Art display coming here

Security State Bank in Farwell will be displaying 50 to 60 pierce of art on July 9 and 10 during bank hours in their

The artwork represents many artists from three galleries - Altermann and Morris Galleries, Houston / Dallas; Canyon Art Gallery, Canyon, and Rice Fine Art. Amarillo.

Richard Rice of Rice Fine Art heads the event. A collector for many years, he eventually decided to become a fine arts dealer on a fulltime basis.

Canyon Art Gallery is owned by Mary Cornette and was opened in 1965. Her gallery has represented many outstanding artists such as Porfirio Salinas, Fremont Ellis and G. Harvey.

Altermann and Morris was founded by Tony Altermann, who has been in the art business for 20 years. The gallery is recognized nationally for its two major art exhibits - the American Arts Classic in Houston and the Collectors Sale in Dallas.

The combination of the three galleries' inventory makes an impresssive presentation which covers western, wildlife, landscape, impressionist and figurative art. Watercolors, oil, drawings, bronzes and limited edition prints are included.

Prices of the artwork range from \$200 to about \$25,000. Here's some background on some of the artists that will be represented:

Paul Calle - He is best known for his pencil drawings. He designed the "First Man on the Moon" stamp and many others, including Robert Frost, Douglas MacArthur and "The International Year of the Children." A retrospective of his works is to be held this year at the Gilcrease Museum in

Frank C. McCarthy - He's been an illustrator for 21 years for most national magazines and a member of the Cowboy Artist of America since 1975. Retrospectives of his work have been held at the Gilcrease Museum in Tulsa, Museum of the Southwest in Midland, and the Norton Museum in

Tom Lovell - He's been an illustrator for many years for national magazines. He was commissioned by Abell Hanger Foundation to do a series of 14 historical painting that now hang in the Permian Basin Petroleum Museum in Midland. He's a member of the National Academy of Western Artists. Cowboy Artists of America and Society of Illustrators Hall of Fame. He was the only artist to win the Prix de West award twice at the National Cowboy Hall of Fame.

A.D. Greer - His larger landscapes have sold for over \$100,000. One of the Southwest's best known landscape artists, he was expelled from public schools for drawing in class.

John Leone - An illustrator for many years doing covers for western books, he was featured in "Southwest Art" magazine in October 1982.

Robert Wood - He probably was one of the nation's best known landscape artists. He spent many of his early years in texas. He died in 1979.

G. Harvey - The subject of two books, he was featured in "Southwest Art" and many other art magazines. He currently Is working on a series for the National Archives and had a show at the Smithsonian in 1991. He probably is Texas' most popular western artist.

John Paul Strain - A Texas artist whose work in gouache was featured in "Art of the West" magazine.

William Whitaker - He has been featured in "Artists of the Rockies" and "Southwest Art" magazines.: He is best known for his figure paintings of young women.

Queener injured


