakistan end of the Khyber Pass, I had the opportunity to visit an Afghan refugee camp. There are several million Afghans who remain in Pakistan and Iran because of the lengthy war in Afghanistan.

It will take time before the refugees can go home to Afghanistan. There are believed to be as many as 13,000,000 land mines planted in Afghanistan's deserted fields and villages. The international effort to enter Afghanistan and clear the country of mines is doing the most it can, but at the current rate that mines are being cleared, I am told it will take 400 years to clear them all.

The Afghans consist of several tribes of fiercely independent tribesmen who have managed to resist every attempted invasion in history, including the British and the Soviets. When they are not chasing invaders out of their country, they are frequently engaged in killing each other. Each house and each village across the countryside is a fortress with no windows, stout gates, and ramparts around the walls.

The Afghans are also some of the most skilled horsemen in the world. The national sport is called buzkashi in which any number of horsemen fight for the possession of a goat carcass. They clash with other horses and their riders to hoist the burden up onto their thigh, and then thunder down the plains to drop it in a small circle. There are no teams, it's every rider against every other rider, and there are no rules. Horses' hooves and whips are used constantly in the attempts to gain control of the carcass.

The buzkashi matches have a lot of crowd participation, especially when the tangle of horses and riders and whips thunder off the plain and into the crowd as it did when I was there. That seemed to be a real crowd-pleaser, oddly enough.


At the completion of the buzkashi match, I left for the evening to prepare for a journey up the Khyber Pass to the border of Afghanistan.







The object of the players in Buzkashi is to hoist the carcass of a dead goat up onto one rider's leg, and elude everyone else while they try to steal it away from the person who has possession of the animal. There are no rules and any number of players may participate.







Texico-Farwell Lions ask for eye donations

This information came from Donna Ratke, president of the Texico-Farwell Lions Club:

One of the most important projects that the New Mexico Lions clubs sponsor is the the New Mexico Lions Eye Bank. Lions Club members donate money, service, and eye tissue to help the blind see.

Medical science has made tremendous progress in preventing and curing blindness due to certain causes. Newly developed surgical techniques require the use of eye tissue which can be grafted or transplanted from a normal eye to a diseased or injured eye. But, medical science can not do this job alone.

Lions Club members help to make people aware of the need for their eye tissue. They also help to teach people how donate their eyes to the service of others. Any eye from any age person may be used for this program.

The Eye Bank collects corneas and other eye tissues needed to restore sight to the blind. These eyes are removed from dead persons shortly after their deaths.

The Eye Bank does not charge the patients or the hospitals

for this eye tissue. Eyes are never bought or sold. There is no cost to the heirs.

But, the eyes must be removed within 6 hours after death. One of the major problems of the Eye Bank is that the immediate family fails to remember that their loved one has pledged his eyes so that others may see. Lions Club members who wish to donate their eyes need to take the following steps so that their wishes may be carried out:

* Advise your family so that they can make arrangements.

* Advise your clergyman.
* Advise your family physician.


* Advise the hospital upon entering.

* Call the nearest eye bank for an eye donor pledge form.

The eyes donated for this program cannot be designated for any specific person. They are used for the next patient on

the waiting list. If no patient needs the eye tissues locally at the time, the tissues can be shipped elsewhere or preserved for later use.

If donated eyes are diseased or cannot be used for grafting they can still serve a valuable purpose through research or study.



Recipe of Week

Mud Pie

1 prepared cookie crumb crust

1 gallon butter pecan ice cream,softened

Combine sugar, milk. corn syrup and dates in a saucepan. Cook to softball stage (240 degrees). Add pecans. Cool to lukewarm; do not stir. Beat mixture thickens and loses its luster. Pour onto a cold damp cloth. Shape into a roll; roll in chopped pecans. Chill until firm. Slice.

Cinnamon butter 2 sticks butter or margarine, softened



Want some Cannon Ball stock?

Roy Richardson of Texico dropped by the Tribune office recently to show us a stock certificate and some

correspondence concerning the Cannon Ball Motor Company which made automobiles in Texico about 1918.

Richardson said that he was in Branson, Mo., in May for a Holiday Rambler Travel Club Convention. When he said that he was from Texico, a fellow he met, John V. Eichelberger, Jr. of Pensacola, Fla., said that he had some papers about the Cannon Ball Motor Company in his possession that he gotten

from his grandfather's estate. When Richardson got home, he received copies of a stock certificate and some correspondence about the company which was one of the early businesses in Texico.

The letterhead for each letter says: C.A. Roberson Brockerage Company, Stocks, Bonds and High Grade Securities, (Incorporated) Texico, New Mexico. R.O. James, Sec'y and Mgr. Capital Stock Fully Paid, \$25,000.00

The first letter is dated, Nov. 13, 1918. Here's what it said:

Mr. John Eichelberger, Yakima Wash. Route #7. Dear Sir:

Owing to the fact that Cannon Ball stock is now being held for \$5.00 per share, it is impossible for us to mail you literature on same as we have been so handicapped on account of influenza that we could not get this literature printed to date. The following is a brief description of the business of the Cannon Ball Motor Company.



Whitten is a 1983 Bovina High School graduate; he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Whitten of Bovina. Mrs. Whitten is a graduate of Friona High School. She is very happy to be closer to home and family.

Bret Whitten's interest in veterinary medicine goes back a long time. He spent 7 - 8 summers working for Dr. Dale

Schueler at Rhea. "He helped me a lot," says Whitten. The experience was invaluable.

The Whittens met while studying at West Texas State University. Both earned their undergraduate degrees there.

During the next few years, Whitten enrolled in veterinary school at Texas A& M while Mrs. Whitten taught speech therapy. Following graduation, Whitten became an associate veterinarian at a veterinary clinic in Wheeler, Texas.

Their daughter, Megan, was born 19 months ago. Since that time Mrs. Whitten has been a homemaker. She will be serving as the receptionist and as an assistant in the clinic.

Last November Whitten began building his own business. The large animal clinic is housed in a metal barn built on his property on Hwy. 60 West about 1/2 mile west of the Sherley Anderson Elevator in Bovina. There are also outdoor pens and chutes set up for the large animal clinic.

The family moved the mobile home that they had lived in for six years to the property west of Bovina so that it could become the small animal clinic and surgery. They set up examining tables and storage space for equipment and supplies. Their former home will also house the dark room, ex-ray department and office.

The clinic will be open from 8:30 a.m. - 5:30 p.m. Monday - Friday and from 8:30 a.m. - noon on Saturday. Dr. Whitten will be available for emergencies, too.

The clinic will serve farm animals and pets as well.

Whitten stressed the fact that the simple act of administering shots to dogs and cats will be an important part of his practice. "The big thing is routine vaccinations. There are a lot of diseases we can prevent by giving vaccinations," he said.

Dr. Whitten can also assist with neutering pets and setting bones following an accident.

Farm animals will be a major part of Whitten's work. In the spring Dr. Whitten will be available to help with calving, and in the fall he will assist with herd general health processing.

The Farwell High School Band will practice for Border Town Days at 7 p.m. on July 24 in the Band Hall.




"Where's he at now?"
