## **Texas lottery** starts May 29

Texas' lottery starts May

Instant prizes for the 'Lone Star Millions' game will range from \$2 to \$10,000 but thousands of tickets will offer Lottery players a chance to enter million- dollar grand prize drawings.

The Texas lottery staff has 186 employees, compared to California's 1.000 and Florida's 775.

Based on current projections, the Texas Lottery should earn enough in less than a week of ticket sales to cover - with 10 percent interest the \$12 million the Legislature appropriated for startup.

More than 2 million winning tickets, providing as much as \$7.1 million in prizes, should be sold on opening day. More than 28,000 of the first-day tickets offer a chance to enter the \$1 million grand prize drawings.

The packages of \$1 tickets will be distributed to the Lottery's network of about 14,700 retailers several days before the May 29 kick- off.

"Texans will find this first game easy to play," Lottery Director Nora Linares said. "All they have to do is scratch the latex covering off of all six Lone Stars on the front of the ticket. Each scratch reveals a prize amount. Any ticket with three matching prize amounts is a winner." The overall odds of winning

an instant prize are one in 7.9. Ticket sales will begin at 6 a.m. May 29, with the Texas Lottery activates the computer system that validates winning tickets.

Any Lottery retailer may redeem prizes of \$100 or less. Winners of \$1,000 or \$10,000 prizes must bring or mail their tickets to one of 24 Lottery claim centers that have been established across the state.

Details of how the weekly grand prize drawing will be conducted will be released later.

Farwell will have five lottery outlets: Farwell United Drug, Helton Oil, Allsup's, Hughes True Value and Capitol Food.

### Council ruling criticized

This letter is in reference to a mobile home variance for 800 Ave. D that was brought before the city council on April 28. Your paper of April 30 did not have the whole story.

First of all, there has never been anything on these lots but a mobile home, and it had only been 6 days since one had been moved out.

These people claim that mobile homes lower the value of their property because mobile home owners "do not keep their yards or property up to standards." Also, I was given a cost of \$35.00 by city hall for this variance and received a bill for \$48.68. This is not the first time my son and his wife have run into this problem. After finding some lots on one street for sale, they were told by one of our former city officials that if they bought a new double wide, he might consider not opposing the sale since he owns property close by and would be polled. Smells like discrimination to me! Or is it prejudice?

Why is it this city is always talking about wanting people to move here, then making it next to impossible for that to happen, unless you meet their standards and qualifications. This basically means you must have been born and raised here and your grandpa must have been born and raised here. If this is not the case, then the majority of the people would just as soon you went elsewhere.

There are a lot of good people in Farwell, but a few . bad apples will spoil the whole barrel and that is what is happening here in Farwell.
